The Louisiana Baptist State Convention has just closed a very enthusiastic and profitable session. It met this year with the Bayou Church, Gretna, Green. The assumption of the convention was to meet from day to day (the convention meeting on the 5th and ending on the 8th) together with the present arrangement was to meet on the 5th and end on the 8th.
