



SBC registration investigation uncovers 'sloppy' procedures

The long-awaited investigation of alleged registration irregularities at the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in June in Houston did not reveal massive wrongdoing.

But the investigation by SBC registration secretary Lee Porter of Nashville did reveal problems calling for measures both by churches and the SBC to correct flaws, ambiguities and 'sloppy' procedures which threaten the integrity of the SBC's balloting system.

Porter's report, made last week to the SBC Executive Committee meeting in Nashville, also declared a 'get out the vote' campaign was in evidence as part of the widely reported effort to elect an SBC president committed to biblical inerrancy as an issue.

In that election Adrian Rogers, pastor of Bellevue Baptist Church, Memphis, Tenn., was elected to the presidency on the first ballot on the opening day of the SBC Tuesday, June 12.

Amid charges irregularities had violated the registration process SBC messengers voted in Houston to instruct Porter to study any such irregularities and report them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee was asked to "report or recommend to the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention next year (1980) necessary bylaw changes and/or registration procedures to prevent irregularities and to maintain the integrity of the balloting system."

Responding to questions from denominational and secular press, Porter said he could find "no evidence that the irregularities uncovered centered around churches or messengers committed to a particular theological or doctrinal persuasion or located in a particular section. . . . They were across-the-board type Southern Baptists."

The only exception to that statement, he said, involved the 'get out the vote' effort.

Although such activity is not illegal, messengers at the SBC's Thursday morning, June 14, session in Houston voted a resolution "disavowing overt political activity and organization as a method of selection of its (the SBC's) officers."

Porter said his investigation showed that reports of large numbers of discarded ballots at the SBC were true. "One usher collected about 400 sets off the

floor. Others turned in 30 to 40 sets in the registration booth. The clean-up crew showed me another large container of discarded ballots. Apparently between 1000 and 2000 sets were thrown away after the Tuesday afternoon session."

He said the investigation uncovered no evidence of massive busing of voters, no evidence of stolen ballots (although security was breached "for three hours on Tuesday morning when numbers of people traveled through the registration booth"), and some messengers voted by proxy.

The investigation also showed technically improper registrations by at least three interim pastors and wives from churches other than ones where they were members, five foreign missionaries, four newly constituted churches, two churches not in cooperation with the SBC and "one individual at the convention (who said) he was a former supply speaker and an honorary member of the church that elected him."

Porter, who declared the investigation was not of the election of Rogers but of the registration process, said the report revealed "the mass of our people were meticulously careful" in following proper procedures and the "letter and spirit of SBC constitution and by-laws."

He reported his investigation revealed 284 registrations absolutely out of line, characterizing the messengers in question as being "caught with blood on their hands." They included registrations beyond the maximum allowed to churches, double registrations, registration of children not elected and other illegal registrations.

Porter also pointed out about 1000 messengers who registered without being elected by their church, noting that these included many pastors and their wives. For example, he said, they included pastors and wives whose churches had voted to provide travel funds for them to attend the convention but had failed to elect them formally as messengers.

He noted at least 47 churches permitted only 10 messengers had more than that, including one with 22, one with 20, one with 16, two with 14, five with 13, 11 with 12 and 26 with 11.

"Thirty-nine churches," he said, "had members who had not been elected or appointed by the church and registered on their own. Thirty-one of those persons who registered on their own were denominational workers." That, declared Porter, a Baptist Sunday School Board staff member, was "very sad."

Porter drew a number of conclusions from his investigation which he hopes will be incorporated in recommendations the Executive Committee brings to the SBC annual meeting in 1980 in St. Louis.



Daley Observations

Registration irregularity report is good and bad

Not the most important but the most interesting item on the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee agenda last week in Nashville was the report of convention secretary Lee Porter on his investigation of registration and voting irregularities in Houston last June. The investigation was authorized by convention messengers following rumors and charges that there were violations in Houston of convention constitutional provisions for messenger registration and balloting.

Secretary Porter took his assignment seriously having spent 300 hours on the study. He has handled every one of the approximately 16,000 registration cards twice and some as many as five times. He has communicated with 377 churches and 197 individuals about their messenger appointments and registrations. The result is a revealing report (see Western Recorder news story on page 1 of this issue).

The report is both reassuring and disappointing. It is reassuring in that it verifies the integrity of the great host of those who attend Southern Baptist Convention sessions to do the Lord's work. It is disappointing in that it reveals that a small number intentionally and flagrantly violated registration regulations.

The investigation put to rest some ugly rumors and charges coming out of Houston, especially related to the election of the convention president. The rumor that crowds were bused in from Texas churches and illegally registered just to vote for a president was proven by the study to be wrong. The study did indicate, however, that there were successful efforts to "get out the vote" for the election of the president but that proper registration procedures were followed for the most part. The large number of ballot books with only the one presidential election ballot removed which were found thrown away after the session in which the president's election was held indicates some messengers came to the convention only for this election.

The most disturbing finding was that out of 284 who were known to have registered when they should not, 31 were denominational workers (conventionwide, state, associational) and five were foreign missionaries. There were more "bad guys" than in Houston than the one prominent convention participant who was exposed in Houston for improper registration as an honorary member of the church appointing him.

There are several conclusions resulting from the Porter report. One is that the 1979 convention in Houston was characterized by few if any more registration irregularities than would likely

have been found most any other year if the same sort of investigation had been made.

Another conclusion is that the outcome of no convention vote was affected by any registration or voting irregularity. This was always fairly obvious but some shadow remained, especially over the president's election, until the study by secretary Porter.

The most important conclusion from the study is that the convention itself has been so lax and sloppy in implementing its own constitutional provisions that registration irregularity on the part of messengers has been encouraged. One clear illustration of this is that more than 7000 messengers came to Houston without their registration cards which churches are supposed to provide them before they leave home. So more than 7000 registration cards were handed out in Houston to be filled in with some technical information that even many pastors don't carry around in their heads. There is no way a credentials committee can properly consider over 7000 requests for credentials.

In light of such laxity and the vagueness and complexity of the present registration card, it is imperative that registration by-laws be revised and the registration card be redesigned.

While there is no justification for deliberately registering improperly, especially in the case of denominational workers, the convention owes every church and would-be messenger a registration procedure characterized by simplicity and clarity. No doubt this will be one of the fruits of the Houston experience.

The final conclusion was included in secretary Porter's report and was expressed on this page several weeks ago. It is that the registration process for our conventions must operate on trust in the integrity of churches and messengers. No plan can be devised that will make us honest. The day we have to employ computers and policemen to monitor registration and voting in Southern Baptist Conventions, we will already be out of the Lord's business.

Should singles serve as pastors?

When was the last time you read an article dealing with the surplus of 'single' pastors? I read with interest Mr. Daley's recent article, "Should divorced persons serve as deacons?" It is no longer a one-sided issue. The dilemma now seems two-fold with divorcees on one side of married status and singles on the other.

Marriage is honorable in all but to be single and in the ministry (particularly pastoral-led), one is often made to feel as a goat among sheep. Marriage is a beautiful, God-ordained institution which has often been misinterpreted and abused. We readily think of those who enter too lightly into marriage with seemingly no grasp of the spiritual implications. We recoil in disillusionment with the prevailing and ever increasing rate of divorce. And yet, while stressing the gravity of marriage, we do a grave injustice to young single ministers by insinuating if not directly stating they must marry before they can seriously begin to pursue and fulfil their call.

I choose not to quibble with scriptural polemics too excessively in making a lengthy case for single pastors. It would seem that the subject could be well taken from either perspective. Mr. Daley's article did well in shedding light on 'the husband of one wife' qualification as having possible reference to the problem of polygamy among early Christians. That is to say that those who use 'the husband of one wife' as grounds for excluding a single pastor are most probably doing it on the basis of their own misinterpretation of scripture. Paul clearly states, "For I would

that all men were even as myself . . . I say therefore to the unmarried and widows, It is good for them if they abide even as I. But if they cannot contain, let them marry . . ." (1 Cor. 7:9-10).

With the scriptural consideration aside, the practical slant would seem to be that a married pastor is more settled and less likely to become promiscuously involved or to attract as much gossip although perhaps unwarranted. But I contend with great remorse that marriage does not guarantee either an individual's uprightness or his devotion. And from a practical standpoint, and one which Paul held, a single person would be more at liberty to do the Lord's work. My real issue is with those churches who filter out the unmarried candidates for any ministerial capacity without giving them fair consideration.

It is not the intention of this letter to merely vent feelings. The hope is that churches might begin to look seriously at individuals (instead of two-for-one packages) regardless of marital status. Scripture has not contributed nearly as much to the "married or else" syndrome as has society. But I am reminded, as a wise pastor once pointed out, for some strange reason Jesus chose to remain single. And what of the disciples? Where they good family men? They left all to follow Jesus. One thing to consider: If churches close their pastorates to unmarried ministers, how often have they perchance missed God's person for that place of service?

Another inerrancy contribution

There has been so very much said about original autographs and present day versions and translations. In fact, there have been so many different things written and said it has become very confusing!

I realize no one living today has ever seen the "original writings" of the Word of God. No one, from the standpoint of having "proof-positive," can say the first manuscripts were verbally inspired of God. If one is to believe God inspired his Word, word by word, then one must believe it by faith. This idea has received much criticism. However, if this belief is incorrect, there is only one alternative: one would have to say God gave to man the ideas and man wrote them as he chose to express those ideas. Some seem to say this is the reason for the things the apostle Paul expressed concerning women. But that's another discussion altogether.

If we say the Bible is not verbally inspired, then it is not the Word of God, but it would contain the Word of God. That, it seems to me, would require someone to be able to pick out the portions that are the words of God as well as those portions that were the expressions of the minds of men. If the Bible is not inspired, verbally, then it would be inspired "in spots." That called for an "inspired spot spotter."

If we can't take all of it as the Word, delivered to men by the Lord, himself, then what man is qualified to tell us what part is of God and what part is of man? The Bible says, "For who hath known the mind of the Lord? Or who hath been his counsellor?"

I have no difficulty believing, by faith, in the word-for-word verbal inspiration of scripture (all of it), but I suppose some would say the verse from Romans, quoted above, is an expression of a man's ideas and not from God.



Billy Graham hosts Louisville's Ali

Muhammad Ali—the greatest—looked up to another man Sunday, Sept. 16 and liked what he saw.

The retired, three-time world heavyweight boxing champion flew to Asheville, N. C. and spent several hours with Billy Graham in the evangelist's home atop a mountain in Montreat.

Sitting on the porch of Graham's home, Ali looked at Graham with admiring eyes and said, "He comes before me, I'm just a boxer—famous and all that—but he leads people to God. I look up to him."

"I'm Muslim and he's Christian, but there is so much truth in the messages he gives, Americanism, repentance, things about government and country—and truth. I always said, if I was a Christian, I'd want to be a Christian like him!" the ex-champ exclaimed.

"I think all religions are basically good and I had a lot of questions I've been wanting to ask about Christianity. I asked them today. He gave me answers."

Ali arrived at the Asheville airport about 1:30 p.m. Graham met him and drove him to Montreat. The two talked until nearly 7 p.m. when Ali departed for a flight to Louisville.

"When we arrived at the airport, Mr. Graham himself was waiting for me. I expected to be chauffeured in a Rolls Royce or at least a Mercedes, but we got in his Oldsmobile and he drove it himself. I couldn't believe he came to the airport driving his own car."

"I thought he'd live on a thousand-acre farm and we drove up to this house made of logs. No mansion with crystal chandeliers and gold carpets, but the kind of a house a man of God would live in."

Graham said, "I believe God has a great future and purpose for Ali. I will pray that God will show him the path to serve humanity and the kingdom of God."

Tennessee unloads Plaza

Tennessee Baptists will transfer the lease of Belmont Plaza, a high-rise retirement center, to a group of Baptist laymen as a result of action taken by the executive board of the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

The board's action in effect rejected a recommendation from an appointed study committee to sell the facility to Lawler-Wood Inc., Knoxville, Tenn. At a special called session of the Tennessee Baptist Convention Apr. 5, messengers voted to sell or transfer the center to relieve the convention of any liability.

The group of laymen is forming Belmont Plaza Inc. and will take over financing and operation of the 123-unit facility which was constructed by the Tennessee Baptist Service Corporation but not opened because of lack of operating funds.



Dan C. Stringer, executive secretary of the Northwest Baptist Convention has been elected executive secretary of the Florida Baptist State Convention effective Nov. 1. Stringer, 51, succeeds Harold C. Bennett who resigned to become executive secretary-treasurer of the Executive Committee of the SBC.

Baptists respond quickly to hurricane Frederic

Within hours after hurricane Frederic blew goodbye to the Mobile, Ala. area, hundreds of Baptist laymen from the state and surrounding states began pouring in to minister to the people of a paralyzed city.

Disaster relief vans from the Louisiana and Tennessee Baptist conventions set up feeding operations in the beleaguered city. Another van from Florida Baptists set up across the bay in Baldwin County, Ala. after pausing in the hurricane-lashed Pensacola, Fla. area where relief efforts were not as badly needed.

Alabama Baptists have issued an appeal for churches to give \$1 million in an offering for disaster relief and have earmarked \$35,000 currently in reserve for disaster relief for immediate use.

In Mississippi the disaster relief van of the Mississippi Baptist Convention set up in hard-hit Pascagoula and dispensed more than 8000 meals in a three-day period. Feeding operations have ceased in Pascagoula, but will continue indefinitely in Mobile, maybe as long as a month, according to John Winters, director of Baptist Men and boys for the Louisiana convention.

The Louisiana van, located in a demolished shopping center, served an average of 3000 meals a day for the first three days.

Oklahoma editor quits under fire


Joe Ingram, executive director of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, has confirmed that Jack Gritz was terminated by the convention's board of directors as editor of Oklahoma's Baptist Messenger Sept. 11.

Earlier, Baptist Press reported the board approved a motion that Gritz, who will be 63 in December, retire early.

Ingram said the board action suggested that Gritz, who will be paid full salary through March 1980, could take disability or early retirement and that the board would work out a non-Cooperative Program supplement which would, in effect, pay his full salary and benefits through his normal retirement age of 65 in December 1981.

The board's decision was not based on health but on the work of Gritz, who has served as editor of the Baptist Messenger for 30 years.

Gritz has said he does not wish to take disability retirement because his health is good and that he does not wish to take early retirement either. He said the termination took him by surprise and hurt him, but added, "I have some good years left and hope to make them count for the Lord."
