►Pastor James R. Pinkley reports a revival at the Mt. Pleasant Church, near Lawrenceburg, in which he was assisted by J. C. Carpenter as evangelist, with six being baptized and one coming by letter.

►Thomas Melzoni, pastor of the Kelly Street Baptist Church, Harlan, Ky., for the past seven years, has accepted the unanimous call to become pastor of the Beech Park Baptist Church, Oline Springs, Tenn. The church was organized in 1952 with a membership of 52, now grown to 200. A New church building and a new parsonage have been erected. The church is recognized as a 4-Star church, and its Sunday school has reached 160. He left July 5 to assume his new duties. He and his wife have two children, Sharon Kay, 8, and Thomas Jr., 4.

►Pastor Carl R. Wright, Crabtree Avenue Church, Owensboro, will preach as the evangelist, assisting Pastor Robert Stinson in a revival at the Bellfield Baptist Church, Route 3, Henderson, July 22-August 2. Under the leadership of Pastor Wright, a former pastor, the Bellfield church went to full time services and then he led them in erecting a new brick building in 1946. A Homecoming was held at Bellfield June 30. Two former pastors, Bert E. Williams, Monck's Corner, S. C., and Carl R. Wright, Owensboro, Ky., were morning and afternoon speakers.

►The Italian Baptist Union Convention was held in Rome May 28-31. It was the first convention held since the name of "Unione Cristiana Evangelica d'Italia" was chosen. Some changes were made and a new Committee of Evangelization was organized as a kind of home mission board. Pastor Manfredi Ronchi was elected president; Dr. Nunzio Palminota, a layman, was elected secretary of the Committee of the Union; Pastor Vincenzo Veneziano, secretary of the new committee; and Mr. Mario Girolami, another layman, treasurer of the Union. All of these will serve in their offices until next year's convention.

►Miss Florence Mitchell Tucker died at Parr's Rest, Louisville, June 6. Her funeral was conducted at Herbert C. Cralle Funeral Home, on the morning of June 8. She was a charter member of the Highland Baptist Church, started in 1892 largely by the Tucker family, and was the only charter member who has kept her membership throughout their life to this date. She was a sister of Miss Louise Tucker, former missionary to China, who survives her, as do two other sisters, Miss Gertrude Tucker, and Mrs. H. T. Gratz, and one brother, John W. Tucker, Jr. Also two nieces in Louisville survive her, i.e., Mrs. Lyman

P. Hailey and Mrs. Harold Wall. All of the Tuckers and their parents were born in Jeffersontown, and were a pioneer family of Jefferson County. Burial was in Cave Hill Cemetery.

►The Louisville Baptist Pastor's Conference adopted a motion June 3 calling for resolutions concerning the retirement of Dr. Emmet Floyd Estes as pastor of West Broadway Church, June 2. He has been there more than 34 years. Dr. Estes was born in DeKalb County, Mo., October 22, 1879. Having obtained his early education at Grand River College and the State Teachers Normal School, he was called to the ministry in 1914 and soon entered William Jewell College. He served churches at Edgerton and Albany, Mo., for seven years before coming to Louisville to enter Southern Seminary in 1922. In April, 1923, he was called to the pastorate of West Broadway. Dr. Estes will continue to make his home in Louisville. A son, Joseph Richard Estes, is now pastor of the First Baptist Church, Bowling Green, Ky.

►The Madison Avenue Church, Covington, observed its Century For Christ 1857-1957 on Sunday, May 26, 1957, with Pastor P. Ennis Taylor presiding. Speaker at the morning and night services was Dr. J. Winston Crawley, secretary for the Orient, Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, Va., son of a former pastor, A. L. Crawley, during 1918-19. Two former pastors, T. C. Ecton and Logan B. English, spoke at the afternoon program. A beautiful, 24-page booklet commemorating the occasion containing many pictures, was published. This also includes much history of the church for the last century. It was organized as the "John's Baptist Church," in affectionate remembrance of the late Brother John S. Bush, on July 19, 1857, under the trees on the campus of Western Baptist Theological

Reflection of a New Editor

Some have called it an honor; others say it's a promotion; a few regard it as the opposite; some even refer to it as a retirement but by far the most who have expressed themselves see in it a great opportunity for Kingdom service. I haven't recovered sufficiently from the shock to know exactly how to consider the election as editor of the Western Recorder but this one thing I'm convinced of—whatever else it is, it is the inscrutable, inexplicable will of God which moves his creatures with or without the sanction of human reason. Without journalistic background or many of the other prerequisites as the world regards qualifications, and without a wildest dream of even being editor of a state Baptist paper, here I am. I confess I have no long range plans—not even any short range plans. I do have some ideas by now, some of which seem judicious and others which certainly would qualify as brainstorm. I know that at this point there are few things one could say as a new editor that he would not want to or have to take back later, nevertheless, there are some convictions which I am reasonably certain I'll cling to from now to the end, be it soon or late.

The first is that my work shall be a ministry as much as was the classroom of Georgetown College or the pulpit of Harrodsburg Baptist Church. The same sense of divine guidance that took me to Georgetown and Harrodsburg has brought me here. When I left college teaching I felt nothing could ever give the same sense of fulfillment, and now I am just as certain that no place could ever give the same soul satisfaction as the personal pastoral ministry. I'm leaving what gives me all I could ever desire in happiness and a church which is a preacher's dream. Nothing less than a consciousness of God's command would budge me.

The next conviction is that with the responsibility of editorship of the Western Recorder comes as a heritage without parallel. The paper has occupied a place in religious journalism which is truly unique. Of its editors I have known only the present retiring servant of God. In my judgment Dr. Skin-

ner's work has been forthright, fair, progressive, and exemplary in every way and I know it will be a matter of little feet to fit big shoes, but his own kind and encouraging words will be of inestimable value to me.

Another conviction of my soul is that no hour of history has been more critical for God's people called Baptists than this one. It ranks in my mind with the hour when Jesus commissioned the church with task or when Carey was ignited by God to set Baptists on missionary fire or when Judson and Rice saw right by New Testament light. The spiritual destiny of this world might well be determined by the response of Baptists to God in this generation. The place of this publication in that destiny is my soul's concern.

A belief of great comfort to me is that Baptist faith and convictions are found nowhere in finer or truer form than among Kentucky Baptists. With all the nobility of Baptists everywhere there is something about Kentucky Baptists that is distinct, different and grand, and my thirteen years among them have made me a great debtor. Dr. George Ragland used to say it exactly as I feel it. "For Baptist orthodoxy to die, Kentucky Baptists would have to die first." I say this with full realization that Baptists in every place have privilege to the same feeling.

As to my own expressions on this page or elsewhere in the Recorder, I can only promise that whatever is said will be honest, sincere and personal convictions. Truth in reporting and sincerity in interpretation of events will be my guiding principle whatever the costs. If I praise, it will be honest; if I criticize or question, it will be with good intentions. I will always be willing to speak the truth as I am given power to know it and trust my fate to God and to Kentucky Baptists. I beseech your prayers, brethren, and your mercy. My prayer today and every day ahead is and will be that of Solomon in his dream, . . . "I am but a little child. I know not how to go out or come in . . . Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart . . . for who is able to judge this thy so great a people?"—CHAUNCEY R. DALEY.



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

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


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Sunday School Lesson

For July 21, 1957

By H. C. Chiles

CALEB, MAN OF FAITH AND COURAGE

When the Israelites arrived at the borderland of their dreams, instead of going at once and possessing the land as God had commanded them, they asked Moses to appoint an appraisal committee to search out the land of Canaan, see what it was like, and tell them about it. Twelve leading men were chosen for this task, one from each tribe, and each was a man of distinction, judgment and discretion. They were chosen because of their physical endurance, quickness of eye, tact in emergencies, and good judgment of the land and the people. However, only two of them, Joshua and Caleb, were men of genuine faith in God and with strong convictions as to the destiny of Israel.

After a forty days' search the twelve spies returned and reported the finding of a land of magic charms, luscious fruits, alluvial soil and marvelous advantages. However, ten of them saw all of these good things overshadowed by the great difficulties to be encountered. They had a far keener sense of the difficulties than they had of the presence and power of God. Their pessimistic report caused disappointment, confusion, consternation and fear among the people.

With difficulty Caleb got permission to submit the minority report. He and Joshua wisely kept the allurements of the Promised Land before the people, realizing that longings often overcome cowardly fears. These men of faith did not minimize the difficulties, but they magnified God. Their faith, expressed in the words, "We are well able to overcome," was not natural optimism, but an expression of real trust in God.

Numbers 14:6-9.

After a feeling of disappointment, which soon developed into anger, the people spent the night weeping. Their resentment was soon directed against Moses and Aaron, whom they criticized harshly. In their remorse the people resolved to depose their leader, to elect another and to return to Egypt. Moses and Aaron, who were criticized unmercifully, fell on their faces and made intercession for their enemies. They tried to get the people to trust God and to do as He had commanded.

Joshua and Caleb protested the revolt with a reassertion of the fruitfulness of the land, an expression of confidence in the presence of the Lord with them, a warning against any rebellion against God, and an encouragement to each of them to perform their respective duties. They sought to restrain the people and to cause them to exercise genuine faith in the power and promises of

God. This they did at the peril of their own lives.

Joshua 14:6-14.

Joshua and Caleb were courageous in doing God's will. Neither of them was as great as Moses, but both of them believed that God was with them, so they did not fear the enemy.

In the light of today's subject and scripture, let us consider the following things about Caleb.

I. His Claim.

God had made a wonderful promise to His faithful servant. So Caleb, along with the members of his tribe, appeared before Joshua and reminded him of God's promise. He said, "Thou knowest the thing that the Lord said unto Moses the man of God concerning me and thee in Kadesh-barnea." He had cherished that promise, and now he was pleading it. It is always pleasing to God when His children plead His promises.

It must have been very gratifying to Caleb to know that he had "wholly followed the Lord." It was not mere egotism that caused him to claim this. Moses had previously testified as to his faithfulness in exactly the same words (v. 9). God's Spirit also inspired Joshua to repeat the same testimony in verse 14. Obedience always brings blessings. God always delights to honor them that honor Him.

Caleb said, "Now therefore give me this mountain." That was about the biggest and most difficult thing he could have requested, but he knew that God was able. He knew there were giants in that land, but he was convinced that God would help His people, so there was nothing for them to fear.

II. His Courage.

Caleb had the courage of independence. Forty-five years before he had dared to bring in a minority report as to the land. It would have been far easier to have agreed with the majority, but Caleb dared to be conscientious and faithful. He advised the people to take immediate action and possess the land. We admire his courage in being willing to stand against ten men who had been his companions on the forty day expedition.

We also admire the venerable old warrior for his courage in seeking as his own inheritance a place which was inhabited with giants. Eagerly he looked toward the daring achievement of possessing this desirable land. To him, driving out these giants was merely laying hold of the promises of God, for he had believed God when He said that He would expel their enemies. Caleb's

courage was calm, strong, wise, resourceful, and unselfish.

God wants all His children to be fearless in their conflict with the forces of evil. He wants us to be willing to do His will in spite of obstacles, hardships, afflictions and sufferings. He expects us to do His will regardless of what Satan may do to keep us from doing so.

III. His Consecration.

Caleb's life was completely yielded to God and His service. He did whatever God told him to do. He stood for God and goodness, truth and trust, humility and obedience, love and liberality. Having ascertained the will of God about any matter, Caleb was very anxious to do His will. God wants us to discover and to do His will. After all, the important thing is to know that you are in the center of God's will and obedient to His Word. Such a realization will give any Christian all the courage which he needs. Those who walk with God in holy living may count on Him for all needed strength.

God always rewards those who are faithful to Him. Devotion to God is necessary if we are to be fruitful in our living and successful in our serving. Whoever has "wholly followed the Lord God" will certainly receive great things from God.

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
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R. B. Hooks, Sr., Commends C. R. Daley As the New Editor

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
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
