News in General.

THE EXPOSITION.

The arrangements have not completed their work yet, but so far as they have gone the results have been encouraging. A large meeting, which will be attended by the Governor and other prominent officials from Frankfort, will be held to-night (Tuesday), at the Opera House. After that is over the company will be banqueted at the Oak House.

CITY.

The structure of the elevated railroad is nearly completed. Dr. L. P. Randall died on Wednesday.

THE STATE.

Twelve houses were burned at Corydon, Ky. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$8,000.

The Warford family at Lyndon, near Louisville, ten in number, have all had the smallpox; four dead already.

Humphrey Critchenden, who murdered George Hutchinson in duet country, has been sentenced to hang. A bill will be introduced in the Kentucky House of Representatives this week, making pool-selling or betting on horse races punishable by a fine of not less than \$250 nor more than \$500.

A syndicate of New York capitalists has taken \$2,000,000 of the bonds of the Henderson (Ky.) Ohio River Bridge Company, and the work will be pushed to completion.

The House of Representatives appropriated \$1,200 to provide for the removal of the remains of the great Kentucky sculptor, Joel T. Hart, from Florence, Italy, to the cemetery at Frankfort.

GENERAL.

The grand jurors at Bayou Sara, La., has given away, and several parades are being instituted.

By an explosion in the Flat Top Mines, Tazewell county, Virginia, 150 lives are supposed to have been lost.

Matt Lewis, colored, was hanged at St. Louis after four convictions and seven years' imprisonment.

Two prisoners escaped from the jail at Windsor, Ontario, and killed the jailer. One was captured, the other was shot.

Bids to supply the ashes for the main building of the New Orleans Exposition, come from no less than fourteen different States, North, East, South and West.

Prentiss Tillar, who robbed the Pacific Express Company at St. Louis, has been captured and a large portion of the stolen money recovered.

The Senate passed a bill the other day providing Alaska with a government. A provision of this bill prohibits the liquor traffic in the territory except for medicinal and scientific purposes. What will prove an almost infallible blessing to Alaska, would be good for all the territories.

It is announced from Washington that the arrangements for the Greely relief expedition are progressing satisfactorily, and that the Bear and Thetis will probably be ready to sail for the Arctic Seas by May 1st, and the supply ship Alert a few weeks later. About seventy-five men have already been accepted to man the vessels.

Robert Small, colored, was nominated for Congressman by the Republicans of the Seventh North Carolina District on the 10th inst., to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Mackey's death. The nomination is equivalent to an election.

The Pope appears to be making a particular raid on this country. He is appointing Archbishops, Monarchs and Counts by the wholesale. There are sixteen Monarchs now in the United States, Wisconsin being favored with three of them.

There is an institution for the education of Indian children in the vicinity of Wabash, Indiana. Forty of them arrived there last week from near the Black Hills in charge of White's Institute, a normal labor educational institution of the Quaker church ten miles south of the city. The children are to be placed in the school and, together with the thirty-seven who were brought there from the West last year, receive thorough education. The United States bears the expense of their transportation and tuition is furnished by the institution free. There are now thirty-five Indian boys and forty-two girls in the institution, representing every important tribe in the Northwest.
