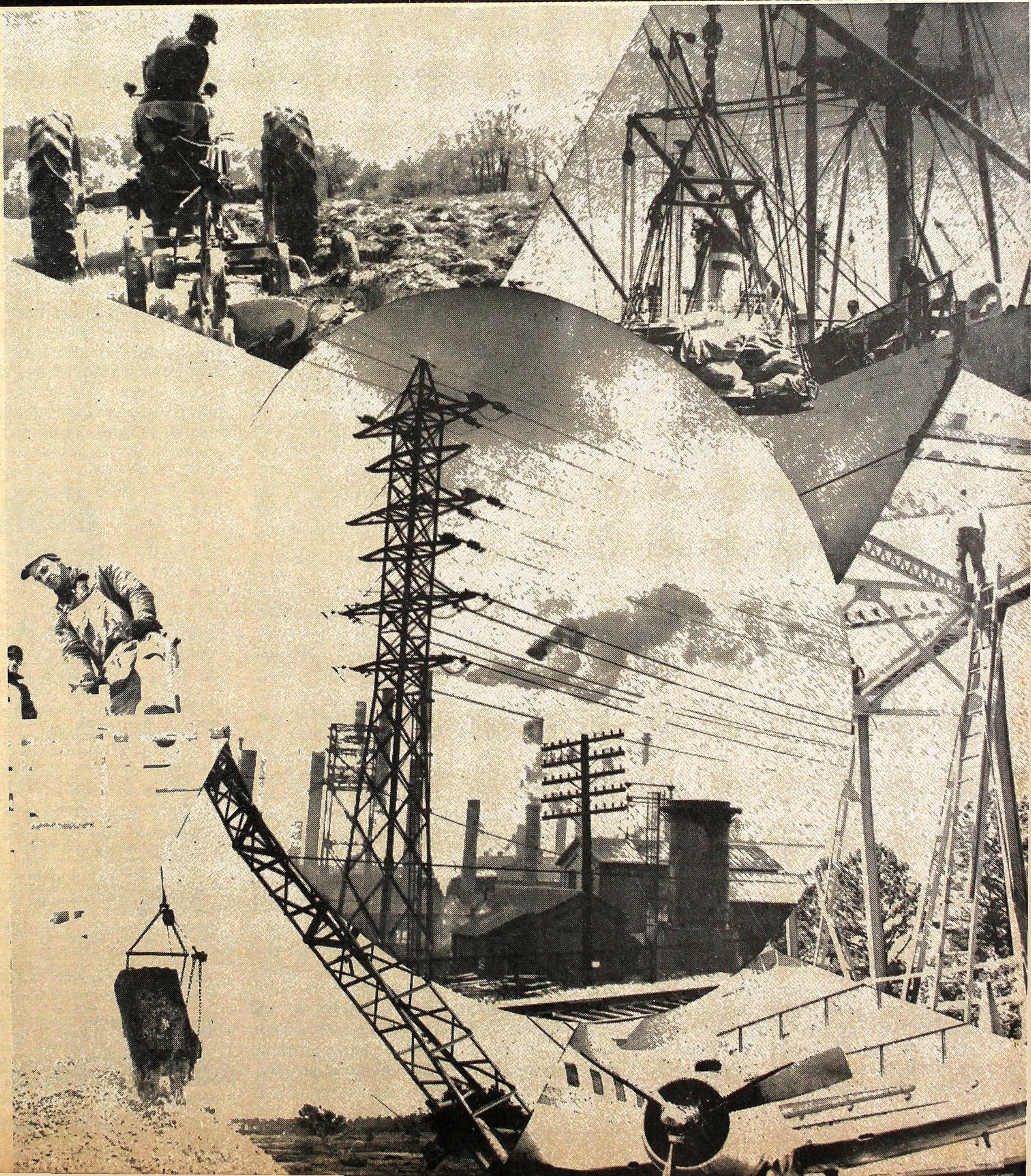

Objectives Of Our Tennessee Baptist Schools

Believing that secular education lacks a vital part of what Christian youth must have in order to attain its full potential in service to God and man, Tennessee Baptists have established colleges to give youth a *complete* education of hand, mind and soul. The following objectives and methods have been set to meet these goals.



To Accomplish the Will of God. Our Baptist schools gladly acknowledge their absolute allegiance to the realization of His Will and Way in the education of young men and women.

Our schools propose to lead their students into an expanding Christian experience through the influence of a wholesome Christian atmosphere and a Christian faculty.

To Educate Leaders for the Denomination. Your Baptist colleges acknowledge their dependence upon the Baptist denomination of which they are a part and pledge their loyalty to it in fulfilling its mission of Christian service.

We affirm without reservation, therefore, the obligation of our schools to require of their graduate instruction in the Bible, in denominational principles, and in missions at home and abroad that they may be properly prepared to fulfill their responsibility as Christian leaders.

The Christian college is an institution for the recruitment and training of personnel for church vocations. It is a vital force in preparing Christian youth to meet the demands of Christian citizenship and leadership in all vocations. Christian parents, leaders, and youth come to recognize the unique ministry of the Christian college in blending Christian purpose with maturing mentality, and Christian convictions with the pattern of youthful aspiration.

To Produce Poised and Refined Christian Men and Women Who Will Practice Christian Principles of Living. The Tennessee Baptist schools seek to create in their students the practice of Christian principles in every area of life. They emphasize personal honesty, decency, clean speech, temperance, and clean living. They demonstrate these precepts in their own relationships on the various campuses and in their respective communities and provide an environment conducive to the founding of Christian homes.

College years are impressionable years.

Dr. Fite has been president of Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn., the past fourteen years.

They are years when young people normally make the most important decisions of life. The real reason for Christian education is the difference it makes in how Christian young people live their lives. The ideals of worthy life and service will take control in a Christian college environment.

For the youth who has had the advantage of a Christian home, the early college years bring the most severe test of personal convictions, standards of conduct, and sense of values. Away from the immediate influence of parents and the home church, the student needs the Christian college.

The trustees, the administration and Christian faculty are basic factors in making a college Christian. Another vital factor is the influence of Christian young people upon other young people. Since young people do not want to be different from the group, social pressures are tremendous. The influence of Christian young people with a pre-disposition toward worthy activities, living, and objectives often makes the difference between righteous and corrupt living. When the majority of students are Christian the pressure is in the right direction.

To Develop Socially Responsible Citizens Who Will Contribute to the Quality of Living in the Community. Our Baptist schools seek to equip their students with a basic knowledge of American institutions and our historical, political, social, scientific, and religious heritage; they produce good citizens concerned with perpetuating the best in our American tradition, and to aspire to leadership in the promotion of civic, national, and international understanding and good will.

Our schools are essentially service institutions. They want to utilize their resources to minister to the people in the church, and in their communities.

To Maintain a High Level of Scholarship. One of the major purposes of our Baptist schools is to give the students as broad a background in the liberal arts subjects as possible as a preparation for a rich cultural life and the varied vocations in which they may serve. The schools endeavor to teach their students to utilize scientific habits and skills in their manner of thinking, in their communication of thought, and in the formation of their judgments.

Our schools consciously strive to maintain a high level of scholarship. They gear their courses to meet their students' needs and strive to give first quality instruction. To do this the schools provide modern equipment, a well-planned curriculum, and a highly trained faculty.

To Guide Students in Developing Strong Bodies and Healthful Habits of Living. The

Story Of A Heroic Life

Long before daylight the young surgeon would report to the mission hospital to study his cases, supervise prepping, and instruct his assistants. Often before breakfast he had completed an operation—several of them if they were minor. Suffering and disease seemed to flow like a great cruel flood. But he was there in the heart of China to help stem it if he could. But what impression can one life make against such odds?

Then came war's ravages. Bombs were falling while he would complete surgery. A third of Wuchow lay in ruins. Thousands were homeless and hungry, multitudes dead. He kept on doing what he could, leaving the results with God. Such was the daily life of the slim, young Tennessean from Knoxville who had in a few years become a legend in South China. He lived but a hair breadth from death. They had heard sermons before, now the people saw one. In this compassionate, brilliant surgeon, a man of few words but brave deeds, there was no dramatizing to others how he lived through devastating air raids. He never made speeches about himself.

He determined the Stout Memorial Hospital should not die. Evacuating the staff of 55 and every possible piece of equipment amidst fighter plane harassment, he kept the hospital functioning while on the move as a place of mercy in the wilderness before returning to Wuchow a year later. Himself thin and ill, this young doctor refused his pitiful allowance of rice, giving it to a Chinese nurse he felt needed it more. His one pair of ragged tennis shoes were worn through. Now he was walking with paper stuffed in them. While on the move he and his helpers treated the ulcer ridden, the soldiers infected with hookworm, dysentery, nutritional diarrhea, nutritional

diarrhea, malaria, relapsing fever, and wounds of battle. Returning to Wuchow they had to restore a hospital building they found in shambles and minister to a city decimated with cholera. With heroic spirit he led in putting the bombed building once more into use. They recovered and cleaned salvaged equipment. They screened, scrubbed, painted. With borrowed acetylene torch, Japanese gasoline drums were converted into storage tanks for water they must boil day and night. He built a hand powered electric generator to furnish power and light for surgery. He defused three unexploded bombs. This man took no thought for himself. He slept on a bamboo mat, a smooth log for a pillow. He had been a refugee so long he couldn't sleep on a bed.

Then this man who brought the hospital through the Japanese invasion was plunged into a yet more terrible ordeal—the Communists' take over of China. Americans had been advised to leave. The Mission Board secretary sent word each missionary could make his own decision. The Board would back each whatever it was. The young doctor from Tennessee decided to stay. Too much was at stake to leave the hospital. He didn't think there was anything heroic in his decision. Yet Communist political workers were restlessly infiltrating every area of life. One after another the other cities fell to them.

Wuchow, the last Southern Baptist mission station in all China, alone remained unoccupied by the Reds. Then they came. The slim, young doctor continued his routine ministry of healing and serving in Christ's name. He was popular among the people. Communists began a terrible hate campaign with denunciations of Americans. They had to discredit this

doctor. They couldn't get any of the local people to bring charges and accusations against the doctor so the Communists planted a gun under his bamboo bed mat. They trumped up charges against him and for weeks, day and night, subjected him to cruel interrogation—overwhelming him with all kinds of degrading accusations, trying to break his faith and make him confess to wrongs he had never done. They never let up for 53 days and nights. Then the guards came to his cell one night—the final night—with long poles cruelly thrusting them between the cell bars to jab their prisoner into unconsciousness. That is how he died—a martyr in a Communist prison cell for Christ.

No amount of Communist propaganda could make the people believe that this doctor was other than what they had known him to be, a kind, humble servant of God who loved them and healed them. Over his grave they dared to put this inscription: "For me to live is Christ." That was how they felt about Dr. William L. Wallace. Such is the story now told twelve years after his death, in **Bill Wallace of China**, a biography by Jesse C. Fletcher. This new Broadman Press book is a moving account of the medical missionary who spent 17 turbulent years in China. The narrative grips the reader with the impact of a life steadfastly committed to Christ. It is one of the great biographies of recent times. It should be read by every Southern Baptist.

Look At The Report

The Convention Treasurer's report for receipts from the churches of this convention year's first nine months is in this issue (pages 8-15). A \$84,375.58 gain in Cooperative Program receipts is still \$135,841.72 under budget requirements with the convention year ending October 31. Many Tennessee Baptists will make special effort during these weeks ahead to meet the goal set a year ago. Gains in designated giving (15.16 percent) are nearly five times the 3.19 percent increase reported in Cooperative Program giving. Let's remember: The Cooperative Program is the main support of both Tennessee Baptist and Southern Baptist Convention work!

The Golden State Missions Offering carries an allocation of \$1200 for the Mary Northington Scholarships. There is one \$400 scholarship for each of the three Tennessee Baptist Colleges. This year there are two endowed scholarships of \$200 each awarded to girls at Belmont College, Nashville.

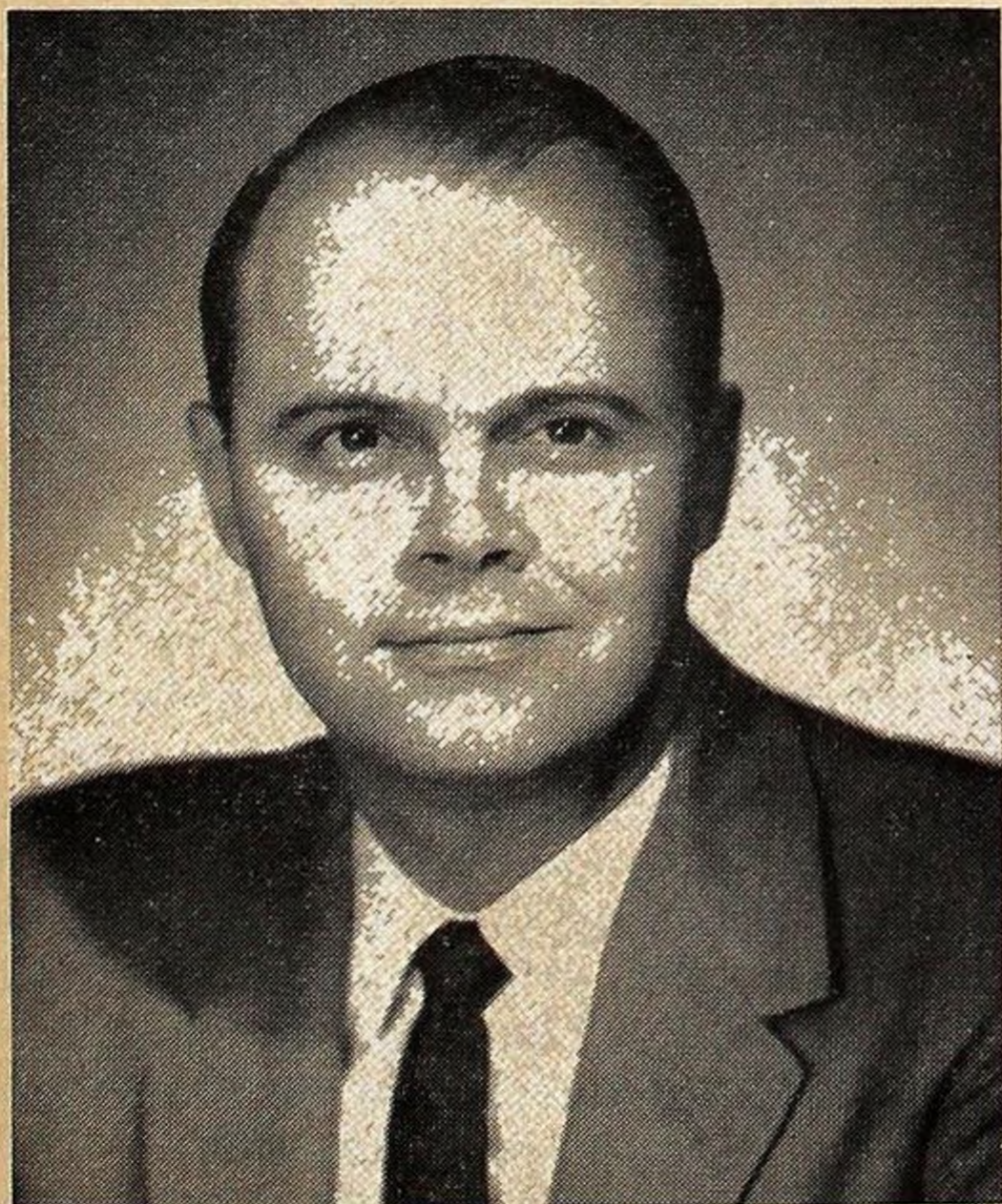

BAPTIST BELIEFS

The Baptism Of The Holy Spirit

Of Jesus, John the Baptist said, "... he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost [Spirit], and with fire" (Matt. 3:11; cf. Mk. 1:8; Lk. 3:16; Jn. 1:33; Acts 1:5). This promise was fulfilled on the day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came in power upon the church in Jerusalem (Acts 2:1ff.). On that day Peter concluded his sermon with these words, "Repent, and be baptized ... for [on the basis of] the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38). Thus Paul speaks of both the church (I Cor. 3:16) and the individual Christian (I Cor. 6:19) as the "temple" [*naos*, Holy of Holies] of the Holy Spirit.

Thenceforth throughout Acts the Holy Spirit is seen as coming on certain individuals or groups of individuals. But always it is in connection with conversion. In two instances this manifestation authenticated new departures in the preaching of the gospel: to half-Jews or Samaritans (Acts 8:17); and Gentiles (Acts 10:44; cf. 13:52; 15:8). Note that when Saul of Tarsus (Paul) received the Holy Spirit there is no mention of an outward manifestation other than his preaching the gospel with power (Acts 9:17-22).

Is there any particular pattern by which the Holy Spirit comes on these people? Note again that each instance, after Pentecost, is in connection with the conversion experience, not later (Acts 2:38; 8:12, 14-17; 9:1-17; 10:44f.; 19:1-6). (Acts 4:31 deals with those who received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Here He manifested to them again His presence and power.)

But beyond this there is no set pattern. The Samaritans received the Holy Spirit after prayer and the laying on of the hands of the apostles (Acts 8:14-17; 19:6). Paul did so at the hands of one not an apostle (Acts 9:17). The Spirit came on Cornelius and others as Peter preached, but with no laying on of hands (Acts 10:44). Thus the Holy Spirit fits into no devised category of action. "The wind [*pneuma*, Spirit] bloweth where it listeth [wills]" (John 3:8). The one all-inclusive fact is that the Holy Spirit comes upon the believer in connection with his conversion, sometimes after baptism (Acts 2:38; 19:5-6), sometimes before baptism (Acts 10:44-48), sometimes with the laying on of hands and prayer, sometimes not. "The Spirit blows [works] as He wills." G. Campbell Morgan, not a Baptist, points out that when "any theologian, or school of theology, attempts to systematize the method of the coming of the Spirit into human lives, in that moment they are excluding a score of His operations, and including only one" (Acts, p. 206).

— Struggle And Victory —

TEXTS: Genesis 29 to 36 (Larger)—Genesis 32:22-32 (Printed)—1 Peter 5:6 (Golden).

The experience of Jacob, as seen in the printed-lesson text, is a pattern for many Christians at present. For it is when they struggle as he did, in earnest prayer and complete commitment to God's will, that they leave Bethel and arrive at Peniel or Peniel. To pass through trying situations, enabled by the sustaining power of the Holy Spirit and encouraged by the intercessions of the saints, is to gain new visions of God's grace. In addition, such examples may indeed furnish hope for others similarly struggling. We observe, then, the printed text for certain specifics. Some four are to be found there.

Concern (vv. 22, 23)

Jacob was face to face with possible tragedy. He was about to meet his brother, Esau, whom he had deeply wronged many years previously. He realized that Esau would likely get even with him because of his fraud and trickery. His past sins were about to overtake him and at a most inopportune time. Thus he was much concerned about the safety of his loved ones as well as himself. In such situations the servants of the Lord should exercise all possible foresight, from a human point of view, and then turn to God for help as well as courage. And this is essentially what Jacob did in this instance.

Conflict (vv. 24-26)

In his utter loneliness, so far as other human beings were concerned, Jacob engaged in genuine prayer through much of the night. This conflict, in terms of prayer, is described here with the expression: "there wrestled a man with him". What a wrestling match this was! It was strenuous. It was trying. It was purifying. One thinks of that similar experience of Jesus in Gethsemane. Jacob was doing far more than "saying" a prayer. This prayer was not brief but long. Day was about to break and Jacob had not received the divine blessing.

The New Testament does not teach the "second blessing," or a baptism of the Holy Spirit apart from the initial indwelling of the Spirit (John 14:17) at conversion. Note Acts 19:2, "Have ye received the Holy Ghost *since* ye believed?" (author's italics). The verbs "received" and "believed" (participle) are both aorist tenses of point action. Doctor A. T. Robertson notes that these tenses are simultaneous, and refer "to the same event" (*Word Pictures, Acts, in loco*). Literally, "Did ye receive the Holy Spirit *when* ye believed" (author's italics). These disciples of John the Baptist had not been saved. When they believed on Jesus Christ they were saved and received the Holy Spirit (Acts 19:4-6).

It is not how much of the Holy Spirit you have, but how much of you does the Holy Spirit have.

He had already been crippled and thus marked for life as a probable symbol of this soul-trying encounter with the Lord. Never again would he be the same person with his selfishness and scheming. Jacob clings to his wrestler until the blessing is promised. With the arrival of dawn the conflict comes to an end. In many of the experiences of life prevailing prayer is like that.

Conquest (vv. 27-29)

The conquest described here is not at all conquering a fickle God or bending Him to our wishes. Far from it! It is rather that of one being brought into complete harmony with His will and purpose. And it is a voluntary act of the person who genuinely prays. Since this is so often so difficult it is pictured here in this lesson as a struggle. The secret, then, is obvious. It is that we (that is, the Christian under the leadership of the Holy Spirit) "overcomes" by being overcome. To surrender, without reservations of any sort, to God and His will is the one and only way to "conquer" in prayer.

The process is identical with that of becoming a Christian in the first place. It is when yielding occurs that freedom is experienced. In this glorious paradox lies the beginning of the regenerated life. In it, also, lies its growth and development. Prevailing prayer is not a sort of magic. One does not manipulate the Lord into granting requests. When one reaches the point of saying from the depths of his soul that he wills God's will, it is at that point that the battle is "won". This, it seems to these notes, is the very heart of this lesson.

Conversion (vv. 30-32)

It will be recalled, in the light of the preceding lesson on Jacob, that he had seen God only in his dream while asleep at Bethel. Here at Peniel, or Penuel, Jacob sees God face to face. The difference is vast. His life had been spared in contrast with what such an encounter was supposed to bring. He now had a new name because he was a different man. He had known conversion. The Christian knows regeneration only once. He should know conversion many, many times. The sun was rising. The Patriarch was limping. Heaven was rejoicing. It is always so each time a saved person struggles to victory in prayer that prevails.

Fish With Whiskers

Almost every boy who has gone fishing knows what catfish and bullheads are. The long feelers of these fish resemble a cat's whiskers. Their round heads, large mouths, and fierce-attack habits resemble the cat family of our natural world.

Several features help to identify catfish. Catfish have no scales, although some are covered with bony protecting plates. They have sharp spines on their backs and on the side front fins. These are dangerous to enemy fish and to people who catch them.

Catfish are fresh water fish. Some two thousand species of catfish exist. They are different in size, shape, coloring, and habits. These fish are always hungry, feeding on water scum, mud plants, and tiny water creatures.

In our country, catfish are found in every sluggish stream east of the Rocky Mountains. Channel catfish are found abundantly in mountain waters. They are excellent food. Blue catfish of the Mississippi Valley are considered by many people as the best of all food fish. They sometimes weigh as much as fifty to one hundred and fifty pounds. Others are smaller.

Some huge European catfish reach a length of ten feet. These giant fish weigh

around four hundred pounds. South American catfish have more colorful markings than the common catfish of our country. These fish are dotted and circled with brown, black, yellow, and dark-blue markings.

Some species of catfish in India resemble a flat-bottomed boat. They have a flat, low-placed head and a flat body. Naturalists tell us this strange kind of catfish is ideally suited to swimming in swift, powerful mountain currents. They are most skilful in moving down falls and in foaming, twisting waters.

As we think about the wonders of catfish, we remember the words of the Bible: "And God created . . . every living creature that moveth, which the waters brought forth abundantly (Genesis 1:21).

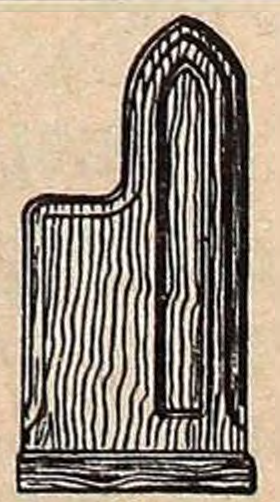

To God Be The Glory, Cumberland Baptist Chapel

This sign stands in front of a building in a beautiful wooded section on the edge of the Cumberland Plateau near Altamont, Tenn. This chapel was dedicated August 11.

The 14 college students and their leaders, who cleared the land and built the chapel, with its spire reaching upward so it can be seen for miles, wanted no praise or mention of sacrifice, for "To God Be the Glory."

Eleven young men and three young women, representing several states and a number of colleges, on June 17, set up a camp near Beersheba Springs for the purpose of erecting a building to serve an area with a population of about 1,200 people. The students received no monetary remuneration for their services. Their actual expenses were provided by fellow students as a part of the Tennessee Baptist Student Summer Missions Program. Ten were from Tenn. colleges, two from Ky., one from Mo., and one from S.C. Joe Crumpacker, director of Baptist Student Work in Memphis, directed the group assisted by Pete Beard, director of Baptist Student Work, UT, Knoxville.

Site for the chapel was purchased through a grant from the Church Lot Fund, administered by the Missions Dept., TBC. Duck River Association assumed responsibility for materials for the chapel.

At the dedication, local leaders and students expressed their hope the building would be used for the enrichment and enjoyment of the people in the area and dedicated to the Glory of God.
