There are two ways we can join in increasing the amount of funds available for missions through the Cooperative Program during this year:



### HERE AND THERE

It is good to note that there is vigor in our Baptist life. This I have observed during the past week in visiting several associations. Holston, oldest of the 64 associations in Tennessee, at its 171st annual meeting, had good reports from its 113 churches and received four new churches. An enlarged program of local missions will be inaugurated by the association.

Nolachucky Association gave serious discussion to its mission work and to the employment of an associational missionary. This matter received democratic discussion by messengers from the churches.

Chilhowee Association received encouraging reports of an increase in baptisms well above last year's. The time of next year's meeting was changed from August to October. The work is well organized in Chilhowee. While in Maryville we had the pleasure of viewing First Church's beautiful new edifice which they will enter Aug. 25. It is a most imposing building on a new six acre lot.

Campbell County Association celebrated their 50th anniversary this year, with their meeting presided over by Moderator Vern Powers.

Sequatchie Valley Association, in its annual meeting October 15, reported mission gifts of \$15,156.96 and total gifts of \$106.745.63. There were 205 baptisms, an increase of 39 over last year. The 26-church association withdrew fellowship from First Church, Pikeville, "for lack of cooperation with association, failure to report, receiving members by alien immersion, and for voting to withdraw support from association, Tennessee Baptist Convention, and Southern Baptist Convention". First Southern Baptist Church, Pikeville, was recognized as a cooperating church and its members seated. The association also withdrew fellowship from Layne's Chapel Church "for practices not followed by missionary Baptist churches, failure to report, and failure to cooperate" according to the association. Wayne Bassette, pastor of First Church, Dunlap, was elected moderator for the coming year. The association set the next meeting at First Church, Jasper, October 23-24, 1958.

Many other associations will be meeting in the weeks ahead. It is encouraging to note the growth expressed in numbers, the increase in the number of baptisms, the new churches, and the enlarged support that is being given to our mission, educational, and benevolent work through the Cooperative Program.

The treasurer's report for the first nine months of this State Convention year is carried in this issue, beginning on page 8. Cooperative Program receipts gained \$105,387.07 above the seme preiod last year; also there is a gain of \$84,248.65 in designated receipts, while receipts from the campaign for Tennessee Baptist schools revealed a loss of \$25,699.74.

Total receipts of \$3,147,511.48 are the best that Tennessee Baptists have ever reported. For this we can indeed be grateful. The gain of more than \$105,000 in the Cooperative Program for the nine months, however, will call for nearly \$95,000 additional giving above last year's amounts, before October 31, if Tennessee Baptists reach their \$2,800,000 goal—a \$200,000 increase this year in the Cooperative Program.

Nearly all pastors in Tipton County took a stand and joined in a vigorous campaign which defeated the return of legalized liquor by a vote of three to one. The wets had called for the referendum which went against them in what was reported by the Covington Leader as the most one-sided liquor balloting ever taken in Tipton County. Pastor D. P. McFarland of First Church, Covington and Pastor R. Y. Gerrard of Liberty Church were active among local leadership in which nearly all churches were united in fighting liquor legalization. Valuable aid was given local leadership by the United Tennessee League and the American Temperance Society.

Central Avenue Church, Memphis, secures the services of Hewitt Slack Aug. 25 as minister of education, a place filled the past five months in an interim capacity by the Rev. Earl Whitsitt. Mr. Slack comes from First Church, Newport, Ky. Recently we had the privilege of being with this Memphis church whose pastor, Dr. George E Stewart, is leading in a great ministry assisted by a fine staff. In July the church voted to sponsor a new work in the Glen Park subdivision at Quince and W. Hayne Road on a four acre lot. Until a building can be constructed services are being held in the Sea Isle School. The mission is to be known as Glen Park Baptist Chapel. Rev. Billy J. Turner is mission pastor.

First Church, Murfreesboro, has received the keys of its new three story educational unit. This well-planned structure, costing \$167,000, will house departments from the beginner through the intermediate age groups. Dr. Robert Palmer is the party.

First Church, Smyrna, had an instant reception for new pastor Jack Altm. Jr., and family. The hospitality committee of the church arranged this Sunday af hoon Aug. 18 in the Tea Room of the toric Sam Davis home.

Pastor Fred O. Ponton reports very successful Youth-led revival in Oak reet Church, Elizabethton with Guy Patterson student at Southern Seminary as evangelist and Stanley Johnson, student at E. Tenn. College leading the singing.

Rev. Clyde Jones is supply pastor at Sylvan Heights Church, 1224 Chelsea Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee, since the resignation June 1 of F. W. Gillespie, according to a statement received from M. L. Douglas, chairman of the deacons.

Troy G. Young announces that Union University alumni will meet during the First National Conference for Southern Baptist Men at Oklahoma City Sept. 19. The meeting will be in the YMCA Cafeteria (two blocks from the auditorium) at 5 P. M.

At the evening service at Forest Hill Church, Maryville, July 21, a nine-year-old lad dedicated his life to the ministry. He is Don (Tinker) Webb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Webb. Harley Smiley is pastor of the Forest Hill Church.

# Victor Glass Elected To Home Board Position

Glass will have principal responsibilities in the educational phase of ministry among the Negroes.

### Routh on CBS - TV

Dr. Porter Routh of Nashville, Tenn., executive secretary of the Executive Committee and treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention, will represent the denomination on the television program "Lamp Unto My Feet" Sunday, September 1.

The program, originated in New York by the Columbia Broadcasting System weekly and telecast nationally, will follow its usual format of televising a 15-minute "live" drama. This is followed by 15-minutes of discussion and commentary on the moral and religious aspects of the drama.

Dr. Lyman Bryson is the moderator of "Lamp Unto My Feet." The September 1st drama will involve various facets of life related to labor.

The program will be produced by CBS in cooperation with the Southern Baptist Radio-Television Commission, Fort Worth, network representative of the Convention.

Miss Boyd is a graduate of Middle Tennessee State College, Murfreesboro, and has done graduate work in religious journalism at Scarritt College, Nashville. She received the Master of Religious Education degree at Southern Seminary in May.

From 1953 to 1955 she was employed by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.

As news director for the Seminary she will serve as managing editor of *The Tie*, a monthly news magazine, and will prepare other news and promotional materials.




Second Continental Assembly Toronto, Canada November 5-7, 1957

Outstanding speakers will present the story of World Missions during a two-day meeting at First Baptist Church in Chattanooga on September 2-3. Appearing on the program will be Dr. Searcy S. Garrison, Executive Secretary of Georgia Baptist Convention. Dr. James D. Belote, missionary to Hong Kong, Rev. J. Howard Young, pastor of Springfield Baptist Church and president of Tennessee Baptist Convention, Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary of Home Mission Board, and Congressman Walter H. Judd, representative from Minneapolis, Minnesota.

During the first session which starts at 2:30 Monday afternoon. Rev. John Christian, Rev. Dan Cameron and Dr. Charles Bond will participate in a panel discussion on the subject "Building a Missionary Church". Monday night's session will include testimonies from young people. Henry Guy Jackson, associational missionary for River-

side and Stone associations, will present associational work and Rev. L. G. Frey, secretary of state missions department, will explain the program of Southern Baptists at the Tuesday morning session. Mr. Lawrence Trivette, city missionary of Knoxville, will discuss city mission work and Dr. Courts Redford will bring a message on the Challenge of the Homeland Tuesday afternoon. "The Lifeline of all Missions—Cooperative Program" will be the subject of an address by Dr. W. Fred Kendall, Executive Secretary of Tennessee Baptist Convention, at the Tuesday evening session. Congressman Judd will outline The Hope of the World in the final message of the conference.

Dr. Herbert Gabhart, pastor of McLean Baptist Church of Memphis, will lead devotional periods at each session, and music will be directed by Mr. Bill Leach, music director of Redbank Church in Chattanooga.

## Baruch: Dependable Worker

TEXTS: Jeremiah 36 (Larger)—Jer. 36:4-8, 22-26, 32 (Printed)—Colossians 3:23 (Golden).

The accent should fall on one word found in the Golden Text. It is the word "heartily". If what we do is truly done "as to the Lord" every deed of ours will be, or at least should be, done heartily (the Greek word from which this is derived furnishes the prefix to our word "psychology" and suggests "vitality"). In another part of the prophecy from which our lesson text comes, Jeremiah 48:10, we read: "Cursed be he that doeth the work of the Lord deceitfully (marg., negligently)". While the topic assigned centers upon Baruch, who was indeed a dependable worker, two others deserve attention as we note in particular the printed text: Jehoiakim, the king; and Jeremiah, the prophet.

The kingdom of Judah was approaching subjugation and captivity. The time was around 600 B.C. Not many years later, the invader would arrive and Judah's glory would depart. The days were and had been evil. God was warning the people to return to Him and righteousness but to no avail. On the surface all was well, but underneath was presumptuous sinfulness. With all three persons before us, then, what may we observe here?

### A FAITHFUL SCRIBE (vv. 4-8)

Cadmus, of the Phoenicians, has been called the giver of the alphabet to the West and the father of writing. This may or may not be true. But of this we can be positive, the written word has been one of man's best gifts. So long as we continue to learn more than nine-tenths through the eye, the written page will remain tremendously important. In order to make writing helpful, men owe much to the right kind of writers; men like Baruch. Here was a scribe, or writer, who was altogether faithful to his task. He wrote as Jeremiah directed and Jeremiah was directed of the Lord. Then he was also faithful in transmitting the message to the people even as Jeremiah requested. Let us ever be grateful for those who write concerning holy matters, drawing their thoughts directly or indirectly from the Bible. Let us at the same time beware those writers and writings that appear from time to time that either ignore or seek to contradict the writings of God that are found in what we refer to as the Holy Bible. The final test as to the value of mere human writings must be determined with harmony of that Word.

### A RUTHLESS DESTROYER (vv. 22-26)

King Jehoiakim appears in no more pathetic light than here in his attempts to destroy the Word of the Lord as given by Jeremiah and delivered by Baruch. He was responsible for its deliberate burning, hoping in this manner to get rid of it forever.

But in this he was utterly mistaken. Men, in other ages and under different circumstances, have imagined that they could destroy the Bible merely by burning it. How puny their imaginations! Was it Voltaire who once proudly predicted that the time would arrive when the Bible would no longer be printed? It is said that on this exact spot, where the prediction was made, there now rests a publishing house for the Bible. Men like Ingersoll mouthed similar predictions but they have been completely negated by the facts of history. The Bible will live and thrive, the foolish predictions of little minds to the contrary notwithstanding.

### A DILIGENT PROPHET (v. 32)

Jeremiah, with courageous diligence, repeated the words which the king had burned and even added unto them. Neither he nor Baruch would be intimidated by the veiled threats of the enraged and ruthless Jehoiakim. After all it was God's message coming through them, and therefore demanded transmission. Who were they to be careless or afraid? Jeremiah realized his responsibility both to God and the people. A diligent spokesman for Him is priceless.

## "The Army Was Never Like This," Says Colonel Turned Evangelist

CULPEPPER COUNTY, Virginia, March, 1765—(BP)—Samuel Harriss, a Baptist preacher who formerly served as a colonel in the militia, has reason to wonder if military life is not less hazardous than the ministry. During recent visits to this county, where opposition to the Established Church is angrily persecuted, Harriss twice has been the object of mob violence and was arrested once.

Invited to preach in the home of a Baptist in Culpepper County recently, Harriss conducted his first meeting here without interference. He announced a second meeting for the following day and was met by a mob carrying sticks, whips, and clubs. The evangelist moved his meetings to another county to avoid violence.

On another occasion when Harriss attempted to preach in Culpepper, the leader of a gang came up and announced that the Baptist could not hold a meeting. When one of the preacher's friends objected to the interruption, a free-for-all broke out.

Fearing that the preacher might suffer serious injury in the ensuing melee, friends spirited Harriss away to a house and posted a guard at the door. Those who opposed the meeting followed, however, battered down the door, and might have harmed Harriss if his followers had not come to his aid. The gang succeeded in turning the meeting into a brawl.

Harriss has been opposed by both the lawless and the law. Culpepper authorities had the preacher arrested at another time for "disturbing the peace," charging him with being "a vagabond, a heretic, a schismatic, and a mover of sedition everywhere." At his trial he was ordered not to preach again in the county within twelve months under penalty of a prison sentence.

Harriss is one of the most prominent men of Pittsylvania County, Virginia, having served as church warden, colonel of the militia, captain of Fort Mayo, sheriff, justice of the peace, and in other influential positions. He was baptized in 1758 by Daniel Marshall, a pioneer itinerant Baptist evangelist in the South.

The former colonel has given himself without reservation to the Baptist cause. In addition to preaching with great boldness, he has turned his comfortable home into a meetinghouse for Baptists and has generously shared his wealth with less prosperous neighbors and others in need.
