A Pleasant Commencement... During the session of the Commencement day at Bethel College, Rev. W. H. Whitaker, D.D., member of the Board of Trustees, announced that the books of 'The Young Men' and 'The Young Women' had been published by the college...

On Monday night a cultured group assembled in the opera house who gave eager and delighted attention to the almost faultlessly rendered program presented by the department of music...

Washington and Lee University completed on Wednesday, June 15th, the most successful session for twenty years, and the Commencement was of unusual interest.

On Sunday, June 18, the Baccalaureate sermon was preached by Bishop G. W. Perkins, of West Virginia. On Sunday night, the address before the Young Men's Christian Association was delivered by Senator A. H. Colquitt, of Georgia.

The contest between representatives of the Graham and Washington Societies for the Society Oration Medal occurred on Monday evening. The judges awarded the medal to Mr. J. B. Anderson, of Missouri, the representative of the Graham-Lee Society.

The event of Tuesday was the address before the Literary Societies by Prof. Edward S. Jones, LL.D., of the University of South Carolina. His subject was 'Literary Society,' and it was handled in a manner that elicited the admiration of the large and cultivated audience.

On Tuesday night the opera house was once more well filled with the graduating exercises and to listen to the address delivered on this occasion by Rev. J. M. Phillips, D.D., of Founsbury, Ky. The speaker spoke in an interesting way on an interesting subject, 'Woman.' The whole address was marked by thoughtful and happily received. At its close, he paid an eloquent and glowing tribute to the graduates which was warmly applauded by his cultured listeners.

The presentation of diplomas by President T. S. McCall formed the last and very impressive feature of the ceremony. He spoke briefly, but most pointedly and appropriately to the graduating class, now passing from his institution, full of courage and fervent and tender 'God-speed' and 'God bless you' at the last.

On the following day the annual art exhibition held in the auditorium was largely attended despite the inclement weather. The numerous paintings, specimens of crayon, water color and pastels, and the handsome room, displayed alike the teacher's skill and the pupils' proficiency.

The planting of a 'class-tree' in the lawn in front of the college was a novel as well as extremely pretty ceremony, attracting the admiring attention of all the 'lookers on' at Verona.

A brilliant levee occurred this evening which the friends and patrons of the school were warmly welcomed to its classic halls. The wide corridors and elegant parlors, gleaming with lights, glowing with flowers, were soon thronged with guests. This evening witnessed the last of Commencement scenes for the year 1922.

We are glad to note the increasing popularity and consequent prosperity of this noted institution. Its outlook for another term is extremely bright, and promises most successful success to its general President and his able corps of teachers.

A large amount, about \$10,000, has been expended in refitting and improving the building and it now offers such attractions, accommodations and inducements as few schools in the South can afford to equal.

The amount for Foreign Missions, as stated above, exceeds that found in the records of 1921, and is \$1,477.47. That sum was contributed by Mr. Theodore Harris for the building of a chapel in a Mexican town and reported to the Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, but omitted from the annual report. In the report of the Home Mission Board Kentucky contribution for Home Missions was \$8,756.70, which exceeds the amount entered in the books of the State Board \$97.10.

The receipt of the Convention Books for the year ending June 30, 1922, aggregated \$1,047.48, while for the year ending June 30, 1921, it was \$908.25, a difference in favor of the latter year of \$139.23.

The Secretary calls the earnest attention of the churches to the fact that the receipts for the year ending June 30, 1922, were \$1,047.48, less than the preceding year, and for State Sunday-school and Colportage work falling off of amount to \$108.10.
