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ITEMS OF INTEREST.

In the state election John Young Brown was elected Governor by a majority of about 50,000. The new constitution was adopted by a majority of 50,000. The Democrats have their usual majority in the Legislature.

In Utah the Democrats have been successful by a small majority over the "Liberals" and the Republicans. It is believed in these countries that this is the first election in the territory on national party lines. The vote was very pretty evenly divided between the Republicans and the Democrats.

The New York Times has a leader declaring that the Constitutional Convention in this state, which started in session several months ago, did its work in most orderly way. The paper says the new Constitution provides that the Governor shall be elected for the next four years, and the Legislature in the even numbered, and in another clause says the Governor shall be elected by the people at the same time when they elect the Legislature. Surely this must be a mistake. Men would not stay away from the polls so often as that.

The old Constitution worked well and we believe without amendment for 47 years. The new is declared by the new majority to be better. Let us hope then the people of the state will have a real order in it, and that there will be no intermission of the same on for 47 years. To begin immediately to repeal a new provision and to collect on the old one is a failure.

The Grand Army of the Republic had its annual convention at Louisville August 29-30. There were 40,000 men in the line of the procession and the enthusiasm was at its height. Capt. John Mackin, Albany, N. Y., was elected Commander-in-Chief. A demand for an increase in the dues was made; among other things that every veteran who should be paid \$10 a day for every day he was in the Southern service. The chief interest was the refusal of the white men to be in the line with the colored men. These were anxious that colored and white should stand on a perfect equality but in separate organizations. The delegates made no change on this point. Commander Geo. T. Hodges said plainly: "The colored men are straightened out during this organization there won't be a white member of the G. A. R. south of the Potomac River."

The Commander-in-Chief, General Tracy also made an eloquent address on the separate Puts for white and black. But no support were victorious, as the G. A. R. by a large majority, adopted the resolution. The Majority of the White Star broke the record for speed in crossing the Atlantic in 10 days, 18 hours and 45 minutes from Queensland to New York, being over an hour less time than the City of Paris.

Thomas A. Booked died on the 28th at his home in Appomattox county, Va. aged 76. He was for fourteen years a member of the U. S. Congress and for 12 years of the Confederate House of Representatives.

The Soldiers Home for Union veterans near this city has been organized for the coming year. Fifty new men to be accommodated, and when the building is completed there will be room for 100 more.

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THE MALIGNERS OF PAUL.

It is a grievous thing for one to be "wounded in the house of his friends." How many, in these latter days, are using their position in some Christian denomination to destroy the confidence of others in the Word of God! Miss Willard, a woman of seeming piety, is held to announce, "Not Paul, but Christ is my Teacher," as if Paul's teachings are at variance with those of Christ. And yet Miss Willard is still recognized as a Christian woman!

More recently Sam Jones publicly declared that "he does not care what Paul says." I wonder if there are Baptist preachers who still hold to Jones, and regard him as "the greatest man that has lived since the days of Paul." If such Baptists keep pace with Jones in his "wonderful" thoughts, they should now put him aside, since Sam has outgrown his former teachings and authority "the Apostle to the Gentiles." It has been a matter of deep surprise to me that anybody of moderate intelligence in any denomination should have been captured by the flowery and billiard-gate Sam Jones.
