FOURTH QUARTER. SUNDAY, DECEMBER 11. THE APOSTOLIC COUNCIL.

ACTS 15:1-29. Morro-Taxco: Through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, we shall be saved even as they.—Acts 15:11.

Teachers should have their scholars read the first part of this chapter that they may understand the trouble in the church at Antioch.
