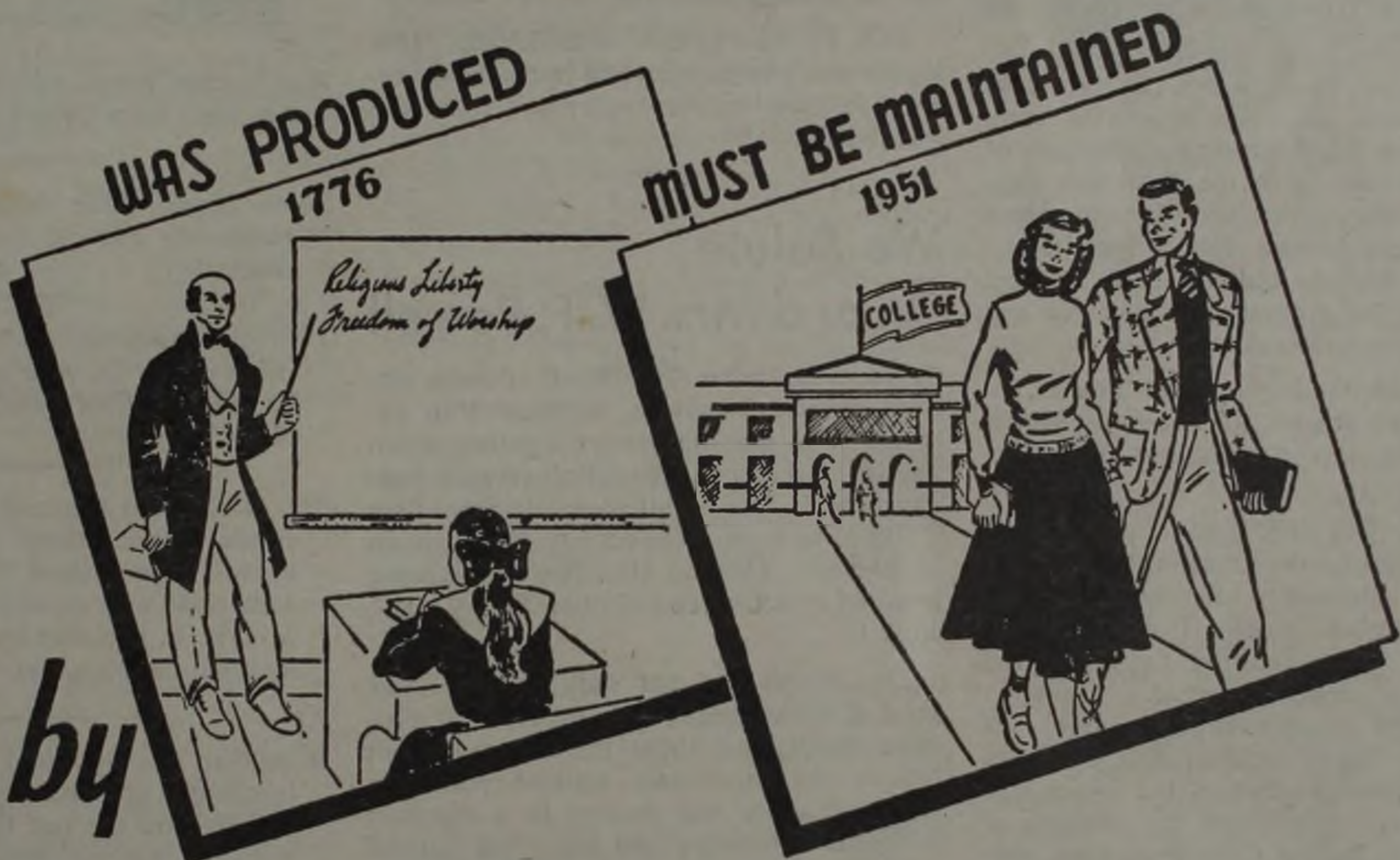

From the Editor's Desk

Cumberland University Returned to Former Trustees

We believe the action taken by the present (Baptist) board of trustees of Cumberland University May 21 to return the property to the former board of trustees (through whom it was given to our Convention) to be a step toward a happy clarifying of this matter.

A friendly settlement is now in prospect with the old trustees taking the University back and the city of Lebanon agreeing to foster the Law school out of municipal funds supplementing income from original endowment of the University prior to Baptist operation.

A committee to work out the details of this settlement has been appointed composed of the Administrative committee of the Executive Board of the Tennessee Baptist Convention together with three members each from the present Cumberland Board of Trustees and the old Board of Trustees from whom the property was received and to whom it now returns.

In the understanding reached May 21 between the two Boards of Trustees (Baptist and former) these resolutions were approved:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That, as a condition of the transfer of the control of the University, the above named newly constituted Trustees (this means the former Board of Trustees to whom the University is being returned,) agree to abide by and comply with the terms of all contracts legally entered into by Cumberland University during the time said University has been under the auspices of the Tennessee Baptist Convention; and particularly to comply with all the terms, provisions and conditions of the contract entered into between Cumberland University, Tennessee Baptist Foundation and Executive Board of Tennessee Baptist Convention referred to in the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on March 19, 1951.

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"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a committee of three members of the present Cumberland Board of Trustees, three members of the former Board and six members of the Administrative or Executive Board of the Tennessee Baptist Convention be designated by the respective bodies to work out the details of the transfer and that said joint committee be instructed to report their recommendations to the present Board of Trustees before actual registration of the charter amendment with the Secretary of State of Tennessee.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this transfer be conditioned upon the agreement that no litigation will result from said transfer."

We Salute Dr. and Mrs. W. F. Powell

We congratulate Dr. W. F. Powell and First church, Nashville, on their 30th anniversary in glorious service together which will be marked by a special observance Sunday June 3. During his pastorate more than 2,600 have been received into First church by baptism. Dr. and Mrs. Powell are being honored by a Church reception Friday night, June 1.

Dr. Powell has not only ably led this great historic church in a program of progress throughout these three decades but has in the meanwhile assisted numerous other churches and pastors in a vigorous evangelistic ministry and has given faithful service to Southern Baptists at large as a trustee or director on various boards and agencies, having served as chairman of the Baptist Sunday School Board directors for 29 years.

At present Dr. Powell is in the midst of two great series of seventeen sermons each at the two Sunday morning worship hours at First church, Nashville. At eight-thirty Dr. Powell preaches on the series, "Seventeen Scenes from the Life of Jesus" while at ten forty-five he preaches on "Seventeen Christian Doctrines." It is not uncommon for Dr. Powell to preach four times on Sunday, sometimes even five times, as he answers calls to share in services on Sunday in addition to his own pulpit.

During the thirty years that Dr. Powell has served as pastor First church, Nashville, has given \$766,736 to missions and total gifts of \$2,131,481 during this same period. The church budget has more than doubled during the last five years.

On thirty years packed with Christ-honoring service we salute Dr. and Mrs. W. F. Powell and First church, Nashville.

Foreign Mission Board Reports To The People

The Orient

China: "Contrary to a statement in a recent issue of *Time* magazine, all Protestant mission Boards have not urged all their missionaries to leave China," Dr. M. Theron Rankin, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, told the Board in its regular monthly meeting, May 10.

"The Board has urged our missionaries to exercise their own judgment in making their own decisions. The Board has repeatedly assured the missionaries that unqualified support would be given any decision to remain or to leave.

"The Board has assumed that the missionaries would remain in China as long as they judged their presence helpful. The time has now come when the missionaries themselves, in light of actual experience under the communists, have concluded that their presence is a hindrance and a source of vital danger to Chinese Christians."

Southern Baptists have only four missionaries left in China. They are Ruth Everley Hayes, Wuchow; Ruth Pettigrew, Kweiyang; Addie Estelle Cox, Shanton; and Pearl Johnson, Tsingtao.

Japan: A report from the president of the Japan Baptist Convention says: "In 1947 there were 15 churches, 14 pastors, and less than 1,000 Baptist church members in Japan. Today there are 37 churches, 76 mission points, 40 pastors, and more than 4,200 church members.

Islands of the Sea: Missionaries who have found it necessary to leave China are being relocated. Rev. and Mrs. Oz Quick, Miss Mary Demarest, and Miss Irene Jeffers are now in Formosa. Wonderful reports come of the opportunities for service there. Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Jackson are waiting for visas to go to the Philippines where they will join the work of the Philippine Mission. Rev. and Mrs. Deaver Lawton and Miss Margie Shumate are helping to strengthen the Siam Mission. Miss Lora Clement has made a visit to the capital city of the Malay Federation and reports great opportunities there. A building has been purchased in Singapore for the work of the church. At least half of the money is being raised by the church itself.

Baker James Cauthen: "It would be easy to conclude that conditions are too unstable and the risks are too great to venture very far. But we have our Master's orders embracing the whole wide world. With the command of our Lord ringing in our hearts and the challenge of his cross before our

eyes, we join the sailors of Bremen and say, 'We don't have to live, but we must put out to sea.' "

Europe

Dr. George W. Sadler, secretary for Africa, Europe, and the Near East, will visit mission fields this summer. He will lay the cornerstone for a building at Spurgeon's College in London on June 28. This honor comes because Southern Baptists contributed \$20,000 toward the restoration of the cloisters at the school.

The Foreign Mission Board is giving a lift to Baptist work in a number of places in Europe in addition to the established Southern Baptist work there.

In cooperating with the American Baptist Convention, the Board has recently helped Norwegian Baptists purchase a boat which will be used in the fjords and islands of Northern Norway where there are no churches or chapels and where many people gather for worship.

Other recent appropriations include \$2,000 for construction of chapels in Austria and \$9,000 to purchase property and help construct church buildings in Southern Germany.

Latin America

Dr. Everett Gill, Jr., secretary for Latin America, is visiting mission centers in Mexico, Central America, Colombia, and Ecuador.

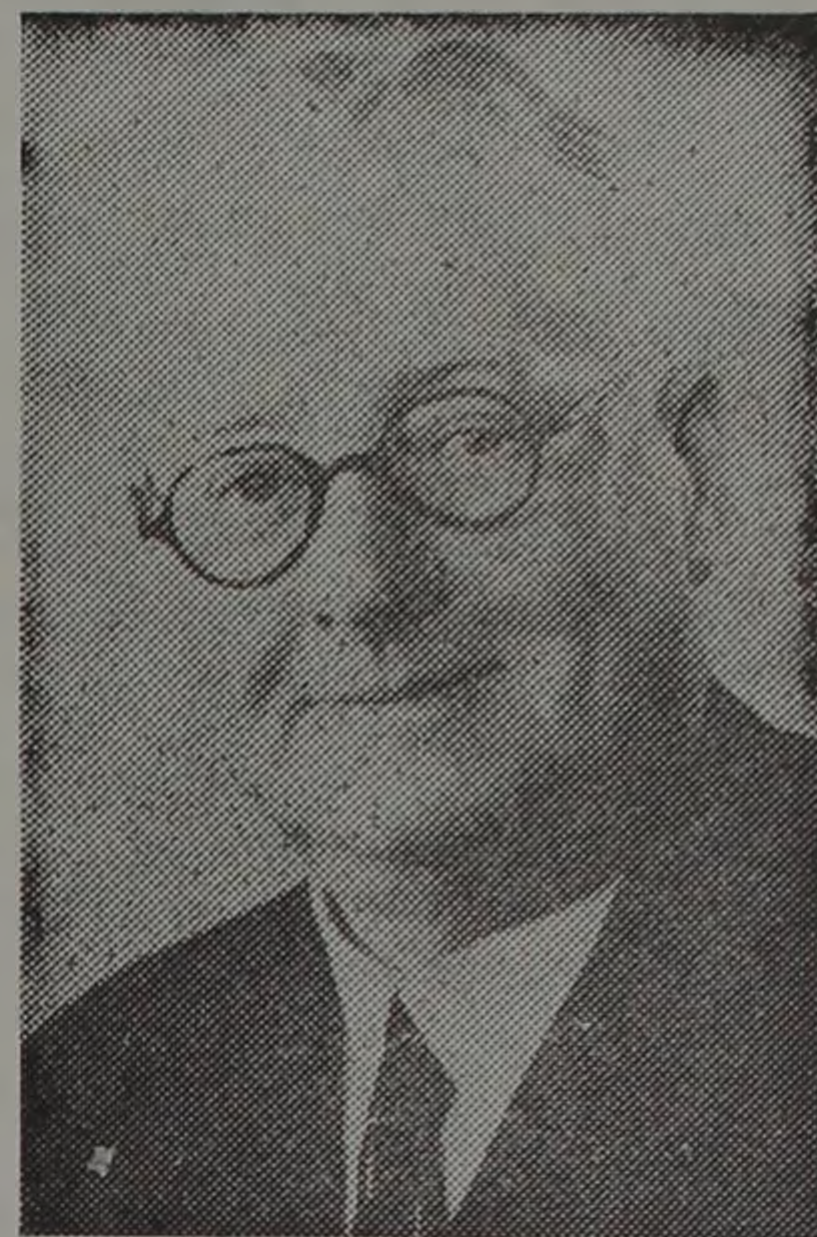
His first stop after leaving Richmond April 16 was the Baptist Publishing House in El Paso, Texas. There he had conferences with the missionaries serving in this institution which has ministry to 25 Spanish-speaking areas.

He went from El Paso to Chihuahua, Mexico, the center of missionary activity for a wide area. There he visited a beautiful new church building which he says "is a credit to our cause." It is in Chihuahua that Rev. and Mrs. A. P. Pierson, with Miss Katherine Skinner, direct a Student Home for young men and women studying in the state schools.

Then Dr. Gill visited Torreon, the home of a new Baptist seminary for young men and women. He spoke in Spanish to the graduating class of the institution. "Here lies the hope of the future of our work in Mexico," he wrote. A lot, 160 x 260 feet, has been purchased for the future home of the seminary, and it is hoped that building operations will begin this year.

for girls in Guadalajara. "These homes, in a land where denominational schools are prohibited, are meeting a long-felt need," Dr. Gill reported. "They train young laymen and women in Christian character while they attend the state schools, and also prepare young people for the ministry and active Christian service in the churches."

Dr. Gill took a mule trip—21 hours in the saddle to cover 75 miles—to the mountainous state of Guerrero, one of the most backward in Mexico. It is the home of the Benito Juarez School which is supported by Baptists. The only school in the community of Guayameo and a far-reaching mountain area surrounding it, it has an enrolment of about 140 children and young people.

Lottie Moon Offering

The 1950 Lottie Moon Offering totaled \$2,110,019.07, according to Everett L. Deane, treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board. This is an increase of \$364,336.26 over the 1949 offering of \$1,745,682.81.

States contributing more than \$100,000 are: Texas, \$764,516.23; North Carolina, \$180,581.22; Virginia, \$160,762.00; South Carolina, \$113,962.62; Georgia, \$106,973.85.

Books on the 1950 offering were closed May 1. Any additional money received from the 1950 offering will be credited to the 1951 total.

Next Sunday's Lesson

TEXTS: Ezra 1; 5; 6; Nehemiah 4 to 6; 8 to 9 (Larger)—Ezra 1:2-3; 6:14-16; Neh. 4:6; 8:1-3 (Printed)—Isaiah 40:31 (Golden).

The Restoration of Jerusalem

There could be no better introduction to this lesson than the passage chosen for the devotional reading for the same, which is Psalm 126. By all means, let the reader turn to it and ponder it carefully and sympathetically. It has been captioned, "Zion Celebrates the Return from Exile."

The Edict Proclaimed (Ezra 1:2-3)

Cyrus, king of Persia, was the person through whom the Lord carried out His eternal plans of bringing the chosen people back to their homeland. The verse that precedes the printed passage tells us that he thus was the means of the fulfillment of Jeremiah's prophecy, made some time previously. God has infinite means of carrying out His promises to His people, and they should learn to depend upon them in implicit faith. Just when the outlook seems darkest often proves to be the coming of the dawn of a new and better day. This was true in the days of this lesson and it is true now.

The Temple Finished (Ezra 6:14-16)

At last the Temple was restored in much of its original splendor and beauty. This accomplishment stood as a symbol of God's protection and guidance and furnished a center of Jewish hopes and aspirations. It was a great day in the life and experience of the then returning captives when they viewed their beloved structure at least partially rebuilt. It is no wonder that they observed the occasion with great joy. It is worth noting, also, that the prophets Haggai and Zechariah added a great deal to the completion of the Temple by their ministry of prophecy. A nation cannot hope to rebuild without the assistance of those who have been chosen to speak for the Lord, the prophets or the preachers. God intends that this shall be the case, and men must keep it in mind.

The Wall Built (Neh. 4:6)

Nehemiah stands out in the Old Testament somewhat as does Barnabas in the New Testament. Both alike were devoted and dependable laymen. Both alike were men of prayer. Both alike were energetic and men of great courage. Nehemiah was the cup-bearer to Artaxerxes, the king, when first introduced in this book. He was a trusted servant and so was finally allowed to lead a group in the reconstruction of Jerusalem's walls. He and his workmen encountered much opposition but the reason for their success is suggested in this verse, namely, "the people had a mind to work." There is no substitute for hard and honest work. When it is performed for a worthy purpose, as was the case before us, it is bound to have God's blessings. The walls

of ancient cities were all-important. They served as devices of protection against the enemies of the people who lived within them. It takes strong and courageous men today to build, or rebuild, the "walls" around all that we hold dear to protect us against all of our enemies, the physical and the spiritual (and they are both numerous and dangerous).

The Law Read (Neh. 8:1-3)

The people of that day desired a full restoration of their country's strength and influence. They wanted to avoid that which had been responsible for their previous downfall and captivity. With sure insight, they saw that they needed to know and to follow the teachings of the Law. And so for a half day some read and others listened. All of the people participated. It was a

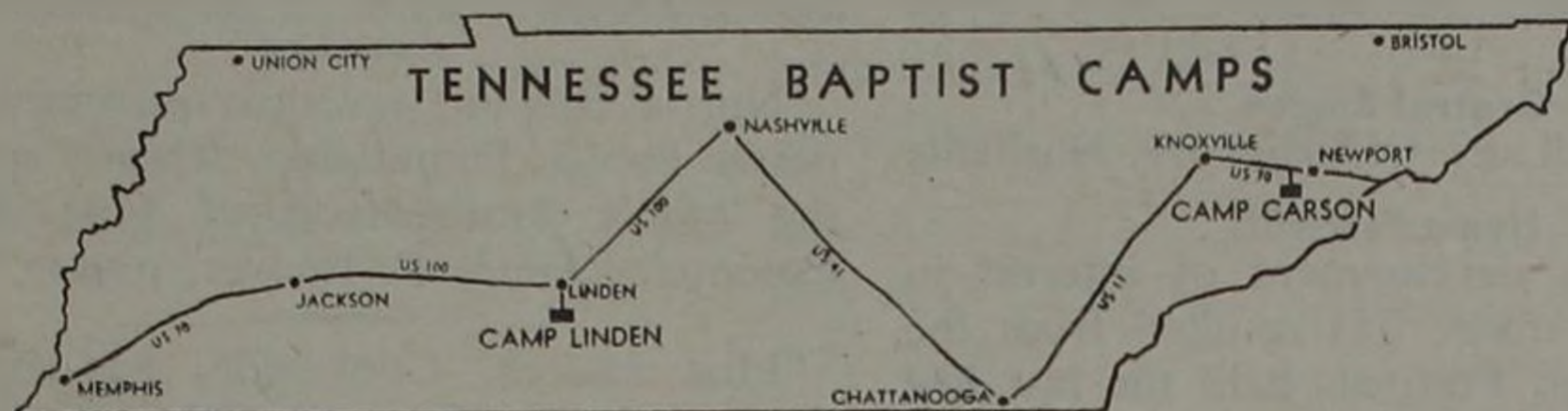

"Raid" Taverns With Prayer

PICAYUNE, Miss.—(RNS)—A group of ministers and laymen "raided" six taverns in Hancock County near here but prayers and hymns took the place of the traditional guns and badges.

Fourteen preachers and five laymen, mostly Baptists, visited the taverns on Saturday night. C. E. James, pastor of the Roseland Baptist church, said the patrons and owners received the group courteously.

"They turned the place over to us and called all other activity to a halt, while we sang and preached," he said.

But when an augmented group of 35 persons went on the same excursion Sunday night they met with outright opposition. Several tavern owners refused the group admission and told them not to come back any more on Saturdays or Sundays. One proprietor told them that "churches are the place to preach."

Pastor Fletcher Lingerfelt reports the death of deacon Fred Raper, May 5, a great loss to North Sweetwater church. He had served as a deacon in First church, Sweetwater, for a number of years and was active in the North Sweetwater mission which was organized into a church in 1947 where-in he served as a deacon.

Baptist Highlights

. . . The 1951 *Southern Baptist Handbook*, The price is \$1.00. Contains a complete summary of Southern Baptist progress for each year since 1845. Two new graphs will picture the relationship between the location of churches and the church membership in each state in the Southern Baptist Convention.

. . . A new survey in the *Handbook* shows 90.3 per cent of all SBC churches had pastors when the associational reports were made, but only 44.5 per cent of the churches reported pastors living on the church field.

. . . The *Handbook* also shows the number of rural churches with fewer than 100 members has decreased from 13,396 in 1923 to 5,846 in 1950. The rural churches (open country, village, town) now report 95.3 per cent owning their own house, compared with only 76.5 per cent in 1923. The number of rural churches reporting Sunday schools has increased from 77.2 per cent in 1923 to 95.6 per cent in 1950.

. . . C. K. Rand has been named as superintendent of the Rescue Mission in New Orleans.

. . . Northern Baptists meet June 11-15 in Buffalo, N. Y. Theme: Beginning at Jerusalem.

In the World of Religion

. . . Bishop Hazen Werner of the Methodist Church estimates that at least 100,000,000 people in India are on the starvation level. He reported that 80 per cent of the total population of about 350,000,000 have only one scant meal per day.

. . . A new Moslem mosque and Islamic institute will be erected in Washington, D. C.

. . . About 2,250,000 Protestant and Catholic children in the U. S. are enrolled in week-day religious education classes.

Facts of Interest

. . . The *Survey* reports 1,500,000 sentences served each year in U. S. penal institutions; 600,000 mentally ill and 140,000 mentally defective require annual care; there is one divorce for every four marriages; 41 out of every 1,000 live births are babies born out of wedlock; and 250,000 children are being cared for in foster homes or institutions because their own families are dissolved or are unwilling to care for them.

. . . The wholesale commodity price index (1926 equal 100) climbed from 183.1 to 183.6 during the week ending April 28.

. . . 92 per cent of 694 teachers in Cincinnati favor bringing television into the classroom as a teaching tool.

. . . U. S. Newspapers carried \$499,019,000 national advertising in 1950. Of the total newspaper advertising, beer companies spent \$14,382,000, wine companies spent \$2,038,000, and liquor companies spent \$29,053,000. Tobacco spent \$19,935,000.

Of interest to Tennessee Baptist is the recently revealed fact that there are far more Baptists in Nashville than of any other denomination. There are 35,802 white Baptists in Nashville, over 1000 more than there are Methodists, the second in size. There are 28,000 members of the Churches of Christ. Including Negro Baptists there are 59,302 Baptists in Nashville, nearly 20,000 more than there are Methodists.

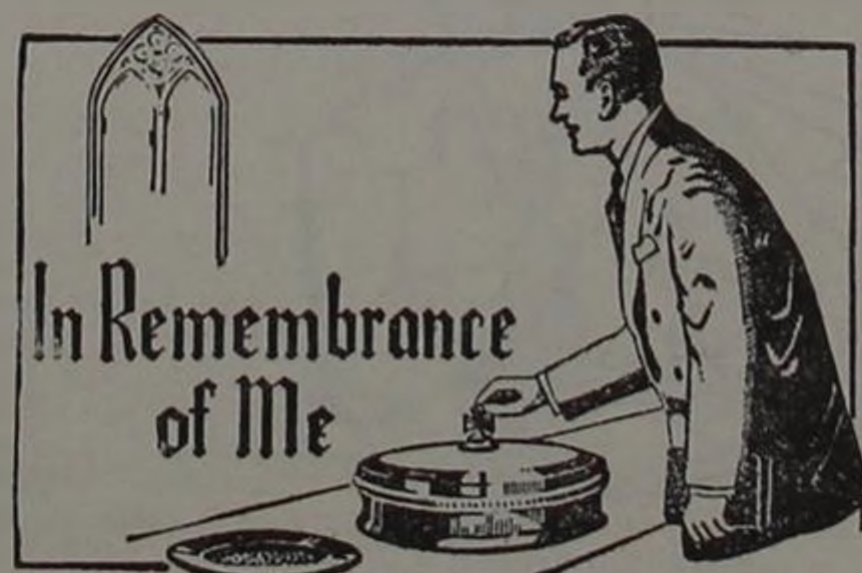

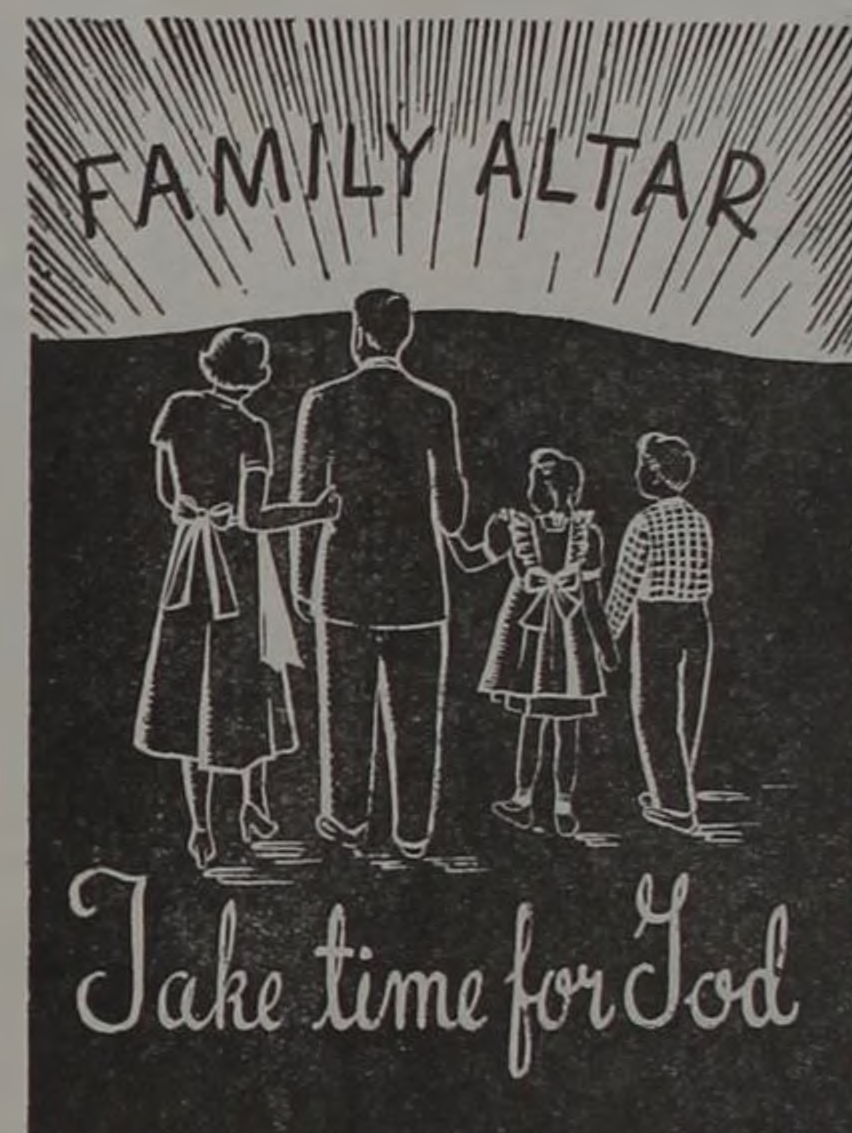

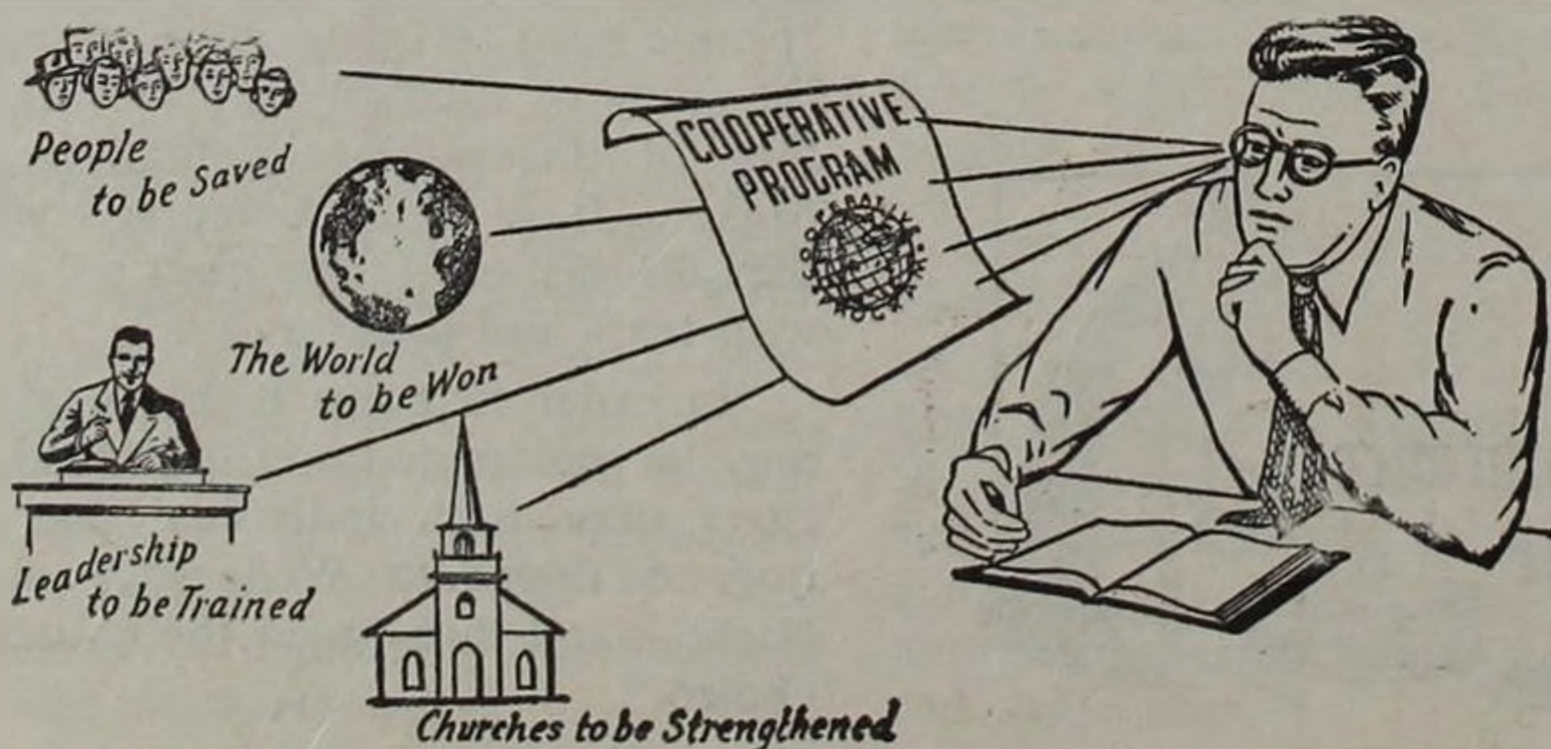
This is the only known church of the 67 Baptist churches in Shelby county which has never received any financial support from another church or the denomination.

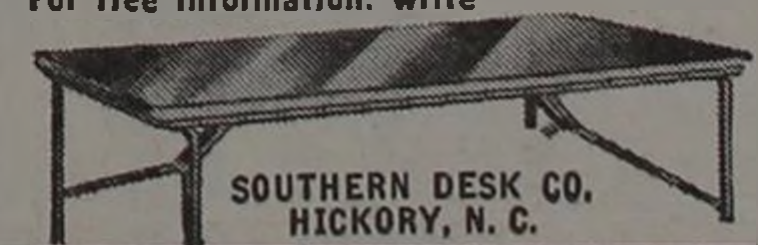

Dr. Crawley is a native of Newport, Tenn., and was an editor in the Training Union Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville from 1940-44.

President Roy Anderson of Harrison-Chilhowee Academy, Seymour, is improving from a recent illness which took him away from Commencement Exercises. However, according to his doctor, Mr. Anderson will need a complete rest for awhile.

First church, Sarasota, Fla., observed the second anniversary of Pastor Wm. R. Hamilton May 6. A native of Knoxville and former pastor at Dyersburg First church, Bro. Hamilton begins his third year with the Florida church rejoicing in God's blessings. Miss Agnes McWhinnie, educational secretary, has sent us the following from the Sarasota First church's anniversary bulletin:

"The record of our church in the past two years is an interesting one, worthy of our study. The Sunday School enrollment has increased from 485 to 805; the average attendance from 315 to 493. The average weekly contributions for the church and denominational program have increased from \$338.27 to \$795.43.

"Since the coming of Brother Hamilton the Educational Building has been completed and the church auditorium enlarged, practically doubling its seating capacity. There has been a total of 355 additions to our church membership. On May 1, 1949, we had a membership of 765; today we have a total of 1,029 members.

"On February 8, 1951, the church took a forward step in the purchase of the adjoining property on Main Street for a future auditorium to accommodate our worshippers and additional educational facilities. This property was purchased at a cost of \$35,000.00 on which \$16,500.00 has already been paid, leaving an indebtedness of \$18,500.00."

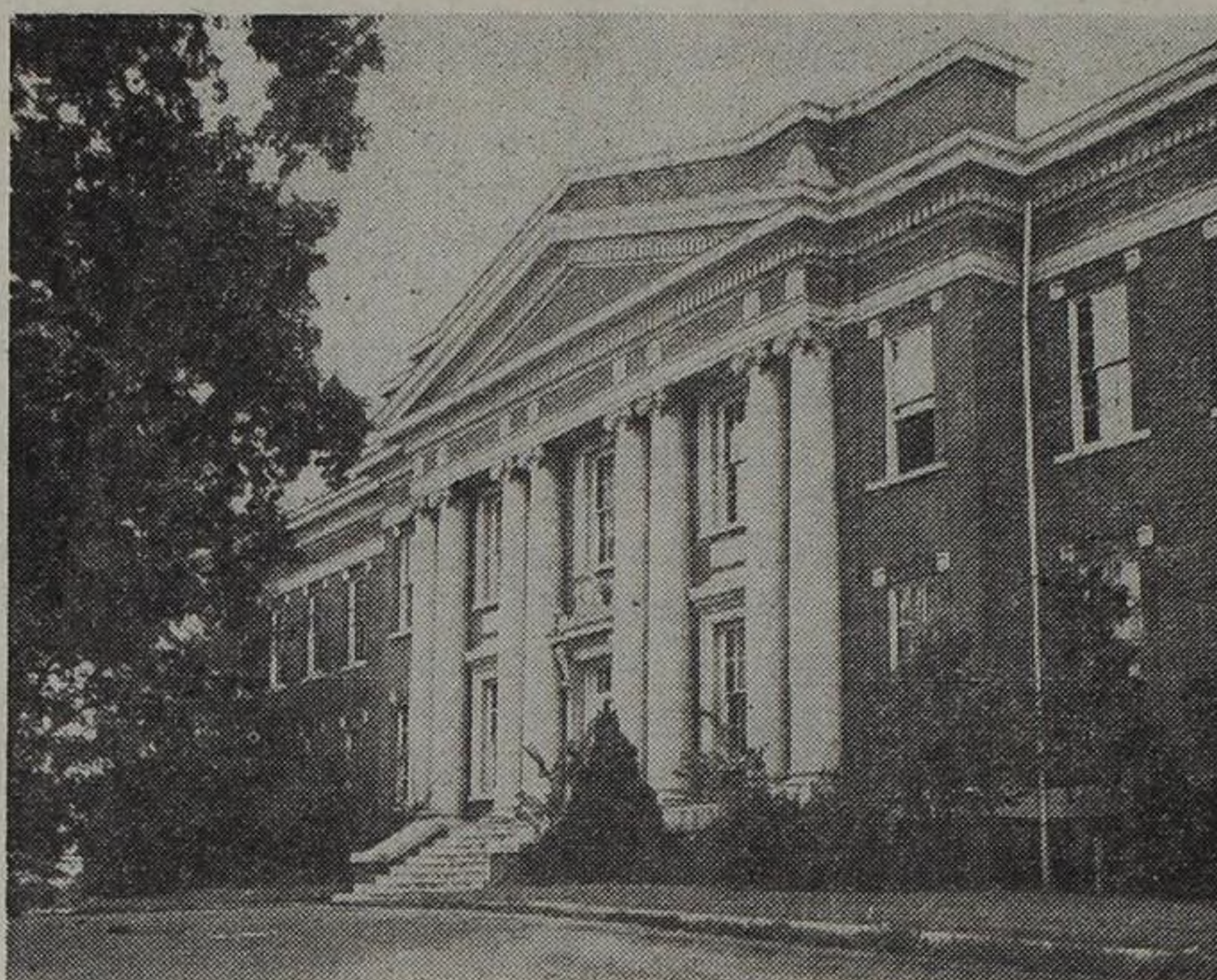
