Upon a third trial a change of venue to Taylorville was secured, and after a long postponement a witness was produced who had long been missing. He swore he saw Mosby have a roll in his pocket, and that an acquittal resulted. There was strong sentiment both for and against Crittenden, and he had gone to Beattyville to begin his life.

Home Topics. THE GARDEN.—What! "somebody says," "do you call that a household topic?" Certainly it is a question of importance to the whole household, and one in which, if the housewife does not interest herself, will be very likely to be anything but success. No one can deny that the products of the garden add very much to the enjoyment of the household, and surely the farmer's family has as good a right to its fruits and vegetables as the city dweller.

There is a reason why the farmer should make his dinner of pork and potatoes the year round, with turnips and cabbage occasionally, and many a very little trouble will secure an early supply, as it may be sown very early in the spring. Asparagus, too, is an early spring vegetable that no household garden should lack. A bed of asparagus once established is good for twenty years. Peas ought to be planted as early as the ground can be prepared in the spring, and then twice as late in the fall. To insure a succession and prolong the season, snap beans and sweet corn should also be planted at two or three different times for the same reason. Lettuce and radishes should be sown as early as possible to insure the best quality. Beans for early use should be planted as soon as the ground can be worked in the spring. Potatoes use sown in early later, and for winter use sown in early enough. If it is thought best to plant lettuce, cabbage and egg plants may be started in the kitchen window and ready for use in the garden. Be sure and make a good supply and variety of vegetables for winter use. The management of celery is not so difficult as the farmer most deny themselves the luxury of having it on their winter table. Plant enough lima beans to have a supply for winter use. If they are gathered before the pods are dry, shelled and dried carefully, they will be very nice and fresh for winter use. Instead of the old-fashioned garden, if farmers would plant their vegetables in long rows, that could be cultivated with a horse, the work will be done in less time and with less labor. FERTILIZERS.—If one has not already a supply of fruits growing, this spring should not pass until the want is supplied. Useful Recipes. BAKED MEAT DUMPLINGS.—Take any cold veal, beef or tongue, cut very fine, slice some pork, mix rich paste as for pie, make into dumplings, adding a large tablespoonful of the meat and potatoes to each, put in a pan and cook with gravy of flour, water and butter, bake until rich brown, eating occasionally. THE BEST WHITEWASH we have ever had knowledge of is composed of lime slaked to the proper consistency for application, into which (for inside work) while hot mix a starch made from half a pound of flour, of two ounces of common white glue, three ounces of molasses. For outside work, add to the above preparation a handful of rock salt and as much soft boiled rice. This will stick with unerring certainty. COLD CAKE.—A pound-cake or cupcake better baked in a square sheet, and cut with a warm knife into small tablets or small squares, and each loaf on the side as well as the top with a delicately flavored and colored icing, will add a decided touch of elegance to the home cake basket. Or they make the macaroon, and dipped in fondant, make a very dainty morsel, which one hardly knows whether to call cake or candy. POTATO BISCUIT.—Eight potatoes of equal size, four very fine, four medium, and two small, cut into thin slices, and set the sponge until rich; four of five hours will be required; then add the melted butter, with a little salt and flour enough to make a soft dough; set in a tin, topped evenly, roll out in a sheet three-quarters of an inch thick, cut into cakes; let them rise one hour, and bake.

THERE is a breed of sheep that has created some note recently. They are the Chinese, or Nankin sheep. Their particular characteristic is that they frequently give birth to three or four lambs at a time, and also breed to a yearling. They probably will not prove of much value as mutton sheep compared with the English Down and Somersetshire sheep, which are superior.
