Green Manuring.
In a Farmer's Bulletin, just issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dr. Wm. E. Ayres, Chief of the Division of the Office of Experimental Stations, discourses most interestingly on the subject of "Leguminous Plants for Green Manuring and Soil Feeding." The following, in particular, deserves a place in this department.

Green manuring, or plowing under green crops raised for that purpose, is one of the oldest means of improving the soil. It was first practiced by the Romans, and was known to the ancients. It is now one of the most important resources of the farmer, especially where the supply of barney manure is insufficient. Its advantages are many. The more striking are that it increases the fertility of the soil, and that it increases the supply of the fertilizing material needed by crops, increases the humus and improves the physical quality of the soil. By means of green manuring, land which is practically barren may be brought to a state of fertility where it will produce profitable crops. As a single instance of this may be given, the experiments carried out by the Michigan Experiment Station on the "Jackpine Plains" of that State. In 1888 experiments were made with the soil of these plains, almost barren, and of these plants, green manures were used mainly, supplemented by cheap fertilizers. In three years the yield of crops was increased, not only in the physical character of the soil, but also in the increased yields of various crops.

Again, green manuring may be used to take the place of green crops, fertilizers and manures on soils arid under cultivation. It is in this respect that it finds its widest application. There has been much speculation as to the manner in which the crops could gather such large quantities of fertilizing material. It will be remembered that the principal fertilizing ingredients required by plants are nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash. These are each and all more or less essential to the healthy growth of crops. Consequently they are applied to the soil in the form of commercial fertilizers and other manures. In attempting to explain how the fertility of the soil is maintained by green manuring, it has been said that plants with long roots, like clovers, feed deep down in the soil, or subsoil on materials broken up by surface-feeding plants; and that when the tops of these plants lie down, and are mixed with the surface soil, they enrich it with the material which they have gathered from the subsoil.
