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above were baptized—they were baptized in broad daylight, while previous- ly baptism had been performed under cover of night for fear of men—a multi- tude came to see it. One of the newly-con- verted Russians, matching the cap- tain's exclamation, "Why, the Lord Jesus was baptized just like that!" He pulled off his upper garments, stepped into the river, advanced toward the officiating minister, and was baptized with the water from a distance. He did not know the individuals to be baptized. He would have trembled had he known that he was baptizing an orthodox Russian, and be certainly troubled when the brethren who had noticed the man told him what he had done.

However, it was past recalling now, and things went on their course. The newly-baptized Russian shortly afterwards baptized six other persons of his own nationality. The truth began to spread among the native Russians, and at present, from the Caucasus to Vol- hynia, there is quite a number of Rus- sian Baptist churches—who are one with us in faith and practice.

These Russian churches have had some baptisms for the sake of the Master and his dear gospel, but they have remained true to their faith, impolement and bitter persecutions have come upon them. But the progress of the gospel cannot be checked. Back of it stands a power greater than the prince of the earth, the power of him who said: "Go ye, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost."
