## TBC messengers face variety of decisions

Messengers to the 112th annual session of the Tennessee Baptist Convention will gather in Johnson City next week to consider a record Cooperative Program budget-goal, a guideline to broaden representation on TBC boards and committees, and the election of officers for the coming year.

The convention will meet Nov. 11-13 at Freedom Hall in Johnson City.

Other business items expected are the election of members to various TBC boards and committees, amendments to three program statements, and a report from Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes Inc. concerning a convention-authorized feasibility study.

The Executive Board will recommend a \$22.5-million Cooperative Program budget-goal for the November 1986-October 1987 convention year. The proposed goal is 7.14 percent higher than the \$21-million 1985-86 Cooperative Program goal and is 8.01 percent higher than the \$20,831,030.34 actually received during

the November 1985-October 1986 convention year.

Another part of the budget recommendation would be to increase the percentage shared with the Southern Baptist Convention's Cooperative Program from the 36.75 to 37 percent.

A summary of the Executive Board's recommendation was printed in the Oct. 8 issue of the Baptist and Reflector.

A proposed amendment to the TBC "Committee Guidelines" would instruct the Committee on Boards and the Committee on Committees to seek to make their nominations from a broader representation of churches within the state. The recommendation from the Constitution and Bylaws Committee is printed on page 6.

In a related matter, the committee will ask for an additional year to study and report on a motion referred to it by the 1985 TBC that "no church be represented by more than one member at one time" on TBC boards and committees.

During the convention, the messengers

will elect a president, vice-president, second vice-president, registration secretary, recording secretary, and statistical secretary.

Other elections will involve the naming of 132 trustees for 10 TBC institutions, agencies, and the Executive Board and of 53 members to 10 TBC committees. Nominations from the Committee on Boards and the Committee on Committees were printed in the Oct. 8 issue of the Baptist and Reflector.

The messengers will also hear a report from Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes in response to a motion passed by the 1983

state convention which asked the organization "to study the utilization of existing institutions and agencies for elderly care and to formulate specific plans for the future ministry of Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc."

The Executive Board will recommend three minor changes in program statements for TBC institutions and agencies:


(1) To delete Function 4 in the Program of Mission Ministries which states, "Cooperates with the Public Affairs and Christian Life Committee of the Executive Board of the Tennessee Baptist Convention." This assignment was made before the establishment of a public affairs and Christian life office.

(2) To amend the Program of the Baptist and Reflector by substituting the sentence, "The Baptist and Reflector is published weekly at the discretion of the Board of Directors" for the sentence, "The Baptist and Reflector is published weekly, 51 times each year."

(3) To change the official name of "East Tennessee Baptist Health Care System" to "The Baptist Health System of East Tennessee."

Major speakers for the Nov. 11-13 state convention include the convention sermon by Dillard Mynatt, pastor of First Baptist Church, Oak Ridge; the presi-

## TBC closes record year just shy of budget-goal

Tennessee Baptists closed a record year in mission giving through the Cooperative Program with a near-record month, but missed the 1985-86 convention-adopted goal by less than one percent, according to Tom Madden, executive secretary-treasurer of the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

When the books for the November 1985-October 1986 convention year closed last Friday, Madden reported that Cooperative Program gifts for the year reached a record \$20,831,030.34 — passing the previous record of \$19,555,062.57 given during the 1984-85 convention year. The new record exceeded last year's total by \$1,275,967.77 or 6.52 percent.

Messengers to the 1985 state convention approved a \$21-million Cooperative Program budget-goal for the 1985-86 convention year. Madden noted that Tennessee Baptists missed the convention approved goal by \$168,969.66 or about eight-tenths of one percent.

The TBC executive secretary reported that Cooperative Program mission gifts for October 1986 were \$2,116,779.50 — which is the fifth highest month in TBC mission giving.

The monthly goal for the 1985-86 convention year was \$1,750,000 (one-twelfth of \$21-million). Last month's Cooperative Program gifts of \$2,116,779.50 were \$366,779.50 above (20.96 percent above) the monthly goal.

Receipts for October 1985 were \$2,189,236.30 — which ranks as TBC's second highest month. Cooperative Program receipts for October 1986 were \$72,456.80 below those given in October 1985.

A month-by-month review of Cooper-

ative Program contributions for the convention year reveals these figures:

- November 1985: \$1,278,158.72;
- December 1985: \$1,601,393.27;
- January 1986: \$2,418,303.10 (TBC's highest month);
- February 1986: \$1,522,647.94;
- March 1986: \$1,284,216.75;
- April 1986: \$2,180,786.89 (third highest month);
- May 1986: \$1,666,136.33;
- June 1986: \$1,367,418.56;
- July 1986: \$2,153,057.94 (fourth highest month);
- August 1986: \$1,242,367.63;
- September 1986: \$1,999,763.71 (ninth highest month); and,
- October 1986: \$2,116,779.50 (fifth highest month).

Madden also reported that Tennessee Baptist Convention records were established during the convention year in the three mission offerings received each year in TBC churches.

Gifts for these offerings during the 1985-86 convention year were:

- Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions: \$4,644,290.40 (6.13 percent above the \$4,375,922.61 received last year);
- Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions: \$1,773,386.13 (6.99 percent above the \$1,657,471.66 received last year);
- Golden State Missions Offering: \$712,730.47 (2.23 percent above the \$697,153.41 received last year).

## Baptists across Tennessee receive 'political' letters

Baptists across the state in recent days have received two letters in the same envelope from Leonard Markham, pastor of First Baptist Church of Sweetwater, soliciting funds for a group called "Concerned Tennesseans" and recommending four candidates for elections next week in Johnson City.

### Telephones set for TBC meeting

Two convention office telephones, a press room telephone, and a Baptist and Reflector telephone will be in operation next week during the Tennessee Baptist Convention at Freedom Hall in Johnson City.

Markham told the Baptist and Reflector that he had written the letters several weeks ago and they were mailed out by a church in east Tennessee which he declined to name. He said he did not know how many letters were mailed.

In one of the letters Markham wrote, "I have several candidates I wish to recommend to you and to ask that you enlist others to support these persons." The letter listed "candidates" for president, vice-president, and second vice-president of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and for president of the Tennessee Baptist Pastors' Conference and also stated the times of these elections.

Markham said Sunday night that these were his own personal recommendations and were not from any political group. "As 'Concerned Tennesseans,' we are not organized to involve ourselves in our state convention's work," Markham told the Baptist and Reflector. "The people I mentioned in my letter were personal choices, friends, and names of the finest people in our Tennessee Baptist life."

Markham added, "I deeply regret that the letter even appeared to be an endorsement from some organized group."

The second letter asked for financial support for a state organization "to help us continue our fight against the 'take-over' effort in the Southern Baptist Con-

## Paraguay crusade reaps 1,120 Christian converts

ASUNCION, Paraguay (BP)— Baptists put a Billy Graham-type evangelist in a stadium and on television for a week in Paraguay, and 1,120 people made decisions to accept Christ as their Saviour, a Southern Baptist missionary reported.

Nilson Fanini, described as the "Billy Graham of Brazil," drew 5,000 to 6,000 people each night to an Asuncion stadium during a week-long crusade in mid-October, said Tom Law, a Southern Baptist missionary in Asuncion. About 7,000 people attended the final Sunday night meeting.

The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and the Paraguay Baptist Convention split the \$30,000 bill to have the crusade broadcast at prime time each night, said Bill Damon, the board's associate area director for eastern South America.

Before the crusade, about 400 Baptists were trained as counselors. People who met counselors received a package containing tracts, the Gospel of John, and the first of a six-part Bible study called "Six People Who Met Jesus." They also received a card with the basic plan of salvation and another card they filled out, giving their name, address, church attendance history, and the decision they had made.

Church members living nearest the new converts have been visiting them at home, giving them New Testaments and continuing the Bible study, said Law, who is promoter of evangelism and new work for the Paraguay Baptist Convention for the greater Asuncion area.

A surprise of the crusade, Law said, is that the Baptist convention office is receiving letters from people in towns where there is no Baptist work. The live half-hour and hour-long broadcasts each

night reached most of the nation, including remote areas.

The convention office has received 200 requests from people who saw the broadcasts and want more information, along with a New Testament offered on television free of charge, Law said.

The broadcasts spilled over into Argentina, which drew Argentines to the stadium, Law said. The Argentines said they planned to have Fanini speak in their country next year.

About 110 pastors, seminary students, and lay people from Brazil rode 1,500 miles in buses to do house-to-house visitation as part of the crusade. They helped during counseling and worked with churches to help create an atmosphere of enthusiasm. One of the bus drivers made a profession of faith during the crusade.

The convention rented 49 city buses that were rerouted to churches and mission points 35 miles away and then to the stadium. To board a bus, a church member had to have an accompanying non-member.

In several instances, people made professions of faith in Christ in the stadium and returned the following night with family members who also made professions. So far, more than 1,000 Bibles have been given out as part of the crusade. A 13-week Bible study is planned for 75 homes, starting in March 1987, Law said.

## Independent church votes to join SBC

GLENDALE, Calif. (BP)— The independent United Community Church of Glendale, Calif., has voted unanimously to affiliate with the Southern Baptist General Convention of California.

The \$7-million church facility, which sits on property larger than a city block, is comprised of a 2,200-seat amphitheater, chapel, garden fellowship building, educational and office facilities, and a full gymnasium.

With 800 members, the church automatically became one of the larger churches in the California convention. According to the convention's 1985 annual, average church membership in the convention is 292.

The "transdenominational" church made the decision in order to "maximize its efficiency for Christ" and become an integral part of the "great commission," said Pastor John Myrick.

"We didn't want to be an island unto ourselves," Myrick said. "We felt we could accomplish more for Christ in cooperation with other churches." The church also needed the resources of a mainline, denomination to help with training and involvement of teachers and members, he added.

"We want to be part of the Cooperative Program," Myrick pointed out, referring to the church's desire to become part of a concerted effort to spread the gospel. The Cooperative Program is the Southern Baptist program of funding worldwide mission, education, and evangelistic endeavors.

"Since they are of 'like faith and order,' I am pleased to welcome them into the convention," said C.B. Hogue, state convention executive director. Hogue said the doctrines, polity, constitution, and bylaws of the church are typical of Southern Baptist churches.

## Myrtice Owens urges students to rediscover joy in worship

NASHVILLE — American Christians can learn a lesson on joy in worship from Africans, according to Missionary Nurse Myrtice Owens, speaker at a recent convocation service at Belmont College. The convocation was the highlight of Belmont's annual World Awareness Week.

Mrs. Owens and her husband, Carlos R. Owens, have served as Southern Baptist missionaries in Africa for 30 years. After serving 25 years in Tanzania, they were transferred to Namibia (also called South West Africa).

Relating several of their experiences while in Namibia, Mrs. Owens recalled one church in which about 400 African Christians "shook the walls" with joy of their singing. These same people, she said, lived in grass huts, had to carry water in containers on their heads for miles, and were usually hungry. She contrasted their worship with that of

American Christians, whose worship is frequently "half-dead."

She challenged American Christians to rediscover the joy of their salvation. "Show Christ is alive and real in your life," she advised.

Carlos Owens started 11 churches and baptized 580 people during their term of service in Namibia.

As a nurse, Myrtice Owens ministered to the physical and spiritual needs of the Africans. She told of a woman who came to her with severely burned arms. As Mrs. Owens cared for her burns, she shared her faith in Christ.

After some time, the woman told Mrs. Owens she was glad for the burns, because she learned about Jesus while receiving treatments.

Mrs. Owens issued a call for greater awareness of the needs of all people, in foreign lands and at home.

## Samford University to benefit from \$150-million development

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (BP)— Samford University's endowment fund will benefit from the \$150-million development of 200 wooded acres the Baptist school owns adjacent to its suburban campus in Birmingham, Ala., officials have confirmed.

Southern Progress Corporation, publisher of the magazines Southern Living, Southern Accents, and Progressive Farmer, will acquire a tract east of Samford's Beeson Woods student residential area for a new 27-acre headquarters. The firm, a subsidiary of TIME Inc., is the largest regional magazine and book publishing company in the United States.

Simultaneously, Samford has signed a joint venture agreement with Trammell Crow Company of Dallas, the nation's largest real estate developer, to construct office, residential, hotel, and retail space on a 180-acre site directly opposite the university's main gate.

The Crow project will extend 1.6 miles along Lakeshore Drive and be served by a new interchange of Interstate 65. It will feature waterways, jogging trails, and recreational facilities to complement the natural scenery of the tract, which contains a forest in a former lakebed.

Samford President Thomas E. Corts said the coordinated development of the two parcels of land will not only create a distinctive environment for the campus and generate nearby housing and retail services of high quality, but also con-

tribute substantial financial support for the university's academic program.

Samford trustees had held the land for such future development and will invest the revenue from the two projects in the school's educational endowment, now more than \$16-million.

"This has the potential for more than doubling the endowment, and far beyond," Corts said, noting, Samford will convey the 180 acres to Trammell Crow over a period of seven to 10 years, retaining part ownership in all buildings erected on the site. These may later be sold or kept for annual income.

Engineering and architectural studies have been underway for more than a year, Corts said, and construction on the first phase could begin by spring.

## John Perdew assumes Woodland Mills post

First Baptist Church, Woodland Mills, called John M. Perdew as pastor. His first Sunday was Sept. 28.

Previously, he served at First Baptist Church, South Bend, Texas. He had an internship with First Baptist Church, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

The Pittsburgh, Pa., native is a graduate of Oklahoma (Stillwater) State University, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

# Moderates respond to Peace Committee

RICHMOND, Va. (BP)— Moderate-conservatives in the Southern Baptist Convention have called upon the SBC Peace Committee to consider their concerns about the strife-torn denomination.

"We are putting our proposals and concerns on the table. There is nothing covert or indirect about them," said James Slatton, pastor of River Road Baptist Church in Richmond, Va.

Saying he was "speaking for moderates," Slatton added: "We feel the Peace Committee has addressed itself to the concerns of the fundamentalists. Moderates until now pretty much have been dealt out of the picture."

He contacted Baptist Press immediately following the latest meeting of the Peace Committee, which has been charged with determining causes of the SBC controversy and offering solutions.

During that meeting, the Peace Committee voted 19-0 to accept a statement of reconciliation and solution offered by presidents of the six SBC seminaries. Most notably, the presidents' "Glorieta Statement" affirms their belief that the '66 books of the Bible are not errant in any area of reality," and it pledges to enforce professors' compliance to the schools' confessional statements.

"The seminary presidents have responded to the concerns of the fundamentalists as conveyed to them by the Peace Committee and have responded as to what they would do," Slatton said. "This now will be the most revealing moment in our long and tragic controversy, or the ball is now in the court of the fundamentalists. Now we will see whether they intend to continue making a division among us or whether they will now act to respond to the concerns of moderates, who represent at least half or more of the house."

"We will see whether the intention of the other side is control through this action of the Peace Committee, or whether it is concern for the well-being of the whole body."

Joining Slatton in presenting the proposal were Winfred Moore, pastor of First Baptist Church of Amarillo, Texas, and moderate-conservative candidate for SBC president the past two years; and Norman Cavender, a layman from Claxton, Ga., who joined Slatton in presenting moderate-conservative concerns to the Peace Committee's subcommittee on denominational politics this summer.

"Now that the presidents of the seminaries have made a united effort toward peace and reconciliation, there must be movement on all sides toward peace to match that which the presidents have done," said Moore, a member of the Peace Committee. "There has to be movement; it cannot be left where it is. We must move toward a common center point."

"The seminary presidents have bent over backwards in an attempt to find authentic peace, a way in which we can have inclusion of all our people and all our sincerely held views," Cavender added. "Now we're going to find out if the other side wants peace."

Slatton said moderate-conservatives call upon SBC President Adrian Rogers and fundamental-conservatives in the convention "to show us now in the following positive ways that they intend to use this moment of opportunity for peace instead of division."

## China missionary dies in Richmond

RICHMOND, Va.— Louise Ellyson Westbrook, an emeritus Southern Baptist foreign missionary to China, died Oct. 26 in Richmond, Va. She was 92 years old.

Mrs. Westbrook was the daughter of William Ellyson, trustee president of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board from 1916 to 1919. She did volunteer work at a Baptist goodwill center in Richmond for 10 years before leaving in 1923 to join her missionary sister in Shanghai, China.

At the University of Shanghai she became the girls' athletic director and met the man she would later marry, the late C. Hart Westbrook. Her husband, a Southern Baptist missionary, held many educational positions including dean at the university.

After marrying in 1924, she was appointed a Southern Baptist missionary in 1925. She continued as the girls' athletic director and an evangelistic worker at the university from 1925 to 1948, except during World War II when she and her twin daughters came back to the States. She retired in 1953.

Mrs. Westbrook attended Woman's College (now Westhampton College of the University of Richmond); Hollins (Va.) College; and William and Mary Extension School of Social Work (now the academic division of Virginia Commonwealth University), Richmond.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. George H. Rose of Harrisonburg, Va., and Mrs. Charles L. Smith of Albemarle, N.C.; and a sister, Mrs. J. H. Wiley of Richmond.

"First, we call upon the Peace Committee to replace Cecil Sherman (a moderate who resigned at the latest committee meeting) with a clearly, openly, and completely identified moderate leader.

"We call for the SBC Forum and Pastors' Conference to be united into one conference, the program to be planned and carried out by an equal number of moderate committee members and fundamental-conservative committee members, with the publicly avowed intention that no one who is a spokesman for either side to be on the program and that the issues which have been in dispute between us not be addressed."

The Forum and Pastors' Conference, both of which meet immediately prior to the SBC annual meeting each summer, have been seen by some observers as politicized meetings of the convention's two polar factions.

"We call upon President Rogers, as an act of good faith no matter what actions he may already have taken, to appoint as the SBC Committee on Committees the sitting presidents of the eligible state conventions and the sitting presidents of the Woman's Missionary Unions of the eligible state conventions."

SBC bylaws require the Committee on Committees to be composed of a layperson and pastor from each eligible state convention. Since the WMU presidents would comprise the laypeople on the committee and some state convention presidents are laymen, Slatton suggested the pastors who most recently served as presidents of those conventions represent them on the committee.

"We call upon the fundamental-conservatives to stand down on political organizing and that each side refrain from sending an emissary around the country to organize politically and to promote a partisan agenda for the annual meeting.

"We call upon the Southern Baptist Advocate to cease publishing attacks on Southern Baptist institutions and their employees." The Advocate is a news journal supported by the fundamental-conservatives within the convention.

"We call for a joint committee of moderate-conservatives and fundamental-conservatives, selected by their respective sides and consisting of equal numbers from both sides, to meet to choose a candidate for convention president in San Antonio, Texas, in 1988 or sooner if Dr. Rogers chooses not to run again next year, with both sides being pledged to support the mutual candidate.

"We call upon the Peace Committee to convene a true and actual peace conference between equal numbers of moderate-conservative and fundamental-conservative leaders to refine the details of this proposal. We propose

that the presidents of the seminaries and the Peace Committee join in a joint release affirming this further step toward peace.

"We call on the fundamentalist leadership to respond to this now, not at some distant future time."

Describing the challenge as a proposal to get the Peace Committee next to consider moderate-conservative concerns, Slatton said: "The proposal goes even beyond the steps taken by the seminary presidents. It goes to the heart of the issues at stake before us."

Speaking of his hope for peace and willingness to be a reconciler, Moore, said, "If concrete movement is made in that direction (toward peace, as initiated by the seminary presidents), I would request permission to nominate for the presidency Dr. Rogers or somebody else, if there is movement toward peace."

"The burden now is on the Peace Committee," Cavender added. "They have in hand half the solution for peace. The other half will have to come through the Peace Committee as they deal with the fundamentalists' stacking of boards and attempted fundamentalist domination of everybody."

Copies of the challenge are being sent to members of the Peace Committee, members of the SBC Executive Committee, the six seminary presidents, and fundamental-conservative leaders Paul Pressler of Houston and Paige Patterson of Dallas, Slatton said.

Moderate-conservative leaders are attempting "to make this as clearly as possible a formal moderate-side proposal" for denominational peace and reconciliation, Slatton said. "We intend to be back as a group in 10 to 14 days to make a public response concerning whether we have been heard. We are going to stick with this."

vention." The funds would be used to set up an office with a part-time secretary and computer capacities.

Markham told the Baptist and Reflector that the group will operate outside the state, not within Tennessee Baptist politics. "Our group is organized for the purpose of support, fellowship, and dealing with issues confronting us in the Southern Baptist Convention" he said, expressing regret that the two letters went out together to give the impression that "Concerned Tennesseans" were endorsing a slate of TBC candidates.

In response to a question about the timing of the letters in view of the apparent "breakthrough" by the SBC Peace Committee (see Baptist and Reflector, Oct. 29, pages 1, 3, 5), Markham said, "We are supportive of the efforts of the Peace Committee, and in no way would we interfere with their work to bring us together as Southern Baptists."

## Paris church calls Stawski as pastor

OSHAKATI, Namibia (BP)— Emilia Noah, an active member of Oshakati Baptist Church, became a noncombatant casualty of the internal strife in Namibia (South West Africa).

In August, Oshakati, Namibia, came under mortar attack for the third time in 16 months, according to a report just received from the field. During the battle, soldiers returned the fire of fleeing attackers, shooting directly into the black housing area.

Noah, 45, was wounded fatally when an apparently stray bullet crashed through her home. Five other civilians died in the clash.

Despite the warfare and a curfew that limits church functions to daylight hours, Oshakati Baptist Church is growing, said Adney and Vel Cross, Southern Baptist missionaries who work in the area.

The country is involved in a struggle for independence from South African control.

## EDITORIAL

# TBC messengers to gather for important convention

For the 112th time, messengers from throughout Tennessee will gather for the annual session of the Tennessee Baptist Convention, when the state convention meets next week at Freedom Hall in Johnson City.

Because of the large number of Baptist churches and church members in this part of the state, it is possible that a record number of messengers will register. The present record is 1,738 messengers which attended the 1984 TBC at Belmont Heights Baptist Church in Nashville.

The Committee on Arrangements will recommend an outstanding program for the Nov. 11-13 convention — built around the theme, "A People of Great Heritage, Great Heart, and Great Hope." A highlight of the session will be the premiere of the new TBC film, "Tennessee Baptist Convention — On Mission Together," on Wednesday night.

Although inspirational messages and music are a vital part of these annual gatherings, the convention technically meets each year to transact the business of the convention — and there are some significant matters to be faced.

## COOPERATIVE PROGRAM BUDGET-GOAL

The Executive Board will recommend a challenging \$22.5-million Cooperative Program budget-goal for the November 1986-October 1987 convention year.

The recommended budget-goal of \$22.5-million is 7.14 percent higher than the \$21-million goal for the convention year which closed last month and 8.01 percent higher than the \$20,831,030.34 received for the Cooperative Program during the 1985-86 convention year.

For the 10th consecutive year, the Executive Board will recommend that the percentage shared with the Southern Baptist Convention missions and ministries through the SBC Cooperative Program be increased. The recommendation is that the percentage be increased from 36.75 percent to 37 percent.

Although this one-fourth of 1 percent might seem rather small, it means that the amount going to the SBC Cooperative Program will increase by 7.87 percent, while the Tennessee portion will increase by 6.72 percent.

## ELECTION OF TBC OFFICERS, TRUSTEES

Elections are always an important part of any Tennessee Baptist Convention.

Although any messenger supposedly is free to nominate any Tennessee Baptist for TBC president, tradition would dictate that the new president will come from the middle part of the state, since the presidency rotates among the three grand divisions of Tennessee.

Because tradition also forbids "public" campaigns, no one can predict who will be nominated on Wednesday afternoon for TBC president. The most frequent names we have heard as possible nominees (listed alphabetically) are Paul Durham, pastor of Radnor Baptist Church, Nashville, and Jerry Oakley, pastor of Springfield Baptist Church, Springfield.

In addition, the messengers will elect five other officers: vice-president, second vice-president, registration secretary, recording secretary, and statistical secretary.

Other important elections will come on Wednesday afternoon, when the

messengers will name 132 Tennesseans as members of the Executive Board and trustees for 10 TBC institutions and agencies and 53 members to 10 TBC committees. Nominations will be made by the Committee on Boards and the Committee on Committees.

## TENNESSEE BAPTIST ADULT HOMES

Three years ago, the messengers to the 1983 state convention voted to ask the Board of Directors of Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes Inc. "to study the utilization of existing institutions and agencies for elderly care and to formulate specific plans for the future ministry Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc."

The study has now been completed and TBAH will make a report concerning the study to the messengers on Wednesday morning.

## POSSIBLE OTHER MATTERS AT 1986 TBC

In recent years, resolutions have attracted much interest at meetings of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Resolutions Committee will report at the Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning sessions.

These would appear to be the major business items on next week's agenda. However, there could also be other important matters presented, since any messenger can make any motion considered appropriate during the three miscellaneous business periods.

All of this would indicate that the 112th annual Tennessee Baptist Convention will be an important one for our state convention. Please pray that God's Holy Spirit will lead the messengers to make decisions which will advance the work of God's kingdom through our state convention.

## Accelerated TBC politics

Baptist politics — SBC style — are making giant, unwelcomed strides in Tennessee.

About a decade ago, "conservatives" in the Southern Baptist Convention began to seek control of SBC institutions by influencing the election of trustees for these institutions. Leaders of this "conservative" movement said that this was done because of "cronyism" which had put the same people from the same churches on SBC boards and committees.

This same argument emerged last November at a meeting of the Tennessee Baptist Conservative Fellowship when it was announced that challenges would be made to the TBC Committee on Committees' nominations the following afternoon. A challenge was made, although the messengers approved the committee's nomination.

This meeting of the Tennessee Baptist Conservative Fellowship was announced during the convention by the TBC president.

Since last November, other matters have surfaced of a political nature. The TBC Committee on Boards and Committee on Committees seek suggestions from Tennessee Baptists. A form is printed in the Baptist and Reflector for this purpose. In recent years, no more than two dozen of such forms have been sent in. This year these committees were besieged by hundreds of returned forms, repeatedly nominating the same people.

In recent days we have heard of an organized plan to challenge several nominations by the Committee on Boards and the Committee on Committees at next week's convention. Although this is certainly permitted, until last year's convention, no one could recall when it last happened.

Another rumor is that an amendment will be presented to the bylaws to have the TBC president appoint the Committee on Committees — like the Southern Baptist Convention — rather than have that committee nominated by the Committee on Boards. We assume the advocates of such action desire the same results that the SBC procedure has produced.

Last spring, Tennessee became the focus of the SBC presidential race, with rallies held by supporters of both candidates in our state.

Now, we have sunk to an even lower level. Last week Tennesseans received a mailing with two letters — one seeking funds for "Concerned Tennesseans" to fight "militant fundamentalism" and the other recommending candidates for four elections next week in Johnson City.

At least two of the four recommended "candidates" were astonished that their names were being circulated in a letter — without their knowledge or permission — by someone who is part of a political group.

It is deplorable that Tennessee has reached this level of denominational politics. What evolved over a decade in SBC life has happened in Tennessee in 12 short months!

We dare not even contemplate what will happen next. We urge these Tennessee politicians to exercise discretion in Tennessee Baptist life. God has blessed us with some wonderful opportunities to serve Him through our state convention. We must not allow our political ambitions to deter us from our cooperative task of proclaiming the gospel of Christ in this state, in Michigan, in Venezuela, and throughout this needy world.

## Response to TBAH report

Dear editor:  
I want to respond to Dr. Willis Bennett's study conducted for Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes and the TBAH report (Baptist and Reflector, Oct. 29).  
Dr. Bennett gives four recommendations based on his study. His study suffers from several limitations which affect the results and recommendations. The continuation of TBAH in its present form is assumed, although this assumption is in direct conflict with an earlier report (page 2).

Secondly, the study does not deal adequately with finances. Dr. Bennett recommends that "expansion of retirement facilities into other regions of Tennessee should be pursued by TBAH in collaboration with private developers, churches, and/or associations, but should be limited to residential living only and developed at no ultimate cost to TBAH." This is an admirable goal, but is it realistic and how can it be accomplished? Tennessee Baptists have not yet been given specific plans for the future ministry of TBAH.

Thirdly, the study seems limited in its survey respondents. The study of Dr. John Ray of the University of Tennessee promises to be the most comprehensive

report on elderly needs.

Dr. Bennett assumes continued management by TBAH of the existing ministries and he recommends improvement in management and expansion of facilities and ministry of TBAH. Can the Holston Baptist Association be made the agents of the TBAH and utilize the Roach Trust Fund? It seems again that Tennessee Baptists get drawn into obligatory ministry, rather than action on a well-developed plan.

Dr. Bennett recommends the employment of a full-time director and expanding the job description. This is a premature step, and I hope that it will come after specific plans have been formulated.

The last recommendation simply urges the TBAH Board of Directors to prepare appropriate reports and requests to the TBC to implement the long-range plan it adopts.

Dear editor:  
Some additional facts I believe Tennessee Baptists should know about Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes are:

TBAH promised they would not use Cooperative Program funds. To date TBAH has spent some \$1,000,000 of Cooperative Program money, mostly for salary and office expenses.

TBAH owns no facilities: neither Deer Lake nor the Lenoir City nursing home. The contract under which TBAH operates the Lenoir City nursing home contains the following restriction clause:

"Section 8.10 Restriction Against Certain Religious Activities.

"(a) The Lessee hereby covenants that throughout the Lease Term no part of the Project shall be used for sectarian instruction, or as a place of religious worship, or in connection with any part of a program of a school or department of divinity of any religious denomination.

"(b) The Issuer and the Lessee hereby agree that upon the termination of the Lease Term, any deed or other instruments conveying the right, title, and interest of the Issuer in and to the Project, shall provide that, so long as the Project shall exist and the Lessee or the Sublessee, or any person connected with the Lessee or the Sublessee, shall own any part thereof, no part of the Project shall be used for sectarian instruction, or as a place of religious worship, or in connection with any part of a program of a school or department of divinity of any religious denomination."

To violate this agreement is illegal.

To honor the agreement is to sell our birthright.

I don't know if Tennessee Baptists are willing to commit large sums of mission dollars to TBAH programs.

But I cannot believe we are ready to sell our birthright for government gold just so we can hang a Baptist sign over the driveway.

## Personal Perspective

I have been pondering the meaning of Psalm 27:4, "One thing have I desired of the Lord, that would I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life."

I do not think the psalmist meant that his desire was unbroken residence in a material temple. Nor do I think he was saying that he wants to loiter in the house of worship, idle, under the pretense of worship, and thereby escape the demands of life.

I understand that a custom of that day was giving a man who took refuge in the tent or house of a tribal chief guest-rights of protection, provision, and friendship. I have read that if a person, even a bitter enemy to blood relatives of the owner of the house, should gain entrance and partake of the salt of the host, it was the responsibility of the owner to keep his guest safe and to watch over the life of the fugitive even as he would watch over his own life. This occurred in spite of the fact that under other circumstances he would be a bitter enemy.

When we translate this in our own life, I believe it is saying that while I may be weak and sinful, I can come to our Heavenly Father and claim the hospitality, love, provision, protection, and friendship which the laws of the house do bestow upon a guest. This might have been the background of the statement when Paul said, "Ye are no more strangers but fellow-citizens with the saints, and of the household of God."

This surely steadies us in all circumstances to know that we are in God's house, that we are close to God, and that His hand is upon us.

There is a sobering thought about all of this. No one of us can claim the rights to residence in God's house for a longer time than we seek those rights. We are to desire it and seek after it.

With this thought in mind, we can be assured that when the days of our physical lives have passed, "we will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."



### Other Recommendations from the Constitution and Bylaws Committee:

—That the committee declines to recommend the adoption of the following amendment to Bylaw 2, (1) Nominations, C. referred to it by the 1985 convention:

The permanent chairmen shall have served at least one year as members of their respective committees with the exception of new standing committees.

# Jesus heals the sick

Basic Passage: John 4:43 to 5:18  
Focal Passages: John 5:2-3, 5-18

You will recall from comments in the first lesson in this series that the Gospel of John is "very theological, very doctrinal, and very important."

John does not deal with the infancy of Jesus and His childhood but moves directly to His manhood and purpose for being in the world in physical form. With this in mind, Bible students will be able to have a better understanding of this gospel.

In other words, the miracles Jesus performed are usually more than sick people becoming well, as marvelous as these events are. The gospel writer is selecting various acts of healing to show the Messiah's power over natural and spiritual illness.

Even though Jesus performed many miraculous signs and wonders which are not recorded (John 20:30-31). He apparently did not heal all persons who were ill. Have you ever wondered why there were so many hurting people who were in need of miraculous help, yet Jesus simply did nothing to help them?

This same question confronts contemporary Christians today. Why is there suffering both physically and emotionally in the world when God has the power to heal and soothe? These kinds of questions are not easy to answer.

You and I are caught in a limited time frame called physical life, mortal existence. From our extremely limited viewpoint, we seek immediate answers to what we determine is important. We want life to be trouble free with an absence of pain and disappointment.

Financial security, peace, and recognition too often are the gods of redeemed as well as unredeemed humanity. When Job faced this same dilemma, one main

point God made to him was that God did not have to fully explain any of His ways to Job and whatever life was like, Job had to trust God.

People during that first century saw Jesus as a source of immediate aid, but He wanted them to look beyond the physical to the spiritual. Jesus showed His power over physical objects by changing water into wine and by healing the government official's son. He showed not only His power over human suffering but He also revealed that His power was not limited to time and space. Jesus was teaching something about His unique power and was attempting to begin pointing people to a higher purpose for His presence.

In the healing of the man beside the pool, Jesus also showed His concern for the neglected of society. Here Jesus again was pointing to the absurdity of religious laws which get in the way of the work of God.

Our Lord stressed the essential value of faith in the relationship between mankind and God. Concern for physical needs alone and/or a "social gospel" approach does not satisfy the basic need people have, which is spiritual. Let us hasten to say that Jesus never said that God is not interested in humanity's physical welfare. He is interested and Biblical teaching urges us to seek to meet human need. In fact, Jesus said if His people appear before Him in judgment without having attempted to care for physical needs of people, "these shall go away into everlasting punishment" (Matthew 25:46).

It is not a matter of "either-or" but "both-and." Neither area should overshadow the other. Certainly the spiritual side of the subject reminds us that the kingdom of God is not physical but spiritual. But since we are trapped in this physical house, God shows us spiritual truths through physical things. God is teaching you and me through things we can attempt to grasp. Jesus was and is the epitome of God's attempt to tell us something of what He is like and how His people should behave.

The Apostle Paul later seeks to follow this same line of thought to remind us that Christ is over and in all of life (Romans 9:5).

# Southern Kingdom falls

Basic Passage: 2 Kings 24:18 to 25:21; Jeremiah 7  
Focal Passage: 2 Kings 24:18 to 25:9

Judah's survival beyond the point of Israel's demise amounted to a 135-year reprieve. She outlasted her northern sister for a variety of reasons. But eventually her sin took its toll, as is the case with all instances of unrenounced sin.

**Jeremiah's deliverances (Jeremiah 7)**

Judah was gifted with a compassionate and persistent prophet. This prophet, Jeremiah, faithfully renounced Judah's sins and warned them of God's judgment for almost 40 years before the end came. He did this even though God told him that the nation would not listen to him (v.27) and forbade him to pray for them (v.16).

Although many of the messages Jeremiah delivered have a ready application to our own day, we would do well also to note a major difference.

Israel (or Judah in that period) was a theocracy with a covenant relationship to God. The theocratic ideal was for God to rule through the king, who was to enforce the laws of God as being binding upon the civil state.

America, or any other nation, has never had such a covenant relationship. Although it continues to be true that righteousness exalts a nation (Proverbs 14:34), we must not make the mistake of using the force of law to exact conduct from people, a conduct which requires freedom if it is to be moral.

We violate the cherished principle of separation of church and state when the apparatus of civil authority is invoked to enforce peculiarly religious conduct. Our democracy must not be confused with their theocracy.

Yet as Christian citizens, we are called to seek justice and righteousness in our national affairs. Separation of church and state does not mean the separation of religion and politics. As institutions, churches and government cannot play favorites nor be partial in mutual support. As individual citizens, we can and must seek a just society under a free state - upholding the rights of all, including those who disagree with us.

The crux of Jeremiah's condemnation in this chapter is that they trust in deceptive words like "the Temple of the Lord"

(v.4) while failing to execute justice (v.5); oppressing foreigners, fatherless, and widows; shedding innocent blood; and going after other gods (v.6). Yet they do it to no avail (v.8), because their wretched lives are at variance with their pious words (vv.7ff.).

While boastfully exclaiming, "the Temple of the Lord," they ignored the worship of God and His work. Could it be that we declare the Bible is "the Word of God," while ignoring its clear but costly teachings? Our talk about total belief of Biblical truths does not fool God or other people when we are so selective in which teachings we will uphold and which we will ignore.

For example, we rightfully champion the right to life of the unborn fetus, while sentencing babies to death by starvation through our exaggerated affluence, our stingy giving to hunger relief, and our political indifference to national spending that turns a deaf ear to the five-digit number of people that starve to death every day.

We bemoan the fact that pagan and un-pagan teachers alike are not required to pray with our school children, while we are silent or complicit to a nuclear buildup that betrays our national trust in weapons rather than the God Whom we claim to trust.

We take pride in the inscription "In God we trust" on our money, while in reality trusting more in the money that bears the inscription than we do in the God to Whom it refers.

In it all, do we not betray our true determination to walk by sight rather than by faith while claiming to be people of faith?

**Judah's dilemma (2 Kings 24:18-25:5)**

Judah fell on the installment plan, so to speak. After a deportation of Jews to Babylon in 597 B.C., Zedekiah came to the throne of a greatly diminished kingdom that had already been weak. He wavered for much of his reign between the advice of submissiveness to Babylon that Jeremiah gave and that of rebellion which the superpatriots of Jerusalem gave.

Finally, at a precipitous moment, Zedekiah rebelled. The forces of Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon threw a siege around Jerusalem. The prolonged siege soon led the city to the point of starvation.

The second dilemma for Zedekiah was whether to surrender or to attempt to escape. He chose the latter but once again to no avail. The quick pursuit of the Babylonian troops thwarted his escape efforts into the southern desert.

**Jerusalem's destruction (2 Kings 25:6-9)**

The gory details of the aftermath are reported in conclusion. The captured king is blinded only after he is forced to witness the slaughter of his sons. Nebuzaradan, the captain of King Nebuchadnezzar's bodyguard, destroyed the city of Jerusalem by fire. This included the king's palace and the Temple that Solomon had built - the focus of the deceptive words in which they had trusted.

# My brother's keeper

Basic Passage: Genesis 4:1 to 5:32  
Focal Passages: Genesis 4:3-12, 15

Jesus summarized the law by saying, "Love God with all your heart. Love your neighbor as yourself."

The first two questions God asked parallel this interpretation. He said to Adam, after Adam's sin, "Where art thou?" He inquired of Cain, after Cain's sin, "Where is ... thy brother?"

This vertical-horizontal relationship continues today as the twofold requirement for anyone who wishes to please God and find self-fulfillment.

Life goes on. Though removed from the garden, Adam and Eve went about their daily duties and engaged in normal relationships. Even before the first sin, God had commanded them, "Be fruitful and multiply" (1:28).

The first two offsprings, though children of the same parents, differed greatly. Environment alone does not determine one's destiny. Choices, not chances, make the difference between a life of godliness and one of sin! A good family background certainly helps, but it does not always guarantee a godly child. One must never feel guilty if good training fails to produce character. We must do all we can but we must not be burdened with guilt if our child, after proper

instruction and example, makes a deliberate choice to go astray.

A large national firm spent \$1-million to determine the single most important trait in business. The \$1-million word was "attitude."

If a person is right in everything else and has the wrong attitude, he will most likely fail in life. A person, however, can be wrong about many things, but if his attitude is right, it will cover a multitude of errors and go a long way toward making him a success.

Cain brought fruit from the field as an offering to God. Abel brought a sacrifice from the flock.

We do not have sufficient information to be dogmatic about why God was pleased with one man's worship but not the other. A strong school of thought insists Abel's blood offering made the difference. The writer of Hebrews mentions Abel's faith as the determining factor of obtaining "witness that he was righteous" (11:4).

God's rebuke of Cain's surly disposition did not seem to affect him. Have you noticed how seldom people with a vindictive spirit can recognize their anti-social attitude? Yet, one can if he will!

I personally like the translation by a rabbi who wrote, "Why art thou wroth? and why is thy countenance fallen? If

thou doest well, shall it not be lifted up? and if thou doest not well, sin coucheth at the door; and unto thee is its desire, but thou mayest rule over it" (4:6-7).

The important point is "but thou mayest," and that depends upon our attitude!

The terrible fruit of hatred (4:8-14)  
How long did Cain hate his brother? The answer to that childhood riddle is, "As long as he was 'Abel.'" A lot of truth is found in that little conundrum. When hatred seizes a person, he loses all control of his emotions. It starts with envy but moves quickly to more serious things. The Bible records the killing but moves quickly to the consequences.

What a bitter price Cain had to pay for his hatred! In the garden, sin separated man and woman from God. Cain's sin separated him from relationships in the larger world. He became a wanderer. A loveless person becomes a lonely person. This sin affects a people's lifestyle. It causes restless impulses, ever changing moods, and strange fancies to spring up within them.

The only sure way to conquer the selfishness that leads to hatred is to receive the love of Christ into our hearts. Those who know God's forgiveness through His Son are best qualified to "Look not ... on his own things, but also on the things of others" (Philippians 2:4).

# Tennessee senior finds fiddling fun

RIDGECREST, N.C. — Cecile is a ferocious fiddler.

She starts out playing "Pop Goes the Weasel" just like any fiddler would — with the fiddle under her chin.

All of a sudden, she whips the fiddle behind her back and continues playing with no change in the quality of sound.

Then she snaps the fiddle from behind her back and pops it on her head, fiddling all the while. Then it goes between her knees, between her ankles, and even in her mouth.

The crowd roars.

Cecile McKinnie should know when she has pleased a crowd. She has been playing the fiddle for more than 50 years.

"I started playing the fiddle right after the Depression when I was 11 years old," McKinnie said.

McKinnie displayed her talents before a crowd of nearly 1,000 recently during a talent show at Ridgecrest (N.C.) Baptist Conference Center during a senior adult Chautauqua. The family ministry department of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board sponsors 10 Chautauquas each fall at Ridgecrest and Glorieta (N.M.) Baptist conference centers.

McKinnie, a Bolivar resident, is hardly a newcomer to the stage.

A decision 42 years ago to become a wife, a mother, and a homemaker took her away from stage performances three years after she began. But McKinnie said she has no regrets.

McKinnie's husband-to-be at the time, Ewell McKinnie, was off fighting in World War II, she said. So McKinnie had

plenty of time to travel and play her fiddle.

She said she started playing on radio stations WREC and WMC in Memphis with a group of girls who called themselves "Angelina's Yodeling Cowgirls" before joining other groups in Memphis and Dallas.

But some of her best memories, Mc-

Kinnie said, are when she played at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville in the spring of 1941 with such country personalities as Roy Acuff, Minnie Pearl, and Bill Monroe.

When Ewell came home from the war in March 1944, the couple was married four days later.

Four years later, Ewell surrendered to church work, she said, and the couple became involved in mission work, organ-

izing churches in Arizona, Arkansas, and Tennessee.

McKinnie said she has not let her fiddle-playing talent die.

"I teach a senior adult ladies class at church (First Baptist Church, Bolivar), and we have a ministry to children at the Western Mental Health Institute.

"We sing hymns and I play the fiddle," said McKinnie, who also plays the auto-harp and mandolin.

## Internationals offer churches foreign missions at doorstep

NASHVILLE (BP) — Southern Baptists can find foreign missions at their own doorsteps by ministering to refugees, foreign business professionals, students, and illegal aliens, a worker with internationals told church leaders.

"We can deal with the people God has put right under our noses by teaching them English and being friends," said Glenda Reece, a Raleigh, N.C., teacher and Southern Baptist Home Mission Board volunteer specialist in conversational English.

Reece led sessions during a training conference in Nashville for campus and church leaders working with internationals. The conference was sponsored by the national student ministries department of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board.

International college students on campuses throughout the United States total more than 344,000. They may be found on virtually every college campus in the nation, said Nell Magee, national student ministries consultant for international students. State student ministries directors reported Baptist international student programs on 371 campuses last year, with 55 programs for international wives. They cited immediate goals of 163 additional campus international student programs.

National student ministries statistics indicate 1,571 churches have ministries to international college students.

"We have multiple opportunities to use English as a bridge to reach people," said Reece, who is writing a book on

teaching English as a second language through the use of Bible stories. In addition to teaching English as a second language in the Raleigh school system, Reece works in the international department at Forest Hills Baptist Church in Raleigh. The church ministers to international students, business professionals, refugees, and illegal aliens, all of whom live and work in most cities, she said.

The language needs of internationals range from survival English skills to academic English but they all have needs to be met, she added, noting while it may be impossible to win some internationals to Christ through love, caring, and friendship, it may be possible to make them friends of Christ.

International students or professionals from non-Christian cultures could be influential when they return to their countries if they have been befriended and developed an understanding of Christians they met here, Reece pointed out.

Baptist college students should work to develop friendships with international students, Magee said: "We need to be careful not to just invite them to church. That gives the message we are only interested in their becoming Christians. We need to understand them and help them feel good about themselves and what they are doing."

Once international students become oriented to their new surroundings and are willing to move outside their ethnic groups, they need people who are understanding, she said.

## Interpretations

### Jesus' first miracle

"This beginning of miracles did Jesus in Cana of Galilee, and manifested forth His glory" (John 2:11).

The Greek text of John's Gospel never uses the word for "miracle." Here John uses *semeion* (signs). They were signs of Jesus' deity. In fact, the structure of this Gospel is built about such signs (see John 20:30-31).

Shortly after His return to Galilee, Jesus, His mother, and His disciples were invited to attend a marriage feast. These lasted about a week, with different guests being invited for different times

of the week. It was customary to serve the best quality of wine first. Later they served wine of a lesser quality (v.10).

It was probably late in the week. Mary learned that they had run out of wine. This could embarrass the host. So she brought the matter to Jesus' attention (v.3). He replied, "Woman, what have I to do with thee? Mine hour is not yet come" (v.4). As guests, the shortage of wine was not their problem. And He had a far greater work than providing wine.

Some see in Jesus' use of "woman" disrespect for His mother. This was not the case. The Greek word is *gune*. Caesar used this word in addressing Cleopatra. It carried the idea of respect but separation. Jesus used it in addressing Mary from the cross (John 19:26). Of interest is the fact that in His public ministry, Jesus never used "mother" in direct address to Mary.

Implied is the idea that as Jesus' mother, she told Him what to do. Gently but with all respect. He reminded her that their relationship was not that of mother and son but that He was now her Saviour. Nevertheless, she told the servants to do whatever He said.

Large pots of water were kept nearby for ceremonial cleansing. Jesus told them to fill the pots with water, draw from them, and take a sample to the ruler of the feast. When it arrived, it was wine. The ruler of the feast declared it to be the best wine saved for the last.

John was a mystic. Often his words had a deeper meaning than appeared on the surface. So the sense is that not only was it the best wine, but that God's revelation in Jesus is the best — superior to His revelation in the Old Testament.

## Martin refreshes missionaries in world hot spot this summer

FORT WORTH, Texas (BP) — Most people are looking for a way out of Beirut, Lebanon. Earl Martin found a way in.

Martin, professor of missions and world religions at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, spent three days in the war-torn city this summer. He went at the request of Southern Baptist missionaries serving in Beirut.

The trip was part of a three-month tour of Europe and the Middle East in preparation for a class Martin will teach at Southwestern seminary next spring.

"I was very much aware of the fact that four days after I left Beirut, intensive shelling occurred," Martin reports. The shelling was followed by a car bomb killing nine people and wounding 85.

But Martin did not step in harm's way seeking accolades. And he said Southern Baptist missionaries serving in Lebanon do not either.

One missionary told him, "We are neither cowards nor heroes."

"They are mindful of the dangers and aware that the Lord has not abandoned them, so they're staying and going about their work," Martin says. "These missionaries are spending careers in a hot spot and in isolation. They wanted someone to come in and minister to them. I couldn't refuse."

Martin spoke at the Baptist seminary in Beirut. A student there told him, "I'm going to stay right here and minister. I love these people and this country."

The student taught the missions professor the importance of faithful mission service. "We must be faithful in the difficult, no-progress areas because you don't know when a situation will open up," he explains. "The churches are vibrant and growing."

"The war has made a lot of people open to the gospel."
