### Madden elected in Tennessee

Tom J. Madden was unanimously elected by the 100-member executive board of the Tennessee Baptist Convention to succeed Ralph Norton as executive secretary-treasurer.

Madden, 59, director of convention ministries for the convention since 1976, will assume office Jan. 1, 1979 succeeding Norton, who will retire Dec. 31 because of the convention's current mandatory retirement age of 65. Norton, who will be 65 in November, has been the top executive for Tennessee Baptists since 1973.

Madden joined the Tennessee convention staff after a 22-year pastorate of First Baptist Church, Tullahoma, Tenn.

A native of Enid, Okla., Madden has been president of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and in a number of positions at local, associational, state and national Southern Baptist levels. He currently serves on the board of the Southern Baptist Foundation and the Southern Baptist Education Commission. He was previously a member of the denomination's Executive Committee and Christian Life Commission.

Madden is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, received a master of theology degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth, Tex., and did additional graduate work at Southwestern and at Baylor University, Waco, Tex.

He is married to the former Edna Parker of Jackson, Miss., and has two children.

### SBC leadership lauds retiring Ben Fisher

Ben C. Fisher, retiring executive director-treasurer of the SBC Education Commission, received recognition from SBC colleagues Sept. 19 in Nashville.

Attending the program honoring the nationally known spokesman for church-related colleges were members of the SBC Executive Committee, state convention executive secretaries and editors, SBC agency heads and other staff representatives.

Elected head of the Education Commission in 1970, Fisher will retire Sept. 30 after 40 years of service to Southern Baptists. Fisher has been a pastor, a Baptist college faculty member, a seminary administrative assistant, and head of Kentucky's Baptist convention education council.

Fisher and his wife will live in Murfreesboro, N. C. and he will write, lecture and be an educational consultant. He will also join the faculty and administrative staff of Campbell College, Buies Creek, N. C., in January as an adjunct professor and consultant to the president.

Actions to study the potential of telecommunications for Baptists and proposals for a new seminary and merger of two Southern Baptist Convention agencies transpired during the annual meeting of the SBC Executive Committee.

The committee also made statements on the Middle East peace accords and "Bold Mission Thrust," set guidelines to select a successor to its executive-secretary-treasurer, and voted a 1978-79 budget.

The committee voted to "encourage the involved and interested (SBC) agencies jointly to participate in a telecommunications study with staff leadership to be provided by the Radio and Television Commission."

Responding to a motion at the 1978 SBC meeting in Atlanta, the committee also asked "all interested parties to support and present their views" on the suggestion for establishing a seventh SBC seminary to the Executive Committee's institutions work group in February. In turn the work group and the program and budget subcommittee of the Executive Committee will bring recommendations to the Executive Committee which would report to the 1979 convention in Houston.

In a related action, the Executive Committee requested the SBC Sunday School Board to work with appropriate agencies to project seminary enrolments through 1985 and update studies done in 1957 showing the number of churches in a 250 mile radius of each existing seminary site and other possible seminary sites.

The matter of agency merger was proposed in a letter sent by George Bagley, executive secretary of the Alabama Baptist Convention. Bagley, noting that the Brotherhood Commission is now without a leader following the recent death of Glendon McCullough, proposed merger of the commission with the Sunday School Board.

Noting that its action "is not to be taken as implying that the committee or its subcommittees or work groups at this time approve or disapprove of the merger," the Executive Committee asked the board and the commission to study the proposal. The two agencies will appoint a conference committee of three from each to discuss the feasibility of Bagley's suggestion for consolidation and report to the Executive Committee in February.

The Executive Committee sent a telegram to President Jimmy Carter commending him and thanking God "for the steps which have been made toward peace in the Middle East." It passed a resolution committing each Executive Committee member to strong personal and prayer support of the SBC's Bold Mission Thrust goal to proclaim the message of Christ to the entire world in this century.

Taking note of the retirement of Porter W. Routh, its executive secretary-treasurer, the Executive Committee approved guidelines outlining qualifications for Routh's successor and took steps to increase Routh's retirement benefits. Routh, who has headed the Executive Committee for more than 27 years, will retire Aug. 1, 1979. A successor is expected to be named in February 1979.

The Executive Committee set its 1978-79 budget of \$736,100, 10.3 percent ahead of the previous year's figure. It includes a six percent cost of living adjustment for Executive Committee staff.

Subject to SBC approval the Executive Committee set a Bold Mission Thrust Cooperative Program goal of \$83 million for the 1979-80 fiscal year, with a \$68.5 million basic budget, \$2.5 million capital fund and \$12 million Bold Mission Thrust challenge section.

A three-part action urged that the total Cooperative Program goal for 1979-80, including all state conventions, be \$226,001,938 in keeping with convention action to double Cooperative Program receipts in five years; that states consider raising percentage of their

Cooperative Program gifts to the SBC Cooperative Program to help reach that goal; and that the SBC Stewardship Commission intensify efforts to acquaint churches with the necessity to raise their gifts in support of the goal.

In a series of other actions, the Executive Committee:

—Passed resolutions paying tribute to the late Glendon McCullough of the Brotherhood Commission and Ralph Norton and Roy Sutton, retiring as executive directors respectively of the Tennessee and Arizona Baptist Conventions.

—Raised the cost of the SBC Book of Reports from \$1 to \$2 and the cost of the SBC Annual from \$3 to \$5 for church and church-related organizations not normally receiving the annual and from \$7 to \$10 for non-church-related organizations.

—Approved fund raising campaigns for Southeastern, New Orleans and Golden Gate Baptist theological seminaries, in keeping with past actions for other seminaries.

### TV home Bible study beginning in October

Two Southern Baptist agencies have joined forces to purchase weekly satellite time to beam television programming through 350 cable systems covering all 50 states.

Beginning Sunday, Oct. 8 "At Home with the Bible" will air in 30 minutes of one hour of time purchased by the Sunday School Board and the Radio and Television Commission. The second half hour will feature varied programs produced by the commission.

"At Home with the Bible" is a weekly program jointly produced by the two agencies which includes Bible study, music and interviews. It will air on 18 television and seven radio stations.

The program will be aired in Louisville Sundays at 7:30 a.m. on WHAS-TV beginning Oct. 15.

### Committee OK's plan for Routh successor

The SBC Executive Committee approved guidelines for a successor to executive secretary-treasurer Porter W. Routh, who will retire Aug. 1, 1979 and took some preliminary steps honoring him for more than 27 years in the post.

Brooks Wester, chairman of both the search committee and the Executive Committee, said the search committee has no specific successor yet in mind and urged persons to send suggestions for a successor and a biographical resume for each.

A successor is expected to be elected at the February 1979 meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee voted to supplement Routh's retirement income with \$500 per month, which would increase with cost of living, and continue to provide half of that amount and half of his survivor annuity to his wife in the event of his death.


Other actions included providing expenses for continuing secretarial assistance to Routh and paying expenses of the Rouths to Baptist meetings, such as the 1980 Baptist World Alliance in Toronto and annual meetings of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Rouths were also given a three-week vacation trip following a Baptist World Alliance meeting in Brighton, England next summer.

The guidelines said the person succeeding Routh should have extensive qualifications in personal, public, professional and Southern Baptist areas.

## Daley Observations

### Sexual immorality in the ministry

Sexual immorality is a growing problem in the Baptist ministry. It is painful to say such a thing but the problem is prevalent enough that it must be faced and dealt with.

In the last several weeks one pastor and one staff member of Baptist churches in Kentucky have been found guilty of adultery and another pastor has deserted his wife for another woman. In two of these instances the second parties in the affairs were staff members of Baptist institutions. It would serve no redemptive purpose to reveal names and places but it also serves no redemptive purpose to ignore such shameful and destructive conduct and sweep it under the rug. Recognition of the problem should serve as a warning to other ministers when tempted.

There is no way to calculate the damage of such conduct. It virtually destroys the minister involved and his family. It tears a church apart and it tragically hurts the faith of church members and especially young people. It reflects upon every minister, every church and every true believer.

If the angels in heaven rejoice over every soul born into the Kingdom of God, the demons in hell dance with glee over every minister who falls into adultery. Adultery is no more sinful in a preacher than in anyone else but it is far more damaging because of his exalted and influential position.

How is such conduct on the part of God's special servants explained? One explanation is that ministers are human and are subject to the same temptations as anyone else. In fact, the sexual temptation is intensified for ministers who in counseling and other relationships deal one to one with women some of whom seem to delight in seeing how far the minister will go.

No doubt the permissive spirit of modern society and the exploitation of sex in every area of American life affect a minister as it does everyone else.

But neither these nor any other reason justify a moral lapse by a minister. Not even the rationalization that some ministers have unhappy marriages excuses such conduct.

How should a church deal with a pastor or staff member involved in adultery? If the guilty minister denies what he has done or tries to conceal it, he must be exposed and removed forthrightly. If he confesses and asks for forgiveness, he should be forgiven but not lightly. The forgiveness should include redemptive help in salvaging his ministry, if he feels he should, but not in the church where the offense occurred.

It is inconceivable a minister could ever recover enough credibility and influence to continue ministering in the church or community where he committed adultery. The most he could expect would be forgiveness and an opportunity

to salvage his ministry somewhere else. Moreover, he would have to be honest with any other church considering him.

What can be done to help prevent a minister from falling into adultery? Whatever anyone else can do to help, the primary responsibility is upon the minister himself. He cannot always control situations which bring temptations but he can decide firmly beforehand what he will do when tempted. If he does not have enough self-control to resist the temptation of adultery, he should get out or should never have gotten into the ministry.

A minister should never underestimate the power of Satan but always remember the Apostle Peter's characterization of the devil "as a roaring lion, (who) walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Pet. 5:8). A minister is a prime target of Satan so he should begin every day with a sincere prayer for the help of the Holy Spirit in every situation he will encounter and at the end of every day thank the Lord for bringing him safely through the day.

In ordination examinations and services a minister should be helped to see the imperative of a pure heart as well as pure doctrine. He should be required to commit himself to orthodox behavior as well as orthodox theology.

Colleges and seminaries where ministers are trained should bear down on moral rectitude as an unqualified prerequisite for ministers of God.

Above all, church members should pray for their ministers every day.

### A bold new venture

Beginning in October a bold new effort will be launched by Southern Baptists to take weekly Bible study into the homes of millions in America by television and radio. A 30 minute Bible study called "At Home with the Bible" will be broadcast weekly over selected television and radio stations. The same program by use of a communication satellite will be beamed over 350 cable television systems covering all 50 states. (See news article on page 1.)

This project is being undertaken jointly by the Sunday School Board and the Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. Time for these telecasts and broadcasts is being bought at commercial rates which limits the number of stations which can be used. One television station in Kentucky, WHAS, channel 11, Louisville, will telecast the home Bible study on Sundays at 7:30 a.m. beginning Oct. 15. The program will also be on WSM, channel 4, Nashville, Sundays at 8 a.m. beginning Oct. 1.

The satellite broadcast of the Bible study for cable television will be Sundays at 9 a.m. eastern time and 8 a.m. central time. The program will be on the Home Box Office channel and cable television users can call the cable manager to learn if this channel is available on their set.

The potential of this home Bible study is unlimited. It is especially for those not now engaged in regular Bible study but also offers those already in Sunday school an additional opportunity for home study. The study will not be limited to those whom the broadcasts reach but will also be available for all who request the *Home Bible Study Guide*, a monthly series of lessons. The material will include tests which can be returned and graded for those who want to receive certificates of credit.

I have previewed two of the first 13 lessons

and they are top quality. Frank Pollard, the teacher, does an outstanding job as do the musicians. Music and one interview are included with Bible study on the half hour program.

Viewers who send in for the guide can expect something new for Southern Baptists but something used almost universally by religious broadcasters. The material for the home Bible study will be sent free of charge but those receiving it will be offered an opportunity to make a contribution for financial help in continuing the telecasts and broadcasts. This is understandable since the time is being purchased instead of being given free as public service time. The material will be sent monthly to those who request it whether a contribution is made and users should feel no obligation.

The Sunday School Board and the Radio and Television Commission are to be commended for combining their resources to present "At Home with the Bible."

### A commendable record

Kentucky Baptists came through in a highly commendable way last year in support of the world wide mission enterprise being undertaken by Southern Baptists. This issue of Western Recorder includes the report of mission giving of Kentucky Baptists for world evangelization. Every reader will want to check the record of his or her church.

We regard this report as very important and we have gone to extra expense this year to make it more attractive and legible.

Doubtlessly there will be some mistakes in such a long statistical report. The business office does its best to keep a perfect record but even computers reflect an occasional human error. # Baptist News in Brief

## CLC expands its work, assignments

The Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission voted to expand the agency's work in three areas of moral concern, enlarged the assignments of two staff members and voted a record budget during its annual meeting.

During the next year, the Southern Baptist Convention's social concerns agency will give increased emphasis to television and morality, world hunger and alcohol education.

The commission added the title of associate executive secretary to the duties of Harry N. Hollis Jr., the agency's director of family and special moral concerns since 1969, and changed the title of public relations director, Floyd A. Craig, to director of public relations and development. Craig, who joined the commission in 1967, spent a recent study leave examining foundations and possible foundation grants.

After hearing a call from executive secretary Foy Valentine for the Southern Baptists to include "Bold Doing" in the denomination's Bold Mission Thrust venture, commission members approved a 1978-79 budget of \$531,000, an increase of \$69,000. It includes a seven percent cost of living increase for staff salaries.

"Southern Baptists are a great and strong body of Christians now about to enter the 1980s under the banner of Bold Mission Thrust (the SBC plan to proclaim the gospel of Christ to the entire world in this century)," Valentine declared. "That banner thus far has been interpreted to include 'Bold Going,' 'Bold Growing' and 'Bold Giving.' It would be a great mistake for Southern Baptists not to find ways to include 'Bold Doing' in this program."

The commission voted to sponsor regional "Bold Doing" conferences in at least seven states during the

next year. Primarily designed for pastors, the conferences will focus on ways Southern Baptist churches can apply the gospel of Christ to current social concerns.

The commission also passed resolutions urging prayer for peace in the Middle East and opposing the proposed rewrite of the Communications Act of 1934. It also asked the staff to seek ways to focus attention on needs of the Hispanic population and deal with the current educational crisis including the current inroads of parochial education on public schools.

Southern Baptist churches were challenged to set aside a special time during worship services on Sunday, Oct. 8, to pray for peace in the Middle East. The resolution was approved in response to a joint call for prayer and peace issued by U. S. President Jimmy Carter, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin from their summit conference at Camp David, Md.

The resolution on the communications act encouraged Southern Baptists to communicate opposition to the proposed legislation to their elected representatives in Congress on grounds the bill would provide substantial deregulation of the broadcasting industry at the expense of the public welfare.

Change in the status of Hollis, for whom Valentine will draw a new job description, came because of the growing size and complexity of the agency's work and to allow Valentine time for study and research in Christian ethics, in addition to his administrative responsibilities.

Craig's job title was revised, the commission said, to include his added responsibilities in securing additional funding, primarily from foundations, for commission projects.

## Gaines S. Dobbins

### dies at age 92

Gaines S. Dobbins, long time prominent figure of Southern Baptist life, died Sept. 22 at age 92.

A native of Langsdale, Miss., Dobbins held degrees from Mississippi College, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Columbia University and did graduate work at the University of Chicago and Peabody College.

Dobbins' professional career included pastorates in Mississippi, editorial work at the Baptist Sunday School Board, professorships at Golden Gate and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. He was first dean of Southern's School of Religious Education and was a pioneer in the fields of religious journalism, pastoral psychology and field training in urban ministry.

In 1975 Dobbins was honored by Southern Seminary with the creation of the Gaines S. Dobbins Chair of Church Administration.

Dobbins was well known as a lecturer and author. He completed his 33rd book a few weeks before his death. His most recently published work, completed when he was 91, is titled "Zest for Living."

The funeral was held Sept. 25 in Birmingham, Ala.


After a reception at the inn, the couple left on a two week wedding trip to Hawaii.



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

Lessons for Oct. 8, 1978

### Life and Work Series

Early in his Galilean ministry our Lord began to call some disciples to work with him. Among those whom he called to be with, learn from, and work with him was Levi or Matthew.

Luke 5:27-32

Christ found Levi sitting at the receipt of custom collecting taxes for the Roman government. Had he possessed much self-respect, or cared much for public opinion, Levi would not have accepted this unpatriotic and ostracized position. All groups looked upon him as a despicable and contemptible renegade. With a look of love in his eyes Christ spoke the significant words, "Follow me," thereby calling Levi to intimate friendship, holy fellowship and sacred employment.

There was not any hesitation on Levi's part. Instantly and resolutely, he forsook all, arose and followed Christ. In so doing he turned his back upon everything for which he had sold himself when he became a publican. Of this great sinner Christ made a clean, self-respecting, happy, God-honoring man.

Instead of feeling a sense of regret upon leaving his financially profitable business, and acting as if he were making a great sacrifice for Christ, Levi celebrated the event by giving a great feast in honor of his Lord. He also wanted to introduce all of his friends to the Saviour, hoping that they too

John 4:24

Christ taught the Samaritan woman that true worship is not confined to a particular place, but that it must be spiritual and must be done in an understanding manner. Worship is a proper recognition of the worth of God.

Matthew 6:24

Christ made it clear that two masters, whose interests are entirely incompatible, cannot be served by the same person at any given time. Our Lord said, "Ye cannot serve God and mammon." The meaning of "mammon" may be a little obscure, but it seems to be the god of riches. True and devoted servants of the Lord give him the preeminence in all things, and rightly so.

Exodus 20:3-7

The second commandment prohibits the use of idols or images in connection with the worship of God. To attempt to represent the living God by that which is without life and made by man is useless, sinful and truly a debasement of deity. The

might put their trust in him and live for him.

Christ accepted Levi's invitation and attended the feast which was given in his honor. He ate with the publicans and the sinners, not because he approved their manner of life, but because he wanted to change it. The Pharisees criticized Christ for attending the feast. With a sarcastic reply Christ rebuked their sinful attitude, and let them know that he had come to save those who were aware that they were sinners and repented.

Luke 18:9-14

Christ addressed this scathing parable to self-satisfied souls who look down on others. Desirous of being esteemed as a person of great piety, the Pharisee stood in a conspicuous place, pretended to thank God, and with polished phrases boasted of his good works and merits. He was careful to throw bouquets at himself, and to point out the delinquencies of others. In spite of his blatant self-righteousness, the Pharisee was still a great sinner.

Knowing himself to be terribly sinful and unworthy of God's favor, the publican pleaded with God, against whom he had sinned, for the mercy of pardon and peace, and received that for which he prayed. He was justified before God as if he had never sinned.

### Reverence for God

worship of images is expressly forbidden in the scriptures.

In verse seven God requires reverence for his name and forbids its use flippantly, irreverently, falsely, insincerely, deceitfully or profanely. The Hebrew word, which is translated "in vain," means falsely, emptily, frivolously and profanely. Many think profanity is a trivial matter, but God considers it a grievous sin.

Luke 4:8

When Satan tempted Christ Jesus to comply with his will rather than conform to God's will, our Lord defeated the tempter on the ground of his humanity and not on the basis of his deity. Unable to stand before the incisive power of God's word, Satan fled and left Christ alone for a season.

Matthew 5:33-37

Knowing that swearing under oath does not increase the truthfulness of one's words, Christ uttered his prohibition against all vain and useless swearing. Using God's name may impress some listeners, but it will not make any liar honest.

### Nostalgia

Driving away from Gainesville, Ga. this afternoon, I feel a little bit like I am leaving home and a little bit like I am going home to Kentucky. I served in this delightful little Georgia city enough years to make some deep and rich friendships. I lived here long enough for the countryside to feel like home. I worshiped this morning in a newly built sanctuary from the one in which I preached a quarter of a century ago. But, there were still enough of the same people to make me feel that I had been away on a long journey and was back at home. I had similar feelings as I passed our former home place and now, driving by the cemetery at the edge of town, I think of so many who sleep out there.

I live in Middletown, Ky. now, from which base I am so frequently gone that I have scarcely had time to put down many new roots, if indeed one can, after reaching my age. In Kentucky I still feel more at home around Lexington where I lived so much longer after my Georgia years. But again, driving out of Georgia toward Kentucky feels a bit like leaving home and a bit like going home.

Vagabond preachers who have lived all over the country have feelings like this. I have them in Missouri, too. I don't know how much of this vague restlessness other people feel who were reared in single homesteads, whose people all tend to live in the same patch of ground. I wonder if they suffer from this sometimes ill-at-easiness that never feels completely at home anywhere?

It's the absence of an anchor, or maybe the fact that we preachers only live on the anchor. We seldom really haul in and set up permanent quarters. We just anchor in port for whatever time the Lord allows.

I believe, though, that everybody has a measure of this restlessness. I doubt that one can live in one place on earth long enough for it to really feel like home. There comes a time when one's friends are all gone, eyesight fades, hearing gets dull, communication becomes difficult and even the life-long resident finds himself a stranger and not even "home" is home.

Where is home? Not here. Heaven must be home. That's where we'll spend most of our time.
