Allen proclaims Day of Prayer of Bold Missions June 11

ATLANTA—Southern Baptist Convention President Jimmy R. Allen has proclaimed Sunday, June 11, as a Day of Prayer for Spiritual Awakening and has urged SBC churches to hold special prayer sessions.

Allen's proclamation came in response to a motion at the 1977 SBC meeting in Kansas City, Mo., calling for a day of prayer for Bold Mission Thrust during the 1978 and 1979 SBC meetings. Bold Mission Thrust is the SBC plan to evangelize the world in this century.

The Kansas City motion also urged the SBC Committee on Order of Business to hold prayer meetings for Bold Mission Thrust sometime during the 1978 and 1979 meetings and asked appropriate SBC agencies to develop guidelines for the day of prayer in local churches.

Forrest Feezor of Shelby, N. C., retired executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will conduct a Prayer Service for Spiritual Awakening at 3:45 p.m., Thursday, June 15, during the 1978

convention. It will follow an address by Martin Luther King Sr. of Atlanta on "America's Need for Spiritual Awakening."

Allen's proclamation requests "our more than 35,000 churches to have special sessions of prayer on that day (June 11) for our nation, for the peoples of the world, and for messengers of the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in annual sessions that week (June 13-15) in Atlanta."

He said the nation needs spiritual awakening "as evidenced in the moral chaos of our people," and that "spiritual awakening does not come by the machinations of men but by the movements of the spirit of God." He urged prayer "that Bold Mission Thrust might become an avenue" for spiritual awakening. (BP)

TREA hears speakers, elects new officers

Other special features included: "The Religious Educator and Media," by Carlton Carter, church library department, Baptist Sunday School Board, and "Our Senior Adult Ministry," led by Adelle Carlson, family ministry department, BSSB.

New TREA officers elected during the business session were: president, Charles McMinn, Immanuel Church, Nashville; president-elect, Criss Prewett, First Church, Brownsville; and vice-president/program chairman, Dennis Lyle, Nashville Baptist Association. The new vice-president for enlistment is Creed Caldwell, First Church, Clinton; and Adkinson was elected secretary-treasurer.

Memphis lady named mother of the year

DES MOINES, Iowa—Mrs. John McCall, a 56-year-old Memphis mother who said she considers herself "liberated through Jesus," has been named American Mother of the Year by the American Mothers Committee.

Mrs. McCall, member of a prominent Baptist family, said her faith was put to test seven months ago when she discovered she had an ovarian carcinoma, a form of cancer, which had spread throughout her abdomen. But she has learned to cope with her problem through faith in God and Christ.

Mrs. McCall was selected to receive the award during the national convention of the American Mother's Committee which made the selection from a field of 50 state winners in the "senior" division—women whose children are 15 or older.

The mother of three is married to John W. McCall Jr., medical director of health services for Memphis State University. Both are active members of First Church, Memphis. McCall's brother, Duke K. McCall is president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky.

They have two sons and one daughter—John McCall III, is acting director of research and grants at North Texas State University, Denton, Texas; Tim McCall, is a surgical resident at Campbell Clinic in Memphis; and Mrs. Carol Richardson is a speech pathologist.

"My husband and I have different roads," she said. "I have always had my own path in life. My husband has had his. He is a surgeon and has had to make his decisions, and I have made mine in the home. I consider being a mother a vocation.

"I have always said, 'as go the homes, so goes the nation.' Now I believe, 'as go the mothers, so goes the nation.' I think motherhood and the family will remain important and necessary no matter what the social mores are."

She was selected on the basis of community involvement, achievement of her children, embodiment of traits, such as courage, cheerfulness, patience, homemaking ability, letters of recommendation, and a three-minute speech entitled "The Highlights of My Career as a Mother." (BP)

Illness strikes Routh during college speech

Porter Routh, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Executive Committee, Nashville, became ill while delivering the baccalaureate address May 14 at Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, N.C.

In the middle of his address, he gripped the sides of the podium as faculty and some 950 graduates watched. Richard Janeway, dean of the university's Bowman-Gray School of Medicine, assisted Routh from the stage.

He was admitted to Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem where tests indicated that the dizziness had resulted from dehydration from a virus, and he has no serious medical problem.

Routh was discharged from the hospital May 17, and has gone to Pigeon Forge for a brief rest.

He was at the Baptist college to speak and receive an honorary doctorate.

Retreat for mentally retarded provides avenue of service for state's Baptists

Tom Madden, director, convention ministries division, Tennessee Baptist Convention, told parents, teachers, and leaders of the mentally retarded that Tennessee Baptists "know you are here, and we love you."

Speaking at the state retreat for retarded persons, parents, and teachers, May 12-13, Madden explained to the group that the mentally retarded need Tennessee Baptists, and Tennessee Baptists need the mentally retarded. "They give us an object of love and compassion," he said, "and provide us with an avenue of service." He then urged churches to provide increased facilities for the mentally retarded and to provide means for ministering to their loved ones.

Marjorie Nelle Cardwell, Clover Bottom Development Center, Nashville, spoke to the group on what care is provided by the State of Tennessee, and enlightened them on present laws and bills before the legislature concerning help for the mentally retarded.

Retreat pastor was Ernest Pippin, Tennessee Baptist Foundation.

Pippin brought two devotionals to the entire group. He focused his remarks on "God is Good," and "The Feeding of the 5,000."

Coordinators for the retreat were Ray Evette, preschool and children's director, Sunday School department, TBC, and Sammie Meek, special worker with the retarded, TBC.

Evette said that plans are being made for two retreats to be held in 1979. Camp Linden is scheduled to host the group May 11-12, and Camp Carson on May 18-19. The retreat is sponsored by the Sunday School department, TBC.

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Harrison-Chilhowee sets graduation ceremonies

Cordell Maddox, president of Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, and A. Douglas Watterson, newly named pastor of First Church, Knoxville, will address graduating seniors at Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy, Seymour, during the school's 98th commencement exercises this week.

Watterson will bring the baccalaureate message to the seniors, their parents, the faculty, and friends of the school at 8 p.m., May 24, in the sanctuary of First Church, Seymour. Commencement ceremonies will be held Friday, May 26, at 10 a.m. in Woody Auditorium.

Maddox is finishing his first academic year at Carson-Newman in the presidential post. Prior to coming to Tennessee, he was president of South Carolina's Anderson College for six years.

Preaching his first sermon in the Knoxville pulpit this month, Watterson came from the pastorate at Cliff Temple Church, Dallas, Tex. He has also led churches in Virginia, Kentucky, and Florida.

Thirty-seven seniors are expected to take diplomas during the spring graduation festivities, according to academy president Hubert Smothers.

Criswell translates lyrics for anthems

W. A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Dallas, has written his first song lyrics for 10 anthems published recently by Broadman Press.

The lyrics are contemporary translations of Scripture passages and each anthem or canticle bears the title of the passage. Several of the canticles will be performed during the Southern Baptist Convention, June 13-15, in Atlanta.

Criswell went to the original Greek language of the New Testament in preparing his translations. "I tried to use modern language but to be very true to the text," Criswell said.

Criswell undertook his first music project at the invitation of William J. Reynolds, secretary of the Sunday School Board's church music department.

Reynolds, who met Criswell in 1938, said he first had the idea of securing "Criswellian translations" about five years ago. "W. A. Criswell is a man who reads the Greek very well. He uses it in his sermons as beautifully as anyone I've ever seen.

After Criswell completed the translations, 10 composers set the passages to music.

Then, Buryl Red scored the compositions for orchestra and recorded the orchestral accompaniment with a symphony orchestra in London. Red is a composer, arranger, and director of The Centurymen, a choir of 100 Southern Baptist ministers of music.

Mississippi assembly opens after hurricane destruction

PASS CHRISTIAN, Miss.—Nine years after its destruction by Hurricane Camille, Gulfshore Baptist Assembly has been completely rebuilt.

The assembly, situated on the tranquil waters of Bay St. Louis, is a nine-acre tract with 600 feet of sandy beach front. A large swimming pool, fishing pier, boat slips, tennis courts, and softball field combine for varied recreational interests.

The auditorium building has movable seating for 600 as well as 10 classrooms and dressing facilities for the adjacent pool. There are sleeping accommodations for 344, offices, four classrooms, cafeteria, bookstore, and gift shop.

The only building not destroyed by Hurricane Camille in 1969, a gymnasium, was later gutted by fire. (BP)

Ky. board extends retirement age

MIDDLETOWN, Ky.—The Executive Board of the Kentucky Baptist Convention has revised its mandatory retirement policy and asked its executive secretary to continue up to five more years.

Franklin P. Owen, who will be 65 this year, would have had to retire on Dec. 31 of this year under the old policy.

The Kentucky board made sweeping changes in its retirement policy by a reported "slim majority" on a standing vote, and then it approved a specific motion for retention of Owen beyond his Dec. 31 retirement date by what was said to be a "large margin."

The new policy recognized the right of employees to terminate their service at age 65, but it allows present employees to continue until age 70 with an annual review. It also states that new employees of the Executive Board will be given contracts specifying dates of terminations. Unless requested by the board to remain longer, employees should retire at that time.

The Kentucky board did pass a resolution reflecting a motion by Harold Wainscott of Latonia, who expressed concern that "Baptists should be careful in giving the appearance of approving the latest governmental dictate and intervention into retirement plans of churches and religious institutions."

The new federal retirement law, which stipulates that persons may not be forced to retire before age 70 from organizations employing 20 or more persons, goes into effect Jan. 1, 1979.

Owen reportedly told the board that he does not intend to remain at his post until age 70, but he would like to stay one or two years until some current projects are completed. At the same May 9 meeting, the board approved a \$1.5-million contract to enlarge and renovate the Kentucky Baptist building in Middletown.

Career church librarians invited to June seminar

NASHVILLE—A "Career Librarians Seminar" is scheduled for June 19-23 in the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board's Church Program Training Center here.

Designed for both paid library workers and volunteer directors of large media centers, the focus of the seminar will be on the media center director's role as administrator.

Included among the topics will be discovering, enlisting and training an adequate staff; relating to paid and volunteer church leadership; planning and evaluating media center activities; expanding or improving media center space and furnishings; and discussions of individual and group problems. Belmont to sponsor 'Miracles,' Biblical dramas, this summer

Belmont College, Nashville, will sponsor and host a unique dramatic production this summer called **Miracles**, which is a modern re-creation of 14th century Biblical plays.

The two and one-half hour production will consist of a series of brief scenes which dramatize the story of mankind from creation and the fall through the stories of Cain and Abel, Noah, and Abraham and culminating in the ultimate "miracle"—the birth, ministry, crucifixion, and ascension of Jesus Christ.

In medieval England the series was called **Mystery Plays** and was performed on wagons in the streets, moving from corner to corner in sequence.

Producer for the dramatic venture will be Anderson Clark, chairman of the department of literature, language, and communication arts at Belmont College. Clark spent six weeks in England in 1976 working on a similar production in York, England. The Belmont project will be the only production of this type in North America.

The **Miracle** plays will be performed in an outdoor arena on the Baptist college campus. Opening night is scheduled for June 24 with productions held six nights a week (Monday through Saturday) through the first week in August.

Clark said this will be a "professional production without professional resources." He said that there will be a \$38,000 budget, with \$14,000 already committed.

Assisting in the production will be Irene Corey Barr, who will design the costumes, and Leon Rubin, who will serve as artistic director and set designer.

Mrs. Barr gained international acclaim for her mosaic designs for **The Book of Job** in Pineville, Ky. She is from Dallas, Tex.

Rubin is director of Studio Theater in Toronto, Canada. He selected the texts for **Miracles** from various medieval cycle plays and wove these together into the acting script from commissioned translations.

Several members of the Belmont faculty will assist with the production.

Lynn Eastes of the drama faculty will serve as Rubin's assistant and as stage manager.

Richard Shadinger, of the music department faculty, is the music consultant.

Nashville organizations have given encouragement to the drama project, according to Clark, seeing **Miracles** as an additional tourist attraction for tourists visiting this area. A grant has been received from the Tennessee Arts Commission to help finance the translation work. Two Nashville banks—Commerce Union and Third National—have assisted financially, Clark said.

Miracles will also attract church groups from Tennessee and surrounding states, Clark believes. Interest in the proposed production has been received from a number of Baptist churches and other religious groups.

Procedure for SBC registration outlined by convention officer

NASHVILLE—Messengers to the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, June 13-15, at the Georgia World Congress Center, must have proper credentials for registration, which begins at 3 p.m., Sunday, June 11.

Lee Porter, SBC registration secretary, urged church to elect messengers in business meetings and to see that they come with proper credentials.

"Registration cards are available from the executive secretary of each state Baptist convention," Porter said. "Each messenger should fill it out in detail, be sure it is signed by the pastor or the church clerk, and present it to a registration clerk at a registration booth in order to receive a copy of the convention program, a messenger identification badge, and computer-card ballots for voting.

"A messenger who comes to the convention without proper credentials must apply to the Credentials Committee for registration," Porter said.

He said each church is entitled to a minimum of one messenger and a maximum of 10 under the SBC constitution. Every cooperating and contributing SBC church may send one messenger and one additional one—up to the maximum—for every 250 members or \$250 in contributions to the work of the convention during the fiscal year preceding the meeting.

Messengers who lose identification badges or ballots will not have them replaced, Porter said, to protect the integrity of the voting process during the convention. He said copies of the **SBC Book of Reports**,

which contains important information on convention business, will be available for \$1 each at the time of registration.

He urged messengers to give hotel, motel, or other local address on the bottom of registration cards, to be used in case of emergencies, and to register as soon as they arrive in Atlanta.

"Due to the anticipated large number of messengers, we decided to begin registration Sunday, rather than Monday, at the Georgia World Congress Center," he explained. Registration will be open through evening sessions of the SBC Pastors' Conference on Sunday and continue until the last day of the convention. (BP)

Public relations director named for Calif. Baptists

FRESNO, Calif.—Donald S. Hepburn, director of communications at Southwestern Baptist Seminary, Fort Worth, has been named to direct the new office of communications and public relations for the Baptist General Convention of California, effective June 1.

Hepburn joined the Southwestern seminary staff in 1970 as a student public relations assistant and became director of communications in 1972. Before coming to Southwestern, he held positions, while a student, as public relations assistant, Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City; news director, Hancock County (Tenn.) Drama Association; public affairs specialist for a radio station; and minister of youth at Greenwich (Conn.) Baptist Church.

He is a graduate of Carson-Newman College and Southwestern seminary. He is accredited by the Public Relations Society of America and currently serves as treasurer of the Baptist Public Relations Association. (BP)

The meeting, at the Peachtree Plaza Hotel in Atlanta, will precede the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, June 13-15, at the Georgia World Congress Center and run simultaneously with a number of satellite meetings surrounding the SBC.

The RNA meeting will feature Don Ranley, associate professor of the University of Missouri's school of journalism; Wayne Smith, founder of Friendship Force, an Atlanta-based, non-profit exchange program of which Rosalynn Carter serves as honorary chairperson; a panel discussion on "How Religion Writers Deal with Theology;" the annual awards banquet; and election of officers.

W. A. Reed, religion news editor of the Nashville *Tennessean*, serves as RNA president. (BP)

Gay rights advocates to picket Anita Bryant at June 11 session

ATLANTA—Gay rights activists plan to demonstrate against the, June 11, appearance of Anita Bryant during the Southern Baptist Pastors' Conference.

The demonstration—which will feature a rally, march, and pickets—will be coordinated by a newly-created organization, Atlanta Coalition for Human Rights, which promotes “civil rights for all people, including lesbians and gay men.”

“We are not objecting to her coming and speaking,” said Victor Host, coordinator of the Atlanta Gay Rights Alliance. “We are not picketing the Southern Baptist Convention. What we are demonstrating and picketing against is what she stands for; not her visit and not the convention.”

Miss Bryant has become a focus on the gay rights issue following a successful campaign in Dade County, Fla., for repeal of a gay rights ordinance last June and subsequent endorsement of other anti-gay rights efforts.

An estimated 2,000 persons are expected to take part in the demonstration, which will feature a 6 p.m. rally on June 11 in the Central City Park, a march to the Georgia World Congress Center where the Pastors' Conference will be held, and a two-hour picket.

Host said the demonstration will be non-violent. “We will not attempt to get into the Pastors' Conference,” he said. “We don't belong in there, and we're not going to try to get in.” He said if there's any trouble, “it won't come from us.”

Tim Hedquist, assistant to the treasurer of the SBC Executive Committee and convention manager, said: “We have made

normal security precautions. I don't anticipate any unusual problem. My concern is that individual Southern Baptists do not precipitate anything. Many times the reaction to something like this (the demonstration) is worse than the action. We could make it worse than it is.”

“As long as they (the gays) picket on public grounds, that's their right unless they violate some local statute. If they do, that's the responsibility of the local police.”

Atlanta police officials said extra lawmen have been alerted for the demonstration.

Bailey Smith, pastor of First Southern Baptist Church of Del City, Okla., and president of the Pastors' Conference, called on Southern Baptists attending the Sunday night meeting to “behave like Christians.” He has issued an appeal to Southern Baptist churches of Atlanta to dismiss services that Sunday night and “come down to the World Congress Center for a revival meeting.”

He added: “We don't want the Sunday night session to look like an anti-gay rally. What we want to spread in Atlanta is the love of Christ, not anger. I hope there is no violence on either side. I don't want anybody to be unkind to a homosexual. We have got to love them and try to win them to Christ. We want the Sunday night meeting to be a rallying together and standing up for what is right and what is decent.”

Cookeville pastor shot by Putnam Co. official

James C. Hammons, pastor of Mill Creek Church of Cookeville, was shot to death last Friday (May 19). He was found near his car which was parked at Judd Cemetery, according to John Roberts, district attorney general.

Hammons also worked as a route salesman for a Cookeville vending machine company.

Roberts said that Orville Simcox was arrested Friday night and has been charged with first-degree murder. Simcox, a longtime Putnam County political official, is presently chairman of the county's Election Commission.

No motive for the shooting had been announced by investigating officers at press time. A hearing will probably be held this week.

Hammons had been pastor of Mill Creek Church for about two years. Earlier he had been assistant pastor of Algood Church.

Funeral services were scheduled for May 22 at Eastwood Church in Cookeville with burial in Crestwood Cemetery.

Home Mission Board plans open house during SBC

ATLANTA—Directors and staff of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board will host an open house at the board offices at 1350 Spring Street during the annual Southern Baptist Convention meeting. The reception honoring home missionaries will be Wednesday, June 14, from 2 to 5 p.m., on the free afternoon scheduled during the convention.

A short visual presentation about the work of the board will precede self-paced tours of the building. Displays on each floor will illustrate the programs of work and a representative in each office will be available to answer questions.

Buses running to hotels in north Atlanta from the Congress Center every few minutes will stop at the Home Mission Board building, about three miles from downtown, on Wednesday afternoon. (BP)

Faith under fire

Basic Passage: Acts 12
Focal Passage: Acts 12:1-11

This chapter holds our interest for three reasons. First, a new opponent to the church is introduced. As the church has preached its message it has faced the opposition of Pharisees and Sadducees, but now the political forces enter the fray. Even in the face of such overwhelming power, Luke recounts how the church continues on its triumphant march. Second, this chapter brings to a close the period in which Jerusalem has served as the center of the church's operations. Antioch will now become the base of operations for the missionary thrust to the Gentiles. Third, with this chapter, Simon Peter departs from the scene and passes out of sight in Luke's history. Peter's departure sets the stage for the introduction of James, the Lord's brother, who emerges as the head of the Jerusalem church.

Herod's Persecution: Acts 12:1-5

From the time Rome seized Palestine in

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63 B.C. until around 100 A.D., the Romans constantly relied upon the Herod family of rulers to maintain order among the volatile Jewish people. The attention here is focused on Herod Agrippa I, the nephew of Herod Antipas who murdered John the Baptist, and on Herod the Great who was responsible for the slaughter of the Innocents at the birth of Jesus. Like all the other Herods, Agrippa is completely loyal to Rome. He had been brought up in the Imperial Roman society and was a friend of both Caligula and Claudius, emperors of Rome.

Unlike the other Herods, Agrippa had won the affection of the Jewish people because of his interest in their law and his sympathy for their customs. The Jewish historian, Josephus, records his defense of the Jewish laws and how he won the sympathy of the Jews. When Caligula, the Roman Emperor, decided to set up a statue of himself in Jerusalem, Agrippa had successfully prevented this idolatrous outrage and thus greatly enhanced his popularity with the Jewish people. His grandmother and wife were of the Maccabean line, and the Jews hailed him as their brother in spite of the fact that he was of the hated Edomites through his grandfather.

Evidently, at this time the relationships between the Jerusalem church and the Jewish leaders had deteriorated. Herod exploited this strained relationship and had James, the brother of John, executed to win the favor of the Jews. His opposition then fastened on Peter who was imprisoned under heavy guard. The Feast of the Unleavened Bread was at hand, and Herod did not want to interrupt the festival with an execution, so Peter was put in prison rather than being killed immediately.

Luke highlights the two opposing forces in this situation. On the one hand is the political force embodied in Herod's power

to imprison the leader of the church. On the other hand is the praying of the church. The prayers are "without ceasing," or the word could be translated "earnestly." The only force opposed to the cleverest of all the Herods is a praying church. The odds seem to be all on Herod's side, but it is evident that God is not necessarily on the side of the biggest army.

God's Deliverance: Acts 12:6-11

Here Luke gives a camera's eye view of one of the most positive pictures of Simon Peter. Some of the best qualities of this great leader are set forth in this last event Luke recounts concerning him. On the night before his execution, he rests quietly and sleeps comfortably. His courage is equal to the test he faces. He has failed before but his maturing faith has prepared him for this ordeal. Instead of pacing his cell in despair, he has removed his sandals and mantle and has gone soundly to sleep—like a baby resting in its father's strong arms. In fact, when deliverance comes, he has to be prodded to wakefulness, he is so sound asleep. In spite of Herod's elaborate precautions, an angel entered the cell and led him to the outside and freedom. Like so many political rulers, Herod thinks that the sword can deal with any opposing force. Peter was so surprised at the angel's deliverance that he thought he was having a vision until he found himself free on the street outside the jail.

The church had been in prayer for Peter and was also surprised when he was delivered from prison. Their surprise would indicate that they were praying for him to be strengthened as he went through this trial, rather than for his deliverance. Peter evidently did not expect to be set free either. Only after the fact did the assurance come (verse 12). He walked with God and was constantly amazed at God's way of doing things. One question that he could have raised was why he was delivered, but James was not. There was no explanation given to him concerning the mystery of God's way. God did not explain the loss of James but manifested Himself in such a way when he delivered Peter that His presence could not be denied.

The chapter ends with the church moving on to new victories after the defeat of Herod. Josephus, the Jewish historian, agrees with Luke's account that Herod was suddenly stricken as the people called him a god. He died the most disgraceful death that could be thought of. The final picture Luke paints in this lesson is that of Barnabas, Saul, and John Mark on the road. Herod has died in disgrace, but the living messengers of the Gospel are on the highway to Antioch where a whole new era in missions will begin. All the power of evil has not even slowed the advance of the living word of God. Such testimony should strengthen the church any time it faces a time of crisis.

Lot—danger of being sidetracked

Basic Passage: Genesis 13-14; 18-19

Focal Passages: Genesis 13:10-13; 19:12-14, 24-26, 29

Sidetrack: a position or condition of secondary importance to which one may be diverted. If Lot lived in our day, Uncle Abraham probably would have been thought of as the one who was sidetracked. Materialistic modern man would approve of the riches that Lot had amassed. Modern man would have thought Lot was a shrewd business man to pick the verdant plains for his manifold flocks rather than the hills with which Abraham was content. Most men would consider Abraham the one sidetracked rather than Lot.

From the stance of faith, it was Lot who was sidetracked, or rather, who got sidetracked by his own nature and desires. There are many tempting sidetracks in life. Lot found several of them along the way.

I. Sidetracked by Selfish Desire (Genesis 13:10-13)

Lot wanted to be successful. There's nothing wrong with being ambitious; in fact, there is something wrong in a person's makeup if he doesn't have a spark of ambition. But to put ambition above everything else is a mark of weakness. Lot looked out upon the plain of Jordan and saw that it had plenty of water. Water was a precious commodity; it was a sure means of success.

Lot, so far as we can tell, never once considered the potential negative effect of his new surroundings upon his life and the life of his family. The foremost thing that he wanted to do was to get away from Uncle Abraham. He also got away from the seemingly restrictive care of the Lord. Abraham couldn't wait to build altars to the Lord, but it never seemed to enter the mind of Lot to build an altar to the Lord. In his mind, the thing to do was to pitch his tent toward Sodom, the center of sin for that part of the world.

Lot probably did not intend to let the

wicked and sinful men of Sodom influence him. After all, he was brought up in a God-fearing home. He had known the Lord as a boy growing up, but he had outgrown all that stuff and nonsense. Worship was for people like Abraham. Lot probably felt that Abraham overdid the religious bit. He was to find out almost too late that if you walk with the ungodly, you will soon be standing along with those who are rebellious to God. It does matter who you keep company with.

II. Sidetracked by Bad Influence/In-laws (Genesis 19:12-14)

How in the world can a man be responsible for his in-laws? That is a real question. But there are some things a man can do. When Abraham was old (Gen. 24:1ff), he had his old and trusted servant to swear that he would not obtain a bride for Isaac in the land of Canaan, but that he would go back to Haran for a girl of like upbringing.

Lot was not as considerate of his girls. The faith of the sons-in-law was of no great importance to him. The young men had charisma and were well liked. The fact that their faith was not deep meant nothing to Lot until the time of testing.

The messengers of the Lord told Lot to clear out. Lot had enough religious back-

Calif. board votes opposition to cancellation of 1981 SBC

FRESNO, Calif.—The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of California has countered a proposal from an Alabama Baptist leader who urged cancellation of the 1981 Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Los Angeles.

George Bagley, executive secretary of the Alabama Baptist Convention, urged recently that the convention be cancelled and "the millions of dollars" spent on it be used in establishing churches in the west and north-west as part of the SBC's Bold Mission Thrust.

While commending Bagley for his concern for mission work in the west, the California board expressed doubt that the idea would be approved. It asked, instead, that Southern Baptists coming to the convention plan to share with western Southern Baptists in Bold Mission Thrust in every way possible during the time they spend in the area.

Bold Mission Thrust is the SBC plan to present the gospel of Jesus Christ to every person in the world by the year 2000. (BP)

ground to know when the Lord was sending him a message, and he thought his irreligious in-laws would listen to him in matters of faith; however, he hadn't lived faith before them. It is no wonder that the in-laws thought Lot was joking. They had never known Lot to be serious about the Lord before. How could they expect him to be serious now in the face of destruction? The only thing they knew to do was laugh, because that's all they had ever done when the Lord's name had been mentioned. One cannot compromise his faith without getting hurt somewhere down the line.

III. Sidetracked by Littleness (Genesis 19:15-29)

The angels of the Lord encouraged Lot to run to the mountain for escape. Lot was so tied to the worldly way of life that he could no longer discern the right way. The Lord said, "Flee to the mountain," and Lot said, "No, let me stay in Zoar." Rather than seek the mountain top, Lot chose to stay in the littleness (Zoar) of life. One's soul cannot live in the littleness of life, yet that is what Lot wanted to do.

Too many times we are like Lot. We have settled into life on the flats, and we prefer to sit placidly rocking on the porch. Life in the plains may not even be evil; it may be merely easy and second-rate. The climb up the mountains requires effort and dedication, but think of the rewards at the top! When we come up out of flats of dullness, sin, narrow vision, to the mountaintops, God spreads before us the wide vistas of world-awareness and service.

Although Lot hung back from following closely the leadership of the Lord, he did follow from afar. He knew to leave was the thing to do. He had that much background in faith—not so his wife. In her leaving, she still looked back to the beckoning ways of the world. Such doubt in the goodness and mercy of the Lord cost her life. Lot lived, but he lived dragging his feet.

Abraham, great in the faith, was remembered by God. Lot sidetracked by selfish desire, a spirit of compromise, and a littleness of vision was sent forth (Genesis 19:29). Lot is a reminder to all who would get sidetracked from faith's priorities that success is not found in self but in obedience to the will of God.

Cicero's comment



By the editor

If you have ever lived in Indianapolis in May (as I did for 11 Mays), you know that this month is race month—with the whole city caught up in the activities around the annual 500-mile automobile contest.

Nearly every visitor to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway asks the same question. They view the 2½-mile oval track, the 300,000 permanent seats, the many buildings, and garage facilities—and exclaim, "You mean all of this is for just ONE race a year?"

Yes, the Speedway actually has only one race each year—the world-famous 500-mile Memorial Day classic. There are occasional tire tests at other times, and the entire month of May is devoted to practice and qualification trials, but these events point directly to the "greatest spectacle in racing."

There is only one race at the Speedway, but over 350,000 attend it. Many speculate that if there were several races each year at the famed track, total attendance at all of them would be less than that one race.

You might say that fascination of the 500-mile event comes partly because the Speedway is completely dedicated to that one race—a singleness of purpose.

Maybe there is a lesson here for a church.

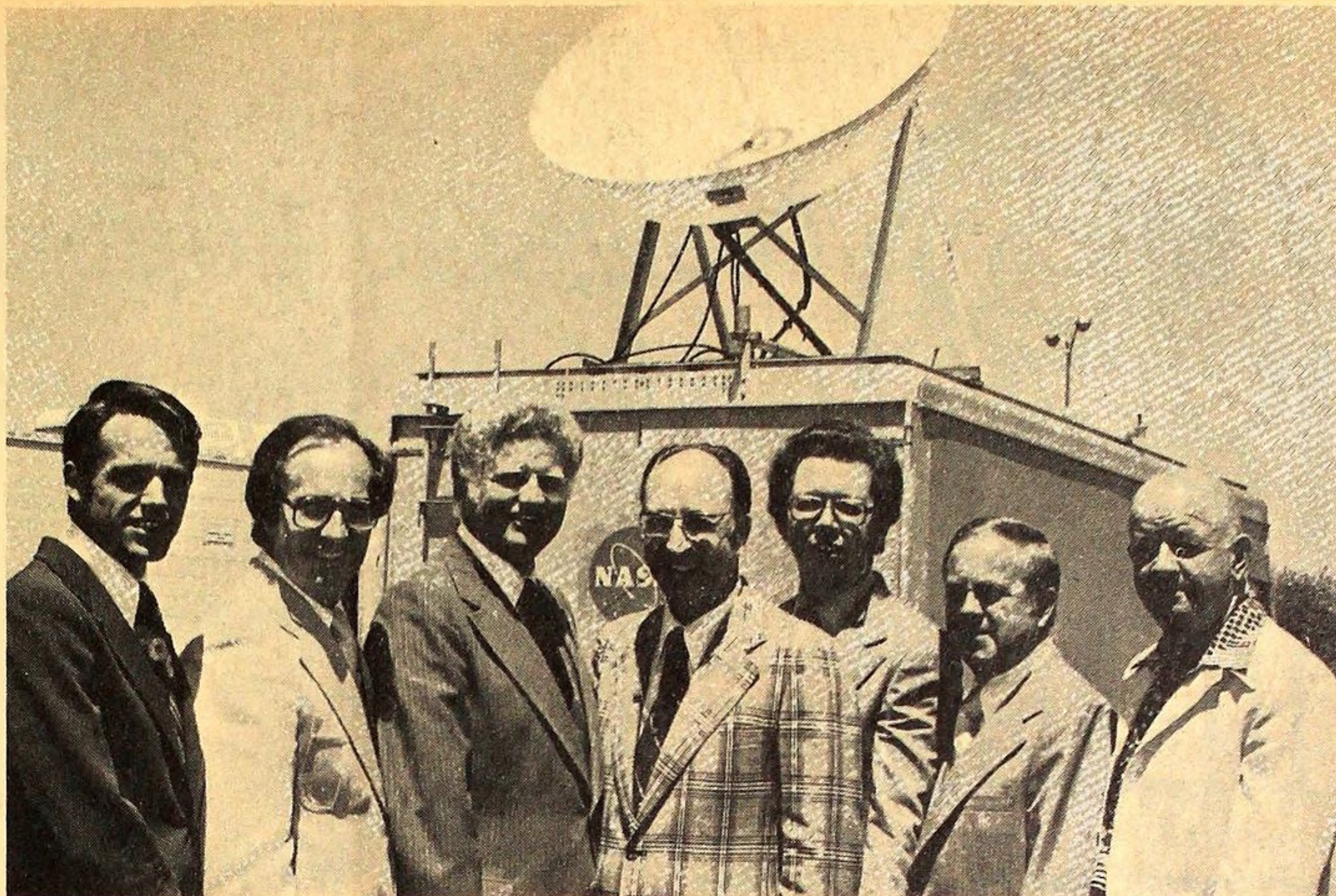
The church founded on the Day of Pentecost was characterized by singleness of heart" (Acts 2:46). Their single concern was to tell a lost world that Jesus Christ was alive, that He had risen from the dead!

Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount that, "If thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light." The idea is of a sound eye that can focus on **one single item**, and so give light, meaning, and purpose to the whole being, rather than confusion and failure.

Many churches in our day have kindergartens, day care centers, sewing clubs, softball leagues, and many other good activities which can involve people.

However, we must always be careful that these wonderful activities are the means of accomplishing the **one single purpose** of a church—the proclamation of our risen Lord. Everything that a church does should have as its immediate end the confrontation of an individual with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Being ever aware of our singleness of purpose, we can lay aside the non-essentials and run the race that God has set before us (Heb. 12:1-2).

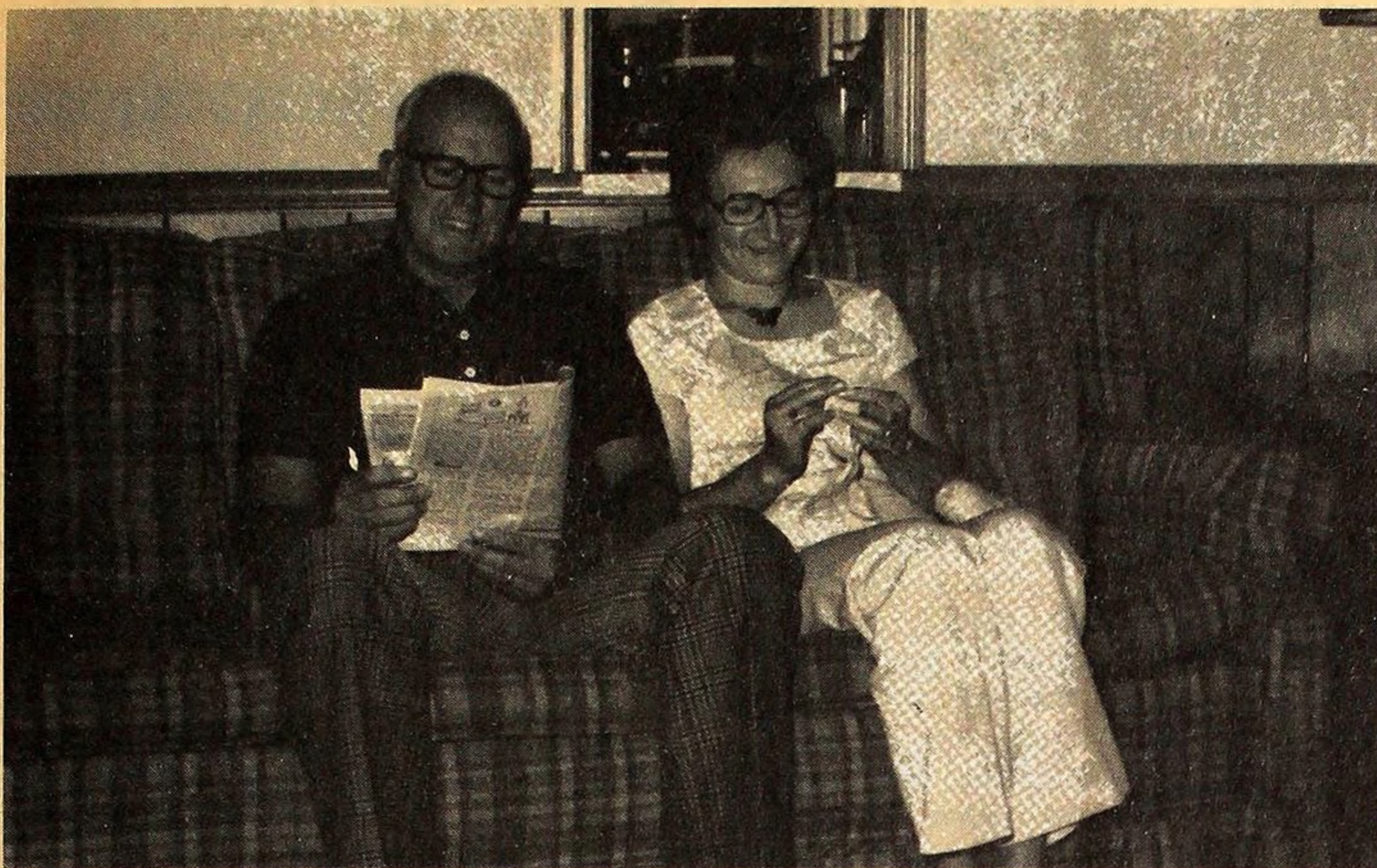

THE MURPHYS

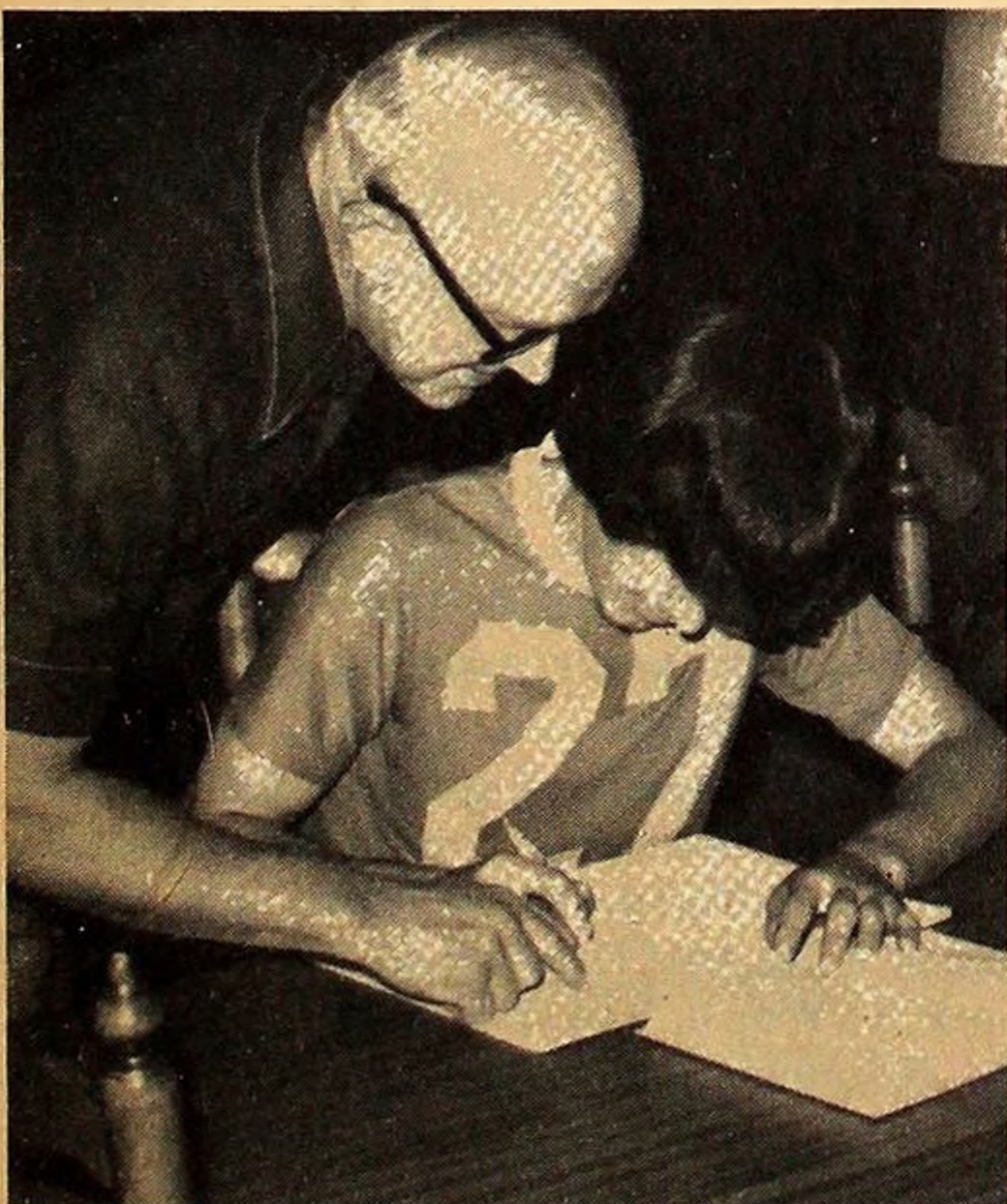

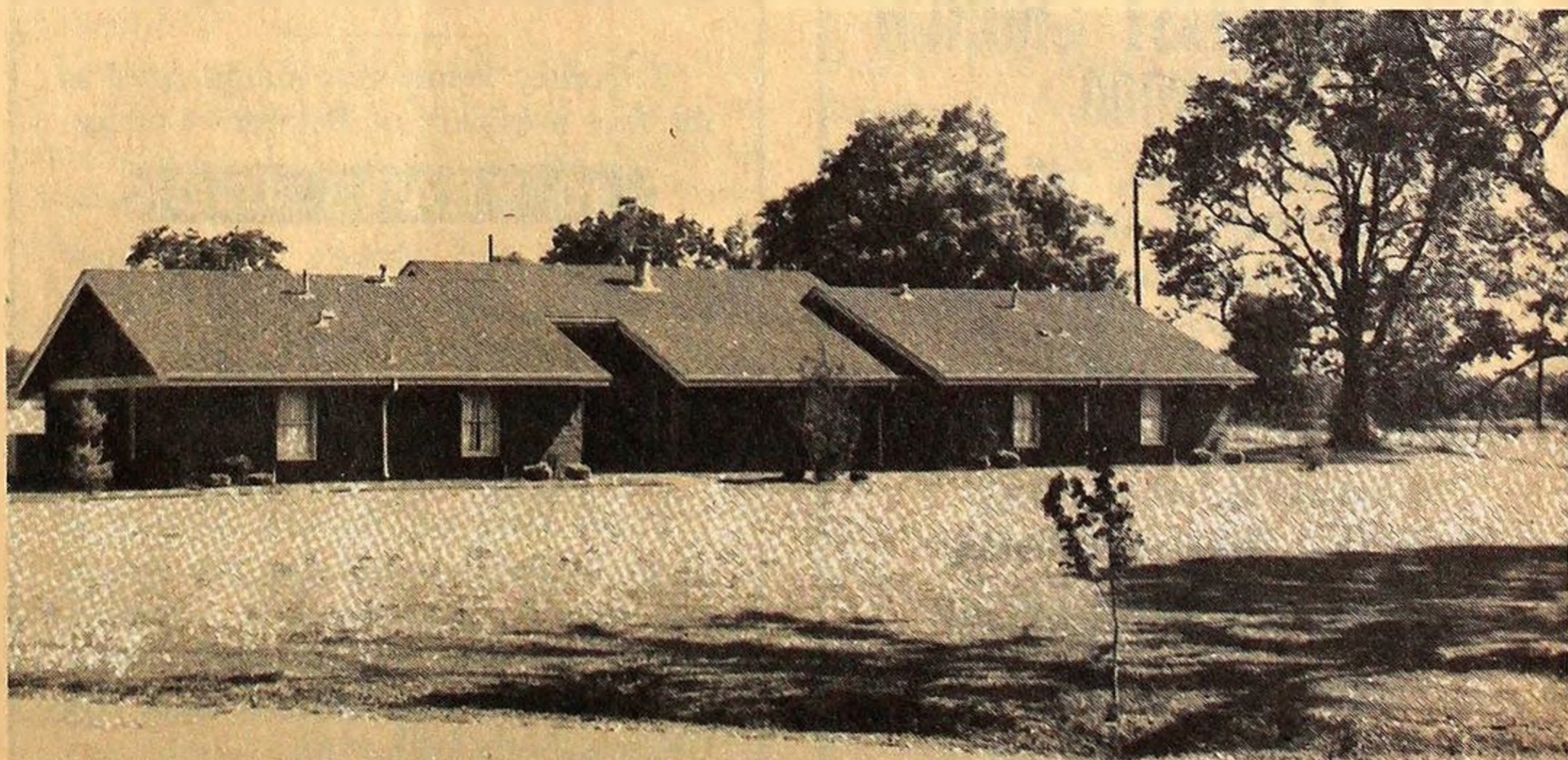
When the housemother stated she would just have to feed it to the dog he replied, "Will the dog eat THAT?"

Equipping Centers to revitalize church training, Edgemon says

PASS CHRISTIAN, Miss.—The decline in church training involvement by Southern Baptists is producing a "generation of theological ignoramuses," Baptist Sunday School Board President Grady C. Cothen told 50 church training leaders at Gulfshore Baptist Assembly.

"I've been at the Sunday School Board for four years, and I've seen and heard a great deal about new programs, but I've seen and heard nothing that can take the place of training at the local church level," Cothen told representatives of the state Baptist conventions and workers from the church training department at the Nashville-based board.

Roy Edgemon, named to head the board's church training department in December, told the leaders that Equipping Centers—a training concept to be introduced in 1979—will revitalize church training.

The board developed Equipping Centers because many Southern Baptist churches have dropped or greatly reduced their church training programs. The cutbacks have resulted in millions of Southern Baptists who are untrained in Biblical doctrine, church operations, Christian ethics, and other vital elements of church and Christian life.

Regular study of systematic theology, Edgemon said, is one of the most important elements in the life of the local church. "One of our biggest problems is that we're not equipping people who are saved in the survival of their faith. We're saving people tonight," he said, "but not doing anything tomorrow to help them."

He said Southern Baptists must move to a climate of growth and training, and that Equipping Centers will help churches reach that climate.

The Equipping Center is made up of a

group of units or courses of study built around a basic subject area, utilizing a number of learning approaches, said Tommy Dixon, church training department staff member who helped develop the equipping concept.

The first six under preparation include Christian doctrine, family life, missions, evangelism, church growth, church, and community leadership. The distinctives of the new approach are short-term training options, flexible schedules, a variety of resources, specialized training, and minimal organization.

Dixon said testing for the concept took place over 200 churches in six conventions. Training in the use and understanding of the centers will begin in June and carry through the time of widespread implementation in October 1979. (BP)

Home Board votes personnel changes

ATLANTA—The Southern Baptist Home Mission Board named C. Kirk Hadaway of Amherst, Mass., as research data management consultant and took several other personnel actions during the May meeting of the board's executive committee.

Directors shifted two staff members, accepted a resignation, named four missionary associates, and approved 13 pastors for salary supplements.

Hadaway, completing doctoral studies in the sociology of religion at the University of Massachusetts, will join the staff, July 1. His responsibilities will include management of all data processing related to research projects, planning and programming research, and coordinating and analyzing computerized data research.

He grew up in Tallahassee, Fla., and Memphis, Tenn., and he is a graduate of Southwestern College and Memphis State University.

Two staffers—Peter Chen and Jerry B. Graham—were assigned to new responsibilities and another, Emery B. Smith, associate director of special missions ministries, resigned to become director of campus ministries for the South Carolina Baptist Convention. He has been on the board staff since April 1970.

Chen, who joined the board's staff, Dec. 1, 1976, as assistant director of the department of language missions, was reassigned as assistant director, department of interfaith witness, world religions.

Graham, who also joined the staff in 1976, was reassigned from his post as associate director of associational administration services to associate director, department of missionary personnel. He will assist in recruiting, screening, and recommending candidates for missionary appointment. (BP)

SEBTS names Nashville native as professor of evangelism

FMB appoints 23, sends relief aid

RICHMOND, Va.—Twenty-three missionaries were named to serve in 10 different countries during the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board's May meeting.

The additions brought the total number of missionaries appointed this year to 53, but mission leaders alerted board members that many more are needed.

John E. Mills, area secretary for west Africa, said that his area alone needs 72 more missionaries this year. Total personnel requests for the 90 countries or territories where Southern Baptists have work add up to 1,406.

Continuing the grapple with problems related to inflation and the declining value of the U.S. dollar in many nations, the board voted \$27,970 for further increases in cost-of-living allowances for missionaries in 12 countries. Cost-of-living adjustments have had to be made for missionaries in 34 other countries in board meetings this year.

The board also voted to send two of its members to meet with representatives of European Baptists to discuss the future of the Baptist Theological Seminary in Ruschlikon, Switzerland. The international seminary, hit hard in the past year by inflation and the reduced buying power of the U.S. dollar in comparison to the Swiss franc, had a \$48,730 budget deficit in 1977. The seminary is seeking ways to trim its expenses and gain added support from European Baptists in view of a predicted \$100,000 deficit this year.

Southern Baptists, through the Foreign Mission Board, supply more funds to support this seminary than to any other institution related to their work overseas. Although it appropriated money to cover the 1977 deficit, the board has informed European Baptists it cannot continue to meet increasingly large deficits at the seminary.

In other actions, the board allocated \$13,700 in relief funds for projects in Brazil, Trinidad and the Philippines. It also allocated \$4,000 in hunger relief money to buy food for an agricultural school in South Brazil, where two periods of extremely hot, dry weather ruined the rice crops, and then constant heavy rains made a bean crop impossible.

The board also voted \$50,000 to help buy a new machine for making backs for Bibles at the Bible Press in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and approved \$172,400 to help equip and finish out the new wing being constructed at its home office building in Richmond. (BP)





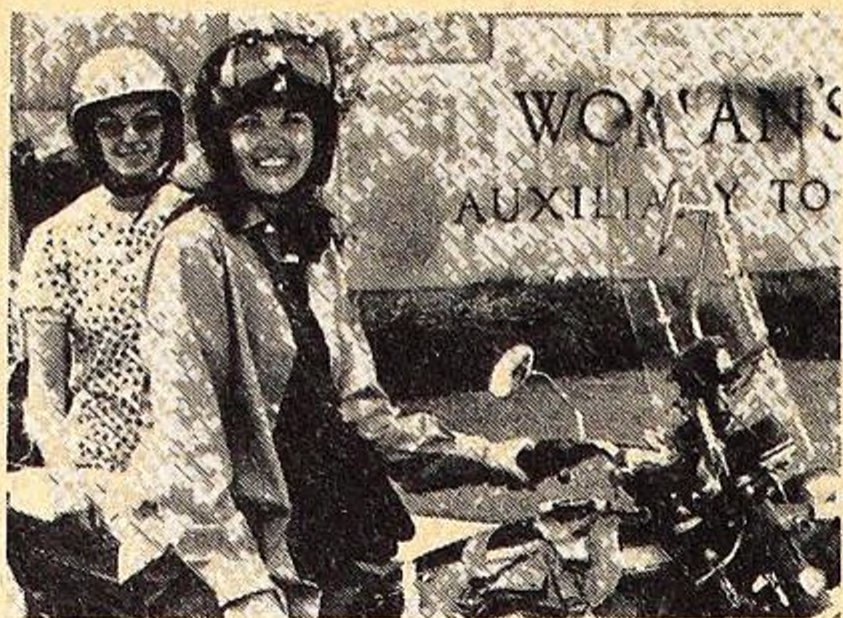

Women members on boards of SBC said increasing

NASHVILLE—When the Southern Baptist Convention meets in Atlanta, June 13-15, it's expected to continue a recent trend that has seen an increase each year in the number of women serving on the boards of SBC agencies.

The denomination's Committee on Boards will recommend 216 persons to serve full or partial terms on boards of 19 national SBC organizations. At least 19 of those persons will be women.

A precise figure is unattainable because selections for nine vacancies will not be completed until the committee meets just prior to the convention, and several of those recommendations may be women.

If the committee's report receives standard approval by convention messengers, it will assure the denomination of having at least seven more women on the boards of its agencies during 1978-79 than in the current year. The remainder of the 19 women on the committee's list already serve on boards and either will be re-elected to second terms or will fill positions vacated by women.

A study of Southern Baptist Convention **Annals** documents the slow but steady increase in representation by women on boards of SBC organizations. In a six-year period the percentage of women on boards has increased from 4.7 percent in 1972-73 (38 of 802) to 8.6 percent in 1977-78 (73 of 352).

The most significant increases have come since 1974, when the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission presented a recommendation to the SBC in Dallas calling for an amendment to the convention's constitution and bylaws which would have required that at least one-fifth of the total members of boards, commissions, and standing committees be women.

The recommendation, defeated by a vote of SBC messengers, asked "that our churches and denominational agencies bear witness to the rest of society by rejecting discrimination against women in job placement, by providing equal pay for equal work, and by electing women to positions of leadership for which God's gifts and the Holy Spirit's calling equip them."

Although the denomination is still far from the one-fifth minimum, a substantial effort is apparently being made to provide for more equitable representation by women on boards of agencies.

At the time of the 1974 convention, only one agency, the Home Mission Board, was near the recommended 20 percent minimum. In 1977-78, women constituted more than 20 percent of the boards of four agencies, the Historical Commission (23.5 percent), Christian Life Commission (23.3), Home Mission Board (20.2), and Foreign Mission Board (20.2).

Those agencies are followed by the Stewardship Commission, which has had an increase from one woman in 1974-75 to four women on its board of 26 (15.3 percent) in 1977-78.

Women, however, make up only 7.7 percent to none of the membership of the boards of other SBC organizations. Five of the 65 Executive Committee members (7.7 percent) this year are women. Four of the Sunday School Board's 84 trustees (4.8 percent are women, and one each of the Annuity Board's 82 members (1.2 percent) and the Southern Baptist Foundation's 35 members (2.9 percent).

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary has four women on its board of 61 this year (6.6 percent), while the other five seminaries; Golden Gate, Midwestern, New Orleans, Southeastern and Southwestern, each have one woman on their boards.

American Baptist Theological Seminary, jointly supported by Southern Baptists and National Baptists, has two women on its 16-member Southern Baptist commission (12.5 percent).

The Education Commission in 1977-78 has one woman out of 17 members (5.9 percent), while the Brotherhood Commission, which sponsors work for men and boys, and the Radio and Television Commission, have no women on their boards. (The Woman's Missionary Union, an auxiliary to the SBC, has no men currently serving on its board, which is made up of state WMU presidents.)

Board membership is determined not by the agencies but by the Committee on Boards, a 52-member committee comprised of two representatives from each state convention in the SBC.

If the Committee on Boards' list of recommendations for board members is approved by this year's convention as expected, the Brotherhood Commission and the Radio and Television Commission will be the only agencies of these 19 organizations with no women serving on their boards. (BP)

Acie Ford takes Memphis church

Acie L. Ford, pastor of churches in Arkansas for the past 10 years, will assume the pastorate of Boulevard Church, Memphis, this Sunday. His last pastorate was at First Church, Huttig, Ark.

A native of Louisiana, he graduated from Tennessee Temple Bible School in Chattanooga, Tenn. He also served a church in Louisiana.

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
