Challenge Accepted

Pair of Ky. Baptist congregations doing 'More for Christ' in their communities

Louisville—The "More for Christ" spiritual renewal emphasis is helping two Kentucky Baptist churches step up already-active outreaches to their respective communities.

"We are using More for Christ as our push, especially as we go into the rest of the year," said Chip Pendleton, pastor of Westport Road Baptist Church in Louisville—which has forged partnerships with several schools in recent years.

"We have a retreat soon and will be talking about how we can do more in the community and how we can put more evangelism into it," Pendleton said.

In Bowling Green, Eastwood Baptist Church is six months into operating a second site just east of the city. Pastor Tom James speaks there each Sunday before preaching at the main campus.

Ninety members of Eastwood helped start the congregation, which meets at Plano Elementary School. After drawing 225 to its Easter launch, about 165 people are attending weekly services.

"More for Christ has challenged us to

step up in all areas of life, not just in giving but in going," James said. "Missions is not just about money. We look at Plano as our Jerusalem."

This year Kentucky Baptists began More for Christ, a three-year emphasis to challenge themselves as individuals and churches to an increased commitment to Christ and the Great Commission.

Several years ago, Westport Road Baptist initiated its community outreach at Westport Road Middle School by hosting a teachers' luncheon.

Church/state separation somewhat limits what the congregation can do on school grounds, but Pendleton said members have embraced what they can do.

Members have renovated a resource

center and the teacher's lounge, done landscaping, and provided chaperones for a student field trip.

In addition, last Christmas the church sponsored a gift drive for eight students who otherwise wouldn't have received presents. It also is in the midst of planning a campaign to help raise money for

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SBC chaplain demonstrates Christ's peace in war zone

Kandahar, Afghanistan—U.S. Air Force Chaplain (Capt.) Kevin Humphrey's last quarterly report to the North American Mission Board's chaplaincy group reads like the script of a Hollywood blockbuster.

But the combat incidents he reports on are real—true wartime stories of battlefield death, horrific injury, bloodshed, bravery and close calls.

"It has been a very challenging time here in Kandahar," said the 38-year-old NAMB-endorsed chaplain, who serves in the 451st Air Expeditionary Wing. "The dangers are very real and it weighs on

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the people's minds here.

Humphrey said combat deaths in the region come so often that American flags never go more than four days without dropping to half-staff in honor of the fallen.

According to Humphrey—only one of about 190 military chaplains in Afghanistan—the Taliban forces in the area constantly are adapting their methods to inflict the most damage and death to U.S. and coalition forces.

"Several dangerous plots have been

discovered, many of which can't be discussed due to the sensitive security considerations," Humphrey said. "Needless to say, had they not been discovered, the loss of life would have been real and great."

One of Humphrey's most recent "scares" came at the nearby base hospital, where he was volunteering as chaplain so the Navy chaplain who usually is on duty there could take a well-deserved day off. While Humphrey couldn't reveal details because of security concerns, the incident came close to claiming his life and the lives of hospital personnel.


"It's brutal at the hospital and the

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Chitwood to commission Kentucky Baptists at annual meeting

Louisville—Longtime pastor Paul Chitwood will be commissioned as executive director of the Kentucky Baptist Convention at the annual meeting Nov. 15 in Florence, where he also plans to commission attendees.

Set to follow Frank Page of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee to the podium in the evening session, Chitwood said he hopes to impart the passion he developed for the gospel after accepting Christ as a boy.


"I plan to respond to (Page's remarks) with a commissioning of Kentucky Baptists as we set goals to accomplish kingdom work together," said the successor to Bill Mackey. "I will also pick up certain elements of the 'More for Christ' theme."

The emphasis adopted at last year's convention is challenging churches to increase giving to the Cooperative Program and do more to spread the gospel in their communities and beyond.

It has challenged the new director personally, causing him to reflect on Paul's words from Galatians 2:20, about being crucified with Christ so that the Savior lives through him.

The words of that verse keep coming to mind, reminding Chitwood that life isn't a matter of giving more for Christ but all for Him.

"I feel blessed to come into this role as director of Kentucky Baptists at a time when Kentucky Baptists are saying, 'We



want to do more for Christ," Chitwood said.

"It's more than a slogan. It's what people are doing. A lot of churches are giving sacrificially. I feel there's a wave rising under me. I don't have to stir it up."

His inaugural address will be his third appearance of the day. The first will be presenting the KBC Mission Board staff report. That evening he will address a young leaders' meeting during the dinner break.

Ironically, Chitwood was among the pastors that helped form the latter group several years ago. After their meal, he will extend an invitation to think of the day when they can attend an old leaders' dinner.

"The statistics on longevity in pastoral

ministry are miserable," Chitwood said. "I'm going to address that with these guys and talk to them about staying the course and what that looks like."

Although recognizing that his commissioning is a historic event whose weight probably won't hit him until that night, the new exec said he thinks the annual meeting will feature many highlights.

In addition to the celebration of More for Christ, Chitwood said he is looking forward to hearing Page, who became president of the SBC Executive Committee on Oct. 1, 2010.

He also anticipates a positive series of reports from state convention agencies, saying 2010-11 has been a banner year for Baptist Campus Ministries, Crossings camps and other initiatives.

"There's a lot going on," Chitwood said. "I've heard about a lot of it, but I'm looking forward to seeing the reaction of our attendees as they hear about it."

After taking office July 1, in recent weeks the director has been traveling 1,000 miles a week, a schedule reflecting

various appearances at associational annual meetings.

Not only have various groups welcomed him warmly and prayed for him, Chitwood said he is encouraged after observing many churches that are making efforts to impact their communities.

Chitwood has taken a personal hand in reaching out, participating in the adult Kentucky Changers project that helped renovate four west Louisville homes in September.

Both that project and his associational visits have energized him, he noted.

"What I'm seeing is that those associations that have a missions strategy in place—some form of Acts 1:8 partnership and approach—are thriving," Chitwood said. "There's excitement. There's a good work going on. That seems to be what is engaging pastors and associations."

But not everything is rosy. Chitwood said he sees some associations struggling with attendance and participation, something he attributed to a lack of missions focus.

Like other Kentucky Baptist leaders, he is concerned about declining giving to the Cooperative Program, something he plans to address in his new position.

"I want to resell the idea that we can do more together than we can do on our own, and help our churches understand the value of their Cooperative Program gifts," Chitwood said. "I feel that's my job and responsibility." (KBC)

student uniforms.

"Twice they put on their sign, 'Thank you Westport Road Baptist Church volunteers,'" Pendleton said. "One year they gave us a whole page in the yearbook and thanked us for our help."

Assistant Principal Angela Newcomb said the assistance has been a huge benefit to a struggling school. Westport Road Baptist's support—alongside new faculty and leadership at the school—have improved morale, she explained.

"It helps us because once people are in the building and see the classrooms and teachers, it helps the school's image in the community," said Newcomb, a 2000 graduate of Campbellsville University.

"Seventy percent of our kids are at-risk" students, she said. "Having church people come in and do these projects

helps the environment" of the school.

With added impetus from More for Christ, Westport Road Baptist expanded its outreach in 2011. That includes plans to buy Christmas gift cards for more than 300 students at two schools.

Among its other endeavors are sponsoring community Easter egg hunts and teachers' luncheons at a nearby elementary school, monthly visits to a retirement home, and working with Habitat for Humanity. The church has sponsored two block parties at a nearby apartment complex and has welcomed new families to the church as a result.

In addition to maintaining its Cooperative Program gifts of 10 percent, Westport Road Baptist is increasing its missions giving.

"We are putting more money into community partnerships, evangelism and missions," Pendleton said. "More for Christ is where we get people thinking about church as more than the place you

go to on Sunday morning. It's going to make a difference in their life and their neighbors' lives."

Meanwhile, at Eastwood Baptist, helping launch a second site in Plano has helped fan the flames of missions.

According to James, more than 100 people will take international missions trips this year, approximately 16 percent of Sunday school attendance. The most recent trip saw 19 people travel to Asia to lead English as a Second Language classes, which led to several college students accepting Christ.

Eastwood also has staffers on the field, including a former youth pastor serving in northern Africa and a former minister of education working in Brazil.

This increased involvement is reflected in its missions offerings as well. Under its former pastor, the church took an all-encompassing annual offer-

ing that generated \$16,000 in December of 2003. Last December its Lottie Moon offering for international missions alone generated \$101,000.

"I challenged the people that in 10 years we have missions partnerships on six continents," James said. "We're now on four continents and are about to add Europe."

This activity reflects the missions thrust inherent in the Cooperative Program, which More For Christ seeks to boost as well. Eastwood gives 12.5 percent of its undesignated offerings to support missions through CP. Last year the congregation ranked fifth in per-capita and overall CP giving among KBC churches.

"The Cooperative Program ... is the best way to support missions and the Great Commission of anything I know," James said. (KBC)

Noss is Pastors' Conference nominee

Pikeville—Wesley Noss, pastor of New Hope Baptist Church in Versailles, will be nominated as president-elect of the Kentucky Baptist Pastors' Conference when it is held Nov. 14 at Florence Baptist Church at Mount Zion.

Noss will be nominated by Paul Badgett, pastor at First Baptist Church of Pikeville. Noss is the second announced nominee for the post. Steve Hill, pastor of New Horizon Baptist Fellowship in Glendale, was named as a candidate last month.

Noss has led New Hope Baptist since 2002 and served as secretary of

last year's Pastors' Conference.

"He is a pastor with the right perspective toward his God (serves with humility) and the right perspective toward his church (withholds no good thing from the people he pastors)," Badgett said of Noss in an email.

If elected, Noss will serve one year as president-elect, then slide into the president's role, presiding over the 2013 Pastors' Conference. Corbin pastor Chad Fugitt is the year's conference president. Jeff Noffsinger, pastor of Dripping Spring Baptist Church in Olmstead, will preside over next year's meeting. (WR)

Presidential nominees discuss 'More for Christ,' KBC goals

Derek Coleman: Ties among KBC churches require strengthening

Derek Coleman has been pastor of Garden-side Baptist Church in Lexington since January. He answered the call to full-time ministry in 1993 following a career in the United States Navy as a nuclear engineer.

Q: If you are elected KBC president, what would be your hopes and goals for the coming year?

My hope would be to strengthen the fellowship among KBC churches for the purpose of supporting "More for Christ."

Goal No. 1: Identify factors that will strengthen the fellowship of KBC churches.

Goal No. 2: Solicit input from KBC pastors and leaders for suggestions that will strengthen fellowship.

Goal No. 3: Establish a core group of pastors in each region to help facilitate that strengthening of fellowship.

Q: The Kentucky Great Commission Task Force report was approved by messengers at last year's KBC annual meeting and the "More for Christ" emphasis now is underway. What is your perspective of the emphasis?

The emphasis, as I understand it, has a five-fold focus: personal spiritual renewal; increased serving in our home churches; increased serving in our communities; increased financial giving to CP; and increased efforts toward accomplishing the Great Commission. These are foundational principles that are key to the life of every believer.

Q: Briefly mention the ways in which you, as KBC president, would promote "More for Christ" over the coming year. On what areas would you focus?

First, I would focus on personal renewal. The other aspects of "More for Christ" hinge upon the effectiveness of this one. I would promote personal renewal through two means: I would organize and hold regional 5k run/walk events to emphasize "running the race that is set before us," to get our focus on the task at hand. I also would hold regional "all-night" preaching and BBQ events to focus on the importance of strengthening our lives by feasting on the word of God.

Second, I would focus on strengthening our Great Commission focus and serving in our home churches and communities by doing a car relay across Kentucky in 50-mile increments with an early-edition KJV Bible to represent taking the word of God to our world. At each stop, the local association would host an evangelistic event to share the gospel in a relevant way.

Third, I would focus on increasing CP giving by encouraging individuals and churches to give the "Widow's Mite for the Cause of Christ."

Q: The GCTF task force's first recommendation was for all Kentucky Baptists to focus on seeking "repentance, renewal and redirection for the future." What will it take for that to happen?

I believe it will take a humbling of our hearts toward the call of Christ in reaching the world with the gospel; a redirection of our daily focus to see more than just the lives we live today, but also to see the lives all are headed to beyond this one; and to assess where we are today, as individ-

iduals and corporately, and determine what we need to do to establish and maintain that focus in our daily actions.

Q: Another highlight of the GCTF report was the need to increase Cooperative Program giving among Kentucky Baptist churches. Have you encouraged your church and its members to increase CP giving? How would you encourage others to follow suit?

Yes, I have encouraged each and every church I have led, and most, if not all, did increase their percentage giving, as well as increase their giving to special denominational offerings.

I would encourage and provide opportunities for our pastors to get informed and involved with the entities supported by CP. I would promote this by setting up Q-and-A sessions where pastors and church leaders could get their questions answered by those whom they support.

Q: One of the primary responsibilities as president is to appoint three individuals to the KBC Committee on Committees. What criteria would you use to make your appointments?

Christian character and overall faithfulness to God in their personal lives; active involvement in their local churches; support of the KBC; commitment to CP giving; and regional representation.

Q: How do you identify yourself within the current political/theological spectrum of Baptist life?

I am a conservative who believes in the inerrant, divinely inspired word of God and desires to see the world won for Christ. I support the local church and believe it is the foundation for our denomination. I believe CP is the best way of accomplishing the Great Commission.

Q: What do you consider to be Kentucky Baptists' greatest strengths? Why?

Kentucky Baptists are committed to the Great Commission. Despite whatever differences they may have, they are committed to sharing the gospel at home and abroad.

Kentucky Baptists are faithful in their Christian service. They are known for ministering amid tragedies and have rung the bell of Christian benevolence to the world.

Kentucky Baptists are resilient. I believe that if their issues are addressed in a truthful manner, they will strengthen fellowship with one another and labor together for the cause of Christ.

Q: What do you consider to be Kentucky Baptists' greatest challenges? Why?

Increasing confidence in the organizational representation and structure of our state and national conventions. If we are to realize the maximum results of "More for Christ," then we must seek ways to include all churches in our convention with equal representation. We must put aside the minor differences that hinder our efforts to reach the world for Christ.

Increase CP giving by reclaiming financial resources that have been diverted to other causes. The economy cannot bear the full blame for decreasing CP gifts. KBC churches have been reallocating their missions giving to areas other than CP, thus creating a shortfall in resources. We must help our KBC churches realize all that CP dollars accomplish in spreading the gospel so they will increase their giving to CP.

Renew the fellowship bonds among our diverse KBC churches. We have more that unites us than divides us.

Adam Greenway: 'Holy dissatisfaction' needed to have genuine revival

Adam Greenway has been an assistant professor of evangelism and applied apologetics at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary's Billy Graham School of Missions and Evangelism since 2007 and its senior associate dean since 2010. He served as Kentucky Baptist Convention first vice president in 2009-10.

Q: If you are elected KBC president, what would be your hopes and goals for the coming year?

If fortunate enough to be elected KBC president, my primary goal for this next year would be to exhort Kentucky Baptists toward greater obedience to Christ and His mission, namely the penetrating of lostness, both within our commonwealth and beyond (Acts 1:8). My primary hope is that by the time of the 2012 KBC annual meeting in Lexington we will have seen an uptick in baptisms, Cooperative Program giving and love.

Q: The Kentucky Great Commission Task Force report was approved by messengers at last year's KBC annual meeting and the "More for Christ" emphasis now is underway. What is your perspective of the emphasis?

I fully embrace the challenge to do "More for Christ" that has been so faithfully led by our current president, Floyd Paris, and echoed by our new executive director, Paul Chitwood. While the primary thrust does center around the necessity of increasing cooperative missions giving, we must not overlook the call to do more in other vital areas of the Christian life, including praying more, witnessing more, loving more and serving more.

Q: Briefly mention the ways in which you, as KBC president, would promote "More for Christ" over the coming year. On what areas would you focus?

I believe a primary role of the KBC president is that of Cooperative Program champion. To borrow from the late Forrest Pollock, you cannot spell "KBC president" without a "C" and a "P," and Kentucky Baptists should expect those persons desiring to serve in elected leadership to be individuals who have demonstrated in word and deed an unwavering commitment to sacrificial financial giving through the Cooperative Program. If elected president, I would take advantage of every opportunity to inspire greater confidence in CP missions giving.

Moreover, we must recapture a passion and priority for evangelism across our commonwealth. The statistics are clear—population growth continues to outstrip church growth, and baptismal numbers are plateaued at best and declining at worst. This situation demands the serious attention of every Kentucky Baptist, and the KBC president should lead by example and exhortation in doing the work of evangelism (Romans 10:8-15; 2 Timothy 4:5).

Q: The GCTF task force's first recommendation was for all Kentucky Baptists to focus on seeking "repentance, renewal and redirection for the future." What will it take for that to happen?

For genuine "repentance, renewal, and redirection" to occur in and amongst Kentucky Baptists, there has to be a "holy

dissatisfaction" over our present spiritual condition and the willingness to humble ourselves to seek God for a fresh anointing (2 Chronicles 7:14). I believe we could see genuine revival in our time if all of us would set aside our agendas and preferences, and in brokenness and humility cry out to God, asking Him to do a transformative work in our lives and in our churches.

Q: Another highlight of the GCTF report was the need to increase Cooperative Program giving among Kentucky Baptist churches. Have you encouraged your church and its members to increase its CP giving? How would you encourage others to follow suit?

In my current ministry roles as professor and interim pastor, I consistently challenge the students and churches under my influence to increase their CP giving. More holistically, I try to cast a comprehensive vision of stewardship in Baptist life that I summarize as "10, 10, 50/50": 10 percent of the believer's income to the local church, from which 10 percent of the church's receipts are given through the Cooperative Program, divided 50/50 between causes inside and outside of Kentucky. While KBC messengers overwhelmingly affirmed moving to a 50/50 CP split over the next several years, the critical element in helping to make that happen without harming state missions and ministry lies in the "10, 10" part of the equation.

Q: One of the primary responsibilities as president is to appoint three individuals to the KBC Committee on Committees. What criteria would you use to make your appointments?

I would be prayerfully dependent upon the leading of the Holy Spirit of God to guide me in making such appointments.

Q: How do you identify yourself within the current political/theological spectrum of Baptist life?

I am a Baptist Christian indebted to the conservative resurgence and prayerfully hopeful for a Great Commission resurgence.

Q: What do you consider to be Kentucky Baptists' greatest strengths? Why?

The greatest strengths of Kentucky Baptists are the people themselves who bear the name. Being a "Kentucky Baptist" means having a devotion to God and His word, a love for fellow believers and those who do not yet know the Lord, and the desire to accomplish more together than any of us can do alone. That spirit is truly felt among Kentucky Baptists from Pikeville to Paducah and from Covington to the Cumberland and beyond. With God's empowerment, there's no obstacle too great or challenge too difficult for us.

Q: What do you consider to be Kentucky Baptists' greatest challenges? Why?

I believe the greatest challenge before Kentucky Baptists is to not allow the Enemy to divert us from the gospel, distract us from the mission, and divide us against each other. It is too easy in our humanness to find reasons to separate rather than cooperate. In a time where different "-isms" are appearing to cause dissension within our ranks, I pray that we will all remember that our focus and fixation should first and foremost be on the "-ism" of Jesus, namely evangelism.

Florence, state, world awaiting 'More for Christ'

"More for Christ" is sure to be the mantra of Kentucky Baptists when they gather next week in the new sanctuary of Florence Baptist Church at Mt. Zion in Florence. In the first year of a three-year spiritual renewal emphasis, messengers to the KBC annual meeting will be encouraged to take up the words of John the Baptist—"He must increase ... I must decrease"—both in their congregational and personal lives.

"It's really not about me; it's about Him, and everything in our lives should be more about Him and less about me," said KBC President Floyd Paris, explaining the theme of the Nov. 15 meeting. "Each day of our lives we should strive to be more like Him and less like our old selves," added the Ashland pastor. "It only stands to reason that everything we pursue should be more about Him."

Joining Paris on the platform to deliver keynote addresses will be Tom James, pastor of Eastwood Baptist Church in Bowling Green, and Frank Page, president of the SBC's Executive Committee. Paul Chitwood, who is to be commissioned as our new executive director that evening, will deliver a challenge to Kentucky Baptists, encouraging them to do "More for Christ" both in increasing Cooperative Program giving and in spreading the gospel.

Among other highlights, messengers will consider a \$23.5 million Cooperative Program budget goal for 2012-13 that continues the 52.46/43.54 percent split

between Kentucky missions work and SBC ministries, after subtracting 4 percent for CP promotion. Under the new budget formula, if KBC churches meet their 2011-2012 budget goal, it could mean as many as 22 new international missionaries being appointed.

Messengers also will choose between two announced candidates for convention president—Adam Greenway, a Southern Seminary professor and dean, and Derek Coleman, a Lexington pastor. Alan Dodson, also of Lexington, and T.J. Francis, of Walton, are expected to be nominated for the vice presidential posts.

After Thought

If approved by members of the KBC Mission Board, Kentucky Baptists also could launch a partnership with Baptists in metro St. Louis, as part of the North American Mission Board's new "Send North America" initiative. The strategy links churches and associations in promoting church planting efforts in 27 strategic cities, and the goal of the KBC's three- to five-year partnership will be to help start 125 churches in the St. Louis area by 2020.

So, let me encourage you to make plans to attend the annual meeting in Florence. Tax breaks for education expense

College education is expensive, but students and parents should be aware of several possible tax breaks that help offset some of the expense. Typically, these benefits apply to a student, their spouse or a qualified dependent. The full amount of the credits and deductions is available only if your modified adjusted gross income is below certain levels.

American Opportunity Credit. This credit is available for 2011 and 2012. The credit can be up to \$2,500 per eligible student and is available for the first four years of post secondary education. Forty

percent of this credit is refundable, which means that you may be able to receive up to \$1,000, even if you owe no taxes. Qualified expenses include



tuition and fees, course-related books, supplies and equipment.

Lifetime Learning Credit. In 2011, you may be able to claim a Lifetime Learning Credit of up to \$2,000 for qualified education expenses paid for a student enrolled in eligible institutions.

Tuition and fees deduction. This deduction can reduce the amount of your income subject to tax by up to \$4,000 for 2011, even if you do not itemize your deductions.

Student loan interest deduction.

Generally, personal interest you pay, other than certain mortgage interest, is not deductible. If you qualify, you may be able to deduct interest paid on a student loan used for higher education during the year. It can reduce the amount of income subject to tax by up to \$2,500, even if you don't itemize deductions.

For each student, you can choose to claim only one of the credits or deductions in a single tax year. However, if you pay college expenses for two or more students in the same year, you can choose to take credits on a per-student, per-year basis. Tax advisors (and tax preparation software) can help determine which credit or deduction is most advantageous to use.

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Southern Baptists help survivors in aftermath of Turkey quake

Ercis, Turkey—Survivors of Turkey's Oct. 23 earthquake need food, temporary shelter from the cold, clean water and medical care—and teams trained by Baptist Global Response are helping to respond to the crisis, a spokesman for the international relief and development organization said last week.

"As with most significant earthquakes that leave much destruction in their wake, the negative impact is beginning to unfold precipitously," said Patrick Melancon, BGR's managing director of disaster response and training. "We are at a phase where other factors are moving the incident from simple needs for food, shelter, water and medical care to a somewhat complicated humanitarian crisis."

"The food logistics chain is normally disrupted in an event like this. Transportation of food becomes difficult due to destruction, increased traffic and panic buying from local suppliers," he added. "In essence, the available food supplies are quickly absorbed, and the distribution to those who are severely in need is hampered."

The fact that winter weather is about to descend on the area raises additional concerns, Melancon noted.

"With winter on the heels of this time period, shelter from the natural elements is also a critical issue that needs to be addressed," Melancon said.

"The government has decided to accept aid from outside of the country and a large portion of that aid will be in the form of tents and other temporary shelter supplies. Over time, things will get better as the situation stabilizes, logistical chains are reestablished and longer-term needs come to the surface."

The death toll from the 7.2-magnitude earthquake has risen to more than 570, with an estimated 2,500 injured, according to news reports. About 5,700 buildings were ruined and thousands of people have been left homeless. The government reported 187 people were rescued from rubble.

The hardest-hit area was Ercis, an eastern city of 75,000 near the Iranian border, which lies on one of Turkey's most earthquake-prone zones, the AP reported. The provincial capital, Van, about 55 miles to the south, also sustained substantial damage.

Melancon called for prayer for both survivors and those trying to help.

"These teams are trained to respond to real needs as they become evident and are able to sort through many of the intricate issues surrounding such an incident," he said. "Our teams are working long hours, dealing with the tragedy personally, and ... attempting to make a real difference in the lives of the survivors." (BP)

White House flubs the Bible ... and so does everyone else

Washington—The White House proved itself Scripturally challenged last week when Press Secretary Jay Carney said: "I believe the phrase from the Bible is, 'The Lord helps those who help themselves.'"

Actually, no.

The phrase that's often attributed to the good book most likely comes from Benjamin Franklin and possibly the ancient Greeks, and the White House felt obligated to add a note to the transcript of Carney's briefing: "This common phrase does not appear in the Bible."

Embarrassing perhaps, but not uncommon.

It may make Carney feel better to learn that he has company—a lot of it—with other Americans. Numerous surveys have shown that most Americans believe the phrase is straight from the Bible, if not straight out of the mouth of God.

Christian pollster George Barna has asked Americans repeatedly about the saying, and consistently found that a majority attributes it to the Bible. In 2000, 75 percent of Americans surveyed by Barna attributed the phrase to the Bible.

Comedian Jay Leno once challenged passersby to name one of the Ten Commandments for "The Tonight Show." The most popular answer? "God helps those

who help themselves."

So, he who is without sin among you, let him cast the first stone. (That one's actually in the Bible. John 8:7)

Carney was trying to back up his boss who had chided Congress for passing a resolution to reaffirm "In God We Trust" as the nation's motto rather than passing his jobs bill.

"I trust in God, but God wants to see us help ourselves by putting people back to work," President Obama said.

Carney "certainly deserves a bit of ribbing, because people attribute to the Bible all kinds of stuff," said Dale Martin, professor of religious studies at Yale University. "They should be more careful."


"But everybody does it," he added, even Bible professors.

So where does the idea that "the Lord helps those who help themselves" really come from?

The earliest records of a similar phrase seem to go back to the ancient Greeks. Aeschylus wrote in his play *The Persians*: "Whenever a man makes haste, God too hastens with him."

Over time, other traditions have enshrined the idea. In Islam, for example, the prophet Mohammad is believed to have said: "Trust in God but tie your camel."

The most common attribution comes from Franklin's "Poor Richard's Almanac" in 1757. (RNS)



Congressmen urge prayer for Obama

Washington—At the National Prayer Breakfast in February, President Obama said his friend, Sen. Tom Coburn, R-Okla., prays for him.

"It's comforting to know people are praying for you who don't always agree with you," Obama said. "Even though we are on opposite sides of a whole bunch of issues, part of what has bound us together is a shared faith, a recognition that we pray to and serve the same God."

The conversations between Capitol Hill and the White House haven't been so lovey-dovey but in early November, a freshman Republican and two Democrats dissipated a little of the acrimony.

The three congressmen—Reps. Dan Boren, D-Okla., Emanuel Cleaver, D-Mo., and James Lankford, R-Okla.—distributed to all 435 members of the House of Representatives a book titled "Obama Prayer: Prayer for the 44th President," by Charles Garriott, who ministers to those in the federal government through Mission to North America, an arm of the Presbyterian Church in America.

The congressmen included a letter with each book, where they wrote: "All of us who have served our nation as members of the House understand the place and significance of prayer. Over the years we have prayed for presidents Bill

Clinton and George Bush Sr. and Jr." They added that the book is "a means of encouraging specific and thoughtful prayer for President Barack Obama."

Lankford, a Southern Baptist, said, "We'll pray for those in authority ... when we line up in the same party. (But) that's not the biblical mandate." He added that

Christians should "pray for the president, no matter who he is."

The congressman then pulled out his iPad in the Speaker's lobby by the House floor during a vote to read from Proverbs 21:1.

Lankford said he has received good feedback from Republican members about the book.

"There are issues there, in Congress, with how we speak about each other," he said. "This is a place that sometimes feels like middle school. The more you criticize, the more you're encouraged."

Lankford was program director at the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma's high-profile Falls Creek summer camp from 1996 to 2009 but quit his position because he said he felt God was calling him to run for Congress.

Lankford said he sees prayer for leaders as a Christian calling, regardless of his disagreements with the president as one of the fierce freshman conservatives.

"We can strongly disagree," he said. "That does not remove our respect for each other." (WNS/BP)

Signs that Jesus is at work exist all throughout Oneida's campus

"God working here!" That's the sign that should be posted at the entrance to our campus, on the farm, in the dormitories, in the classrooms, and, as you might expect, in the chapel. Although the Holy Spirit works in many quiet and invisible ways to draw our students to Christ—and we know and believe that based on God's word—it is exciting to see the tangible proof of His work.

Twice in the past three days, the chapel worship leader has led in prayer with a tear-choked voice. When a student asked his teacher why the leader had been crying, the teacher replied, "Because he's worried about the souls of those of you who haven't accepted Christ. I think sometimes we teachers are more worried about you than you are about yourselves."

A few weeks ago, we had the divinely planned privilege of having Bonnie Cebulak, author of the book, "From a Pothead to a Preacher's Wife," in chapel. She shared her personal testimony of a childhood of sexual abuse and a young-adult life of drug abuse as a prelude to her ringing altar call for the students to accept Christ. Two days later when we asked for those who truly had made decisions for Christ during that service, 10 students remained.

Last week we had the unexpected opportunity to have the 12-member young-adult team from the national

Silver Ring Thing ministry for two chapel services. They came to encourage our students toward sexual purity and spoke about receiving Jesus as Savior.

Although they only made a passing reference to the silver ring that symbolizes a commitment to sexual abstinence until marriage, the next day a student stopped me in the corridor to ask me how she could get one to symbolize the commitment she had made to a sexually pure lifestyle. Some of our "staff kids" had done so earlier, as I learned when one of the boys joyfully showed me his own ring.

A staff member who works on the farm reported last week that a student came up to him and said, "I know I'm a sinner and that I'm headed for hell. Can you help me get saved?" The staff member led that student to the Lord.

Last weekend two of our male staff members followed the Lord's leading and initiated boys' devotions by showing the video "180" with a follow-up discussion. This will be a biweekly ministry with our male students.

Earlier this week, a student who had spoken with me in August about baptism asked, "When can I get baptized?" He'll talk to the pastor of Oneida Baptist Church tomorrow.

After one of our musical chapel services, a student stopped me and said, "I saw Jesus while we were singing." Students seeing and receiving Jesus is what the ministry here is all about, no matter where you are on the campus. God truly is working at OBI. Thanks for being a praying partner in that work.

Crosses on public land caught in judicial 'mess,' groups say

Washington—The U.S. Supreme Court's refusal to halt the removal of memorial crosses across Utah's highways could impact religious symbols in other western states and even nationwide, social conservative groups warn.

The high court announced last week it would not take up a case from the U.S. Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals in which a three-judge panel last year ordered the removal of more than a dozen 12-foot-tall crosses throughout Utah honoring state troopers killed in action. That panel said the crosses amounted to an unconstitutional government establishment of religion and that a reasonable observer would conclude "the state of Utah is endorsing Christianity."

The full Tenth Circuit subsequently refused to take up the case in a 5-4 vote, and the Supreme Court also refused, with only Justice Clarence Thomas saying the court should have acted.

Because the Tenth Circuit also covers Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Utah and Wyoming, the case's impact could be felt elsewhere.

"None of their crosses on public property will be tolerated either," said Tony Perkins of the Family Research Council, which submitted a brief supporting the crosses. "And if this decision is ever applied nationally, ... Arlington National Cemetery and other landmarks would have to be completely dismantled."

The fact that the Supreme Court did not take the case left conservative groups puzzled. Just last year, Justice Anthony Kennedy, in a separate church-state case that allowed a cross on California public land to remain, wrote in a majority opinion that the "goal of avoiding governmental endorsement does not require eradication of all religious symbols in the public realm."

"A cross by the side of a public highway marking, for instance, the place where a state trooper perished need not be taken as a statement of governmental support for sectarian beliefs," Kennedy wrote. "The Constitution does not oblige government to avoid any public acknowledgment of religion's role in society."

"It is baffling that the Supreme Court did not take this case, in light of the fact that just last year they said that roadside memorials to fallen troopers would not violate the establishment clause," said Byron Babione, senior counsel with the Alliance Defense Fund.

Ken Klukowski, director of the Center for Religious Liberty at the Family Research Council, said Thomas' dissent suggests that only crosses bearing government insignia are impacted by the court's denial. The crosses themselves are privately funded, although they do bear the Utah Highway Patrol's official symbol and most of them are on public land. Each cross has the trooper's name, rank and badge number, along with biographical information and a photo. (BP)

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FCC rescinds church broadcast exemptions

Washington—The Federal Communications Commission has reversed a policy that allowed church broadcasts to receive exemptions from a closed captioning requirement. But a representative of the National Religious Broadcasters group said the development is not necessarily bad news.

"We don't believe that the action of the FCC shows hostility against Christian broadcasters. We think it's a recognition by the Federal Communications Commission that the process that was being used internally to review these applications for waiver was simply not the right process," Craig Parshall, senior vice president and general counsel for NRB, told Baptist Press.

"So, it's not a matter of Christian broadcasters having either done the wrong thing or being punished by the FCC," he noted. "It's a matter of correcting a process that went awry, and they're trying to set the clock back now."

Since 1996, churches were granted exemptions from the requirement to provide closed captioning of their

programming under a decision known as the Anglers Order, named for the Anglers for Christ Ministries program that had argued for exemption.

The exemptions were handled by the FCC's Consumer and Governmental Affairs Bureau, but the full commission overturned the Anglers Order Oct. 20 following objections by representatives of the hearing impaired.

Under the closed-captioning policy, programmers obtained exemptions if they could prove that the cost of the captioning would cause undue economic hardship. The hearing-impaired groups said the policy essentially created a blanket exemption for nonprofit organizations.

The FCC has been mailing letters to programmers informing them of the policy reversal and giving them 90 days to comply with the closed-captioning requirement or reapply for exemption.

Parshall said the development holds both good and bad news for religious broadcasters.

"The bad news is there are about 400 programmers/stations that have applied for exemptions and were granted them

under a process that the FCC now has determined wasn't proper, not because of anything that the broadcasters did wrong but because the media bureau within the FCC that oversees the application for exemptions wasn't following the right procedures," Parshall said. "So, they're going back to square one. That's the bad news, I guess.

"The good news is that they have 90 days to file again for exemptions if they simply can't afford to do it," he added. "Some small broadcasters can't afford the price of closed captioning, and there's a provision for them to apply and show economic hardship."

Broadcasters will have to show that if they have to pay the expense of closed captioning, which can cost \$200 or \$300 per hour, their programming day would be disrupted, Parshall said. In other words, they may have to drop some programs or change programming as a result.

Parshall urged broadcasters to take action sooner rather than later and to ensure that they submit paperwork to the FCC well in advance of the 90-day deadline. (BP)

N.M. Baptists affirm Glorieta, resolve to see ministry remain

Farmington, N.M.—New Mexico Baptists overwhelmingly passed a resolution urging the Southern Baptist Convention and LifeWay Christian Resources to ensure that Glorieta Conference Center continues its ministry to Southern Baptists "well into the future or until Jesus returns."

The resolution, adopted at the state convention's Oct. 25-26 annual meeting, was in response to LifeWay's recent announcement that Glorieta's operations were being scaled back and that trustees were seeking "viable options" for disposition of the property, including sale.

The resolution noted that BCNM messengers in 1947 unanimously voted to purchase property that would become "the Western Assembly known as Glorieta." New Mexico Baptists held the first camp at Glorieta the following year and the property was deemed to what was then the SBC's Sunday School Board in 1950 "with the intent that a great Baptist training center would be established and maintained in the West."

The resolution also cited "Baptists' sacrificial investment of millions of dollars that has contributed to the growth of Glorieta" and that the conference center has operated for 63 years "for the glory of God." (Baptist New Mexican/ABP)

New Baptist Covenant II finalizes speaker lineup

Atlanta—Social activists Marian Wright Edelman and Tony Campolo will join former President Jimmy Carter and seven other speakers on the program of the New Baptist Covenant II, a Nov. 17-19 gathering of diverse Baptists in Atlanta that will be linked by satellite and Internet to dozens of viewing locations around the country.

The multiracial lineup of speakers includes Carter's wife, Rosalynn, a long-time champion for mental-health research, along with two justice-system advocates and four pastors—three African-American and one Asian.

The New Baptist Covenant, started by Carter in 2008, is a loose-knit, grass-roots effort to unite disparate Baptists groups in North America around a platform of progressive social and justice ministries.

Edelman is founder and president of the Washington-based Children's Defense Fund, the nation's preeminent advocacy group for disadvantaged children and families. A lawyer and civil-rights pioneer, Edelman received the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, in 2002.

Campolo, who lives in suburban Philadelphia, is a sociologist, popular speaker, prolific author and former university professor. An outspoken advocate for social justice, Campolo also is founder and president of the Evangelical Association for the Promotion of Education.

Edelman and Campolo will speak about issues confronting American children and youth.

New Baptist Covenant II will originate from Second-Ponce de Leon Baptist Church in Atlanta, but most participants

will gather at one of seven satellite-viewing locations in Los Angeles, Oklahoma City, Philadelphia, San Antonio, Seattle, St. Louis and Washington. Many more participants will watch in smaller church-based gatherings nationwide via video streaming over the Internet.

In addition, participants in all the locations will spread out after the concluding session Saturday, Nov. 19, to work for social causes in their local communities. (NBC/ABP)

ethnéCITY: World's unreached now live in U.S. urban centers

New York—Your average rural Kentucky Baptist pastor might not willingly sample the high-octane cuisine at Curry in a Hurry Restaurant in Manhattan's bustling Little India neighborhood.

Chris Turpin isn't your average rural Kentucky Baptist pastor.

Turpin, 34, survived the spicy lunch. He also learned about multiple cultures as he walked the neighborhood and introduced himself to strangers.

"I'm in New York City for the first time," said Turpin, pastor of Donaldson Baptist Church in Farmersville, a tiny community near Princeton. "It's overwhelmed me—all the sounds, all the sights, all the people."

But he's no country boy visiting the big city just to gawk. Turpin's congregation of 120 already ministers to immigrants and Mexican migrant workers in Caldwell County and sends mission teams to Mexico. He has a longer-range vision to extend that ministry to the rapidly expanding ethnic populations of urban areas in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Turpin joined more than 150 other Southern Baptist leaders and missionaries at the first-ever "ethnéCITY: Reaching the Unreached in the Urban Center" event, Oct. 20-22 at Park Slope Community Church in Brooklyn. Participants heard from some of Southern Baptists' top mission strategists focusing on cities in North America and the rest of the world, traded ideas and joining in team

"excursions" into multiethnic neighborhoods within a subway ride of the church in metro New York.

"This is one of the first steps I've taken as pastor to see what is out there and what we could do to be involved in helping to reach some of the people in the cities," Turpin said.

"God is bringing the nations to us, so we need to begin to think about what we can do to reach the nations within our own borders. We send people overseas to reach people groups, and we ought to do that. But we've also got to reach the people God has brought right to us."

If statistics are any indication, God has brought many of the world's peoples to North America's cities.

New York is the ultimate case in point. The metropolitan area is home to about 22 million people; they speak as many as 800 languages. Two-thirds of them are first-generation immigrants or their children. At least 700,000 Russian speakers live in New York; 2 million Jews; 800,000 Muslims; and 400,000 Hindus. Some 60 West African mosques are said to meet in the city. The sheer number, variety and ever-changing mixture of cultures found in the city boggle the mind.

But the ethnic diversification of North America's cities now extends far beyond New York and the other large coastal gateways that traditionally have welcomed immigrants and refugees.

"Many of these immigrants are not going to L.A. and Chicago and New York, but to smaller and mid-sized cities" in the South and Midwest, said Terry Sharp, IMB's lead strategist for state and association relations and urban strategies. "Churches keep saying to us, 'We're discovering that these same people groups that we are trying to reach overseas have come to our neighborhood.'"

According to current mission research, nearly 600 unengaged, unreached people groups can be found in North America—many of them in urban areas. They haven't heard the gospel in ways they can understand it and respond to it, and no evangelical group has a viable plan yet to reach them.

With guidance from urban specialists based in North America and across the world, ethnéCITY participants focused on topics including: urban mapping to understand the demographics involved in reaching people groups; effective ways to spark urban church-planting movements; tips for getting started; casting an urban vision in churches; networking with others committed to urban ministry; reaching international students; and how IMB missionaries and U.S. churches and ministry leaders can partner to reach peoples at home and around the world. ministry is tough. They've had many single, double or triple amputees come through in the last two months," he said. "The things you are exposed to there are things that no human being should have to see. But it is a powerful ministry to the staff and patients."

Dangerous territory

Humphrey said the dangers are many and come without warning in Afghanistan.

"During a recent rocket attack, a Department of Defense compound was hit," Humphrey recalled. "Their chaplain was unavailable, so I went and ministered to 250 shaken DOD army civilians.

"The building's generator just happened to go out about 30 minutes prior to the rocket attack, so only six people were in the building at the time it was hit. Had the generator not gone out, several people would have been killed. Thanks to God, only six had minor shrapnel injuries.

"I spoke with one man who couldn't understand why he was not in the building at the time and didn't die," Humphrey said. "I shared that God says in Hebrews we are appointed once to die and that our day of death has been fixed by God, and that God has a plan and purpose for our lives. While he is not yet a Christian, he is now seeking God for the first time in his life."

Humphrey said he conducts seven combat services each week for his units.

"I have preached three times

at contemporary services in the Army's chapel," said Humphrey, adding that the services are attended not only by American troops, but by soldiers from the coalition nations. "It makes me think that this is what heaven will be like with every tribe and nation."

Although Humphrey's job as a chaplain is difficult because of the hostile and chaotic environment in Afghanistan, his ministry also is very rich.


"The very real presence of Christ has been here in the midst of difficulty," Humphrey shared. "Psalm 91 has become very real for me. I have not feared for my life since I have been here—not because I think I'm brave but because Christ has been so present."

International fellowship

When Humphrey is not carrying out his chaplain duties, he said he loves to meet and fellowship with other international chaplains serving in the coalition. Recently he met with Canadian, British, Dutch, Australian and other American chaplains. They discussed the state of spirituality back in their home countries.

"A chill ran down my back," Humphrey recalled. Taking turns, each chaplain—with sadness in their hearts and voices—began describing the deteriorating spiritual state of affairs back home, regardless of their nationality.

"The Dutch chaplain spoke of being in a post-Christian society. He described Dutch people who didn't even know who Jesus is. Each chaplain gave a similarly

negative report from his own nation."

At Humphrey's suggestion, the international chaplains now meet and pray every Monday for God to move in each nation and to bless their ministries.

"I would ask that all Southern Baptists pray for us, that this might be the beginning of a Great Awakening movement," he said. "I feel that the fact we chaplains finally got together is no accident. I feel it's miraculous and one of the reasons God sent me here" to Afghanistan.

Humphrey and wife, Jennifer, who is back "home" at Kadena Air Force Base in Okinawa, Japan, are the parents of five children, ranging in ages from 3 to 11. He graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, with an M.Div. degree in 2003, and was a pastor for three years prior to

entering active duty as an Air Force chaplain. He is slated to serve in Afghanistan until January 2012, after which he will be reassigned to the Air Force base at Kadena in Okinawa.

The National Bible Association recently announced that Humphrey—out of 500 Air Force chaplains—is one of three recipients of the association's prestigious Witherspoon Award, given annually to military chaplains representing the Army, Air Force and Navy. The award is named for World War I and II chaplain, Maurice Witherspoon.





SBC Oct. CP gifts fall way off from '10

Nashville, Tenn.—Contributions to Southern Baptist national and international missions and ministries received in October were 17.27 percent below the same month last year, according to SBC Executive Committee President Frank Page.

As of Oct. 31, gifts received by the Executive Committee for distribution through the Cooperative Program Allocation Budget totaled more than \$14.58 million,

more than \$3 million behind the nearly \$17.625 million received in October 2010.

Meanwhile, designated giving of nearly \$3.9 million during October was 4.20 percent below gifts of more than \$4 million received last October. That total includes only those gifts received and distributed by the Executive Committee and does not reflect designated gifts contributed directly to SBC entities. (BP)
