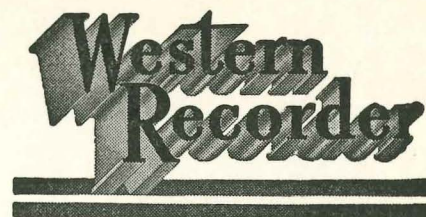

# The Observance of the Ordinance of Baptism

Southern Baptists are in the business of baptizing Christians. We do not baptize to evangelize; we baptize to symbolize. We do not baptize to obtain; we baptize to obey. We do not baptize to procure, we baptize to proclaim. We are not finding Christ when we baptize; we are following Christ.

Christian baptism is not the last step in an old life; it is one of the first steps in a new life. With Baptists, it is not a matter of baptismal regeneration, but a matter of baptizing the generations.

Baptists have not won distinctiveness in baptism by allegiance to a Greek Lexicon. It requires more than proper form to constitute New Testament baptism. Neither have we won our distinctiveness by insistence that the candidate receive baptism as a believer. To stop here is to share honored ground with numerous denominational groups.

Baptists have won their distinctiveness by believing that Christian baptism derives its sanctions from the example and injunctions of our Lord Christ and that the act must do no violence ever to the whole law of the whole New Testament.

God in his infinite wisdom has made plain the heart of the gospel in symbols that are perfect for their purposes. Christian baptism is God's assurance that the foundation facts of the gospel will be made plain and kept so through the ages without error.

### Some Mistakes

Some years ago an experience in baptizing made me resolve I would further my education in this art with the same passion and persistence I applied to sermon preparation and other church administrations. I had assisted a fellow pastor in a revival, and he had announced that all candidates would be baptized on the final night following the worship service.

Now that was his first mistake. His church plant was not adequate to provide convenience and privacy to more than a few candidates at a time. How much more effective and reverent it would have been to baptize a few candidates at the opening of each evening's service.

Baptizing should always be done reverently, as an eloquent portrayal of New Testament truths.

But that was not this brother's biggest mistake. He employed the splash method of immersing candidates. There was more to hear than there was to see. He did not lower the candidate into the water; he thrust him and retrieved him in one swift, unbroken movement.

What one of our seminaries failed to teach him in three years about baptizing the dead, he could have learned in three minutes from a firstclass under-

taker. An undertaker knows how to bury the dead, for that is his business. But is not that our business when we administer Christian baptism? Each candidate should be lowered into the watery grave as tenderly and slowly as though he were a beloved member of the household. And that is what he is: a member of the household of faith.

All evidence and advice seem to support an unhurried service in every phase of the sacred act.

### Methods

Quoting from Kenneth I. Brown's book, *And Be Ye Baptized* (page 71): "A very wise minister once said that he had never seen an immersion cared for with excessive slowness, but that he had seen hundreds cared for with excessive speed." The most effective baptisms are those performed with appropriate slowness, where the candidate is laid into the water with reverent ease, and raised in like fashion.

Pastors having difficulty in this regard should seek advice from sympathetic brethren and study handbooks designed to afford practical helps in various administrations.

One author says about a practice many of us have followed without much thought for years:

"To protect the candidate from any possible discomfort from the water on his face or from possible coughing or strangling, some ministers hold a handkerchief in their hands, which they use to cover the candidate's mouth and nose as they lower him into the water. Other ministers have the candidate hold it himself, covering his mouth and nose as he is immersed. But it will be generally agreed that for the handkerchief to be placed over the face while the candidate is still standing erect and visible to the congregation, robs the service of desired dignity . . . A handkerchief is not necessary for protection if the candidate is lowered slowly, with utmost care, and only so far as to have the water cover his face with a thin film. Nothing in the Bible requires the candidate's face to be pushed two or three feet under water. Considerably less dignified is the use of the handkerchief to protect the face is the custom of having the candidate hold his

nose as he is immersed. The result is one of distinct unpleasantness to the thoughtful candidate and of possible ridiculousness to the congregation." (pp. 69-70, *And Be Ye Baptized* by Kenneth I. Brown).

I was surprised to learn that the simple advice to the candidate that he turn his head slightly to one side at the point of contact with the water would solve the problem with ease without the use of a handkerchief. There are new and better methods in baptizing and we are wise to search them out through study and questioning and observation.

### Interpretative Statements

But there was something else missing in that baptismal scene that night. I realized it then and have sought to correct the error ever since in my own ministry. The Brother baptized those candidates without the assistance of interpretative statements.

Christian baptism is designed to say something and the very fact that its message is silent demands a ministry of interpretation on the part of the administrator. We cannot say more than baptism says but we can and should say as much. There are many ways of saying what baptism says, and each one of us who administers it should strive for variations that bring a continual freshness. Instead of settling on a fixed formula that has suffered no changes through the years, we should continually labor to surround this sacred ordinance with the best interpretative expressions we can find and create.

We can say what baptism says. We can say that scripturally. The scriptures afford opportunities for many variations for those pastors who employ this means of setting forth what Christian baptism involves.

The most favorite passage quoted is taken from the memorable scene of our Lord's baptism. It requires practice to master this art, but the results add beauty and meaning.

We need to speak a few choice summary statements of our own with right timing and designed to convey our Baptist position regarding baptism. Such statements as "The only fit candidate to be baptized is a saved individual" and "We are not baptizing these candidates in order that they might be saved, but because they are already saved," we can say that baptism is a means of confessing Christ. In baptism we show forth the Lord's death as the original source of holiness and life in our souls. We do well to remember that there are nearly always those in the audience who make its witness strong and make it beautiful.

**EXECUTIVE BOARD:** The annual meeting of the Executive Board of the General Association was held December 1 in the building of Walnut Street Baptist Church, Louisville. The day's work was marked by finest harmony and by sympathetic understanding of all matters with which the Board worked. H. Leo Eddleman was elected chairman, and H. Franklin Paschall the assistant. F. G. Schlafer was elected recording secretary of the body, and Clyde H. Freed, Jr. assistant recording secretary. The Executive Board is made up of laymen and preachers who love the Baptist cause and who can be trusted to carry on the business of the General Association between sessions.

**THE HEART:** Zula Evelyn Coon said in the September, 1952 issue of *The Church Musician*: "No worship service has fulfilled its mission unless it touches the heart of man and pleases the heart of God." She was right. Unless hearts are reached, nothing of permanence will result. There is danger in feverish emotionalism but there is also danger in cold intellectualism. Happy is the man who both uses his head and keeps his heart warm. The hand of God was on the writer of Proverbs when he said, "Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life." It takes the head to keep the heart from going to extremes, and it takes the heart to give power to the head. We believe that when people leave the house of God they should go feeling something has been done for the whole being. Empty formalities have neither thought nor heart. Paul revealed his aversion for such when he wrote: "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am become sounding brass, or a clanging cymbal." Love, whether in the witnessing of a layman, or in the sermon, or in the song, NEVER FAILS.

**A Quick Glance at State Mission Work**

Someone remarked, If people could be informed of the actual needs, no begging for money would be necessary. But isn't it true that, if people know what has been done, they will rejoice in the part they've had in it?

Our State Mission Board brought to the General Association a condensed report of its 98 workers. Not all of it can be carried here. You will find it in the Annual. But the money you gave through the Cooperative Program brought real results.

Your gifts made possible 16,184 preaching serv-

ices. Those services resulted in 2,876 professions of faith; 1,901 baptisms; 999 additions by letter; 3,488 rededications; 163 surrendering to full-time Christian work.

Your State Board workers conducted, also, 6,891 teaching services with a total attendance of 170,688. Their visits totaled 99,400. They traveled 1,422,917 miles carrying out your program. Fourteen new churches were organized; 34 churches were led to sponsor missions; 11 inactive churches were revived; 149 revivals were conducted; 533 tithers were pledged; 189 church fields were surveyed. All these facts only begin to tell the story.

**"He Didn't Say Anything About My Soul!"**

A good deacon in a prominent and highly useful Baptist church in Kentucky recently related an incident which touched my heart and illustrated a great need. The incident occurred many months ago, but others like it may be taking place every week, somewhere.

Some friends had been laboring to bring an unsaved man to full surrender to Christ as Saviour and Lord. The man finally consented to attend a night service and hear a sermon. His heart was hungry to know the way, and the friends were hoping the preacher would make it plain.

But on that night the good pastor had to be away, and a visiting minister preached, dealing only with generalities. It was a good sermon for saved people, but nothing was in it to point the way to "the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world."

The unsaved man listened closely all the way through the sermon. Then came the closing hymn and benediction. As he was leaving the auditorium with his friends, he said in disappointment, "He didn't say anything about my soul. He didn't tell me how to be saved."

This much was tragic. But there is more. A few days later the man was in an accident which quickly snuffed out his life. The last and only sermon he heard dealt merely with generalities.

The good man who preached that night is now in heaven. He loved lost souls and was evangelistic in spirit. But that night he did not stress the need for repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ. The unsaved man went out without hope, and to his death.

How know we? In any service there may be, on the outskirts of the throng, some soul who, like the leper, would come saying, "Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean." And Jesus longs to say to every such soul, "I will; be thou clean."

►Metropolitan Life Insurance Company reports that "accidents, rather than disease, constitutes the greatest single threat to American children," and that "about 6,000 children between 5 and 14 are killed in accidents each year—nearly twice the number of lives taken by leukemia, influenza, and acute polio together."

►The Baptist Book Store, Nashville, has been moved back to its old location—161 Eighth Avenue, North. The new store covers the entire first floor of the administration building, an area of 6,750 square feet.

►Brother I. H. Ball, Sr., has been called to be pastor of the Big Spring Baptist Church in Salem Association. Heretofore he has been the first pastor of the Garfield Avenue Baptist Mission in Louisville.

►Pastor John D. Boykin recently helped Pastor Francis Tallant in special meetings at the First Church, Henderson. Cliff Holcomb, Nashville, Tenn., directed the music. Dr. Sabin Landry supplied the Shawnee pulpit in Louisville during Pastor Boykin's absence.

►Prue H. Kelly, Springfield, Ky., assisted Pastor Charles Devine and the First Baptist Church, Central City, in a revival recently. Dr. Loren Williams, of the Music Department of the Sunday School Board, was in charge of the music.

►Kentucky students attending New Orleans Seminary this year are: William Robert Boyd, Somerset; William Oscar Graham, Bellevue; Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Jackson Park, Mt. Sterling; H. Eldon Sturgeon, Glendale; and William T. Pepper, Paducah.

►Corn Creek Baptist Church, in Whitley County and Mt. Zion Association, had a successful training course recently. Pastor J. H. Hopkins, Corbin, taught them the book, "Baptist Training Union Manual, by Lambdin. Good attendance and fine interest were manifested throughout the course.

►While Pastor John D. Boykin was conducting a revival meeting at the First Baptist Church, Vincennes, Indiana, the pulpit of the Shawnee Baptist Church of Louisville was supplied by Dr. Denton Coker and Dr. Wayne Ward, both professors at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

►At their recent annual meeting at Tucson, Arizona Baptists adopted a Cooperative Program goal of \$308,250 to be divided 32 per cent to Southern Baptist Convention causes and 68 per cent to state causes. They also voted to hold two regional conventions—one in Utah and the other in Colorado—looking toward organization of conventions in outlying states. Jack K. Haben was elected president.

►Alabama Baptists in session at Montgomery adopted a \$1,894,000 Cooperative Program goal to be divided 54 per cent to state causes and 46 per cent to Convention-wide causes. Howard College, Birmingham, was authorized to borrow \$1,500,000 to start building on the new campus in order that the college may move to its new site within five years. The over-all cost of the minimum plant is estimated at \$7,172,000. Oscar A. Davis was elected president.

►Southern Baptists have taken another forward step in a joint endeavor with the National Baptist Convention, Inc. in the field of evangelism. The Department of Evangelism of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has given financial support to the employment of an evangelistic secretary for the Negroes, and laid the groundwork for the development with the National Convention a plan for evangelism.

►The Hall Street Baptist Church, Owensboro, was richly blessed in a recent revival with Pastor Cova Duvall of the Corinth Church, Winchester, as the evangelist. The music was directed by Clarence Heneisen of the Grace Church, Evansville, Ind. There were 56 decisions made during the meetings—12 by baptism, 12 by letter, and 32 who dedicated their lives to Christ. W. O. Spencer is pastor at Hall Street.

►The men of the Gethsemane Church, West Danville, met on Monday night, November 23, and organized a Brotherhood. Brother J. E. Howell is their pastor. Cecil Shannon was elected president. Other officers elected were: Ward Smith, membership vice president; James Moore, program vice president; Mr. Lyons, activities vice president; Jackie Holmes, chorister; and Paul Hushisson, secretary-treasurer. Thirty men have joined so far.

►Mississippi Baptists, at their annual meeting in Jackson, voted to rename and make Mississippi Woman's College a four-year coeducational college. They also set a Cooperative Program goal of 1,500,000 to be divided 55 per cent to state causes and 45 per cent to Convention-wide causes. All receipts above \$1,400,000 will be divided 66 and 2/3 per cent to Convention-wide causes and 33 and 1/3 per cent to state causes. John E. Barnes was elected president. Attendance reached 2,000.

►Pastor Edward Galloway, of First Church, Russellville, preached in a series of meetings with Pastor Ray H. Dean at the Middleton Baptist Church, Franklin, Ky., during recent days, and Pastor Dean led the singing. A number of the members pledged to tithe their income and a building fund for

class rooms has been started. The church has already reached a 20 per cent gain in enrollment and attendance in the Million More in Fifty-Four campaign. The Western Recorder goes into all the church homes.

►Leach Station Church, Greenup Association, has ordained Carmel Slone as a deacon. Pastor S. M. Meade, South Shore Church, was elected moderator; Pastor Ralph E. Webb, Westmoreland, clerk. The questioning was done by W. T. Green, Summit Church. Pastor A. N. Lester, Summit, brought the message, giving the charge to the deacon and the church. Pastor Bert Blevins, Rush, offered the ordaining prayer. George Slone, Chadwick's Creek, father of the candidate, offered the benediction. James M. Moore is pastor of the Leach Station Church.

►E. A. Somers, pastor, Bethel Church, Harrodsburg, Ky., recently did the preaching in an evangelistic meeting sponsored by the Trinity (Southern) Baptist Church, Ness City, Kansas. Robert Stinson, formerly of Corydon Church in Kentucky, is pastor of the Trinity Church. Much interest was stirred among the people in the community. Five people made professions of faith in Jesus. The meetings were held in a building where Brother Stinson teaches school. Many of the people are interested in seeing a Southern Missionary Baptist church organized in the community. Pastor Somers says: "Pastor Stinson is doing a commendable work in West Kansas. The State of Kansas is a real mission field for Southern Baptists."

►East Audubon Church, Louisville, ordained R. S. Davidson as a deacon November 8. Deacons and pastors from East Audubon, Audubon, Fairdale, Farmdale, Oakdale and Walnut Street Churches made up the examining council. Pastor James Borders, Farmdale, was elected moderator; Maurice Griffin, East Audubon, clerk; and Pastor Mac Johnson, East Audubon, was elected to lead the questioning. Pastor B. B. Isley, Fairdale, gave the challenge to the church; Pastor Audrey Granade, Audubon, spoke on the responsibility of deacons. Ora G. Brown, Stanley Baker and G. M. Griffin, will serve a 3-year term along with Brother Davidson. H. D. Higbee, chairman of deacons, welcomed these men to active service in the church.

## Music and Lights

We miss the services of a great servant in baptizing if we fail to make use of suitable music. But its proper use does not come without careful study and conferences with all who share in the service. Suitable hymns should have proper timing and volume. All who have a part in the music should be fully aware of the planning. Again the warning here is that we do not develop our own Baptist liturgy by never seeking change and freshness in musical support for this sacred symbolizing of Gospel truths.

Modern lighting effects are coming into wider usage in our churches today and that is as it should be. Many churches are giving careful study to the use of rheostat controls of lighting effects and competent advice on balanced lighting over the baptistry, especially directed lighting which spots the candidate. Time and money spent on these items pay great dividends in keeping the service beautiful and dignified.

## Committee

Order and dignity in the observance of baptisms are virtually impossible without the assistance of a carefully selected and well trained baptismal committee. These servants deserve honor on a par with any other committee. The personnel of this committee should always include those who are sympathetic and understanding and tactful in the performance of their duties. What goes on backstage is a determining factor in a smoothly functioning service out front. These should not only be well trained and coached in their respective assignments, but should be checked from time to time to see if a weak link exists anywhere in the entire process, including every single phase of the completed act.

There is an old practice fast fading out of the picture in our Baptist life. I refer to the practice of having the newly baptized candidates reassemble before the congregation to receive the right hand of church membership. This beautiful old gesture seemingly does not fit into the schedule of our busy programs today, but we must admit that we are losing out on an emphasis that ought never be divorced from the baptismal act; namely, that Christian baptism is initiatory for full fellowship in a New Testament church. We miss the mark when we fail to teach that baptism is the beginning and not the end of a dedication to satisfy the Will of our Lord,

and baptism must always point with an inspired finger to the church that our Lord loved and gave Himself for. For this reason I am suggesting that, as a possible substitute, we do not forsake the newly baptized candidates to their dressing rooms following the service. We often miss one of the most opportune moments in the life of the candidate when we fail to meet him with some greeting in these earliest, first moments following his actual entrance into the holiest society on earth, membership in the family of the redeemed in Christ, relationship with those who make up New Testament churches by the Will and Grace of our Lord Christ. It might well be that the church's action during the first five minutes of a new member's life is highly indicative of the church's actions the rest of the way. We have been warned against dipping them and dropping them.

He was author of a number of books among them, "The Gospel of Christ," "Definite Decisions for New Church Members," "Sermons in Outline," and "Seed for Sermons."

Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Ethel Hudson, a daughter, a son, and three grandchildren.

# Foreign Mission Board Reports to the People

## New Board Member

Mrs. R. L. Mathis, president of the Woman's Missionary Union of Texas, was named one of the five members from Texas on the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board at its November meeting. She replaces Dr. Vernon Yearby, who has moved from Texas to Alabama, and will serve until the next meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Mrs. Mathis becomes the fifth woman member now on the Board and the only woman serving as a state rather than as a local member.

## Gift of \$100,000

The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board recently received \$100,000 from the Jarman Foundation for the construction of the Central Baptist Church of Bogota, Colombia, according to Dr. Everett Gill, Jr., the Board's secretary for Latin America.

## New Bible Institute

The Baptist Bible Institute in Nassau, Bahamas, which opened September 15, now has an enrollment of 30 students, according to Missionary John Mein, director of the school. Dr. and Mrs. Mein are teaching night classes at present, and plans are being made to start daytime classes also. This school constitutes the only Baptist theological training center for the 20,000 Baptists of the islands of the Caribbean.

## "We Can Dream"

Rev. Charles W. Whitten, Southern Baptist missionary to Spain, reports an incident which occurred in an interior city, where one of the Baptist churches has been closed by government orders for six months. One evening 30 people gathered in the national pastor's home to hear Mr. Whitten bring a message and to meet the four Southern Baptist missionary appointees who had just arrived, Rev. and Mrs. Joseph W. Mefford, Jr., and Rev. and Mrs. Roy B. Wyatt, Jr.

Mr. Whitten said that after the service the missionaries were presented with boxes of candy to take to their children. He said he wrote a note of appreciation for the candy and received the following reply from the national pastor:

"You do not need to thank us for anything. That which we do for you is nothing in comparison with so much that you and your fellow countrymen do for us. Since we are not able to demonstrate in a visible way our gratitude to our American brethren, please permit us to do it through you missionaries . . .

"You will have many difficulties and disappointments in this country; but we can dream because God can make our

dreams a reality. For many years I have been dreaming of a Christian Spain, an evangelical Spain, a democratic Spain; and I believe that someday when it is his good pleasure the Lord will make my dreams a reality."

## What We Can Do

In a recent letter Kathleen (Mrs. Roberts H.) Culppepper, Southern Baptist missionary to Japan, said: "Many of you have asked what you could do in a material way for the work here. You can encourage a higher percentage of local offerings to go to the Cooperative Program and double your gifts to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering this year.

"This will make it possible to continue advancing in this and other fields around the world. May we be filled with the spirit of Christ that we may accept the challenge to advance and realize the inspired vision of our late Dr. M. Theron Rankin."

### Concerning Harmful Literature

Dear Sirs:

At a relative's home this summer, I picked up a recent copy of the Western Recorder and read an article which interested me very much. I have forgotten the writer's name and the name of the article but not his subject. I have often thought about the problem and was grateful to hear of one committee which intends to do something about it.

The problem is harmful literature, which our young people are seeing and reading every day. The reading material's unfitness is only exceeded by the pictures on the book or magazine covers used to advertise it. Even children's comic books are bad enough to shock grown men and women. Not all of them, of course, but the harmless ones are sadly in the minority.

Nearly every place which sells anything sells reading material, too. This bad literature must be in demand for a certain number of people; mostly young people, so I've observed. I cannot go into a drugstore, bookstore, newsstand, bus or train station, or even a grocery store any more without seeing magazines and books which are so very objectionable to me that it usually makes me angry. I am twenty-two years old and like good reading. I am married to a fine person who feels as I do—we both hate for our family to grow up surrounded by a "concrete wall," seemingly, of lurid harmful influences. Some of

these things cannot be helped but surely we aren't asking too much to ask for cleaner, more inspiring literature.

I fail to see any inspiring things in Hollywood movies. Even in radio and television; crime, unfaithfulness, drinking alcoholic beverages, and other similar things, are dealt with lightly and often made almost attractive by people whom children admire. I could give endless examples. I realize we cannot and should not try to completely protect our children from everything we object to since they learn much from experience.

Surely, everyone must desire only the finest characteristics for our leaders of tomorrow and these leaders can only come from the children of today and the future. We must all realize that the movies, literature of all kinds, and television shows, of our time will influence our children in one way or another, either good or bad. Things seldom remain at a perfect standstill. They become better or worse. It is up to us, the Christians in every church, to whom it really matters, to see that conditions improve.

We must work and pray, each person doing what he can in the best way he can. We can begin in our homes.

I would appreciate knowing, through the Recorder, any news of developments concerning a committee, group, or an individual who is working on any of the problems I have mentioned.—J. E. B.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. — (BP) — Texas Baptists will have no more conventions. Action was taken at the annual state convention of the Texans recently.

A resolution passed to that effect stated: "That the affiliated six state Baptist conventions, organized and promoted by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, are sufficient to meet all of our Baptist denominational needs; and that if and when there seems to be a need for another state convention or state organization of any type or name, that the proposals be studied by the Executive Board of this convention, and recommended by it to the Baptist General Convention of Texas."

"We can spend so much time in conventions reporting what we have accomplished in the past and in planning programs for the future, until we have no time left to do the job before us at present," David M. Gardner, editor, *Baptist Standard*, said.

# Five Days Among the Choctaws

This is the story of five days—five days away from my pastorate—five days spent with the Choctaw Indians at Conehatta, Mississippi—five days helping Home Board Missionary W. W. Simpson in a Bible Institute at the Macedonia Baptist Church in whose building no white man drew a line or drove a nail. This is the story of the impressions gained during five days in which I preached thrice daily to the Indian people of the Macedonia Church and the New Choctaw Baptist Association.

My first impression is that of a people who come to church. Some Choctaws walked four and five miles to get to the services even though it rained for the first three days of the Institute. Yes, they walked carrying babies and baskets of food. They came in the morning to stay until after the evening service. Many came every day for such a stay. The young people came in the afternoon after school remaining for supper and the evening service. Our peak attendance of 154 on Friday evening was 24 more than the membership of the Macedonia Church.

I was impressed again by the way the people love to hear the Word of God. The first preaching service began about 10:30 a.m. As many as four preachers were heard each afternoon including Dr. Walter Moore, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Meridian, Mississippi, who preached on Baptist doctrine, and Dr. Martin J. Gilbert, the head of the Rural Department in Mississippi. At least two more preachers were heard each evening. I preached in the morning for worship, each afternoon on stewardship and each evening on the Acts of the Apostles. The Choctaws heard all preachers gladly.

No person could spend five days with the Choctaws without being impressed with their hospitality. I felt welcome from the first hour. True, I did not understand their language, but the message of a smile and a handclasp are universal. With noon and night meals served in the church if raining or under the trees if not, the fellowship with the people was great. The cooking was done mostly on the grounds. The meals on the long outdoor table with the women on one side and the men on the other were always a joy. I learned that Indian cooking is good.

A profound impression was made on me by the large number of boys, girls, and young people who came to the services. Here is the future of the

Choctaw people. Win them to Christ, as is being done, and the future of the Choctaws is Christian. Train them for Christ and the future of the Choctaws is assured. I do not want to forget such boys as college graduate Henry Ben who led the singing or Pastor Isaac's son, Calvin, who played the piano.

One other impression must be mentioned: the faithfulness of Missionary W. W. Simpson. Brother Simpson lives for Christ and the Choctaws. Twice he has

been in churches of which I have been pastor. He was in our School of Missions at Eminence, Kentucky, several years ago. He was with us here in Clinton, Kentucky, last February for the same type program. I watched him at work in Conehatta, Mississippi. The consuming passion of his life is Choctaw Indian missions. His has not been an easy life during the past eight years he has been on the field, but he is convinced he is in God's place as God's man. He and his pickup truck are signs of Christian friendship to the Mississippi Choctaws. Whatever God has in the future W. W. Simpson will follow.

These are the major impressions of five days with the Choctaws. I trust I can be with them again. I pray I can serve my God in other such periods with other Home Board missionaries. I hope my fellow pastors can spend five or more days each year with our missionaries on our mission fields.

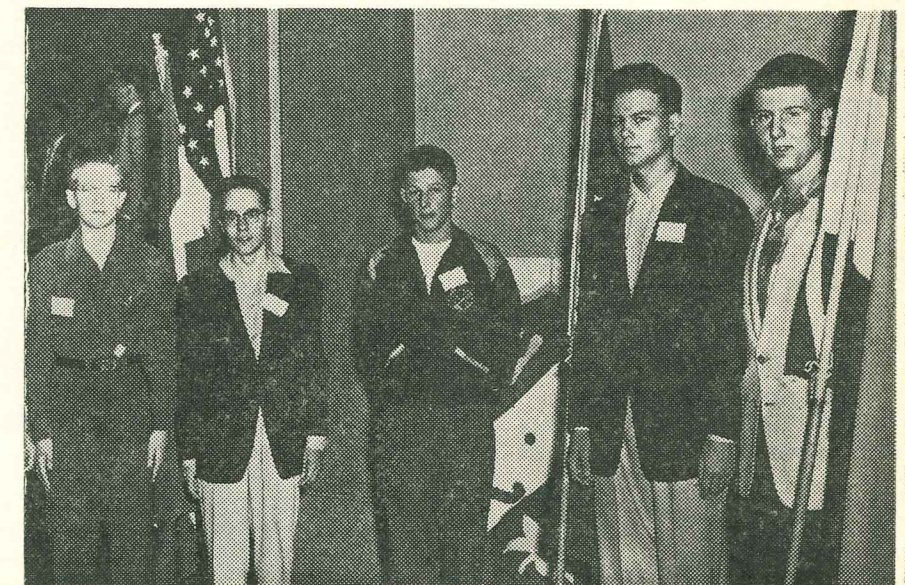

# The Prince of Peace

Isaiah 2:2-4; 9:2, 5-7; Luke 2:8-14

This great prophecy was written at a time when error, superstition, idolatry and distress abounded in the land. The people had turned their backs upon God, so the light of His countenance no longer shone upon them. The people were filled with despair because of the approaching Assyrian invasion, from which they could not see any hope of deliverance. This lesson presented to them their only hope, the coming Messiah. All hope rested in Him, the bringer of a far greater deliverance than that from the Assyrians.

### ISAIAH 2:2-4

According to Isaiah 2:1, God granted to the prophet a vision concerning Judah and Jerusalem. With the dark war clouds as a background, God enabled him to look into the future and see the time of universal peace in the latter days. The prophet visualized the time when Christ shall return and set up His reign in Jerusalem, which shall extend to the uttermost parts of the earth. With Jerusalem as the center of the world, the worshippers will flow to it constantly to be instructed in the things of God, and from it will go forth the knowledge of God's truth to enlighten the world. Returning to their homes, the people will remark to their relatives, friends and associates, "Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; and He will teach us of His ways, and we will walk in His paths: for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem."

When the King returns to this earth and begins His reign, He will arbitrate all disputes that may arise and give equitable decisions in all matters. Any problems beyond man's ability to solve will be unraveled by Him, Who has perfect wisdom. Implements of warfare will be converted into those of agriculture, and the art of war will be forgotten. But, these delightful and ideal conditions are not to be expected until the Prince of Peace returns to reign.

### ISAIAH 9:2, 5-7

To the people who were dwelling in the dense darkness and painful distress of their sins and sorrows, the prophet wrote a promise of hope. He assured his readers that the darkness would not last forever. However, he made it plain that their only hope was in God. Amid

all the darkness and gloom surrounding the nation, Isaiah saw the vision of the coming King as a star of hope and wrote of a coming day when their joy would be increased immensely.

As Isaiah was permitted by God to peer down through the centuries, he had a clearer vision of the coming Messiah than any other prophet. Although he wrote more than seven centuries before the birth of the Saviour, the prophet presented a glorious and detailed picture of the Christ. In it we note various details about His character and accomplishments.

Referring to His birth as though it was an accomplished fact, Isaiah wrote, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." This statement is abundant evidence of both the humanity and the deity of Christ. Isaiah pictured Him as being unique, remarkable and truly wonderful. Finite minds have never been able to grasp the full import of all that is involved in the names which were applied to Him in this passage of scripture.

"Wonderful" accurately describes Him. Christ is wonderful in His person—Son of God and Son of Man, wonderful in His purpose—the revelation of God to man, the redemption of man from sin and the reconciliation of man to God, and wonderful in His power—that is, His ability to save, to sustain and to supervise. "Counselor" implies His omniscience and includes His qualification to guide men and to direct the course of the race. As a counselor He is infallible or incapable of error. "The mighty God" speaks of His essential deity and His infinite power as the Creator of all things and the upholder of all His creation. "The everlasting Father" emphasizes the fact that He is eternal, with both continuity and immutability. "The Prince of Peace" portrays Him as the One Who has brought peace to the hearts of all who have trusted Him, and the One Who will ultimately bring peace to a distraught world and perpetuate it ever after. His reign will be peaceful, universal, righteous, powerful, glorious and enduring.

### LUKE 2:8-14

The story of the birth of Jesus Christ is of continual interest and constant blessing to those of us who know and love Him. His coming has meant more to the world than that of any other per-

son. Some seven hundred years before the Saviour was born, the prophet Micah had foretold that He would be born in Bethlehem in Judea. Just prior to the birth of the Lord Jesus, Joseph and Mary were in Nazareth, some sixty miles north of Bethlehem. In order that they might be at the proper place at the right time, God caused Caesar Augustus to issue a decree that all the world over which he had control should be enrolled, everyone in his own city, with a view to taxation and perhaps military service. In response to this decree Joseph and Mary made their way to Bethlehem. While they were there the Lord Jesus was born. His birth is absolutely unique; there is no other like it in all the annals of history.

At that time there were lowly shepherds in the Judean hill country, watching over their flocks by night. As these humble shepherds were guarding their sheep and protecting them from robbers and wild beasts, they were visited by an angel of the Lord. As the glory of the Lord shone round about this heavenly messenger, the shepherds were frightened. No wonder these men were filled with fear. Most anyone would have been under the circumstances. Seeking to calm them, the angel said, "Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour which is Christ the Lord." The angel not only told the city in which Jesus was born, but he gave to them a sign by which they might recognize Him—"Ye shall find the Babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger."

Thus the angel revealed intimate knowledge and announced the most wonderful news that was ever given to men. Instantly the heavenly hosts sounded forth a paean of praise to God because of the birth of a Saviour. The angelic hosts sang the praises of God because of His wondrous gift of the Prince Who had come to bring peace to the hearts and minds of the people of this sin-cursed world. Soon after the departure of the visitor from heaven, the shepherds went to see the newly born Saviour. Upon seeing Him lying in a manger, they manifested humble awe and reverential joy. When they returned, the shepherds were "glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen." They rejoiced because they had seen the Son of God Who was to bring such wonderful and so many blessings to this world.
