KENTUCKY ITEMS.

Sheep are dying of pneumonia fever in Boone county.

Five horses in Lincoln are selling at \$200, and five at \$275.

In Lexington heavy bringing \$4.00 per 100, and light \$3.50.

Washington county a lot of hog, average weight, 200 pounds, sold at 64 cents.

The Louisville cattle market was brisk on the 18th, with an advance of 10 to 30 for best beef.

It is reported on good authority that a sale of 300 head of cattle was held on the 10th, at 75, for delivery in June, July and August.

This is the highest sale of the season, and shows the feeder and grazer a good profit.

What is quite unpromising in Caldwell county and section of many farmers propose to give up and sell their wheat and plant the ground in corn.

Parts Court, 100 cattle on the market, not very good, sold at \$3.50 per pair; 50 or 60 brook sows brought from \$100 to \$200.

Dr. T. B. Wright, of Warren county, raised on one and quarter acres of land 2,400 pounds of fine Burley tobacco.

Harrodsburg Court: Moderate supply of common and inferior cattle on the market. Prices ranged from 10 to 40; fair demand for good two-year-olds, and good work mules in the market.

Common and good hogs exchanged hands quite freely at from \$75 to \$100 per head.




