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THE CONVENTION.

The recent session of the Southern Baptist Convention was of special interest and of unusual importance. The reports from the Boards were most encouraging. Dr. Tupper's presentation of his report the best ever made in the history of the Foreign Mission Board.

The attention was large and representative. It was the largest that would not be the case, since it would be so far to the West. But Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and Kentucky had delegates.
