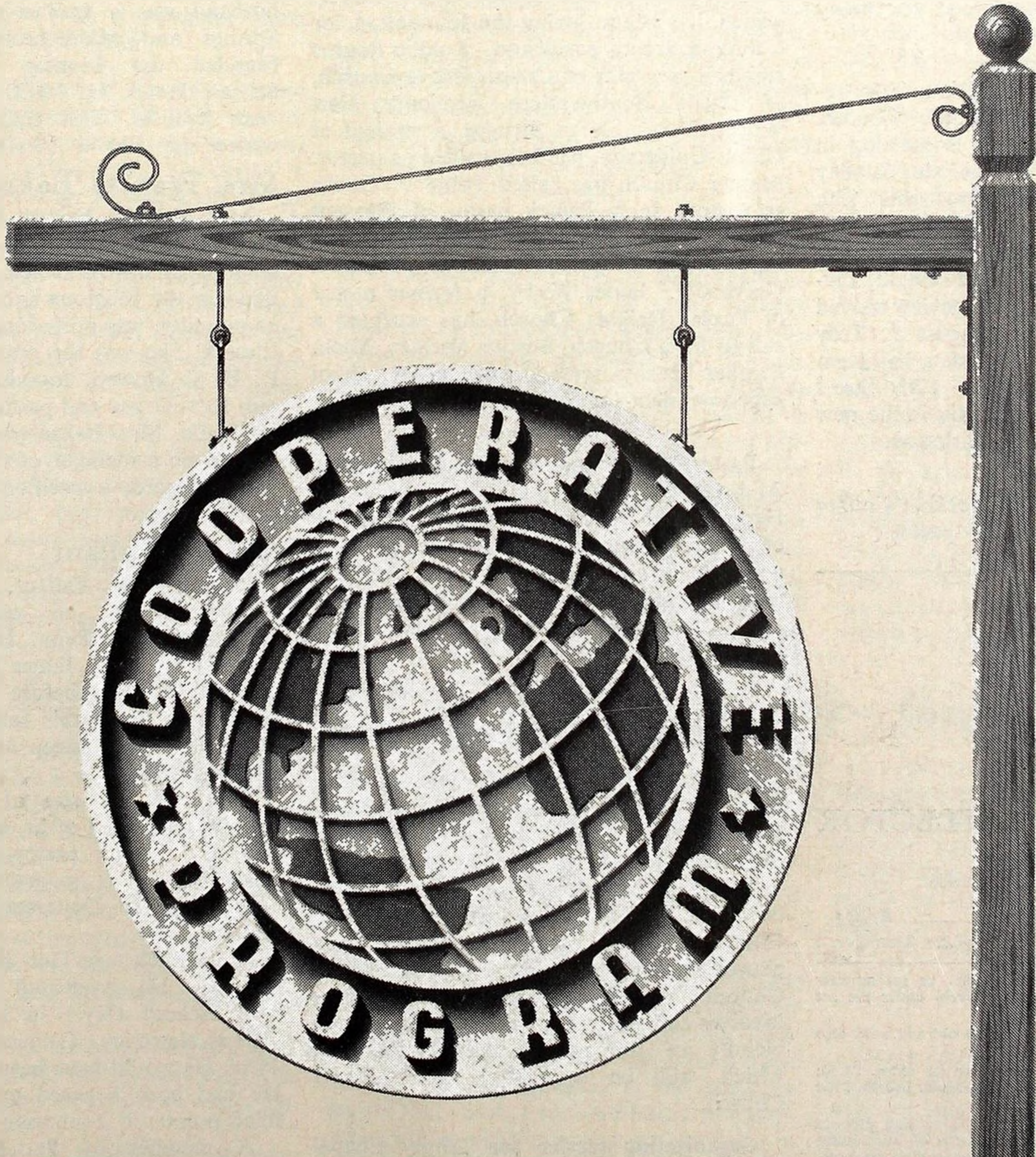

Two Churches to be Re-named

Grubbs Memorial Church building is located in the path of part of the expressway in Nashville. According to Pastor Ernest Slate the church has voted to re-locate at 142 Ewing Lane. The move will involve two undertakings. First, Grubbs Memorial Church will be constituted into a new church, using the name Hillhurst Baptist Church. The second part of the re-locating involves continuing a work in the immediate vicinity of the present church building, which will be sponsored by Hillhurst Church.

Organization service for Trinity Chapel at 1602 Gallatin Road, Nashville, will be held September 25. The chapel will be changed to church status and will be re-named Altaloma Baptist Church. It is at the intersection of Altaloma and Gallatin Road. The 259 member congregation, which has been a mission of Inglewood Church for the past 3 years, has been served by Rev. Ken Chapman as pastor for the past 2 years.

Rev. Andrew Watkins

Rev. Andrew J. Watkins, a retired Baptist minister, of Jefferson City, died August 11. He was 93. Brother Watkins was a member of First Church, Jefferson City.

Mrs. Lewis Clarkson

Mrs. Lewis Clarkson, 55, wife of a Knoxville Baptist minister, was killed instantly August 13 in a two-car collision. Mrs. Clarkson, of 4118 Middlebrook Pike, was returning from Jefferson City with a young Oak Ridge couple, Mr. and Mrs. William C. Klima, when the accident occurred. She accompanied them to Carson-Newman College earlier in the day, where Klima, enrolled as a senior. Mrs. Clarkson's husband was a former pastor of Whittle Springs and Middlebrook Churches. He founded the Morgan Baptist Church, Schaad Road, in 1942. Funeral services were held at West End Baptist Church, where she was a member.

Mrs. Frances Baker

Mrs. Frances Howell Grigsby Baker of Nashville died August 14 after an illness of several years. Mrs. Baker, prominently identified in the religious and social life of the community, was a life-long member of First Church. She was the granddaughter of Dr. R. B. C. Howell, founder of the BAPTIST AND REFLECTOR and pastor of First Church, Nashville. Mrs. Baker was the first woman to become a member of the Baptist Sunday School Board, a position she held for 25 years.

Donald Tallant

Donald Lee Tallant, 19, was killed August 6 in an auto crash near McConnellsburg, Penn. He was on a motor trip with a friend, James Mitchell, enjoying a short vacation before entering Carson-Newman College this fall. His friend was driving and fell asleep at the wheel. Don died instantly.

Don was the son of Rev. and Mrs. Francis R. Tallant of St. Matthews, Ky. His father, a former pastor of First Church, Jellico, Tenn., is an associate in the State Sunday School Department for Kentucky Baptists.

At an early age Don felt the call to the ministry. He graduated from Henderson High School (Ky.) in 1958 and entered Carson-Newman College in September, 1958. He would have been a junior this fall. He had been licensed to preach and had filled pulpits in Tennessee and Kentucky.

A member of St. Matthews Baptist Church, near Louisville, Ky., Don was superintendent of the Intermediate Department in the Sunday school and director of the Church Drama Department.

Funeral services were held at St. Matthews Church on the morning of August 9 and in the afternoon at First Church, Jellico, Tenn. Interment was in Jellico Cemetery.

August 27, with Kenneth Green, president the Polk County Brotherhood Association, will sponsor a man and boy banquet, honoring the Jr. and Int. R.A. baseball teams of the association. Rev. Julian P. Snyder of Ocoee and Atlanta will be the guest speaker. Brother Snyder is an associate in the Training Union Department, Georgia Baptist Convention.

Rev. and Mrs. John Green Cooper celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary August 5. Brother Cooper attended Hall-Moody Institute at Martin and Union University, Jackson. Ordained to preach in 1903, he served churches throughout Tennessee and in other states until 1955 when he retired because of poor health. They make their home with a daughter, Mrs. Leonard Peebles of Camden.

Five miles northeast of Greenfield stood a small but inspirational church, Gearin Chapel, with an enrollment of 70 people until during a revival July 31-August 6 God's richest blessings showered upon the entire community, opening the heart of one member for rededication, five by letter and 26 by baptism. The following Sunday morning, instead of the usual 55 for Sunday school there were 94. Bobby Campbell was the evangelist with the assistant of Earnest L. Winscott, pastor of Gearin Chapel Church.

John L. Shoun, associational missionary of Campbell Association for the past three and a half years, has resigned effective August 31, to enter Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, N. C., and to become pastor of Reed's Chapel Church nearby Siler City, N. C.

Mitchell Bennett, pastor of First Church, Savannah, began his ministry as the new pastor of First Church, Carterville, Ill., August 7. He had been at Savannah since December, 1952. Some accomplishments while at Savannah include 369 additions and the budget tripled. The church purchased four and a half acres of ground for building and completed an annex at a cost of \$50,000. The church is now engaged in building a home for the pastor. Two missions were also established. Brother Bennett succeeds C. R. Walker at the Carterville church.

Dr. Tennessee Jenkins, Professor Emerita of History, Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn., this week observed her birthday anniversary at her home in Jefferson City. For many years she taught at Carson-Newman and was the first president of the Hyatian Literary Society. She is recognized as one of the college's outstanding graduates and a leading professor.

The Church Nominating Committee

A church is a spiritual organism. It also is an organization for effective witness and ministry. As the churches face the beginning of a new year, which for many starts in the early Fall, the necessity of reorganizing the teaching, training and educational forces of the church is imperative.

A church needs to be well organized. For this purpose, a nominating committee is usually appointed. In many of our churches, the nominating committee is already at work making a thorough study of the church, the places of service to be filled, and the personnel available for the various positions. The work of the nominating committee is one of the most important in the whole life of the church. The effectiveness of the church for the year ahead depends very largely upon how this church fulfills its responsibility. There are always the faithful workers who can be counted upon and who are therefore too often placed under too many responsibilities. The nominating committee may be inclined to overload these people. Particularly is

this so unless the committee consciously endeavors to enlarge the working force of the church and secure new teachers and officers.

Church members need to be enlisted and given responsibility. Ideally there should be a place of service for every member and every member in his place. Sometimes people are elected to positions that they cannot effectively fill. If there has been such a misfit in the organization, the nominating committee should do what it can in the reorganization that comes at this time of year to move such a person into a place where they can serve more effectively. Life is not static, and an organization should not be static. That's why the work of the nominating committee is so tremendously important. Its task must be done with much prayer and with much intelligence and with the sole motive of making the church more effective in its whole program.

Better To Do More

We are in danger of losing the freedom we so glibly sing about, here in the U.S.A. There is grave danger that we and our children may be deprived of the very blessings we enjoy. Now we must do more for freedom than extol it in song. Dr. James E. Coggin of Fort Worth, Texas, former pastor in Memphis, drove home this truth the other day. He told Ridgecrest assembly Sunday School conference delegates that four things need to be seen today as we look at our nation:

1. Our heritage. We sing, "Land where my fathers died." That is the source of our heritage enjoyed as American citizens. Liberty cost our forefathers dearly.
2. Our freedom. We sing, "From every mountain side let freedom ring." That has been our heritage's outgrowth.
3. Our danger. We sing, "Long may our land be bright with freedom's holy light." Here is the insidious danger—freedom's light may go out. This peril is altogether too real. We are foolish to ignore it.
4. Our hope. We sing, "Protect us by thy might, great God our king." Therein is the hope for America.

Let us make our coming national election for the Presidency of the USA a matter of deep daily concern and of earnest prayer that the people of this land will make the choice which best safeguards the religious and political freedoms bought by the blood of our fathers.

Belmont To Care For All Students Despite Fire Loss

NASHVILLE—Despite heavy fire loss at Belmont's Hail Hall Sunday night, August 21st, the college is making all necessary arrangements so no students will fail to get accommodations. This assurance was phoned to the BAPTIST AND REFLECTOR by President Herbert Gabhart late Sunday night after fire in the brick structure was brought under control.

Caused by lightning, according to the college night watchman, the fire destroyed the fourth floor and did extensive damage to one of the three structures in residence row on the campus east side. Damage was said to be covered by insurance. The building housed the music and drama activities of the college.

Dr. Gabhart said the loss would not handicap Belmont, "We will go right on. We don't want any student to feel that they can't be cared for here." The college opens September 12.

President Asks Nation To Observe Prayer Day

WASHINGTON—(BP)—America enjoys the blessings of liberty "by the grace of God" according to President Eisenhower in his proclamation of A Day of Prayer for the People of the United States.

Wednesday, October 5, is the National Day of Prayer as set by the President under instruction from Congress.

In his proclamation the President called upon his countrymen to remember that "the abundant gifts of our Creator" are not deserved "by our own righteousness," that the heritage of faith lays upon its recipients a responsible stewardship, that the nation should place its trust in the keeping of God's commandments, and that the nation should strive for the achievement "of the world that is meant to be."

Be On Guard

A spurious paper alleged to be the "oath" taken by the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic laymen's organization, has been circulated among some people recently as if it were genuine. In the interest of truth and fair play we strongly deplore this. Even though it was printed in the Congressional Record in 1913, it has since been proven to be false. This spurious Knights of Columbus oath was fabricated by some unscrupulous person a number of years ago to serve his own evil purpose.

Let our people be on guard against accepting or spreading false accusations against anyone.—The Editor

A PROCLAMATION

Whereas by the grace of God we live in a good land where each citizen can enjoy the blessings of liberty; and

Whereas our forebearers did establish in this land a nation whose law defends and whose spirit ever nourishes that liberty; and

Whereas the Congress, by a joint resolution approved April 17, 1952 (66 Stat. 64), sought to remind our citizens of this heritage by providing that the president "shall set aside and proclaim a suitable day each year, other than a Sunday, as a National Day of Prayer, on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer and meditation":

Now, therefore, I, Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States of America, do hereby set aside Wednesday, the fifth day of October, 1960, as a National Day of Prayer; and I call upon my countrymen to observe it, remembering:

First, that it is not by our strength alone, nor by our own righteousness, that we have deserved the abundant gifts of our Creator;

Second, that the heritage of a faith born of hope and raised in sacrifice lays upon its heirs the high calling of being generous and responsible stewards in our own and among the kindred nations of the earth;

Third, that in this time of testing we shall ever place our trust in the keeping of God's commandments, knowing that He who has brought us here requires justice and mercy in return;

And finally, that as we lift our thankful hearts to Him, we will see clearly the vision of the world that is meant to be and set our hearts resolutely toward the achievement of it.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington this twenty-second day of July in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-fifth.

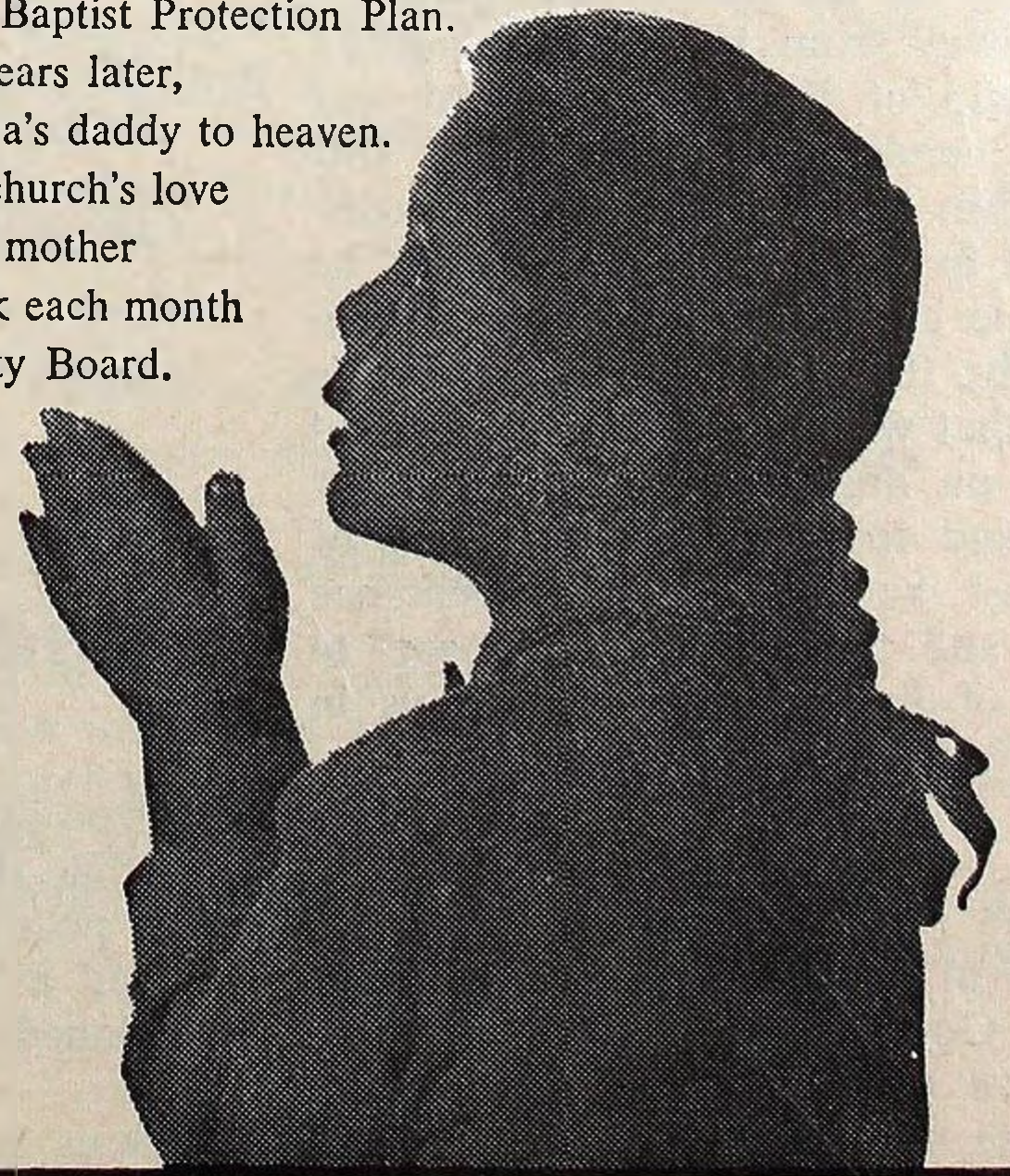

The Folly Of Forsaking God

TEXTS: Isaiah 20; 30; 31 (Larger)—Isaiah 30; 1-3, 15-18 (Printed).

Not many days ago a former president of the United States addressed a national political convention. The aged statesman spoke with deep sincerity and earnestness. His words were filled with wisdom and permeated with anxious concern. He voiced the warning to America in the rapid rise of crime and vice. He called upon his viewers and listeners to return to righteous living. By implication, if not by direct statement, he suggested that our national strength lies in our trust in God and in our living in conformity with His moral laws. Aside from political considerations, it was a moving appeal and one calculated to produce worthwhile results.

The prophet Isaiah, more than twenty-five centuries ago, spoke in a similar vein. He warned his people not to depend upon material well-being, at the sacrifice of morality (individually and nationally) for their security. The Lord spoke through him in solemn and positive terms, reminding them that their safety resided in spiritual devotion to Him and in dedication to the doing of His will. The time was around 700 B. C. Hezekiah was king over Judah. Assyria was the threatening foe. An international crisis loomed large.

Foolish Forsaking (vv. 1-3)

The Lord, through His spokesman, had but one word for the people who persisted in turning away from Him in dependence upon the help of Egypt. That word was "woe". He condemned their foolish forsaking of Him and warned that their disappointment in Egypt's assistance would be tragic. Shame and confusion awaited them in their folly. The lesson for us today is clear. It is that we must depend upon God rather than on ourselves or our allies for protection and security. Our first line of defense must be in personal repentance from sins and absolute commitment to God's way of living as revealed to us in the Holy Bible. Any other dependence insures ruin.

Faithless Fear (vv. 16-17)

The basis of a nation's fears is its faithlessness to God. So said Isaiah in these verses before us. When the people said, "We will flee upon horses"; Isaiah replied, "Therefore shall ye flee". In this there was nothing arbitrary, for defeat was inherent in their attitude. It was a case of their placing their trust in an unworthy source. Since they depended upon fickle and weak Egypt, and Egypt failed them, there remained nothing else to do but to flee in

terror. And it is always so. When an individual, or a group of individuals, depend upon an unworthy source of help they invite chaos in the end. And herein lies the tragedy of mere materialism. "One thousand shall flee at the rebuke of one", Isaiah further declares. This is another way of stating that the Eternal One on one's side makes an absolute majority and therefore makes for invincibility. Thus the wisdom of our former president becomes apparent. In a background of national concern, not to say downright uneasiness, for ultimate survival against a cruel foe; he stressed in his address the need for righteousness among the

American people. This, he implied, is our greatest need in these perilous days.

Firm Foundation (vv. 15-18)

To return to God is to find rest, or security, Isaiah was inspired to promise to Judah in their time of imminent disaster. Note the classic words given here, "in quietness and confidence shall be your strength". What better way could there be for their improvement of morale? And morale is always important, as witnessed in our recent wars. Without it, military equipment and brilliant strategy are of no consequence. But with it, mountains of difficulty can be overcome. "And therefore will the Lord wait", Isaiah says. He stands anxious to bestow his blessing of deliverance. But there is the other side, as seen in, "blessed are all they that wait for him". Thus we glimpse specifically the firmest and most reliable fortification for those who are threatened by the enemy. It lies within the realm of the spiritual.



Secret of the Wasp's Nest*

If you investigated far enough, you would find that the paper of this magazine was made possible by two young men who discovered a multimillion dollar secret in an abandoned wasp's nest. It happened like this.

About one hundred years ago a young papermaker in Germany finished his day's work at the mill and took a short cut through the woods to his home. On the way he accidentally trod on a fallen wasp's nest. Without quite knowing why, young Hermann Keller picked up the soft gray mass and carried it home. There he set it on

a shelf, and then in the press of other business he forgot it.

That is, he forgot about it until one day a week later when a friend visited him. Noticing the strange object, Keller's friend asked about it. The two men began discussing it and soon Keller, aided by his friend who had some knowledge of chemistry began taking it apart to learn something of its construction.

The secret, they discovered, was that the clever insects used the fibers of the spruce tree, grinding it to a fine pulp, and adding saliva. Thus they made their nest which closely resembled paper.

The youth's next step was to experiment with spruce fibers, hot water, and a small quantity of rags. At that time all paper

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was made from rags and the cost of making it was very high.

To their amazement, Keller and his friend discovered they had created a wonderful new kind of paper. It not only was strong and tough and capable of quickly absorbing printer's ink but also the boys felt sure it could be produced for almost nothing as compared with the papermaking process then in use.

Having wrested the secret of pulp papermaking from the insects, Keller now set about building a machine to manufacture his "wasp paper." He obtained a patent

on his invention in 1844. Following that, mills for the manufacture of pulp paper were gradually set up, opening the way for today's widespread production of books, magazines, and newspapers throughout the world.

Nowadays thousands of plants all over the world make paper for books, magazines, and hundreds of other paper products, such as drinking cups, towels, handkerchiefs, and boxes. And it all began when a young man trod on an old wasp's nest.

Quiet Games*

Sometimes parties get too noisy. Then it is a good idea to have a few quiet games on hand. These games should be the kind that can be played while the guests are resting from more strenuous things. Be sure to have lots of extra paper and sharp pencils handy for the first two.

In the first game multiply the number of your brothers by 2. Add 3. Multiply by 5. Add the number of your sisters. Multiply by 10. Add the number of your living grandparents. Subtract 150.

The first number in the answer will be the number of brothers you have. The second number will be the number of sisters. The last number will be the number of grandparents you have.

For the second game write the numbers from 1 to 9 in a straight row. Multiply this row of numbers by any number in the row. Multiply the answer by 9. The result will always be the same: The first number with which you multiplied will be the answer right across the row with the exception of one zero in the next to last place on the right.

For the third game you will not need pencils but marshmallows. Say, "I never felt flat as that felt felt." Add a marshmallow and repeat the sentence. Continue until your mouth is full of marshmallows. The one who gets the most marshmallows in his mouth wins the game.

An other game that is fun must be played in the dark. Otherwise, you will have to blindfold the players. Give each player a paper and pencil and tell him to draw the outline of a house. Of course, he is going to think that is easy, but wait.

When he has the house drawn and is waiting for others to finish, he will forget just where he has drawn the house. When you are sure each player has lost his place on the paper, give instructions for filling in doors, windows, a chimney, a tree in the yard, and other details. Then turn on the lights.

Probably you will find a cat on the chimney instead of the fence, and the moon will be peering out from behind the curtains in the window.

This last game can really keep one player puzzled. Choose someone to leave the room. While he is gone, select a leader to go through various sitting down actions.

Treasurer's Report For Third Quarter

Convention Year 1959-1960

Below is given the report of the Treasurer of the Tennessee Baptist Convention for the third quarter of the convention year. This report includes totals of all funds received from November 1, 1959, through July 31, 1960. Funds which were mailed prior to November 1, 1959, but which reached this office after that date are included. Funds mailed before July 31, 1960, but which reached this office after that date are not included but will be included in the next quarter's report.

Below we give the totals and a comparison with receipts for the same period last year.

The above figures do not include funds sent directly to the Foreign Mission Board since they no longer report these gifts as formerly.

The gain in Cooperative Program giving has been far less than at the same period last year and unless churches make every effort to get their gifts in before October 31, 1960, we shall not reach the goal set by the convention last year. At this time last year the gain was \$252,613.81. You will note from the above figures that the gain for this year at the close of July was only \$66,134.56.

Gifts for the last quarter will have to be increased tremendously if the goal is to be reached. This can be done if the churches regain the fine record which they set in the first two quarters of this convention year.

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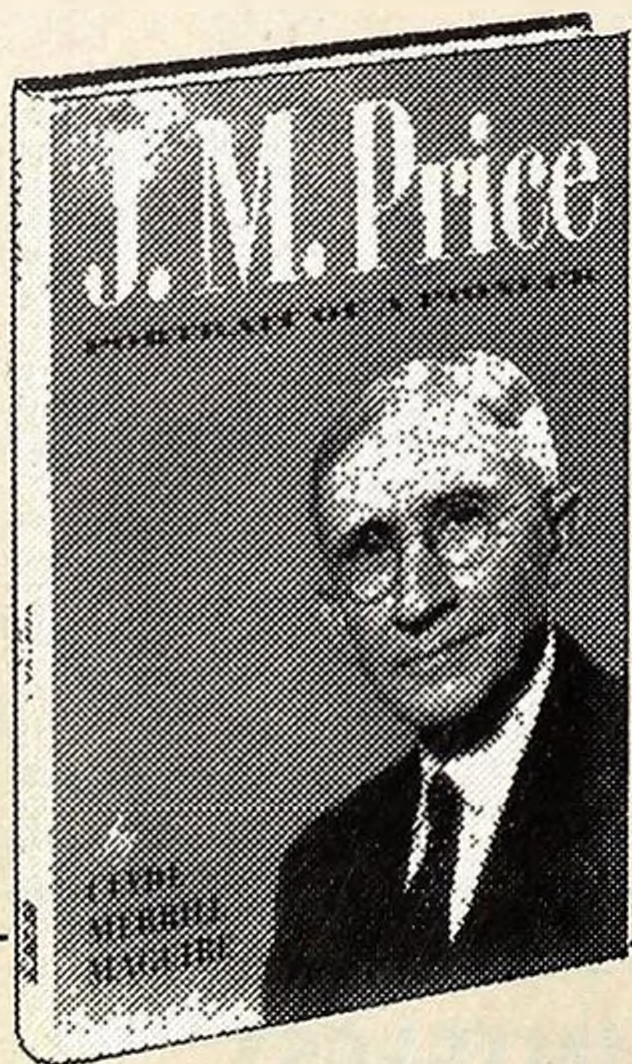

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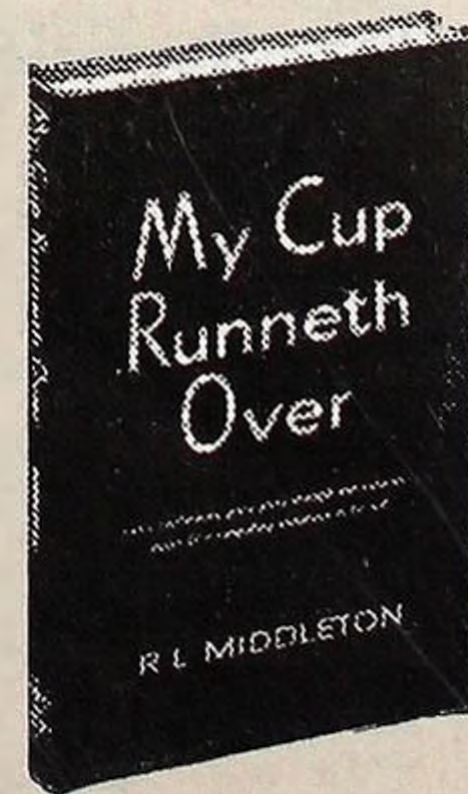
