THE NEW THEOLOGY.

A good brother writes to me from the New Theology. He says that he knows the New Theology, and suggests that it should not be objected to because it is new, since Luther's theology was new in his day.

There is a clear difference between Luther and the New Theology. Luther's theology was away from tradition and toward the Bible as God's Word; while the New Theology is away from the Bible and toward the "Christian consciousness," whatever that may be.

But this New Theology is a very vague and indefinite thing. Spurgeon says of a recent book advocating it: "Some of the pages of additional matter, and there is no earthly reason why its author should have made them 3,000. You have nothing to do but mangle your brain and set your tongue going, and the result will be a mass of incoherence."

Still, as time passes, some of the doctrines of this New Theology are talking of being brought to the attention of the plenary inspiration of the Bible and appeal to the "Christian consciousness" of the theologian. What is true is to be decided by the "Christian consciousness," and not by the "Christian consciousness" of the theologian.
