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
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
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EDITORIAL

THE ANSWER TO CHRIST'S PRAYER FOR UNITY

CHRIST PRAYED for believers "That they may all be one" (John 17:21). Some hold that the organic union of denominations is to be the answer and, therefore, that the prayer is still unanswered. This notion can come only from ignoring the context of the prayer or from the superficial study of the prayer in the light of the context.

What organic unionists propose cannot be what Jesus had in mind. His plea was for a oneness of believers corresponding to the unity between the Father and Himself—"that they may be one, even as we are one" (v. 22). Two among other elements in the divine unity are (1) acceptance of the proposition that "thy word is truth" (v. 17) and (2) oneness of belief. But in the organic union proposed today the Word of God is not given its proper reverence and authority. Human wisdom and sentimentalism are largely placed ahead of it in determining religious beliefs and practices. Many of the great teachings of the Bible are either rejected outright or are watered down, perverted, misinterpreted and misapplied. There is offered a compromising mixture of diverse practices and conflicting beliefs in which doctrinal convictions and loyalty from a biblical viewpoint are seriously discounted. Jesus never prayed for a thing like that, and to make His prayer mean that is to read into it something which does not belong there.

The terms, "one in us," and "one, even as we are one," described an intimate and permeating oneness which could be accomplished only by the power of God in the souls of believers. Human effort through organic union could not produce an effect measuring up to this high standard. It was the inward spiritual unity of believers in the Lord and not their outward organizational adjustment to each other. It embraced all true believers within and without the denominations, and therefore was not any more contingent upon denominations amalgamated than upon denominations separated. The antecedent of "they" in the prayer was believers as spiritually connected with Christ

and not as organizationally connected with each other. Hence, the answer to the prayer cannot be equated with organic union.

The Lord prayed for the unity of believers then present with Him and also for the unity of foreseen future believers (vs. 6-11 and 20). So believers then present were to participate in the blessing for which Jesus prayed in addition to believers who should later come within the scope of the blessing. But to make the prayer mean the organic union of denominations logically excludes believers then present from this blessing. For at the time of the prayer there were not any differing denominations to be united since there was only one denomination in existence. If organic union as proposed today fulfills the prayer, then the answer was to be centuries and centuries after all these early believers had died. But an interpretation which logically excludes these early believers from the blessing of the answer to the prayer in which they were specifically included is absurd on the face of it.

At the tomb of Lazarus Jesus said that the Father "hearest me always" (John 11:42). The answer to His prayer on that occassion was soon forthcoming. Since the Father always hears the prayers of Jesus, was not the prayer for unity heard and was not the answer soon forthcoming? One believes that it cannot be shown that the answer was to be ages in coming except in the sense of the extension of the answer which began ages ago. The nature of the unity in mind and the fact that believers then present were to be embraced in the answer indicate that the lapses of ages was not required for the answer. If so, then organic union is ruled out from being the answer to the prayer.

As has been seen, Christ prayed in John 17 for the unity of true believers then present and for the unity of future foreseen believers. Regeneration makes believers one in nature. Jesus took people at the point of regeneration, which is the point of faith, and prayed for these regenerated people to be one—a unity additional to that accomplished by regeneration. It seems that He meant oneness of love, spirit, purpose, conviction and so on intensified. He meant the spiritual blending of believers in a way they had not been blended before.

As a result, believers then associated with Christ were soon fused into an intimate spiritual oneness which they had not known before. And also through empowerment by the Holy Spirit on Pentecost and then in the household of Cornelius, Jewish and Gentile believers were blended into a spiritual oneness which was not possible until the Holy Spirit came officially to earth. Since then all who have been born again have been brought within the scope of this unity.

Yes, "thou hearest me always." The Savior's prayer for unity has been and is being answered. The separation of denominations cannot prevent it and the organic union of denominations can neither originate nor perpetuate it. Paul wrote to the Galatians and through them to all believers: "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:28). The apostle did not say that "ye are all to be one in Christ Jesus," but "ye ARE all one in Christ Jesus." This would seem to be the same unity for which Jesus prayed. If so, here was the answer to the prayer centuries and centuries before the organic unionists came on the scene. Organic unionists are exceedingly late. They propose to answer a prayer which God has already answered.

To be sure, there is the practical expression of unity which is to be cultivated by Christians, not even this calls for organic union. But the deep basic unity for which Jesus prayed is already a fact. Unity in practical expression flows from this. And real unity in practical expression accepts the fact that "thy word is truth" and, step by step, leads to oneness of belief on that basis.

Jesus prayed "that they may all be one." In answer "ye are all one." Organic union has no part in it without Christ.

Church Membership Drives?

The Religious News Service reported that, "forty-two denominations have pledged support of a United Evangelistic Advance, beginning next fall, that is expected to mark the most comprehensive church-mem-

bership drive ever launched by American Protestants." The release goes on to say: "The crusade will open on World Communion Sunday, October 2, and will continue 15 months, according to Dr. Jesse M. Bader, executive secretary of the department of evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches, which is sponsoring the drive."

Evangelism is not a drive for church members. Evangelism is the telling of the old story of God's love expressed by the sending of His only begotten Son to die on the cross for our sins, of His atoning death on Calvary, of salvation through His blood, of His burial and bodily resurrection and ascension to the Father to make intercessions in our behalf, of His blessed coming again. Mixed Marriages And Divorces

Judson T. Landis, sociologist of Michigan State College, has made a three-year survey of marriages between Catholics and Protestants. This survey reveals that 14.1 per cent of mixed Catholic-Protestant

marriages end in divorce, or separation, as compared with five per cent of non-mixed marriages. That means that almost three times as many Catholic-Protestant marriages go on the rocks as non-mixed marriages.

A further study of the statistics on Catholic-Protestant marriages, reveals that Protestant women and Catholic men are three times as apt to end in divorce courts as with Catholic women and Protestant men.

The major cause of marital friction between Catholic and Protestants, according to the Landis survey, is the unscriptural and inhuman demand of the Catholic church that Protestants marrying Catholics shall take an oath that all children of such marital unions shall be educated as Catholics.

No person, Catholic or Protestant, has a moral, religious, or any other right to swear away the rights of unborn children; and what's more, no institution except a dictatorial, totalitarian, political power would dare to make such unjust demands upon individuals concerning matters so sacred to parents.

Such meddling and absurd demands made by the Roman Catholic church is tantamount to a concession that the message of Romanism is not capable of making sufficient appeal to mature intelligence to make converts; therefore, she must take advantage of helpless infants.

Whatever we have of religious liberty in the nation, of purity and happiness in the home, and of personal independence of conscience, we owe to the Protestant Reformation, to separation from the Roman Catholic Church."

MAGNIFY CHRIST IN THE HOME

Follow His Plan

God is and has always been an orderly and systematic person. Creation took place in an orderly fashion; first things came first. He created man in his own image and gave him dominion over the earth

and all that was therein. And, because it was not good for man to be alone, He created a companion, a helpmeet, from one of man's own ribs.

GOD'S INTENTION FOR HOME

God is omnipotent—all powerful. He intended woman to be the mother of the children and a homemaker. He did not intend for her to be the breadwinner. He is powerful enough to have made it otherwise, if He had so willed. He established the first family and the first institution, a home. Therefore, God must have intended that the home be a first thing.

All through the Old Testament we are given examples of what home life should be like. Girls were taught by their mothers to cook, sew, and do other household duties; preparing them to become wives, mothers, and helpmates for their husbands. Boys were taught by their fathers to till the fields and take care of the sheep and cattle and perform other heavy duties; thereby preparing them to become heads of the households. In the home, by word of mouth from the fathers and mothers, the children were taught the Scriptures, the hymns, the Ten Commandments, and the Golden Rule. This was not left to a teacher to do in thirty minutes, once a week, as is done today.

TEMPLES . . . UNDEFILED

God gave us our bodies as temples for our souls. He very emphatically tells us not to defile this temple. Sex is not a thing to be ashamed of, neither is it a thing to be flaunted before the eyes of the world. God gave it to us as a sacred trust. Read Matthew 5:28. But how can men fail to lust when so much of women's bodies are uncovered, inviting sin? Who then is to blame for so many sex crimes?

Even babies are exposed to insects and the glaring heat of the sun with scarcely any clothes on—to get a good suntan. These customs were no doubt started by some vile thinking man or woman. Science has proved that the rays of the sun will penetrate six inches of clothing. Let's go back to the cradle and begin there to teach our children modesty. Why did God give us the story of Abraham's drunkenness and his son's walking backwards to cover him up? Not for historical purposes alone, but to teach us modesty.

FORSAKING GOD'S STANDARD

Each generation gets farther and farther away from the standard set by God and followed by Christ. In Luke 2:51: "And he went down with them, and came to Nazareth, and was subject to them." For how long? As far as we know until He started His ministry when He was well past twenty-five years of age. What a hue and cry would be raised if we even attempt to discipline a sixteen year old boy or girl today!

All down through the ages, when people become over-burdened, they finally rebel. There are too many organizations: in the churches, in the schools, and in the world. There are too many demands on the people of today for their time. And yet, nobody will give up one thing. It has made people restless. Even a small family can rarely have a meal when all members can sit down and eat together. That is the reason for so few family altars today. Each member of the family is so busy with various affairs that they are astounded if all members of the family assemble in one room at the same time.

ORGANIZATIONS NEED CONDENSING

The Church is going to have to take the lead if the situation is ever corrected. The Church will have to condense its organ-



izations and weed out of its activities everything that is not of spiritual value and give people more time for their home and family. Churches are not intended to be houses of entertainment.

A family of four, each trying to keep up with the activities of their church and school, will never find time to have a single evening together at home. How then are children ever to be taught by word of mouth and example that Christ is head of the home? Can there be a family altar under such conditions?

Juvenile delinquency will never be healed by youth centers, teen-towns, or recreational programs in the churches. Is Christ ever mentioned at a church softball game? Or a basketball game? Is any Scripture ever read at one of these? Do you ever hear a prayer there? But a child can be taught the Golden Rule, and the Ten Commandments in the home while playing a few games with neighborhood companions provided the mother and father are there and take time to supervise them. Being a parent is a twenty-four hour a day job, three hundred and sixty-five days a year. It should be a privilege and taken as a sacred trust from God.

God does not tell you to send your children to Sunday School and Church—He commands you to TAKE them. Read Deut. 31:12. Christ taught it in Mark 16:15.

TRAINING NEEDED EARLY IN LIFE

The time to start training a child is early in life. Every child should be taught to respect the rights, privilege, and property of others from the cradle. And you cannot teach that which you do not yourself know and practice.

There are a few words we as Americans and as Christians could very easily forget for our own good: glamour, pleasure, popularity, and personality. And there are a few we very sorely need to bring into use and magnification again: such as, modesty, discipline, piety, reverence, respect, scriptures, and CHRIST.

CHURCH IS TEMPLE OF THE LORD

"The Lord is in His Holy Temple, let all the earth keep silence before Him."

A child who is allowed to romp and play in church will not grow up with any reverence for God's house. A child who grows up and never hears the Bible read and reverently discussed in his home, and never hears prayer or a blessing asked, will grow up calloused, indifferent, and a cynical doubter.

If we are ever to have a truly Christian nation, Christ must be taught and lived in the homes. And the children must be taught and shown by example that Sunday is the Lord's day and that it is to be spent in rest, meditation, and worship of the Lord. The Lord's day should be spent in the advancement of His Kingdom; by visiting the lost, and ministering to the sick and to those in distress.

Magnify Christ in the home and in homelife, and He will soon be magnified in the nation.

"God must become real! This does not carry the implication that God himself has been unreal. Most definitely is it true, however, that God of many may be unreal. If life is a matter of abuse, overwork, and burden; if all your days are hemmed in, cluttered, misdirected; if life is a matter of boredom, indifference, and purposelessness, your God is not real. KNOW GOD

Seek Happiness

First of all, if you would be happy, seek to know God; have a speaking acquaintance with Him and form a lifelong partnership in which you can go to Him for blessings and counsel in

regard to all of your undertakings. Then select the church of your choice—the one in which you can be happiest and the most efficient. After you have selected the church of your choice, attend it, support it, and defend it.

We fought for the four freedoms in the Atlantic Charter, but many don't worship now that they can. They are like the little boy that didn't want to do what he wanted to.

FALSE REASONING

The way some people support the church resembles Rastus' answer to the judge, when he wanted a divorce because his wife was always asking for money. The judge asked, "What did she do with all of the money you gave her?" Rastus answered, "Well, I don't know, Judge, I never have given her any yet."

We don't renounce our citizenship because we are ashamed of some Americans. Yet some excuses for failing to defend our churches are based on just as falacious reasoning.

KNOW YOURSELF

The second thing that you should do to find happiness is to know yourself, to know what you are capable of doing, and to discover the vocation from which you can secure the greatest happiness and economical compensation to maintain a happy livelihood.



In knowing yourself, you should know your general ability as compared with others. This information can be secured from a so-called intelligence test. If you are above average, there

probably will be a number of vocations which you could successfully follow and still be happy, but there will be certain routine occupations which definitely will not bring you greatest benefits.

OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE

If you are definitely below average, you still can be happy if you select a vocation in which you can render efficient service. If you are in the average group in general ability, perhaps you should not endeavor to become an engineer, laboratory technician, or a physician.

There may also be routine jobs which you should avoid because you may be able to render greater service to humanity and secure greater enjoyment in a more difficult occupation.

DISCOVER ABILITY

In addition to general ability, one should discover from an interest test or vocational inventory perhaps the three highest interests. In these three fields, aptitude tests should be taken to determine if the interest inventory, based on the individual, personal opinions of the student, actually indicates permanent interests.

The theory is that an individual really interested in a field will already have attained at least average or above average ability in that field. Personality tests, interviews with vocational guidance counselors, and personal analysis of one's own interest, ability, and personality should help one to decide the most logical vocations to consider.

IS YOUR FIELD CROWDED?

Another consideration is, "What opportunities are there in the fields of your interest?" For example, there are more engineers in college today than there are engineering jobs available, and the chances are that the field will continue to be more crowded in the next five to ten years.

If you prefer to work in a field which is crowded, or which may be crowded when you complete your preparation, at least, you should take this into consideration when you enter training.

After you definitely have selected your vocation, put your best into it and make adequate preparation for efficient service. Preparation and achievement are definitely related, and there is nothing that can bring you greater pleasure from your work than to know that you have done a good job.

KNOW OTHER PEOPLE

In the third place, if you would be happy, understand your-self, have a knowledge and understanding of other people, and know how to get along with them and to work with them successfully. In getting along with other people, you should realize that you are no longer a child, and you should not expect other people to make all of the adjustments. In other words, you should grow up or mature emotionally.

Temper tantrums may be excusable in a small child, but they are not present in a well developed personality.

Some people are devoutly religious, entirely sincere, well-informed in their field, but still are unhappy because they have not learned to get along with others. In such cases, we sometimes say, "Well, he means well, anyway." People who can't get along with others not only make other people unhappy, but they, themselves, are miserable.

DIFFERENCE IN VOCATION

Most fields require more or less interrelationship for successful achievement. There are some vocations which do not require a person to be able to get along with others. For example, a laboratory technician needs to be capable and efficient, but he does not have to meet the public to the same extent that a receptionist, teacher, doctor, or merchant must do in order to be successful—success brings contentment.

In the final analysis, if you have a wholesome speaking acquaintance with God; if you are happy in your work; and if you find pleasure in dealing with others, happiness is yours.

WITHOUT CHRIST

CHRIST is the Way—Men without Him are like Cain, wandering vagabonds.

He is the Truth—Men without Him are dead in trespasses and sin.

He is the Light—Men without Him walk in darkness and know not whither they go.

He is the Vine—Men who are not in Him are withered branches prepared for the fire.

He is the Rock—Men not built on Him are carried away by the flood of judgment.

He is the Bread and Water of Life—Men without Him will hunger and thirst throughout all eternity.

MAGNIFY CHRIST IN MUSIC

Sing With Understanding

Heavenly music was heard for the first time on earth, by the shepherds, when the angels sang, "Glory to God in the highest and on earth, peace and good will among

men." Majestic was the musical accompaniment to the Virgin birth of God's only begotten Son. No other person has ever been ushered into this world by such angelic harmonies as was He.

The Jewish nation had looked forward to the coming of the "Messiah" for centuries and to the time when they could sing a "new song unto the Lord" for a Savior, Redeemer, a King of Kings, a Lord of Lords, and a Prince of Peace. The Psalms were the hymns of praise to Jehovah God in the Temple worship. Many of them were composed and sung by David, the "sweet singer" and a man after God's own heart.

MUSIC ORDAINED OF GOD

God gave great emphasis to music in the Tabernacle and Temple worship. Detailed instruction was given by Him concerning the leaders and chief musicians and those who were under rigid musical training. He even designed the proper dress and garb of the priests and singers.

We cannot overlook the importance of music which God ordained both in the Old and New Testament. With such a pattern and example before us, we may well follow it in the twentieth century church music and more pointedly in our Baptist Church worship.

We all agree that music and singing is a means of expressing inner feelings and emotions. To be more specific, sacred or religious music is a means of expressing the deep spiritual emotions such as gratitude for God's grace, love and mercy; adoration for our atonement; the joy of our salvation; earnest concern for the lost, and prayer for God's continued blessing and guidance in His service.

WHO HATH EARS TO HEAR

We need to give careful thought to the songs we use to express these worthy emotions. Too many so-called sacred songs have little, if any, real merit that is genuinely worthy of magnifying. Christ in a worship service. One has only to listen to the radio to become amazed and disgusted with some of the jazzy, and uncouth songs that are presented under the disguise of "favorite sacred songs." How can Christ be truly honored by such common commercialized compositions? Yet this type of music is used in a number of Baptist Churches in Tennessee and other states. He who hath ears to hear, let him hear hymns of great character and beauty that will express proper praise and reverent feeling toward the Christ of Calvary, the Risen Redeemer of the world, and the Prince of Peace. Could we imagine the angels of Heaven singing around the throne of the Heavenly Father some of these cheap, shallow, and undignified songs that are sung in our churches today? Father, forgive them for they know not what they do.

SPIRITUAL TRUTH TAUGHT

The educational value of sacred songs has far reaching possibilities and provides lasting impressions. "Jesus Loves Me This I Know" is usually the first song most of us learn as tiny tots in Sunday School. It still Sings in our adult hearts and is the first important spiritual truth that children need to know: that God is love and the Bible is the one Book that reveals it. All the other basic doctrines of Christianity are to be found in the great hymns that have helped to make Christianity great. Christ commanded us to go and make disciples, teaching them to observe all the doctrines He taught us. "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom: teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord." Col. 3:16.

"What is it then? . . . I will sing with the spirit and I will sing with understanding also." 1 Cor. 14:15. Frequently I have stopped group singing between the stanzas of some hymn and asked what doctrines are suggested in the stanza just sung. Many Christians are unable to answer because they have not been grounded in the faith either by teaching and preaching or because they are new converts.

SING UNTO THE LORD



God's Word tells us that singing is a religious duty. Ps. 81:1: "Sing aloud unto God our strength: make a joyful noise unto the God of Jacob." Ps. 95:1: "O Come, let us sing unto the Lord: let us make a joyful noise unto the Rock of our salvation." Is. 30:29: "Ye shall have a song, as in the night when a holy solemnity is kept; and gladness of heart as when one goeth with a pipe into the mountain of the Lord, to the mighty One of Israel."

Paul and Silas must have believed it their

duty to sing as they witnessed for Christ. In jail at Philippi, at midnight, we hear Paul and Silas singing and praising God. He heard them and sent a mighty earthquake to shake loose their chains and prison doors which gave them an opportunity to witness, and win the keeper of that jail. We may be certain that no jig tunes nor light weighted rhymes were lifted to God by these great pioneer missionaries. No doubt Paul and Silas sang some of the psalms on this occasion but we can suggest a few great hymns that might have been appropriately sung, had they been written then: "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "Amazing Grace," "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing My Great Redeemer's Praise," "I Need Thee Every Hour," "Have Thine Own Way Lord," "What A Friend We Have In Jesus." To be sure, Paul and Silas sang with the spirit and with understanding.

SING WITH UNDERSTANDING

The choir of a New Testament Church needs to sing with the Spirit, in the Spirit and most of all with understanding. Many modern church choirs have become as sounding brass or clanging cymbals because they lack compassionate love in their hearts for lost people. This is another way of saying they have not the Spirit of Christ in their hearts nor in their singing. They prefer to sing loud anthems rather than the great heartwarming hymns and soul-stirring gospel songs that have melted the hard hearts of sinful men, thereby permitting the Holy Spirit to come in and convict them of their sins. The main purpose of a New Testament Church choir, in any worship service, is to sing effectively the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Lord of Lords. There is no more effective way for a choir to magnify Christ than by fulfilling this purpose. The preacher and his choir have this duty in common.

Pastors and ministers of music must plan the worship services of our Baptist Churches with extreme care to avoid too much formality and too little formality. When Baptists lose their warm-hearted fervor, they will cease to sing with the zealous spirit and with the heartfelt understanding that have kept the flames of progressive evangelism burning throughout our history. Again I say, "Sing with the Spirit and with understanding."

MAGNIFY CHRIST IN VISITATION

The surest way to magnify Christ through pastoral visitation is to do things the way Christ wants them done. The way He wants them done is the way He did them Himself.

When Jesus began His public ministry he did not go to the temple in Jerusalem and call great crowds about Himself. On the contrary, He was found at the home of some friend with publicans and sinners drawing near to hear Him. He was found going through Samaria. He was found sitting on a well curb telling a wretched woman of the "Water of Life."

Jesus was seen calling to the man of little stature who was forced to climb a tree to see Him, "Make haste, come down, for today I must abide in thy house." Jesus was seen when a little later He uttered the greatest promise that ever falls on mortal ears, "Today is salvation come to thy house."

MUST LEARN JESUS' EXAMPLE

This scene could be duplicated thousands of times if pastors could learn the secret of following Jesus. The Holy Spirit will lead us into similar joys with great experiences. If we are willing to furnish the man-power, the Holy Spirit will furnish the God-power: for, Jesus said, "Greater things than these shall He do because I go unto my Father."

OBEY HIS COMMANDS

We can magnify Christ in pastoral visitation by obeying His commands. Twice He said, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you." Any child who obeys his father magnifies his father; and, conversely, any child who disobeys his father brings reproach upon his father.

Therefore, if we are to magnify Christ, we must do the things He said and do them in the way He wants them done.

SOUL WINNING THROUGH VISITATION

We can magnify Christ best through personal visitation and in personal soul winning. This method is scriptural. It has the approval of the Holy Spirit. We read in Acts 20:18-28 that it was the method used by Paul. (Every pastor ought to read this passage at least once each week). When Paul set foot on Asia Minor he did it all at the call of the Holy Spirit (Acts 13:2). "The Holy Spirit, said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them."

Now Paul looks back on his work and says that he left no stone unturned for the Lord, both publicly and from house to house. From the very first day in Asia Minor, Paul served the Lord with lowliness of mind, with many tears, and many trials; but he shrank not from declaring unto them anything that was profitable, teaching publicly and from house to house, testifying both to Jews and Greeks, repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ.

You have heard it said that "so-and-so is a great pulpiteer." My belief is that if anyone is a great personal soul winner, he will also be a great pulpiteer. My reason for saying this is that, no matter how much one knows about the Bible and how well he can present it, if no unsaved people are there to hear it no one will be saved. Another reason for this belief is that, no matter how well a man may know the truth, if he does not know the needs of the people seated before him, he cannot effectively apply the truth. The Holy Spirit will offer leadership but the ministry of the Holy Spirit was not intended to make up for laziness.

The Holy Spirit led Paul from house to house. The method has not been changed. We may sin away "our days of grace" as a soul winner and the Holy Spirit will change the messenger;

but neither the method nor the message will be changed. The message is the Blood of Christ. The method is publicly and from house to house.

HOW FIND TIME?

When shall we find time for personal visitation? We may not find all the time that we would like to have for personal visitation, but we can find more time if we look for it prayerfully. Paul found time. He held continents in one hand but he held individuals in the other. A study of the lives of men who have moved continents for God will reveal that they also moved individuals.

Jesus said, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners... They that are whole have no need of a physician, but they that are sick." Nowhere in the Scriptures is it said that sinners are to go to church. I do not wonder why so few come; I wonder why any come. Their nature is just the opposite.

Church people need to learn that sinners are not commanded to come to church, but that the church is commanded to go after them. We can never win the fight against sin by defending our position; we must assert our position by offensive invasion of the stronghold of sin and satan. Before Jesus sent out the Seventy, He went Himself and showed them the way to win and to heal and how to proclaim His message.

Before pastors can send their church members out to win souls they will have to teach them; and, best of all, by example. There are more effective results awaiting the general who leads his troops into battle rather than sending them into battle.

PASTOR AS UNDERSHEPHERD



In Acts 20:28 we read: "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over which the Holy Spirit hath made you bishops (overseer, pastor, shepherd) to feed the church of the Lord which He purchased with His own blood." A pastor is not a hireling nor a hired hand. If a church can pay him all he is worth, he isn't worth that much. The pastor is God's man placed over the flock by the Holy Spirit to tend the flock. He is to protect the flock from the wolves (Acts 20:29,30). He cannot do that unless he is among the flock. Jesus said that a good shepherd could call his sheep by name and lead them out and go before them. He also said

that a good shepherd would lay down his life for his sheep, but that the hireling would flee when he saw the wolf coming and let the wolf snatch the sheep and scatter the flock.

The place of the pastor as the undershepherd ordained of God is to feed the flock. Many there are who have tried in the battle but have lost. They have become discouraged but did not want to bother the pastor with their troubles. They decided to quit; they fell out of the ranks and became one of the unenlisted Baptists.

Many times if the pastor could just stop for a brief visit, give a word of encouragement, read a verse of Scripture or pray for them, the dark clouds would scatter. The circumstances would be overcome. The victory could be won. A life of usefulness would be saved for kingdom service.

At the foot of the cross this group of people we call a church is a classless society. The greatest need of every member is to grow in the image of Christ and to follow him in faithful service."—J. The Great Invitation

A good way to study the entire Bible is in terms of its great invitations. One will be amazed, at first, at the number of times God invites men to come to Him. One will also be impressed at the urgency of these invitations.

In this, one of many, great invitations, we may group our thinking around a "pod of p's"; without making of them too artificial an outline, it is hoped.

I. PRESUPPOSES POVERTY (Vss. 1-2a).

- 1. Thirst of spirit is discovered. The soul of man cries out after that which can be satisfied only as a result of coming into contact with the Lord God. Such a lack is both intensive and extensive.
- 2. Waste of effort is evidenced. Apart from God's gracious help, men in their intense search for that which would satisfy are always tragically disappointed and woefully frustrated.

II. PROMISES PLENTY (Vss. 2b-3).

- 1. The soul feeds. It listens to God's call, or invitation, and responds by feeding at His bountiful table. Its hunger is great but the feast set before it is yet greater. God satisfies.
- 2. The soul lives. It lives here and now and it will live forever. It thrives and it grows. Some day it will mature. Its diet is like the manna given to Israel on their way to Canaan. "To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna" (Rev. 2:17).

III. PRODUCES PEOPLE (Vss. 4-5).

- 1. Commanded by the Lord. Men must give their loyalty to some one or to some thing. When they give it to God they are not only thus at one with Him but they are also at one with their best selves.
- 2. Exalted by the Lord. It means much to be exalted and glorified by Him. It carries with it a great responsibility. He does it not for our sakes or for our glory but rather for His own. This means that we are to do our best to realize His purposes within us.

IV. PROCLAIMS PARDON (Vss. 6-7).

- 1. If we seek Him. He is to be sought when His Spirit leads us to seek Him. If we are earnest and sincere, and are being led by His Spirit, He can be found. By implication, we are warned not to delay or postpone such seeking, for there may come a time when He will be hard to find or be far removed from us.
- 2. If we forsake evil. We are to forsake evil ways and turn to Him for mercy. We are to renounce sinful thoughts and look to Him for pardon. His pardon will prove abundant and sufficient to meet our needs. "Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound" (Rom. 5:20).

V. PORTRAYS POWER (Vss. 8-11).

- 1. In being superior. The thoughts of God are far above ours. At times He seems to permit our thinking His thoughts after Him. This is indeed a rare privilege for us, and should be exercised in humility. His ways are far above ours also. Man's highest concepts of right and wrong have come through processes of revelation. Both God's thoughts and ways are as far above those of man as the heavens are higher than the earth. Facing this truth, how can man be proud or be filled with vainglory?
- 2. In guaranteeing success. His word cannot fail. It will not fall to the ground without bringing forth fruit. "It shall not return unto me void," says the Lord. What a word of assurance for God's prophet! Let him be confident, but never boastful, that his deliverance of God's message will have God's blessings upon the results. But like germinating seed, it takes time always.

VI. PROVIDES PEACE. (Vss. 12-13).

- 1. Peace on the inside. This is where peace must have its beginning, within the human heart and life and as a result of the adjustment of the individual with the plan and purpose of God. As a consequence, he can experience what Paul mentions (Phil. 4:7).
- 2. Peace on the outside. Isaiah becomes poet as well as prophet in these two verses, when he speaks of the singing of the hills and the clapping of the hands of the trees. They came into the mind of the writer with new significance on the morning of the first Armistice Day in 1918.

Lorene Tilford Writes From China

Dear friends:

My last letter was written just before the opening of the summer school at the University on June 26. We had more than 300 students for seven weeks. During that time I taught nine hours of English and helped with the V.B.S., B T U and Bible classes. Summer school closed on August 13. Ever since I have been doing my best to get over amoebic dysentery from which I have been suffering since I returned last fall from the states. I hope when I return to the campus tomorrow that I can live above disturbing factors and that my physical strength will not be dissapated by this lack of self control and quiet calmness. I have fully resolved to live only one day at a time and try to make that day the best of my life.

When the Gordon sails, there will be 25 missionaries from our Board located in Shanghai. Only Dr. and Mrs. Hipps and Wesley Lawton are leaving on the Gordon. Our missionaries are located at the Seminary, the Eliza Yates Girls' School, the University Boys' Middle School, the Publication Society, the Office, the Cantonese Girl's School, the North Gate Church and Schools and the University. All of the High Schools have opened with good enrolment although because of the HCL they do not have as many as they did last year. There are 65 students in the Seminary which opened last week. Many more students have asked for scholarships than last year. I am especially grateful for the scholarship fund that has been created out of the over and above relief funds that will help 96 young people who have dedicated their lives to serve their own people as doctors, dentists, teachers, mining engineers, and business men and women who build Christian homes.

The University registered students last week. We expect to have 1,200 studying with us this year. Our English load has been reduced so that I will have time to teach one course in religion. Miss Coleman will teach Christian doctrine and I am to teach a Life of Christ. The administration of the school has been modified, and although we regret to see much of the old discarded, there is some good in the new. At least our people, especially the students are learning the meaning of responsibility, and I hope that they will be less ready to criticize because they will have learned about many of the problems first hand. They are learning to make and balance budgets. They will know why new books and equipment cannot be bought, and have a greater knowledge of the teachers position in the school.

I also hope that many of them after seeing the need for more education will dedicate themselves to the life of a teacher instead of trying to build a fortune for themselves in the business world.

Young people's conferences were sponsored by the B T U department this summer in four of the areas of the city. These were well attended. Every church had a V B S. The University Church sponsored three with a total enrolment of more than 500. For the first time in our history, no one received pay for helping. Two schools ran three weeks and one four weeks. Our church work will continue with minor changes. The Chinese Christians will assume responsibility for more of the leadership. The missionary will be seen and heard less.

We have enough food, money, clothing and the comforts of life to make our living enjoyable; we wonder how God can give us so much. We hope that mail will soon be possible but we are grateful for the contact that we are having through Hongkong. God was leading when He let Miss Smith and Dr. Cauthen get out to open the office there. If at any time you want to send me a message write to Miss Lucy Smith, Box 1686 Kowloon, Hongkong.

I am returning to the campus tomorrow and we will begin classes on the 21st. I am moving my furniture back that was evacuated before the Shanghai fighting. I expect to dig in for the winter term. Much, much love to all of you and know that we are thankful for you and are depending on you to hold the ropes for us.





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
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NEWS MIDDLE TENNESSEE

A special series of Revival services began at the Magness Memorial Baptist Church, E. L. Smothers, pastor, Sunday, October 30th.



Glorieta Assembly is Dedicated

GLORIETA, N. Mex.—(BP)—With the snow-capped De Christo mountains nodding their welcome, 250 Baptists formed a circle by the rippling stream in a canyon-like repose here, the morning of October 26, and dedicated to God a second-Southern Baptist assembly. The service was a part of the New Mexico Baptist Convention.

The Southern Baptist Convention voted at Oklahoma City to establish the assembly at Glorieta and instructed the Sunday School Board to study all that is involved in the development of the site and to bring a report to Chicago in 1950. A committee from the Board made up of Dr. T. L. Holcomb, executive secretary, Dr. J. O. Williams, Mr. Harold Ingraham, and Mr. W. A. Harrell, along with New Mexico Baptists, investigated the site and reported that the property was desirable for development as an assembly.

Dr. Duke K. McCall, executive secretary of the Convention's Executive Committee, also present at the dedicatory service, said he would recommend that the Executive Committee accept title to the 1200-acre property in line with the Convention action.

"Our problem now is to get the money to develop the property so it can become another Ridgecrest and serve as a blessing to thousands of young people and to hundreds of churches," Dr. McCall said. "Our responsibility is to carry out the will of Southern Baptists: With practical considerations, all working together, we can make a reality of our dreams. This property is dedicated to the advancement of Christ's work until he comes again."

In his dedicatory message, Dr. Williams stressed the accessibility by train, plane, and bus to this spot in the heart of the rapidly growing West; the adequacy of the 1200 acres; the adaptability of the grounds for buildings of every need; and the flowing wells and sublime scenery. He received an ovation, however, when he stated that while Glorieta is accessible, adequate, and adaptable, the matter that will always be emphasized is the fact that it is a religious assembly and not a hunter's paradise nor a recreational haven. "Praise the Lord for Glorieta," he said. "We are ready to do all we can until Jesus comes. We are dedicated to this task."

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
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
