## Union launches \$5 million campus redesign project

JACKSON — Union University will spend nearly \$5 million during the next five years in the first phase of an extensive redesign of the 15-year-old campus.

President Hyran Barefoot said the long-range master plan could boost enrollment on the Jackson campus to as high as 2500 in the 21st century.

Phase one calls for relocation of the main entrance from the U. S. 45 Bypass to Country Club Lane; construction of additional student apartments, a new commons building and parking; and construction of the college's first student union building.

Cost of the housing and student union building is estimated at about \$4.8 million, Barefoot said.

The campus redesign, recently approved by the school's trustees, is the first such long-range plan since architects designed the new campus in the early 1970s. All construction had been based on those plans, which is now complete.

The long-range plans call for adding a second housing complex and commons area for up to 232 additional students. Site preparation has already begun for the first stage of construction, which will provide 22 apartments for 88 female students, as well as the 8000-square-foot commons building.

The \$1.1 million project will provide the first apartments the college has

added in eight years. Furnishings and parking will add another \$200,000 to the total cost, Barefoot added.

The 22 apartments will be ready for August occupancy for students enrolling for the fall semester.

The complex will eventually have 58 apartments housing four students each. The number of units for males and females, as well as future construction, will be dictated by enrollment trends, Barefoot said.

Union currently provides housing for 816 students.

Within the near future the college will also realign parking near existing apartments to provide 60 more spaces, and nearly double the parking at Blasingame Academic Complex.

Under the five-year timetable the Blasingame building will also be increased by 5000 additional square feet.


Construction of Union's first student union building, valued at \$3.5 million, will begin within three to five years, Barefoot said.

Slightly beyond the five-year timetable the college will begin relocating all athletic playing fields and tennis courts to a 40-acre tract recently purchased on Walker Road. The college maintenance building will be moved to the site.

The new athletic area will be located directly across from student housing and will also feature a 1.4 mile fitness

trail for hiking and jogging.

Union originally had 190 acres on the new campus when it relocated from a 22-acre site near downtown Jackson in August 1975. It had been at the down-

town location for 150 years.

In December 1989 it sold 60 acres from its Bypass site and purchased the 40-acre tract across from Walker Road.

## Belmont holds 'grand opening' for Massey Business Center

May 1 marked the grand opening of Belmont College's Jack C. Massey Business Center. The largest single construction project in the history of Belmont College, the \$7.5-million project incorporates the renovation of the historic hall adjacent to the new structure.

The center provides within 115,000-square feet: 16 classrooms, 52 offices,

a conference center and a state-of-the-art learning center with five computer labs. Accommodating more than 1200 undergraduate and 100 graduate students enrolled in Belmont's business schools, the center houses undergraduate and graduate business programs at Belmont, including the Jack C. Massey Graduate School of Business.

The Massey School was established

in 1986 to offer the MBA degree, following an update of the mission statement of the three Baptist colleges by the Tennessee Baptist Convention in 1985. Charged with stressing moral and ethical business issues, the school is founded on the business standards and principles of the late Jack C. Massey.

An internationally known entrepreneur and Baptist layman, Massey died Feb. 15. The business center was officially named in his honor during his last visit to Belmont College last Dec. 14.

He helped lay the groundwork for the Southern Baptist Foundation, and served a 12-year tenure on the board of trustees for Baptist Hospital in Nashville. Massey chaired the building committee during the construction of Belmont Heights Church in Nashville, and contributed greatly to Belmont College.

"Belmont College lost a great friend in Jack Massey, a man whose vision, encouragement, and support have enabled Belmont to grow and develop as a quality institution," said Belmont President William E. Troutt.

## National SBC giving ahead of 1989 pace

NASHVILLE (BP) — Southern Baptists' unified budget remains 1.45 percent ahead of last year's pace after seven months of the current fiscal year.

The national Cooperative Program received \$11,667,118 in April, reported Harold C. Bennett, president and treasurer of the Southern Baptist Executive Committee.

The April total brought year-to-date receipts to \$82,539,644, Bennett said. That is \$1,177,881, or 1.45 percent, more than the Cooperative Program took in during the first seven months of 1988-89, he said.

The gain did not keep pace with inflation, which reached 6.5 percent at the end of the first quarter of 1990, according to the Wall Street Journal.

April receipts dropped \$1,626,759, or 12.24 percent, below receipts for April

1989, the best April in the Cooperative Program's 65-year history.

The current fiscal year will end Sept. 30. The 1989-90 Cooperative Program has a \$134,787,543 basic operating goal.

### More than enough news

This 12-page issue of the Baptist and Reflector contains seven pages of Cooperative Program receipts from the churches, and explanation of receipts distribution.

Because of the paper's need to stay within the operating budget, we can have the larger 16-page edition only a limited number of times.

# Looking at the Cooperative Program — increasing efforts

The six-months treasurer's report is in this issue of the *Baptist and Reflector*, notable by the seven pages that it occupies.

The *Baptist and Reflector* publishes the Tennessee Baptist Convention's Cooperative Program financial report at the end of each quarter during the year. This means that at least twenty-eight pages of the paper are used annually to report on how money is received and disbursed.

It is a system of accountability. Churches are able to check on their giving, and Tennessee Baptists can see how those CP gifts are being used.

We are not making a case for devoting that much space to report financial information. If the *Baptist and Reflector* were reimbursed for those pages, income for the paper's budget would increase by about \$28,000.

In the treasurer's report from D. L. Lowrie, TBC executive director/treasurer, Cooperative Program gifts for the six months

ending April 30 amounted to \$12,711,473. That is an increase of \$537,965 over last year.

The report also notes that other income, excluding CP, missions offerings, and gifts, totalled \$946,764. That figure includes \$242,189 from *Baptist and Reflector* subscriptions and advertising — or 25.5 percent.

We do, however, encourage Tennessee Baptists to study the report each quarter. The studying should be done for positive reasons — not simply to compare what the church across town is giving.

There may be a healthy curiosity in checking on gifts from a church where you served previously as layman or pastor. It could be an accurate gauge of stewardship growth. But it could also be a method of feeding envy or ego.

Cooperative Program giving through Tennessee Baptist churches has increased over last year's giving by slightly more than \$500,000. While that is good, it probably is lower than the rate of inflation.

The convention is operating this year under an austere budget; one that has absolutely no frills. Salary increases, approved last November, are at a minimum. The austerity move will be continued through this next budget year — 1990-91.

It can be argued that many Tennessee Baptist churches are facing difficult financial problems. Many are not able to minister as they want. Some are in economically-stressed areas.

But the budgeting process bears study. This is why we encourage every reader to participate, not only in studying the quarterly TBC reports, but to be involved in the local church budget process. The majority of us probably can give more financially and of ourselves to local ministries and through the Cooperative Program.

When we do, we will grow spiritually and in joy as God's work will abound here and around the world. — WFA

## Baptists' right to know may not be guaranteed

Last week's *Baptist and Reflector* reported a shift in power for trustees of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. It was noted in a thorough story of the board's meeting in Louisville, that "conservatives" had gained control of the seminary's board.

No one has authority to claim the good word "conservative" exclusively. The current bent toward labels makes it convenient to call some conservative and others by a perhaps less likeable term — moderate, liberal, etc.

Before addressing even briefly the Southern Seminary situation, a point should be made. For a decade (since 1979) thousands of Southern Baptists are guilty of nonfeasance. Failure to act, failure to do what ought to be done, has brought us to where we are.

There is another word that characterizes much of what Southern Baptists are doing. The convention has become nondescript. The SBC is difficult to describe, appearing to belong to no certain group.

What the SBC is doing is much more evident to the world than what we say we are doing.

At most meetings of SBC boards, commissions, and institutions, at least one editor from Southern Baptist state papers attends. This

alleviates the burden of doubt sometimes placed on inhouse reporting.

At the April 23-25 Southern Seminary board meeting, Al Mohler, editor of the *Christian Index of Georgia*, represented the state paper editors. He gives firm approval to the *Baptist Press* news article written by Southern staff members, and reported in last week's *Baptist and Reflector*.

But Dr. Mohler informs us that the news was even more devastating than the article reported. He reports that the seminary's board of trustees engaged in almost six hours of executive session — behind closed doors. Mohler and Bob Terry, editor of *Missouri's Word and Way*, were not allowed in that portion of the meeting. Both are Southern alumni. A vote taken to admit them was lost 27-26.

Mohler says, and we agree, that coverage of the meeting was "severely curtailed by the extensive amount of time the board met in executive session." And, he says, the executive session was uncharacteristic of previous Southern Seminary board meetings. It is a woeful thought, but this may be the trend of the future.

The news last week reported that a trustee


distributed a 16-page, single-spaced, typed document of charges against President Roy Honeycutt and the seminary. Action on the document will not be discussed until 1991 — but it had already been released for publication in an autonomous publication, "The Southern Baptist Advocate."

It is a serious matter for a trustee to attack a seminary, and the situation grows more critical because the trustees narrowly voted not to discuss the accusatory document until next year.

The document did appear in print, in full and without any statement of denial by Southern Seminary authorities, early this week. The standard belief of "innocent until proven guilty" has been defied again.

All such actions stem from the overriding elements of distrust and suspicion that exist between and among Southern Baptists.

We strongly urge all SBC boards to transact business, except for delicate personnel matters, in the open. Baptists have a heritage of openness and honesty. Closed meetings breed suspicion. The Baptist way is to let the people know. After all, they will find out eventually. — WFA

# Faith, the key to endurance

Exhortations to hold fast through confession (10:19-25)  
 The Jewish-Christian readers were encouraged to remain committed to Christianity. The writer of Hebrews showed them that Jesus' one great sacrifice was sufficient for all time. He also showed them that the veil separating man from the "Holy of Holies" in the temple was replaced by Christ Himself. People can now enter the presence of God through "the New Veil," Christ (v. 20).

Readers were challenged to take advantage of their new relationship to God and draw near to Him, since through Christ the believers are members of the "House of God." There are requirements for drawing near, however. They had to be cleansed. Just as the priests under the old covenant sprinkled sacrificial blood in a ritualistic cleansing from sin, the blood of Christ that cleansed their conscience had to be applied to their hearts. Too, the readers were admon-

ished that they could not "draw near to God" unless they continued (to hold fast) in their faith in Christ. A final responsibility, or requirement, for drawing near to God was to encourage

(provoke) others to lives that exemplified love which found expression in activities designed to benefit others.

It seems natural that the writer of Hebrews would emphasize the need for these Jewish-Christians to meet together on a regular basis (v. 25). Not only would their worship be enhanced, they would also have the opportunity to determine the needs of one another, express brotherly love, and encourage one another to continue in the faith.

Warning against willful disobedience and encouragement to endure (10:26-39)

Christians were warned that they could not willfully return to a lifestyle that continued in sin without paying a high price. The writer reminded the Hebrews (and us) that there is no forgiveness of sins except through

Jesus. Those who accepted this truth and then returned to their old lifestyle of sin surely faced severe judgment. Although their sins will be forgiven, Christians cannot willfully sin with impunity.

In this passage, the writer expressed confidence that his readers would not return to Judaism. He remembered the tough times they went through in the past and how they remained faithful to Christ. Mindful of their Jewish background, the author cited an Old Testament passage (Habakkuk 2:3-9) to strengthen his plea for them to endure.

**Definition and examples of faith (11:1-40)**

The passage from Habakkuk turns the emphasis towards the importance of faith. In defining faith, the writer of Hebrews made it clear that the promises of God (things hoped for) are real and valid. They cannot be seen for they do not have substance that can be determined by any of the five senses. Yet, these promises take on substance and tangible meaning when people have the faith or confidence that God did send His Son to die for our sins and that His promises to those who accept that sacrifice cannot be false.

In the eleventh chapter of Hebrews, often called "the roll call of the faithful," the writer cited examples of faithfulness in the lives of Old Testa-

ment heroes with which the Jewish-Christian readers were familiar. He referred to instances (v. 33) where the mouths of lions were closed, probably a reference to Daniel's experience; where the fury of the flames were quenched, likely a reference to the furnace experience of the three Hebrews in Babylon; and other dramatic incidents where faith prevailed. All the faithful people mentioned acted on the basis of their faith, not what they were able to see or to intellectually know.

The emphasis on the need to endure through faith is concluded by pointing out that the Old Testament faithful had not lived to see the culmination of God's great promise brought to us through Jesus. Yet they will be united with those who know Christ as we are all brought to the position of perfection through the sacrificial blood of Jesus.

**Summary**

We, like the Hebrews to whom the book was written, are encouraged to remain committed to Christ and His teachings. Those who have accepted the saving grace of our Lord and then return to a lifestyle of sin will surely face severe judgment. With faith in Christ one will have confidence in God to the extent that His promises, though unseen, take on real and substantial meaning. The key to remaining committed is found in the quality of one's faith.

# Fear and love

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear" (v. 18). Then why are we so fearful? Why are we afraid to be real with one another, hiding behind religious talk and activity, while inside we are withered, angry, uptight, and aching to be healed?

Probably our greatest fears have to do with relationships; being rejected or disapproved. We all try to hide from God and from each other, as Adam and Eve did. We are naked before the Lord, and try desperately to prevent being exposed to our fellow man. The first step toward a proper self-image is to admit who we are in Adam and find ourselves accepted in Christ's perfect love.

I suppose all of us experience fear of rejection and always will to some

degree, because love flowing from human nature is conditional. It is based on performance; a system that rewards the good and punishes the bad. Our natural assumption is that God relates to us this way. But God's love is unconditional. He works to transform our behavior, but will never reject us, belittle us, withhold His encouragement, or turn His face away in disgust and impatience. We are totally loved and accepted. I believe as we grow in His perfect love, we are able to extend this same love to others. When I am no longer fearful of God, I begin to be honest before Him and relax. His complete acceptance melts away my shame and covers the horrors of my depravity. I find His strength that overcomes all that will destroy. This begins to free me to reach out.

Oh, the riches of His grace, that would cause Him to enter my life of pain, blindness, and stubbornness! I can do nothing to shock or disappoint my Lord. I can face any spirit of deception, struggle against any personality defect or flesh trap, and win. I can endure any adversity and remain faithful because, "greater is He that is in me than He that is in the world" (v. 4). His perfect love casts out any fear that I will become a castaway from His presence in the day of judgment, because even now, "as He is, so are we in this world" (v. 17). "There is now no condemnation to those who are in Christ" (Romans 8:1, 37-39).

I want others to be set free, so I will commit myself to stand with God and in His strength, pay the price required to flesh out God's love. Bill and Gloria Gaither wrote a song that expresses this truth. "You are loved, I can risk loving you, for the One who knows me best, loves me most. Won't you please take my hand?"

John tells us, "If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen?" (v. 20). Jesus said, "When you have done it unto one of the least of these My brothers, you have done it unto Me." No man has seen God at any time, but we see our brothers in whom He dwells - living, working, worshipping, playing, weeping, rejoicing, debating, encouraging, snubbing, belittling, attacking, and exploiting. We loose sight of the fact that Christ is in each of us and is the recipient of all that we do to each other.

C. S. Lewis expressed it this way. "It is a serious thing to live in a society of possible gods and goddesses. All day long we are in some degree helping each other to one or other of two destinies: immortal horrors or everlasting splendors." Our love must be real and is costly, loving the sinner but hating the sin that mars our glory in Christ. Your Christian brother is a holy creature, destined to share Christ's throne. Do not fear. He will accomplish His work in us (Philippians 1:6), regardless of any negative.

During a hurtful time in the life of my church, the Lord gave me the insight I needed to rise above the destructive turmoil and tremendous fear of rejection. I was to stop discuss-

ing the matter with others and stop rehearsing things in my mind. Prayer was the only safe activity. It proved to be the way to personal victory and

healing. The Holy Spirit was very specific about the wording of my prayer. "Lord, I request in Jesus' name, that You bless (the offender) as I want You to bless me. Forgive his wrong conduct and change wrong attitudes so he can be free and rejoice in You. Be his wisdom and peace. Help him know how much You love him and use me to support this truth by my actions." This prayer begins as an act of obedience that expresses my willingness to lay my life down before the Lord, with no assurance it will turn out comfortable for me.

It is easy to agree to live the crucified life, but when a Christian brother brings a crown of shame down on my head, or spits angry words in my face and sets others against me, I am ready to scream and fight. This is not what I have in mind when I sing, "I surrender all." Indignation and self-pity rise in me and set in motion all manner of destruction. But the Spirit of God in me says, "Lay it down. That is My child you are threatening. This is My work. Stand with Me, for I mean to bless him."

His perfect love casts out fear for what others may think of me. If I allow others to get too close they will surely find a reason to dislike me, but the Lover of my soul will never leave me or forsake me. If Jesus learned obedience by the things He suffered, much more will I.

# Speaking God's truth

Truth can be illusive. Even those who sincerely want the truth or even think they have arrived at the truth may be mistaken. Who do we believe when it is one person's word against another's? Discovering the truth is not always easy. Alfred North Whitehead once remarked that there are no whole truths, only half-truths. Though that is a pessimistic opinion, it still points out that the truth may not be easily discernable.

Jeremiah was one who faced such difficulties regarding the truth — not in himself, but in his hearers. There were many prophets, Jeremiah being only one of them. Who were the people to believe?

The two passages in this week's lesson point out the difficulties surrounding the truth. As Thoreau once put it: "It takes two to speak the truth — one to speak, and another to hear." Jeremiah showed great courage in speaking the truth as he received it from God, no matter what the circumstances or the results.

Who says the Lord says? (28:11-15)  
On several occasions, Jeremiah put his message forth in graphic symbolic images. For a long time he repeated the message that Babylon was God's chosen vessel for bringing judgment and punishment to Judah. The people would come under the yoke of Nebuchadnezzar. Thus, according to the word of the Lord, Jeremiah made yoke-bars of wood and wore them around his neck symbolizing what was to happen to the people (chapter 27:2). This message was given to Zedekiah in 594 B.C. as he considered rebellion against Nebuchadnezzar while a revolt occurred in his army. But the prophet Hananiah removed the yoke-bars from Jeremiah and broke them, saying that within two years God would break the

yoke of Nebuchadnezzar. Hananiah prefaced this prophecy with "Thus says the Lord."  
Jeremiah at first had no response to Hananiah. Perhaps he hoped this new prophecy was right. Or, he had not yet received anything from the Lord in the way of an answer. So, Jeremiah went away. Sometime later God spoke again to Jeremiah and told him to go to Hananiah with "Thus says the Lord." The answer to Hananiah's rosy picture of the near future was that the wooden yoke-bars were to be replaced with iron ones. Judah and the other nations conspiring to prevent the advances of Babylon would all come under the iron yoke of service.

Furthermore, Jeremiah predicted Hananiah's death as an indication that the Lord had not sent him to speak His words of peace. Verse 9 indicates that the burden of proof lies with the prophet of peace. When the predicted

peace comes, then the prophet will be known as sent from God. In the case of Judah, this peace would not come. The people would have to decide who was telling the truth. They were helped to know that Jeremiah was the bearer of truth when Hananiah did in fact die within two months.

Is there any word from the Lord?  
(37:15-18)

King Zedekiah sent a request for Jeremiah's prayers about the time an Egyptian army came which required the Chaldeans (Babylonians) to pull back temporarily from besieging Judah (588 B.C., v. 5). Jeremiah told the king that this was temporary and not to be led to think that Judah could survive.

Jeremiah took advantage of this time of peace to try to go to Anathoth to "receive his portion." This is prob-

ably a reference to the event recorded in 32:6-15. He was stopped, however, at the Benjamin Gate, accused of desertion, and taken to the princes who beat him and placed him in a make-shift prison in the house of Jonathan the secretary.

After a long time in prison, Jeremiah was sent for by Zedekiah who wanted to know if there was any word from the Lord. Jeremiah told him there was and repeated the same message as before: "You shall be delivered into the hand of the king of Babylon" (v. 17, RSV). To have just come from prison and delivered a message which could have him sent right back shows Jeremiah's courage and commitment to speak the truth from God. Speaking the truth can be costly. It may be countered by untruth. It may be met with hostility. Yet, the truth is greater than its foes for it is of God.

## Shelby County to study camp

Shelby County Association's executive board approved April 16 a feasibility study of Cordova Baptist Camp, its 42-year-old camp covering 118 acres in a prime area of the county.

John M. McVain, a retired Southern Baptist Convention Stewardship Commission employee of San Antonio, Texas, will conduct the feasibility study, added McBride. It will be presented to the executive board's June 18 meeting.

Study proposals may include a capital fund drive, renovation of camp buildings, and building an associational office/conference center at the camp, stated McBride. His personal goal is for completion within seven to ten years.

The associational office hopes to move permanently to the camp, said Director of Missions John McBride. The office relocated in 1988 to a vacant church building when it outgrew its

downtown location. The association planned to stay only until another church could assume responsibility for the facility, which has been assumed by Westhaven Church.

The association will move to a vacant house at the camp during the first part of June and await the study report, said McBride.

If renovation of the camp is adopted, Douglas Beggs, associational Brotherhood Director, predicts 40 to 60 percent of the construction can be done by volunteer laborers.

# CLC: Respond to homosexual issue

NASHVILLE (BP) — Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission Executive Director Richard Land is asking Southern Baptists to write President George Bush and express outrage over a White House invitation to representatives of homosexual organizations.

The representatives were invited to witness Bush's signing at the White House of new federal legislation requiring records on hate crimes. That meeting occurred April 24.

Afterwards, The Washington Post quoted Robert Bray of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force as saying, "We were stunned. No president has ever invited a group of gay and lesbian activists to the White House. We think the president sent a very clear message to bigots and bashers that he will not tolerate violence" against gays and lesbians.

Land said in a letter to Bush on April 30: "We do not want hate crimes either. Such acts of violence against people are wrong. It is quite another matter, however, for the president of

the United States to invite leaders of homosexual and lesbian groups to be invited guests at an official White House ceremony precisely because they represent such groups.

"Such an action provides an implicit White House approbation of their lifestyle and it is something no previous administration has done."

Land said, "The White House should not be giving its sanction and implicit approval to such groups.

"The presidency, as Theodore Roosevelt so aptly noted, is a 'bully pulpit.' In allowing that pulpit to be used in this way, you have compromised your attempts to portray your administration as pro-family and you have diminished both the presidency and your administration," Land said.

He also reported, "The White House staff responded that support for the invitation was far from unanimous ..."
