SWISS BAPTISTS.

THE BAPTISTS OF SWITZERLAND IN THE TIME OF THE REFORMATION.

TRANSLATED FROM THE GERMAN, BY REV. WILLIAM APPEL.

The sixteenth century began with a desire for religious reformation, which manifested itself especially in Switzerland, long before the time of Luther. When Zwingle became the leader of the Reformation, he demanded the submission to the Word of God in all religious matters, and declared himself determined to reject all that the Bible did not teach. When in 1523 he, with Farel, met six hundred Catholic dignitaries in a disputation, he stood by these principles. When the Baptists refused to make the same profession, he followed in the footsteps of the Catholic church. He refused to do that which he claimed for himself.

The Baptists of Zurich began to protest against infant sprinkling in 1523. One of their ministers called the same "a worthless thing." Grebel, one of their prominent men, wrote: "They who understand the scriptures doctrine of infant rebirth refuse to have their infants sprinkled." Bezzliin, another Baptist preacher, rejected infant baptism and had a disputation with the ministers of the country. When even the wife and the members of his church were intimidated because they would not have their infants sprinkled. When they were asked by the judge why they refused to have their infants sprinkled, he replied: "Because Christ requires faith before baptism."

During a disputation on the 17th of January, 1525, the Swiss reformer became so irritated that, instead of answering the Baptists with arguments, he began to reproach and interrupt them in such a manner that they could not continue.

From the fact that the same was elsewhere prohibited in the Scriptures. Thereupon the Legislature of Zurich passed a resolution forbidding the Baptists to speak about their doctrines. This law was easier made than carried out. The Baptist country were commended to quit the country within a week. Infants were brought to baptism by force. Preachers and members of Baptist churches were all imprisoned, or fined large sums of money, or forced to leave the country. When even this was not enough, still more rigorous measures were adopted. Zwingle said the public welfare demanded the utmost rigor. He called upon the government to exterminate the sect. He even threatened to agree with him in matters of faith. He forced the religious liberty which he claimed for himself, and persecuted them with fire and sword.

But even the Swiss Baptists that were so cruelly treated by the government inquisition? A few of them will now intro into to the reader.

ROMAN ORIGIN.

It was one of the most prominent among them. He was born in 1599; his father was an honorable citizen and a member of the Council of Zurich. Konrad was thoroughly educated, and studied at the Universities of Vienna and Paris. He was naturally proud, moved in aristocratic society, and led a sinful life before his conversion. In the year 1523, Basel intrusted to him important literary work. After his return to Zurich, Zwingle began his pastor and noticed the extraordinary talents of the young man, became very intimate with him. In a letter of 1527, Myconius wrote of him: "Grebel is a most sincere and pure man, and his heart is devoted to God before the eyes of all men." But soon Zwingle and Grebel became separated on the question of the character of an evangelistic church. Grebel told Zwingle: "The Bible teaches that all children who believe are to be baptized."

"Only by faith in the blood of Christ can one cleanse of sin; and faith does neither condemn nor increase faith, nor does water save. Let us found a church, which will follow the scriptures, and seek being the promise!" But Zwingle did not want this; he insisted on a state-church. He said: "It is impossible to create a heaven upon the earth, for before the angels will be allowed to grow with the wheat till the time of the harvest." But Grebel did not understand it so, but made a distinction between the field and the church. He proposed to baptize all the children of the church of Hilarion, and many others.

FELIX MANTZ.

He was also a notable Baptist preacher. He came from a noble family. His father was canon in the cathedral, and gave him a good education. He was a thorough Hebrew scholar, and an associate of Zwingle in his work. He began to doubt, however, about the spirituality of the State church and infant baptism. When he disclosed his views to Zwingle, the latter immediately broke all relations with him. After this, Mantz began to preach in woods, fields, and private houses, translating his texts from the original and then explaining the same. Because he preached and baptized grown persons he was arrested and banished, and though his life was threatened he returned again. In Zurich he suffered a long imprisonment, and many grievances. He was finally accused of severing in error and sentenced to death, January, 1527. He was delivered to the executioner, who bound his hands over the altar and asked a sign through which the altar and the government took his possession. He left a pathetic letter admonishing his brethren to have the courage to stand for the truth, and to be persecuted for it. On his way to the last minister tried to quiet him; but his faithful brother and his old mother dried their tears and encouraged him to suffer the martyr's crown willingly. While the executioner was ready to strike, the executioner he said: "Lord Jesus, into thy hands I commend my spirit!"

The execution of Mantz affected the people of Switzerland like an electric shock, and immediately after, Baptists sprung up all over the land.

This crime, perpetrated by the Legislature, smote the conscience of its members, and they wrote to Augsburg that they had killed Mantz as a warning to others. Bullinger explains Mantz's joy in the hour of death thus: "Mantz's own often suffered when they are executed." This poor martyr's mantle was his strength in his suffering words: "The gospel teaches us to love God, and leads us away from hatred and envy to love. In accordance with the nature of the Gospel."

Love to God through Christ alone will stand. As our Heavenly Father is, so also should we be merciful to all. And this was one of the Baptist fanatics, whose more we have sought to make many Christians understand.
