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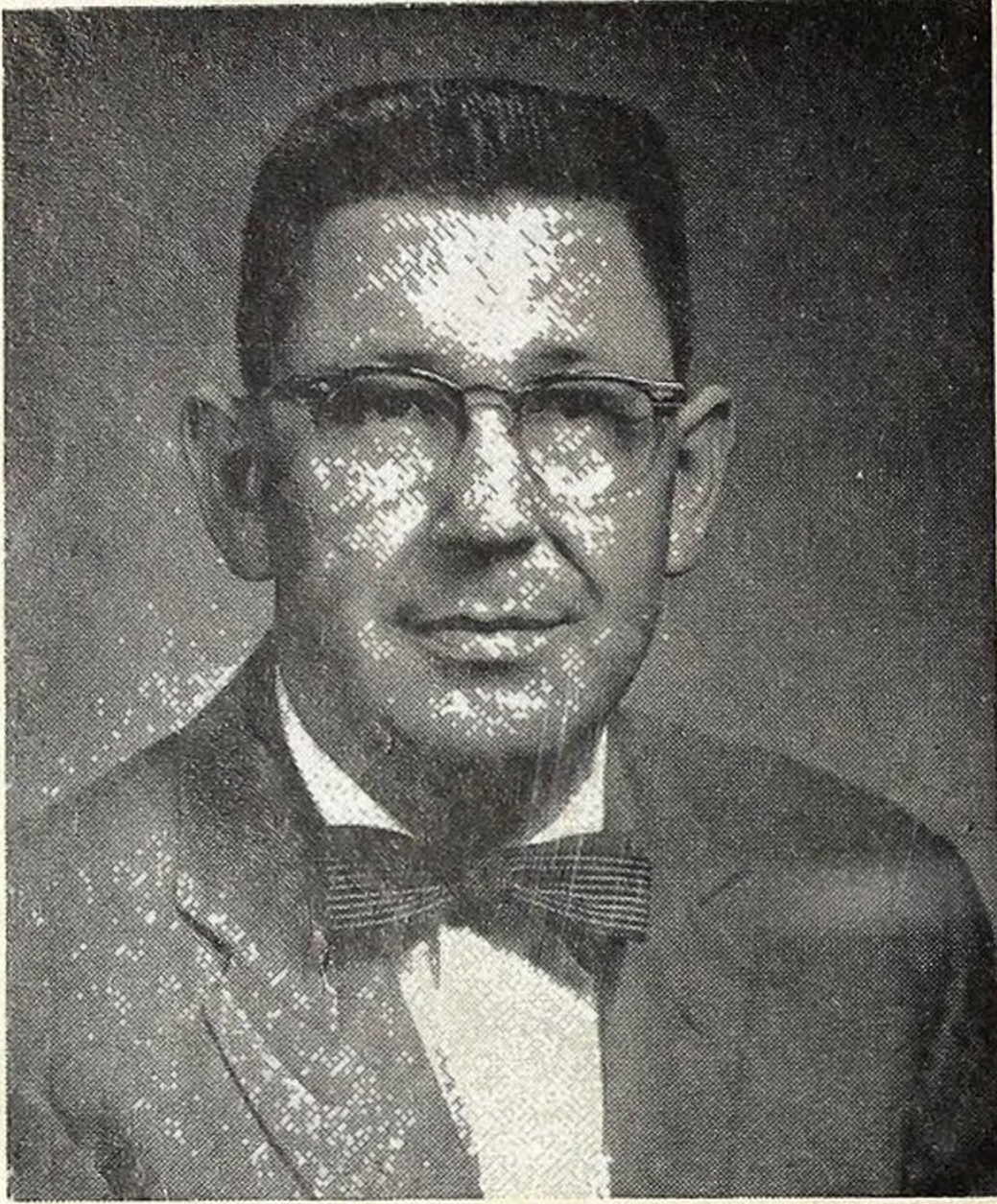

Executive Committee Has 12 Proposals

NASHVILLE (BP)—The budget for 1963, a new procedure for amending the constitution of the Convention, and removing exceptions for rotating "local board" members are among the dozen or more recommendations from the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee here.

They will go before the 1962 session of the Convention at San Francisco next month for adoption.

Other recommendations make changes in technical wording to bring the constitution and bylaws into closer harmony with each other, provide for representation of Indiana Baptists on several SBC agencies and call

for printed ballots to be used by messengers in voting.

Executive Secretary Porter Routh of Nashville said the total proposed 1963 budget for SBC agencies is \$19,792,500. This is the basic amount needed to meet operating and capital needs. Any funds received beyond this sum would go to foreign and home missionary advance only.

The proposed 1963 budget compares with the grand total 1962 budget of \$19,013,500.

The Executive Committee recommends that the Convention adopt a procedure for amending its constitution so that subsequent amendments must be approved at two successive Conventions.

Presently, amendments may be presented at one session, without a vote, and voted on at the following year's session.

Another recommendation calls for eliminating the exception which has been granted to "local board members" of the SBC agencies. Presently, agencies may retain "any local member whose technical services . . . in such matters as medical, legal, and financial operation seems to make it advisable that he be continued as a board member."

"Local members" live in the city, or within a short distance of the agency on whose board they serve. Those covered by present exemption have not had to rotate off the boards periodically as have other members of the agencies.

To make the adjustment easier, the recommendation is that it be implemented gradually over two years and take full effect by time of the 1964 Convention.

Indiana Baptists reported more than 25,000 members of affiliated churches, which has made them eligible to have representatives on all agencies whose charters permit.

Printed ballots for the messengers (elected by churches to vote on Convention affairs) would be provided when they register their attendance at the Convention. A count of important votes, such as the election of officers, would be announced only if a majority of messengers requested it, if the recommendation passes. Vote counts are not presently reported, only the outcome.

The Executive Committee recommended that a proposed week on the Convention calendar to promote the Cooperative Program be "postponed for the time being." The Cooperative Program is the financial plan to support state and nationwide Baptist work.

Other ways in which the Cooperative Program may be promoted are listed.

In continuing to prepare an organization manual of SBC agencies, the Executive Committee will present for adoption the program descriptions of two more agencies—The Southern Baptist Foundation and Southern Baptist Hospitals.

It seems one of the most important statements ever given to man was the suggestion subtly made to our Lord by the Tempter in the wilderness and the magnificent answer given by Jesus to the suggestion.

"If thou art the Son of God (there is no article in the original), command that these stones be made bread." The devil here alludes to the Father's words at the baptism of Jesus: "This is my Son, the Beloved." The devil challenges our Saviour to use His Divine power to appease His hunger and really prove to Himself and others that He is the Son of God.

He answers: "It is written (stands written and is still in force) man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

Bread is a mere detail in man's dependence upon God. But, alas, we have, as Christians, made our lives almost exclusively dependent upon it. Christ's first temptation was like man's first temptation in the Garden of Eden—to eat of the "forbidden fruit." Jesus is here tempted to make bread out of stones.

Men have always been tempted to sin just here. There are two great philosophies of life. One says man shall not live by bread alone; the other says he shall.

Christians have said the first; communists the second. If it is true that we are right (and we Christians say we believe it) we ought then to live like it. Someone recently said, if the material aspects of civilization were taken out of our lives, would we have much left?

Those who believe in bread alone will win out—and should—if we say we believe in that which "is above and beyond bread" but really believe almost exclusively in bread. The great trouble is you can't tell too much practical difference between people who believe in two diametrically opposed philosophies of life.

It is time for the Lord's people to "come out from among them and be separate." Let us get down to business and "consecrate our selves to the Lord" this day.

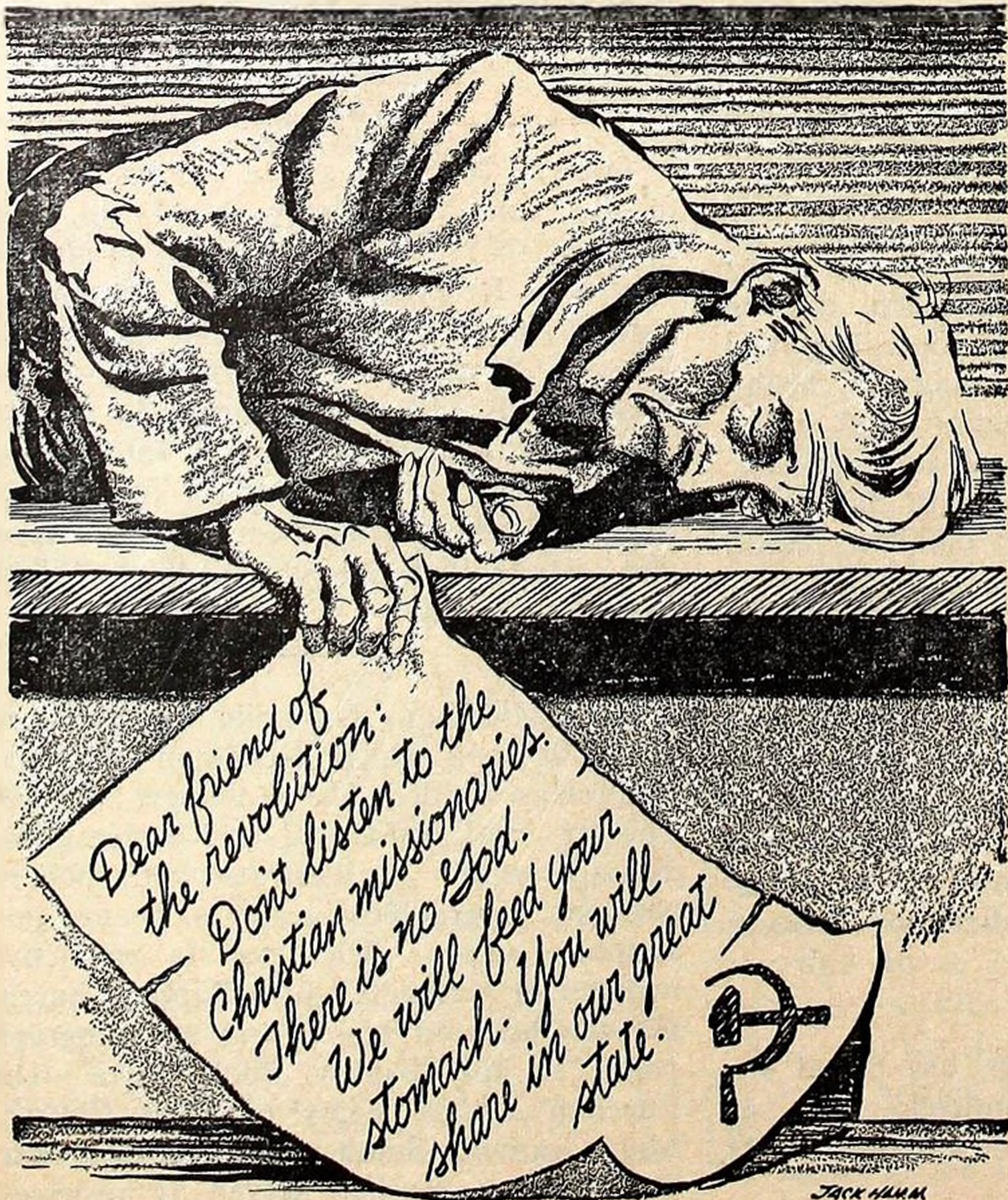
Editorially

Grievous Affront To Religious Rights

Labor unions should hang their heads in shame at what happened in Milwaukee the other day. A union member was fined in county court because she exercised the right to attend her church rather than attend union meetings on Sunday mornings. Union officials sued her in court when she refused to pay a \$5 fine they assessed on her when she chose to go and worship at her church Sunday rather than attend a union meeting. The court upheld the union, and also assessed her with \$5.40 court cost.

Mrs. Mary Ellen Venson, the union member, protested the fine assessed against her, but when she paid it in court, she said she wanted to find "someone who cares" about her right to worship on Sunday instead of attending union meetings. "I thought the Constitution gave us the right of freedom of worship," this union member said. "I just wish I could find someone who cares, who is willing to stand up and be counted in this."

The Laborer Is Worthy Of His Hire

We say this with particular reference to retired ministers of the gospel. And we write it with reference to their pay as supply preacher or interim pastor. Churches should play fair in this matter. Possibly some fail to do so. A retired preacher has a lessened income. Sometimes it is very meager. Churches do well to call upon retired ministers to fill their pulpit when their pastor is away, and their services can be used with profit in many instances as interim pastors. It is good to know that these men of God, many of whom are so capable and richly experienced, are being given opportunity to continue their meaningful ministry. Certainly the churches profit by calling upon them. They come to the pulpit with a blessing for those who hear them. They are available and they are called upon. But no church should take advantage of the situation. These servants of God should be paid adequately. It is a disgrace to any church that fails to do so.

Contrasts

America should have been spared from the Soviet astronaut. He used his visit here as a pad to launch materialistic propaganda. Mr. Titov, visiting the Seattle World's Fair, told the press he "saw no God or angels" in circling the earth 17 times. "No God helped build our rocket. It was made by our people," this arrogant atheist continued. "I don't believe in God. I believe in man, his strength, his possibilities, and his reason." Major Titov used every opportunity while in the USA to claim Russia's superiority, to turn up his nose at America and to parade his atheism.

In contrast Colonel John H. Glenn, Jr., America's first man to orbit the earth, has been cited as a living example of faith, morality, and integrity of character. Given a citation by the Military Chaplain's Association of the USA for the good influence he has had on the young and immature service men he strengthens the qualities of character on which the survival of America depends. The citation reads, "His is a living faith which professes an humble acknowledgment of the eternal truth that religion is not the anchor of survival in crisis but rather the 'daily living bread of life'."

—Tests Of Our Faith—

TEXTS: I John 1:1 to 2:17 (Larger)—I John 1:5-10; 2:1-6 (Printed)—I Thessalonians 5:21 (Golden).

Does the faith we profess as Christians ring true? Is it genuine? Such questions are indeed sobering when faced with sincerity, for we need to be sure lest we be guilty of either deceiving others or (more serious) be deceived ourselves. The Golden Text: "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good" has appropriateness on this point.

We are reminded also that many and varied tests are practiced among us at present. The teacher tests the student both for the benefit of the teacher as well as the student. One of the goals is for improvement. The scientist tests the theory in the laboratory with the hope that new truth may be discovered. The employer tests the prospective employee to ascertain whether or not he can perform the task involved.

Our printed texts furnish at least two tests for the Christian's faith. Each of these is two-fold in nature. Each looks in two different directions. The first, as indicated below, looks manward. The second looks towards God. The first has to do with the here and now, for the most part. The second is largely concerned with the hereafter, although not entirely so. What are they?

Company and Conduct (I Jn. 1:5-10)

The Christian can test his own faith, first of all, by examining his own inner life. With whom does he really like to associate? In what kind of company does he find enjoyment and satisfaction? If his faith is genuine he will find enrichment and encouragement among other Christians. This concept is glimpsed in the saying, "Birds of a feather flock together".

The faith of the Christian will surely be tested, in the second place, by others as they observe his daily conduct. This may prove to be uncomfortable, in some instances, but it is inevitable. We have no right to profess one way of living with our tongues and an entirely opposite way with the rest of our bodies. The writer of our verses here uses a frank word for such a procedure. It is, of course, that of liar. What could be more pointedly descriptive?

The company of the Christian will affect as well as reveal his conduct. Another way of saying it is that fellowship influences faithfulness, and vice-versa. The genuine Christian will reflect the fellowship he has with other Christians, and in so doing he will manifest true fidelity to the One whom all seek to serve. This inter-relatedness is clearly taught in verse seven. Read it.

Paraclete and Propitiator (I Jn. 2:1-6)

The word, "advocate", used here is practically equivalent to another used elsewhere and perhaps by the same writer. It has been translated "comforter" but another word would be "paraclete". The first word refers to Christ. The second refers to the Holy Spirit. The word "advocate" literally means "called to"; while "paraclete" literally means "called alongside". We as Christians should feel secure when we recall that Christ is, in legal terminology, our "attorney" before God who will judge all men. We can, then, "turn our case over" to Christ without fear or uneasiness after we have confessed our sins to Him in sincere repentance. This can be regarded as a kind of test of our faith, so far as our relationship to God is concerned.

Closely connected with Christ's being our advocate is the fact that He is also our propitiator, for verse two here refers to Him as being the "propitiation for our sins". That is to say, Christ's death upon the Cross for our sins causes God to be favorably inclined toward us. When we come under Christ's shed blood, by faith and repentance, God pardons us and in so doing makes possible our fellowship with Him.

Thus it is that Christ as our advocate, or paraclete, validates our faith before God. Thus it is that Christ as our propitiator, or substitutionary sacrifice, becomes the foundation of our acceptance with God. We do well to link the two together. This begins here and now but its results are fully realized in the hereafter. These two two-fold tests encompass much, very much.

Explore the Biggest Satellite*

The biggest earth satellite is the moon. It is the only satellite that seems to stay still long enough for you to get a good look. You can explore the moon just by looking at it. You don't need a telescope. Look up in the sky by day or by night. See what you can see on the moon.

The best time to see the face of the man in the moon is when the moon is full. There are other things to see when the moon is less bright. Watch for them at different times of the month, and see how the pictures on the moon seem to change.

Look at the left eye of the man in the moon. Concentrate on it. You should be able to see the rabbit in the moon as it jumps out of the man's eye.

Now that you see the rabbit, look at it very sharply. Let your eye run down the moon and away from the rabbit. Move

your eye back up toward the rabbit and say to yourself, "That's no rabbit. It's a woman's long hair."

Move your eye down from the woman's hair, and look for her face. The lady in the moon has her mouth and chin near the center of the moon where you usually find the nose of the man in the moon. The lady is looking to your left. She looks away from the rabbit.

Some people see an angel in the moon. Can you? The angel's wings are the eyes of the man in the moon. Some people say they see two angels.

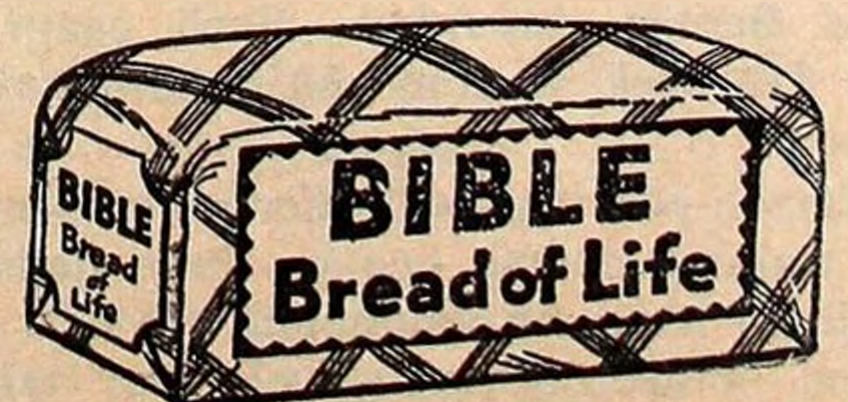
Other people sometimes see a second man in the moon when the moon is not bright. He is on the half away from the rabbit and is running after the rabbit. Some say this is no second man at all but the head of a horse or moose.

Others can clearly see a third man in the moon. The third man in the moon is upside down. He stretches all across the top of the moon from one side to the other. His feet and legs are where you saw the rabbit. His waist is at the top of the moon. He is all bent over, with his head near the mouth of the first man in the moon. He is carrying a bundle on his back.

The third man in the moon is sometimes called Santa Claus. Sometimes he is called the poor man who is carrying sticks home to build a fire and cook some soup.

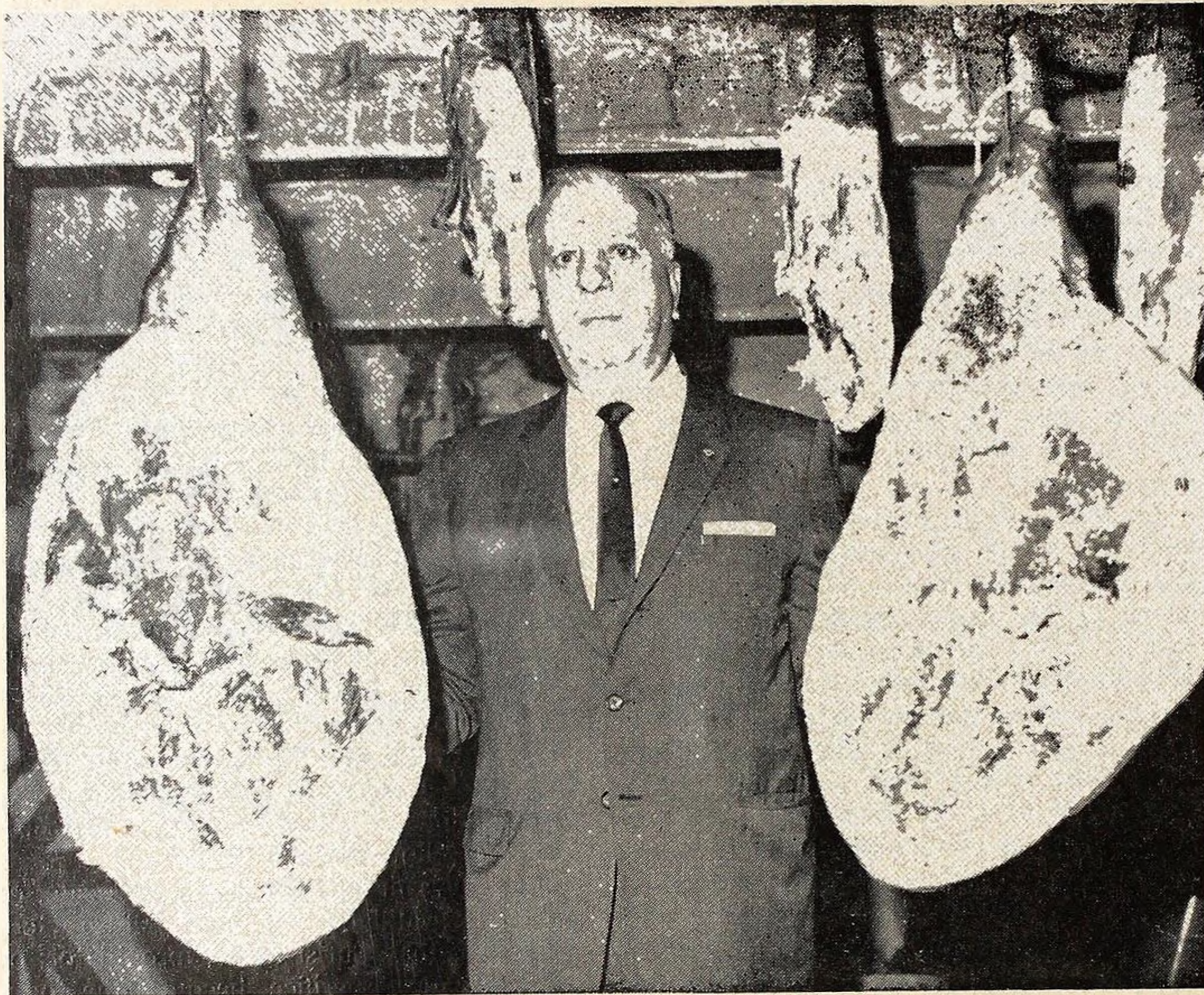
How many other people, animals, birds, and fish can you see in the moon?

College Credit Offered To Camp Counselors

NASHVILLE—Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn., will again offer college credit for summer counselors participating in a pre-camp counselor's training course at Ridgecrest, N.C., boys' and girls' camps this year.

The course is an orientation program to camp counseling designed especially for leadership at Camp Ridgecrest for boys and Camp Crestridge for girls, Ridgecrest, N.C. It is scheduled for June 1-9.

The two camps—for boys and girls 8-16 years of age—are part of the 1,100-acre tract of land maintained by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, for Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly. Each camp has two five-week sessions during the summer season.

Carson-Newman will offer participants of the training course two or three hours of credit in its camp counseling physical education course, or individuals may take it

without credit. Those who wish to enroll for credit should write the camps for an outline of study immediately. In this way students may begin their required outside reading before arriving for the course.

Program directors include Miss Mae Idins and coach "Frosty" Holt, of the Carson-Newman physical education department, and Wayne H. Chastain and Miss Arvine Bell, Ridgecrest and Crestridge camp directors, respectively. A faculty of 10 others has already been named.
