ELD. DITZLER'S FIRST SPEECH. In a Discourse on Practiced by the M. E. Church South Authorized by the Word of God

GENTLEMEN MODERATORS: - With Dr. Graves we agree, that this subject has been treated superficially. Yes; by both parties to it.

It is agreed by all parties to the question, that infant membership, the greater matter, the genus, necessarily carries with it the less, the species, baptism, and therefore we are under no particular necessity to discuss the species, baptism, unless we prefer to do so.

Let it be understood we do not confound church and State, the fleshly, national, and spiritual Israel. We recognize the difference fully. But who can point out God's spiritual Israel to-day? Where is there a complete organization that corresponds to it? Who can show it? Let this be rememorbed, for in just this phase of God's ancient church will our opponents have to make his issue.

It is a little remarkable that John the Harbinger should come and preach for six months "to prepare the people for the Lord" at his coming, and, with an eye to that, should baptize, that Christ might have a proper occasion to make known or manifest himself to Israel; to be shown openly, known.
