GREAT BAPTIST FIGHT.

Editor Western Recorder:

The Committee of Arrangements, The second annual... Baptist Sunday-school, have appointed me as a Committee on Invitations, and have conceived the idea of making our picnic at Fishersville on the Fourth of July, 1888, a very notable affair.

The day will be spent in social intermingling of the Baptists of Long Run Association, a feature of which will be the first appearance of our people as a church in mid-association, although in an informal manner.

There were 144 matriculates during the session, representing six different States. This is a larger number than the College has had for many years.

COMMENCEMENT AT GEORGETOWN.

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The annual sermon before the Y. M. C. A. of the College was preached Sunday evening by Dr. A. D. Davidson of Covington, Ky., from Col. 3:17, "The love of Christ constraineth us."

The commencement exercises proper occurred on Thursday morning, which time eleven young men were honored with the three different degrees of the College. The young men who completed the whole course, and were therefore entitled to the degree of Arts were: W. J. Davidson, R. H. Hays, C. M. Mead and R. C. Mitchell.

WESTERN COLLEGE.

Editor Western Recorder:

With reference to the removal of the College, the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Board of Trustees: "While not receding the action of this Board at the last meeting in Lexington, October 24, 1887, in reference to the desirability of the union of the existing Baptist colleges of the State, yet there appearing no probability of the consummation of so desirable an end, and desiring it to be duty to conserve the interests of Georgetown College in every possible way, we accept the bonds of the citizens of Scott county, conditioned upon the permanent location of the College at Georgetown, and pledge ourselves to fulfill compliance with the conditions of said bonds, and further to prosecute to completion the work of endowing the College where it now is."

The commencement season began with the baccalaureate sermon by President A. A. Kendrick, Sunday, June 20th. The sermon before the Illinois Baptist Educational Society was preached that evening by Rev. George B. Vostburg, of Detroit, from 2 Tim. 3:17, and it was a strong and eloquent argument in favor of thorough ministerial education.

Thursday evening, June 22nd, at 8 o'clock, a special conference before the literary societies, his subject being "The ethics of the twentieth century." It was an able and well written address, predicting that the twentieth century ethics will be essentially that of the twenty-first century.

There was a commencement at 10 A. M. Faculty, Board and school, led by college brass band, marched from chapel to the large church where the exercises were held.

FROM MR. MOODY.

The Sixth General Bible Conference at Northfield, Mass.

A sixth General Conference for Bible study and dissemination of working methods in the various fields of Christian service, will be held at Northfield in August next.

The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon Rev. H. Allen Trupper, of Louisville, by the Board of Trustees of the Seminary, and room was also found in the new building to first opened this season, and admirably located but half a mile from the school.

The closing exercises of the Seminary began with an address by Rev. J. A. French, of Shelbyville, Ky. His subject was "Woman," which he discussed in a most pleasing manner.

The closing exercises were held on Wednesday evening, June 20th, at 8 o'clock, in the presence of a large and appreciative audience. The order of exercises was as follows: Address of welcome by Mr. E. Garnett; prayer, by Rev. J. A. French; presentation by Elinora Richards; presentation made to Juniors by Mary Mack; response, by Bettie Gaines.

On Wednesday morning the Commencement exercises proper of this institution occurred, and the programme was brief and attractive. There were four young ladies who were honored with the diploma of the school: Wood Garnett, Mary Bernice Mack, Mary Elizabeth Garnett and Elinora Keene Richards.

There were 120 pupils in the Seminary during the session, and Prof. Becker thinks it was the most satisfactory and successful session in the history of the institution. True charms of a place, whether in the city or the country, in a palace or a hovel, depend mainly upon the beings who occupy it, and comparatively little upon the place itself.


