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Americans show difference between belief, practice

NEWARK, N.J. (BP) — Although Americans appear to be religious, there is a gap between what they say they believe and what they practice, George Gallup Jr. said.

To illustrate he reported eight in ten Americans say they're Christians, but only four in ten know who delivered the Sermon on the Mount.

Gallup is co-chairman of the board of the Gallup Organization, which is best known for its Gallup Poll. He is also an active Episcopal layman.

Gallup was a keynote speaker during an urban ministries conference sponsored by the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

"The religious condition of Americans today can perhaps best be described in terms of gaps," he said.

On the surface, the levels of religious

belief and practice of Americans are impressive, especially compared to other regions of the world, he said. "But when you start to probe a little bit deeper, you become less impressed."

In America, religion "does not change people's lives to the degree one would expect," he added.

Gallup described this gap in three categories: knowledge, ethics, and belonging.

"There is a tendency to assume we know much more about the Bible than we do, to believe that we pray in a powerful, meaningful, and effective way, to believe that we are capable of sharing our faith," he said.

"I doubt if more than five to ten percent of Christians are prepared to defend their faith. Many don't know what

it means to be a Christian.

"The Sunday School and religious education system in this country is not working," he said. "There are wonderful exceptions, but by and large, while we worry about secular education we really ought to worry about religious education, which is more important.

"The lack of Biblical knowledge in this country is tragic. We say we believe the Ten Commandments are valid rules for living, but we can't name them. We revere the Bible, but we don't read it. Many people don't know the significance of Easter.

"It's really a very frightening situation because not being grounded in one's faith, we're open for anything that comes along," Gallup said.

"That's why the New Age movement has tremendous power to grab people.

"Many people who say they are Christians subscribe to New Age beliefs. In fact New Age is just as strong among traditionally religious people as among those who are not traditionally religious."

Gallup questioned one aspect of a widely published study on religion recently completed by the Graduate School of the City University of New York. That study showed only about 20,000 people nationwide adhering to New Age teachings.

"That is a little misleading," he explained. "People are not going to label themselves as New Agers, yet they may be very caught up in New Age beliefs and still be Episcopalian, or Presbyterian, or so forth."

Second, Gallup described a gap related to ethics.

"We want the fruits of faith but not the obligations," he said. "Religion is important to Americans but it doesn't have primacy."

In a survey of 19 social values, following God's will ranked "far down

the list among the public's choices, behind happiness and satisfaction," Gallup reported. In another survey of eight important traits, teenagers rated religious faith as least important, behind attributes such as patience and hard work.

Further, church involvement "does not seem to make a great deal of difference in the way we live our lives," Gallup said. Although church members are more likely to give to charitable organizations, the church "are just as likely as the unchurched to engage in unethical behavior."

A significant difference is found only at the level of deep commitment, he added.

Gallup said Americans believe in God, "but this God is often only an affirming one, not a demanding one. He does not command our total allegiance.

"We pray, but often ... with the emphasis on asking (for ourselves), not on thanksgiving, petition, or intercession for others."

Further, Gallup said the rich and the poor rarely interact with each other in a meaningful way. "We give to charities, but do we give of ourselves?"

"The record of volunteerism is spectacular, but how many Americans have had a personal relationship with somebody who is impoverished? I believe nothing less than a face-to-face, personal relationship between the haves and have nots will redeem society."

Third, Gallup described a gap between believers and belongers.

Americans increasingly view their faith as a matter between them and God, he said. A rising number of Christians and Jews believe they can sustain faith without attending church or synagogue.

This trend is also evidenced in decreasing loyalty to the church and to denominations, he said.

Bethea resigns missionary post

RICHMOND (BP) — Ralph Bethea Jr., whose wife, Lynda, was murdered March 27 by highway robbers in Kenya, has resigned as a Southern Baptist foreign missionary. His resignation will be effective July 1.

In a letter to John Faulkner, director for Southern Baptist mission work in eastern and southern Africa, Bethea said he was resigning for family reasons. He said his four children "need to be with my family here in America for the coming years," adding: "I need to be close with them. I need the time personally for grieving and healing."

He expressed appreciation for the support of the Southern Baptist

Foreign Mission Board and the Baptist Mission of Kenya during the family's bereavement.

Bethea, of Memphis, told Kenyan police he and his wife were ambushed as they stopped to aid a man lying in the road, apparently injured, on a rural highway northwest of Nairobi near Kijabe, Kenya. They were en route to Kijabe to pick up their two older sons, students at Rift Valley Academy, for the Easter holidays. Their two younger children had remained with friends in the coastal city of Mombasa, where the family lived.

Mrs. Bethea died of severe head wounds and her husband was badly beaten as he tried to fight off the attackers. Local police initially reported the arrest of four suspects, but national police have since declined to comment.

The Bethetas were appointed as missionaries to Kenya in 1984. They worked in personal evangelism and church starting in the Mombasa area, where a major evangelistic crusade last summer resulted in more than 56,000 people professing faith in Christ and the organization of 84 new congregations. Bethea described recent evangelistic results as "the fruit of 35 years of faithful Southern Baptist teamwork."

The two older sons, Ralph III, 17, and Joshua, 13, returned to Kenya after their mother's burial in the United States to complete school, which ends in July. The younger children, Luke, 12, and Lizette, 9, and their father remained in Claremore, Okla., with his parents, Lizette and Ralph Bethea Sr., former Southern Baptist missionaries to Kenya, Tanzania, Indonesia, and India.

Editorial**Stalemate, unity, or division— what will Baptists choose?**

Please remove our names from your mailing list, the letter read.

The writer said the family no longer held membership in a Baptist church. "After lifetimes as active Baptists, the bickering and arguing have driven us and others out of the Baptist fold.

"We do not believe God is happy with us... Baptists are now known as dissenters. Thank you anyway for a good state paper."

For whatever reason, that family is disappointed with the Southern Baptist Convention, an organization where they had been happy for many years, spiritually fed, with opportunities for ministry.

Another plaintive letter asked this paper to find some unbiased Baptist who could accurately define the difference between "moderates" and "conservatives." The writer was struggling with the ongoing strife and wanted it to end so that all Southern Baptists could "get back to working for the Lord."

There probably are many more Southern Baptists who share the views expressed so pointedly by these two. One has chosen to leave, another has chosen to stay — at least temporarily.

After June 6 Southern Baptists can reflect that two sizable groups from their family had met in Atlanta within a span of five weeks — and ask what happened.

For the larger body of Southern Baptists, the convention meets June 4-6. It will be a different kind of meeting compared to those of the past decade. The rhetoric seems to have lessened (we have written that before), and there should be less acrimony.

"Conservative" forces have dominated each convention for twelve years and last year at New Orleans gained virtual control of the convention itself. "Moderate" Southern Baptists, so called because of the perception they are not as conservative as the "conservatives," have retreated so far that they have not fielded a candidate for the presidency. Between 5000 and 6000 of them held their own meeting May 9-11.

The June meeting will bear little resemblance to the previous dozen. "Conservatives" will not have to strategize. The energies of the ruling group can be turned toward a sincere process of healing

even as convention business is pursued.

Despite the fact that all signs point to a peaceful convention, we remind Southern Baptists that all is not well. One role of the Baptist newspaper is that of interpreting, prodding, and temperate warning.

We interpret events of Baptist life, not as Joseph or Daniel, but as an impartial observer. We prod as we attempt to remind Baptists who we are and caution about the results (good and bad) of our actions.

We warn of dangers in overlooking people of the Bible who have been faithful, diligent, and courageous for the cause of Christ. Some of these are "losers."

Like other Christian groups, Southern Baptists are not guaranteed perpetual stardom on the stage of life. While we have accomplished much in our history, we now must re-unite in living the Gospel. The old adage relating to finger-pointing is still true. When the index finger points accusatively to the other person, three other fingers are turned to the pointer.

There are things that can be done by leadership and messengers of the June convention.

- Victors in this kind of struggle have to love more than the victims. The victims are those who feel left out, ignored, displaced. The victor's best motive should be turned to genuine reconciliation.

- Surrender is not unconditional. Regardless of what we say about each other, how we treat each other, whether we pray for each other — neither victor nor vanquished has a monopoly on what's right. An overwhelming majority of Southern Baptists — leadership included — are people who believe in and live by the Bible. It has always been so.

- The convention should move positively on our course of missions, evangelization, education. Other Christian groups want and need our combined leadership. Instead we are showing them faltering steps.

- There is a point of no return in most world-changing ventures. We are nearing that point. Can we not envision again that mighty army of Southern Baptists moving shoulder-to-shoulder forward for

Christ? Some will argue that "we are better off" without those who have been shut out of all convention processes except giving. Try telling God that. The convention may get along without them, but it will not be as strong a force against evil.

- Jesus chose twelve disciples for difficult times, a close-knit group of followers. They were diverse — and one betrayed his Lord because of greed and avarice. He loved money and power.

- "Conservatives" used convention bylaws and guidelines to accomplish their goal of controlling boards and committees thoroughly. Now that the goal has been accomplished, they seem comfortable in denying (except giving) to those they displaced.

- At the May Atlanta meeting where "moderates" organized the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, reporters asked whether a new denomination had been begun. CBF leaders replied that was not their intention — many even said they would attend the SBC sessions in June.

But the structure looks like a denomination, and with a little more planning and organization, it could well be one.

What about the positions of the two groups? "Moderates" hear "conservatives" saying they must agree on every point if they want to share leadership on committees, boards, and commissions. "Moderates" are tired of being accused of not believing in the Bible. They want to play a role, other than financial, in determining the direction of the Southern Baptist Convention.

"Conservatives" want to ensure continuation of the present SBC course, and base their criterion for leadership on agreement with those goals. Because "moderates" can vote at all SBC levels, they are not disenfranchised. There will be no changes in these views in the foreseeable future. Broadening the tent will come only when "moderates" see eye-to-eye with "conservatives."

We heard someone ask about the SBC which the "moderates" have "left." They asked, "Isn't that a new denomination? Well, that's why we are here in Atlanta in May."

Who is right? God knows. Most of us think we know, but any one of us is only partially right. God knows precisely — and He hasn't given us the right to decide. — WFA

East, West Germans reunite to form German Baptist Union

SIEGEN, Germany (BP) — Two thousand Baptists from former East and West Germany stood in silence as their elected leaders signed their official unification document May 10. Then, with tear-filled eyes and hearts full of emotion, their voices united to sing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The 22-year separation, forced on them by the loathsome Berlin Wall had finally ended. A reunited German Baptist

Union was formed, and the Baptist Unions of the former German Democratic Republic and the Federal Republic of Germany were no more.

"That which just a short time ago would have been unthinkable," someone said in a public prayer, "has now been accomplished. It is a miracle, and we are grateful." More than 1500 people from East and West registered for the Unification Conference, May

8-12, were at a loss for words.

"Wonderful!" exclaimed many in the futile attempt to find adjectives sufficient for the occasion.

"In spite of all these years of separation," said Walter Zeschky following the signing, "a strong sense of unity continued to live in our hearts."

Zeschky, former president of the West German Union, and Wolfgang Lorenz, former vice-president, were elected to similar offices in the now united German Baptist Union.

Prior to the signing ceremony, separate sessions were held in which 210 delegates from the East and 609 from the West voted by secret ballot to

endorse the unification. Remarkably, only two persons withheld their vote, making the final tally virtually unanimous. The newly formed union consists of 940 autonomous churches with 85,000 members.

Forty-four Brethren Assemblies and 11 Elim Pentecostal churches in the former East German Union decided against unification, choosing instead to join their denominational bodies in the West. In all, 13,500 members in 165 churches in the East united with the Western churches in Siegen.

"The whole world is united, but German Baptists are divided," declared Denton Lotz, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance.

Powell invited to address Brotherhood

MEMPHIS (BP) — The Southern Baptist Brotherhood Commission at its annual Brotherhood Breakfast at the Southern Baptist Convention will honor James H. Smith, agency president since 1979, who plans to retire June 30.

Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has received an invitation to serve as featured speaker for the event, scheduled for Atlanta's Omni Hotel on Wednesday, June 5, but has yet to confirm his plans.

Starting time for the event is 6:30 a.m.

The breakfast also will honor this year's winner of the High School Baptist Young Men's National Missions Speak Out Award, Warren Kinghorn, a 10th-grade student from Edwards Road Church, Greenville, S.C., will deliver his winning speech.

In addition, 16 honorees will receive the International Legion of Royal Ambassador Leaders Award of Merit, created in 1989 to recognize the contributions of professional and lay leaders to the Brotherhood Commission's program for boys in grades 1-9.

Honorees in full-time Christian service are Robert T. "Bob" Banks, Atlanta; Frank Black, Memphis; and Samson Olaniyan, Ibadan, Nigeria, West Africa.

Laypersons to be honored include Ozro "Ozzie" Berryhill, North Little Rock, Ark.; Larry Blanchard, Lindale, Texas; Jim Burchette, Raleigh, N.C.; W. B. "Bill" Carson, Miami; Carson E. "Nick" Deskins, Kingsport; Jerry Kelly, Mooresville, N.C.; Clyde Kemp, Ardmore, Okla.; Wayne Robinson, Montgomery, Ala.; and Richard Woods, Springfield, Mo.

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God delivers David from Absalom

There is a hymn familiar to many Christians with the theme of bright hope arising from the darkest hours. "Just When I Need Him Most" is a boost to us when defeat seems everlasting. Philippians 4:19 is one of the greatest Biblical expressions of how God supplies when the "cup-board" of life is empty: "And my God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus." Absalom's plan for overthrowing David worked to perfection. It was much easier than he expected. His revolt against his father progressed rapidly because help came from unexpected quarters.

But his early successes turned sour. Absalom soon was afflicted with problems, also unexpected.

Ahithophel's loyalty to Absalom (16:15-19).

We do not know exactly what had happened between David and Ahithophel to cause a trusted advisor

to turn against his king. But Ahithophel did just that. One of David's wisest and most trusted friends, he joined Absalom and helped the rebellion.

It is possible that people saw Absalom as a "deliverer" because many thought David did not pay enough attention to their problems. Now David's second most trusted advisor joined Absalom. He too said he was ready to serve the new king — and would be loyal in every way. But Absalom had no way of knowing that David had sent Hushai to counteract Ahithophel's advice.

The entangling web was being woven around Absalom and he did not know it.

Ahithophel's counsel to Absalom (16:20-17:4).

When David fled Jerusalem, a problem faced Absalom. He had hoped to trap David and his forces in the city and persuade him to surrender. A new

plan had to be developed. Ahithophel offered to chase David with a large army before he could prepare a defense.

Ahithophel would then kill David and bring back the rest of the people and possessions. There would be peace in the land. Absalom liked the idea. It was brilliant — and seemed to come from God Himself. But Absalom

hesitated, perhaps because he had not expected his father's life to be endangered. He asked for Hushai's advice. Hushai reminded Absalom of David's prowess and the strength of his seasoned army.

He persuaded Absalom to wait until Absalom could raise a great army and lead it himself to overpower David. Then Hushai sent word to David of the

plan. David was not to remain at the fords (May 6 lesson), but should cross quickly over the Jordan and escape in case Absalom should change his mind.

The two messengers hid in a cistern (well), escaping Absalom's servants (v. 21), and went on to inform David of Ahithophel's plan. David heeded the warning — taking his people with him across the Jordan.

Ahithophel's suicide (17:23)

As a result of his treachery and the ensuing events, Ahithophel knew Absalom would be defeated. He also knew that when Absalom lost his bid to become king, he and Absalom would be disgraced and punished.

Ahithophel went back to his home in Giloh, set his affairs in order, and killed himself.

Again God protected David in a dark and dangerous time. Though he had sinned, God still had chosen him. He had repented.

The house of the Lord

In order to be aware of the setting of the book of Ezra one needs to read the last chapter of II Chronicles. These two books are so closely related that the first three verses of Ezra repeat the message of the last two verses of II Chronicles almost verbatim.

The prophet Jeremiah had predicted that because of their unfaithfulness the people of Judah would be taken captive by the Babylonians and after 70 years God would intervene, judging the Babylonians and allowing the Jews to return (Jeremiah 25:1-14; 29:10-14; 33:7-13).

Who is in charge? (1:1-4)

The Bible makes it plain that God as sovereign is in control of history. As it has been said, in reality history is His story. No doubt Nebuchadnezzar and Cyrus thought they were in charge during their reigns, but God called Nebuchadnezzar His servant (Jeremiah 25:9; 27:6; 43:10) and Cyrus His shepherd and His anointed (Isaiah

44:28; 45:1). One old sage observed that "God can hit straight with a crooked stick."

God keeps His promises regardless of whom He has to use or how He has to go about doing it. He used Jeremiah to proclaim His promise. He used Cyrus to fulfill it, and Cyrus, regardless of what his theology may have been, acknowledged the right of the "Lord God of heaven" to direct the affairs of His people, the Jews.

God's people may sometimes be unfaithful, but He is always completely faithful. He sent His people into captivity because they had forgotten Him, but He had not forgotten His people, promises, or purpose.

Who will go? (1:3-4)

The public proclamation and written edict of Cyrus permitted and encouraged the Jews to return to and reclaim their homeland with the priority of rebuilding their central place of worship, the temple of God in

Jerusalem. The restoring of a nation must begin with the restoring of its faith and worship.

The exile had taught the Jews that God was not limited to one area of the world, but could be worshiped and served wherever His people were. Not all of the Jews were required to go to their homeland, but those who chose to remain were urged to support those go-

Basic Passage: Ezra 1

ing and the rebuilding project with financial and material resources.

Who will support? (1:5-6)

God had taken the initiative and moved Cyrus to make his benevolent proclamation. Then He took the initiative and led His people to volunteer to meet the challenge in faith and action. He began with the family leaders, the fathers, and the religious leaders, the priests and Levites, but He used everyone who was sensitive and responsive to His Spirit's leadership. Just as the Spirit leads some to do a

special work for the Lord, He leads us all to support the Lord's work. We all cannot go as foreign missionaries, but all believers can support those who do go by our prayers and giving. This is the blessing of the Southern Baptist Cooperative Program. It is based on this ancient Biblical principle we see in this passage.

Who will be accountable? (1:7-11)

Nebuchadnezzar had looted the sacred utensils from Solomon's Temple in Jerusalem and had brought them as trophies to his gods in Babylon. He eventually was smitten with insanity, and his successor, Belshazzar who had blatantly desecrated those vessels in drunken revelry, was slain. Cyrus ordered his treasurer to give those sacred implements to Sheshbazzar, the leader of the returning Jews, to take back to Jerusalem to be restored to the rebuilt temple of God. Since these golden and silver articles were not only very sacred, but also valuable, a strict accounting was required. That which is dedicated to God should always be handled in the most responsible way.

Strive for maturity

All along our pilgrimage of living there are expectations. We expect certain things to happen — and there are expectations of us by others. There are rules to be followed, loyalty to be expressed. My father reminded me of this by saying, "I have nothing of value to give you but a good name. Live up to it." He also taught me how to plow a straight furrow, and the importance of it. "If you run the first row crooked, Son, the rest of them will be crooked too."

A lifestyle of following in the footsteps of Christ leads us to Christian maturity. Using our gifts to build up His church is a worthy "furrow to plow." God expects that from us.

Living a worthy life (vv. 1-2)

Our efforts toward following Christ do not redeem us, but we must always give our most heroic efforts to be true disciples. God gives us the power to do that as we strive for the mature faith He promises.

Paul lists four parts to the worthy Christian lifestyle: Exhibiting humility

(but not inferiority), demonstrating meekness (allowing God to control our passions and anger), having an attitude of patience (perseverance in faith, not taking revenge), and forbearing each other in love (good feelings overcoming ill will and hurts).

These four traits will lead us to harmony in fellowship with God.

Promoting a unified body (vv. 3-6)

Paul reminds us of conflict that can split a church apart. The fellowship (togetherness in Christian love) must be guarded. He gives the basis for our Christian unity. Emphasizing what we hold in common allows us to forget that which pulls us apart. He calls us to "one faith," noting that the Christians, including us, are surrounded by many false gods.

But Paul is not content to leave us with lofty theological ideas. He said that believer's unity comes through one body, one hope, one faith, and one baptism. He spoke to Jewish and Gentile Christians who bickered over the nature of the church, its purpose, its

methods. He pointed them toward a unity based on one outlook. The believers in Ephesus did not totally embrace Paul's concept, but we can learn the lesson of obedience.

If the Gospel is to flourish, we must embrace our brothers and sisters in Christ for the same goal of spreading that Gospel. Paul explained God's foundation of faith for us.

LIFE AND WORK

Basic Passage: Ephesians 4:1-16

Using a diversified ministry (vv. 7, 11)

Though we are united in Christ, these verses point us to that which makes us different so we can do Christ's work. God multiplies the ways through which He can accomplish His work in us — because various situations and people require distinct skills and gifts. We may not perform each task equally well, but we must each discover our gift and use it.

Completing an unfinished body

(vv. 12-16)

To assist the church and individuals in attaining mature faith, God gives us these diverse gifts.

Three things happen as we mature.

We will experience in increasing depth the unity, the knowledge, and the fullness which Christ offers us. We will seek a clear understanding of God and the qualities which make us Christlike.

Second, we become firmly established in our faith and commitments. We will not fall easily to new theological fads and to thoughts and words that sound good but are evil in intent. Yes, we will continue to seek answers to difficult situations. We will think about our faith — but the winds of deceit will not cause us to toss it aside.

Third, maturity causes us to concentrate on Jesus Christ, the head of the body of which we are a part. The Christian and the church will be in the proper place. Each is responsible for the dynamic functioning of the body of Christ — as a mature Christian. — *Wm. Fletcher Allen*

Four students from Calvary Church, Knoxville, volunteered through the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board for summer work. University of Tennessee students Tim Carnes, Byron Davis, Pamela Hodnett, and Carson-Newman College student Jennifer Jones are serving May 11-July 19. The team is helping missionaries Darrell and Shirley Seale in Quezon City, Luzon, minister on a college campus.

Shackelford and Martin are the fund's first beneficiaries, Hewett said.

Shackelford, who was director of Baptist Press, and Martin, the service's news editor, had been criticized by leaders of the Executive Committee. Both men were told to resign and refused, prompting their terminations in a called meeting of the Executive Committee July 17. No reason for the firing was stated.

Shackelford, 58, will receive \$1,000 a month and Martin, 52, will receive \$750 a month from the Fellowship, said Hewett, pastor of First Church, Asheville. The support will continue until the end of the year but may be renewed "if there is still a need," Hewett said.

Shackelford, a 35-year veteran of Baptist journalism, said he has been unable to find a denominational job in the ten months since his firing. He is working part time at night in a Nashville grocery store for \$4.45 an hour while looking for full-time employment.

Shackelford said the stigma attached to his firing is hurting his search for a job. Although he has applied at several Baptist colleges and other institutions, Shackelford said, "none of these has shown any interest."

Martin is serving as bivocational pastor of Ledger Church in Bakersville, N.C., and pursuing freelance writing assignments. He served as part-time news director of

Associated Baptist Press from September to January.

"I'm just trying to rebuild my life," Martin said from his home in the Blue Ridge Mountains, where he is helping his wife, Colleen, open her pottery business.

Martin also expressed appreciation for the Fellowship funding, which he said "will make it possible for me to stay here" in North Carolina. — *ABP*

Tennessee volunteers return home

MEMPHIS — Tennessee Baptist volunteers, who were on standby last week in Dallas waiting to fly to Iran, have returned home.

Three of the volunteers — James McPherson, Clinton; Pat Still, Brentwood; and Carl Lord, Lenoir City — remain on standby status, said Cameron Byler, Tennessee Baptist Convention Brotherhood director.

A fourth member of the team, Nashville physician Bill Skinner, was sent to Iraq, where the Foreign Mission Board needed additional doctors

to work in Kurdish refugee camps.

Seven Southern Baptist volunteers who were in Iran left the country May 22. During their eight days in Iran they were able to set up one feeding unit at a refugee camp near Sanandag. They were feeding about 9500 Kurds daily.

Five members who remained to continue the feeding and medical efforts were scheduled to leave Iran May 26.

Replacement volunteers, including the Tennesseans, are on standby until the mission is evaluated by FMB and Brotherhood Commission officials.

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


