Draper reports to SSB trustees on first months as president

NASHVILLE (BP) — Citing a "wonderful response" as he travels throughout the nation, Southern Baptist Sunday School Board President James T. Draper Jr. said he is spending a major portion of this time speaking and meeting with Baptist groups.

"The convention at this time is very fragile," Draper told trustees meeting Feb. 3-5 in Nashville. "I don't try to go in and give a commercial for the Sunday School Board. I try to go in and preach and share my heart."

Draper, who became the board's eighth president in August 1991, said he and his three executive vice presidents are coming together as a team.

"These are not 'yes' men," said Draper of Gene Mims, executive vice president for planning, research, and denominational relations; Mike Arrington, executive vice president for operations; and E. V. King, executive vice president for finance and administration.

"Each of us has his own baggage. While it's tough, it's going to work. I'll have to be honest with you, autocratic leadership would be easier but what we're doing is the wave of the future in management," Draper said.

Task forces of employees will participate in evaluating "every area of our work at the Sunday School Board" in the next few months, he said.

In another area, Draper called for expanded efforts with language and culture groups.

"I believe the potential to work with ethnic groups is mind boggling, and we're just playing at it," he said. He also cited a need for greater ethnic representation on the trustee board.

Trustees approved business plans to guide the operations of Genevox music publishing, video/audiovisuals, and Church Information System computer hardware and software.

Draper told trustees the board's first quarter financial report had "mixed results." Total revenue from operations was \$48.5 million, 1.3 percent below budget but 11.3 percent above last year. "Overall, the financial health of the board is strong," he said, board is strong," he said.

On the positive side, sales in the 63 Baptist Book Stores topped \$7 million in December, the first time the milestone has been reached in one month. Sunday School literature sales registered a 1.9 percent increase in unit sales for the first quarter of

BreakThrough improvements.

On the negative side, Broadman books were below budget and church literature, except for Sunday School, showed a decrease.

Trustees voted to ask the administration to review policy for stocking books in Baptist Book Stores and at the SBC store and other special meetings.

They also voted to delay closing of

the Baptist Book Store in Albuquerque, N.M., for at least one year in response to expressions of concern from New Mexico Baptists. During that time, a business plan will be developed for the store. In August 1991 trustees had voted to close the store on March 31, 1992, because it had lost money for 12 of the previous 15 years.

SBTS trustees name Dockery dean; two professors warned

LOUISVILLE (BP) — David S. Dockery has been appointed dean of the school of theology at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, effective Aug. 1.

The appointment by seminary President Roy L. Honeycutt followed unanimous approval of faculty status for Dockery by the school's trustee executive committee Feb. 4.

In executive session, the executive committee heard a report from the academic personnel committee regarding Southern professors E. Glenn Hinson and Molly T. Marshall. A joint statement issued after the meeting by trustee chairman W. Wayne Allen of Tennessee and Honeycutt said the academic personnel committee had "brought to a conclusion several years of continuing concern related to certain writings of" the two professors.

The academic personnel committee reported it had instructed Honeycutt to "warn the professors that if in the future one should teach the positions which someone interpreted them to have expressed, he/she might be in violation of the Abstract of Principles (the seminary's confessional statement) and thus in jeopardy of dismissal," the statement said. The

warning, it noted, has been communicated to each professor.

"We are encouraged by the trustees' careful resolution of this important and sensitive matter," Allen and Honeycutt said. "We are grateful that the action taken satisfies the concerns raised without constituting a punitive action against the two faculty members."

Dockery, general editor for Broadman Press in Nashville, was elected to a tenurable position as associate professor of New Testament interpretation. He will be presented to the full board in April as a candidate for tenure.

Dockery, 39, has been at his current position as editor of the 40-volume New American Commentary since 1990. Before that, he was assistant professor of New Testament interpretation at Southern Seminary for two years. He previously taught for four years at Criswell College in Dallas.

Allen said the board's academic personnel committee, which interviewed Dockery the previous day, was impressed with Dockery's command of Scripture and his ability to answer a broad range of theological questions.

Dockery was selected from a field of 27 candidates whose names were submitted last summer and early fall as

part of a nationwide search process. Honeycutt had promised to name a "conservative" evangelical scholar for the deanship whose views were consistent with the covenant agreement between faculty and trustees approved last April. In the covenant, faculty and trustees agreed to cooperate to move the school in a more "conservative" direction.

After hearing of the seminary trustee action, trustees of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board voted unanimously at their Feb. 5 meeting in Nashville to express commendation for Dockery to the seminary trustees.

Prior to the executive session, the executive committee, acting on a recommendation from the academic

SBC Cooperative Program rises

NASHVILLE (BP) — The SBC Cooperative Program recorded a huge 20.99 percent increase for the month of January 1992 compared to that month a year ago, according to Harold C. Bennett, Executive Committee President/Treasurer.

However, the increase was due, in part, to the 1991 January omission of one of the larger state convention CP checks, SBC business office records indicate. The SBC business office did receive a check from that state convention in January 1992, which basically accounted for the entire increase. Records for 1991 indicate that check was received too late to be counted in the January totals.

Total for January 1992 was \$12,492,681 compared to \$10,325,464 for the comparable month in 1991.

The SBC budget year-to-date, October through January, also revealed an increase: \$45,965,591 compared to the previous year-to-date of \$44,640,953, or an increase of 2.97 percent.

"I am gratified by the year-to-date

increase of \$1,324,638 for the four-month period, October 1991 through January 1992," Bennett said. "I really believe that Southern Baptists are committed to funding world missions through the Cooperative Program."

The 1991-92 monthly basic operating budget requirement for the SBC is \$11,725,856.

Designated gifts channeled through the SBC Executive Committee also increased significantly. For January 1992, \$18,495,615 was received compared to January 1991, of \$14,423,372, or an increase of 28.23 percent. Again, the omission of one of the larger state convention checks for January, 1991, skewed the figures somewhat.

Year-to-date designated gifts are also up: \$25,381,613 compared to the previous year of \$21,310,568 or an increase of 19.10 percent.

Designated contributions include the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions, world hunger, and other special gifts.

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Editorials**Committed to intellectual and spiritual development**

There probably are no churches in the Tennessee Baptist Convention that have not been touched positively by Baptist seminaries, colleges, and schools.

Tennessee Baptists can express pride for Carson-Newman College, Belmont University, and Union University — and Harrison-Chilhowee Academy. They are an integral part of Baptist life in Tennessee.

The colleges all have storied pasts, a determined purpose for serving our youth, and a bright future.

Tennessee Baptist Churches should pause to honor the schools on Sunday, February 16, Southern Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day.

As we honor our schools, it is timely to recall the Baptists who believed in Christian higher education in formative years of the Tennessee Baptist

Convention. Most of the state conventions had Christian higher education as a purpose when the conventions were being formed, as did Tennessee.

That is true of Tennessee Baptists. Arthur Walker Jr., executive director of the SBC's Education Commission, says that the earliest schools were usually laboratories of faith. In some cases, they were experiments — but incredible results ensued.

Belmont, Union, and Carson-Newman are geographically within reach of all Tennessee Baptist students. More than that, though they operate without the benefit of tax dollars, they also remain financially within reach of students.

The schools are deserving of unqualified support from the convention and from individual Baptists. More than that, they need support. To provide the Christian fabric of quality education within that

faith context — they need Tennessee Baptists.

The colleges are committed to the intellectual and spiritual development of the students. Last November Tennessee Baptist convention messengers voted to financially equalize funding of the three colleges. No doubt leadership of the colleges want an equally magnanimous outpouring of prayer support.

Tennessee Baptists can plan an observance of rich heritage in Christian education on February 16, recognizing the colleges and Harrison-Chilhowee. We should also remember in prayer the more than 6500 professors and administrators and the 190,000 plus students at the 71 Southern Baptist educational institutions sponsored by state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention. Visit the campuses, talk with students and educators.

Make it a day to remember. — WFA

Guest editorial**Faith inspires learning in Baptist colleges, seminaries**

The 1992 theme of Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day on February 16 stresses the long tradition of the close relationship between faith and learning. The earliest schools in Western Civilization were usually laboratories of religious faith. Education was closely tied to the religious institution.

The close tie between faith and learning has also emphasized the relationship between education and the mission enterprise. Baptists traditionally have made educational institutions a major part of their mission activities. The current emphasis on the importance of education within society also stresses the importance of education in evangelistic concerns of today's church.

The earliest educators were committed to both faith and the church. Their concern affected both the emphasis of the church and standards of the colleges. George M. Marsden of Duke University has written, "Protestants and their heirs were over-

whelmingly dominant in setting the standards for American universities."

The challenge to faith presented by the development of the modern university movement did not result in the demise of faith but did create more stringent restrictions on faith-related matters. The result experienced by many is that Christianity has been excluded from much of the modern university environment.

The alternative for the modern Christian is to develop a "remnant" mentality. This will require a commitment to basic Christian beliefs which will shape all other relationships and commitments. It also requires a commitment that is held even when others do not accept it. Such a faith calls for continual examination and the expansion of one's religious understanding.

The person of Christian faith must recognize that there may be a significant difference between his/her basic philosophy of life and that of the consensus philosophy of the general society.

Williams stresses importance of state Brotherhood leadership

MEMPHIS (BP) — James D. Williams, president of the Southern Baptist Brotherhood Commission, met for the first time with state convention Brotherhood leaders Jan. 29-Feb. 1 and called them a "valuable and important part of the Brotherhood network."

"We cannot carry out the mission assigned to the Brotherhood Commission without the faithful, effective executive leadership you are giving," Williams told those attending the National Brotherhood Leadership Conference, which meets annually in Memphis. "That's not sugar coating or

window dressing, but it's from the heart."

Williams repeated a pledge made at his installation last October to work with state personnel, along with trustees, staff, Woman's Missionary Union leadership, and other Southern Baptist agencies to "strengthen our commitment to world evangelism and missions."

"Everybody, everywhere, ought to know who Jesus is," Williams said. "This simple line from the familiar chorus is a good way of expressing Southern Baptists' understanding of our world missions challenge, and I'm ever more convinced that men and boys should be spiritual leaders in the ministry of reconciliation with Jesus Christ. I hope he will use us to do just that."

"Without you (state leadership), we cannot do our work," he said. "I want us to be partners in the process, and you've already been extremely helpful."

Much attention was given during the conference to discussion of the partnership involving Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood in the ongoing production of coeducational missions options and products. Brotherhood Commission members of age-level work groups on coeducation reported on progress.

Editors shared with state leaders that the first Express Missions quarterly resource packet for youth ministers, published under the new World Changers Resources imprint,

will be available June 1, while the World Changers coeducational work projects for senior high youth will see expansion with a junior high pilot project this summer in Birmingham, Ala.

The task force on coeducational options for adults has agreed that existing WMU and Brotherhood organizations are still needed and that both organizations reserve the right to program a "total church missions experience," according to Douglas Beggs, Brotherhood Commission vice president of program services. He added that the group's preliminary discussions have focused on missions options for senior adults "using their

wealth of experiences from a professional lifetime."

In other action, the state leaders:

- Engaged in dialogue with Williams covering the Brotherhood Commission's new organizational structure, corporate planning process, and strategic growth goals, all approved by the agency's trustees last October.

- Honored retiring state Brotherhood directors Edd Brown of California, Charles Ragland of Florida, and John Winters of Louisiana.

- Elected Rob Carr, director of Brotherhood for the Illinois Baptist State Association, as their co-convenor-elect.

Deacon conference scheduled in Jackson

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God's Word through Hosea's marriage

One of the most unusual books in all the Bible is the Old Testament prophecy of Hosea. The theme of the book is the love of God for His wayward people. This theme takes on a flesh and blood existence in the living illustration of Hosea's marriage. Hosea learned much about the Lord and His love for Israel through the tragic breakup of his family. This lesson shows that God is willing and ready to forgive those who come to Him in repentance.

God's call to Hosea (ch. 1:1)

Hosea's ministry to the northern kingdom of Israel was contemporary with that of Amos and probably lasted about 40 years. His ministry roughly coincides with the ministry of Isaiah in the southern kingdom of Israel.

Little is known about the details of Hosea's life. It appears he was an Israelite himself and thus was the only native prophet to preach in Israel. His closeness to the national situation

gives us a first hand look at the depth of Israel's sin.

God's Word through the prophet's family (ch. 1:2-9)

Although several options in interpretation are possible, it appears that Hosea's wife, Gomer, was unfaithful to him after the birth of their children. Eventually, Gomer became a harlot, or temple prostitute. Yet, in spite of her sin, Hosea still loved his wife.

Even the names of their children graphically illustrate the deteriorating relationship. Jezreel means "God scatters or sows;" Loruhamah means "no mercy or not pitied;" and Loammi means "not my people." Thus, the family of the prophet became a clear illustration of the consequences of unfaithfulness in Israel's relationship to the Lord.

God's reassuring Word of hope (ch. 1:10-2:1)

These verses point out the ideal relationship of Israel to God. After the

judgment, there would come a time in the future when God would re-establish His covenant with His people and they would again be a great and unified nation.

Unfaithfulness of Gomer and Israel (ch. 2:2-13)

After Hosea described Israel's condition and pictured her future state, he appealed to his people to repent. In these verses Hosea presented the conversion that would be necessary before restoration could take place.

Hosea's appeal compared Israel's continued unfaithfulness to that of Gomer's. In this message, God was the husband, Israel the unfaithful wife, and the lovers were the false nature gods. To reach His people, God removed their blessings in hopes they would realize their sin and return unto Him.

God's promise of a new covenant (ch. 2:14-23)

God's purpose in punishing Israel

was redemptive. When the people responded to Him spiritually, He would respond with a renewed covenant. This relationship would be a state of peace, righteousness, and faithfulness. The language of courtship illustrated that this could only happen through God's love.

February 16 Lesson
Basic Passage: Hosea 1:1-3:15

God's love demonstrated in redemption (ch. 3:1-5)

To help reinforce his message, Hosea used the analogy of his love for Gomer. Even though Gomer's sin was persistent and shameful, God told Hosea to love her and redeem her from the slavery caused by her sin.

Hosea compared this redemption to the future redemption of Israel. The ultimate fulfillment is seen in the king of David's lineage — Jesus.

Praise for Christ, God's servant

Our Scripture passage depicts a unique relationship between Paul and the Philippian church. I do not believe Paul favored this church over the others, but the church in Philippi needed just a little more attention. This church was born amidst strife and stress. One of the early converts was the jailer of Philippi. In Acts 16:20, we read that Paul and Silas were imprisoned for being men who "do exceedingly trouble the Philippian people." Paul expressed his desire for the church to live together in peace and harmony.

Disharmony was increasing and causing division in the church. It must have been a very strong problem because Paul not only revealed the problem, he also named those involved. Philippians 4:2 tells us that two women, Euodia and Syntyche, were in heavy dispute with one another. The dispute could have been theological, social, or personal. Whatever the problem was, Paul called for unity. To effectively defend themselves from the enemy assaults, believers needed to "stand fast in one spirit with one mind,

striving together for the faith of the Gospel," Philippians 1:27.

Our passage today can be considered a song and a prayer, adaptable for reading or singing. It is similar to the intercessory prayer of Jesus in John 17. Jesus prayed the disciples might continue in unity. Paul prayed for the church in like manner.

Philippians 2:1-4 calls for Christian harmony among the members of this church. The series of "if's" in verses 1 and 2 suggest penetrating questions. The answer to these questions should be "yes" if we are to live together in harmony. Are you motivated by God's kind of love in all your actions? Do you allow the Holy Spirit to be the compelling force in your life? If we cannot answer "yes," then we need to take whatever steps are necessary to become like Jesus in attitude and behavior.

February 16 Lesson
Basic Passage: Philippians 2:1-11

I have noticed in my 32 years in the

ministry that, non-Christians treat "real" Christians far better than some church members treat fellow members. This happens when people compete to become the big "I" in the church.

This attitude is not Christ-like and should not be tolerated in the church. Verses 3 and 4 tells us we are to serve one another.

Paul, writing from a Roman prison, pled with the Philippian church to have the same attitude as Jesus when He denied Himself and gave His life at Calvary for others.

Jesus existed in the form of God before His appearance in mortal flesh at Bethlehem's stable. As He was involved in creation, so was He also involved in the redemption of mankind. (John 1:1-14; Colossians 1:17). We have no way to comprehend what He forfeited to take on the likeness of man. Jesus was not a clone. He was a real, live God who gave up His divinity all for the redemption of mankind.

I get excited each time I think about verses 9-11. Listen what God did for Jesus! God exalted Jesus, and gave

Him a name above all names. Every knee shall bow in heaven, earth, and under the earth to Jesus' given name. Every tongue shall confess "Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

This passage also suggests that both Jesus' name and nature were given eternal significance. In the height of persecution and scattering of the early Christians, they defied certain death by saying, "Jesus Christ is Lord," rather than "Caesar is Lord." Their words were not their only testimony. Their lives attested to the fact that they lived what they claimed to be.

Terry Hensley, a high school student, was a devoted member of the Bowmantown Church during my pastorate there some years ago. He had a beautiful voice, great music ability, and a sincere love for his Jesus. He was loved by his fellow classmates because they knew his testimony was real. Terry worked part-time for a music company in the mall at Johnson City. When he was playing the organ or piano, people would gather around the music store to listen. His playing and singing were not for show. They were his testimony.

We should have this type of Christ-like mind.

Coming in faith

"When He came down from the mountainside . . ." — these words create a mental picture of Jesus' exit from the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7. Like Jesus, many pastoral ministers face the reality of hurting people waiting for them after the sermon on Sunday.

Alan Culpepper, a professor at Baylor University, Waco, Texas, points out that Matthew lists ten healings, or miracles, of Jesus in chapters 8 and 9, and highlighted Jesus' authority over disease, nature, and demons in these chapters.

Culpepper suggests that the miracles "serve to confirm the work of the Spirit of God through Jesus . . ." and that "His works of healing were a demonstration of God's concern for the wholeness and well being of those who have faith."

In the ten miracles of Matthew 8-9, a

common element of faith is woven into every account. In each healing, friends brought others to Jesus for healing, which was an indication of faith on the part of the friends and the sick person. The exception was Jesus' noticing Peter's mother-in-law and taking the initiative to reach out and heal her by His touch. She in turn rose and served Him, a demonstration of her gratitude, service, and faith.

The two miracles or healings of this lesson focus on the healing of the leper and the centurion's servant. Faith of the outcast leper and the socially outcast centurion, coupled with Jesus' compassion, made the difference in each of the lives affected by His power.

What faith and humility are heard in the leper's cry, "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean," (v. 2). Look at the centurion's humble grati-

tude in verse 8. "Lord, I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. But just say the word, and my servant will be healed."

LIFE AND WORK
February 16 Lesson
Basic Passage: Matthew 8:1-17

Whether the healing is physical, emotional, or spiritual, Jesus knows what we need before we ever ask. Our asking signals our trust and faith in God to control the situation we face. And, He encourages us to ask (Matthew 7:7-11; Hebrews 4:16).

One afternoon years ago, a lady called my father-in-law, then pastor of a county-seat town, to come and pray over her and anoint her with oil. She related that her illness had grown worse and she needed help desperately. Arriving at the house, the pastor found Christian friends waiting for him to come and help them pray over her. The lady instructed my father-in-law to take the cooking oil from the kitchen

cabinet to use for her anointing. (We Baptists often pray over and with our friends, but we are a little uncomfortable with the anointing of oil spoken of in James 5:14-15.)

Later, my father-in-law confessed he was more impressed with the lady's faith in God's power to heal through the words of James than he was nervous over his officiating a non-Baptist practice.

The cooking oil did not make the difference; the lady's humility and personal assurance that God would heal her made the difference. Her asking her friends to come to pray over her made the difference. My father-in-law's faith displayed by his willingness to administer cooking oil to the head of a lady who was not a member of his church made the difference. The friends taking time from their day's schedule to come to the lady's house to practice the words of James made the difference. "Two or more" were gathered in His name made a difference. Now that's coming in faith!

Recreation leaders to hold retreat


The 1992 church recreation leadership retreat will be held March 6-7 at Camp Linden.

worldwide with the demise of communism."

The resolution conveyed "to Chairman Bill Hancock and the trustees of the Foreign Mission Board our heartfelt concern, our continuing prayers, and our strong confidence in their Spirit-led leadership at this time."

Trustees also voted to commend to the trustees of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky., their support for David Dockery, general editor of *The New American Commentary* at the board. A day earlier seminary trustees unanimously had approved faculty status for Dockery who then was appointed dean of the school of theology by President Roy L. Honeycutt.

Sunday School Board trustees approved a process to allow the administration to fill Dockery's position before the next full meeting of the trustee board in August. A candidate will be presented and questioned by the trustee executive committee and a mail ballot will be conducted of the full board.

Dockery reported on an expanded line of academic books to be released by Broadman Press in the next five

years. Books to be released this year include *The Identity of Jesus of Nazareth* by Carl F. H. Henry, *Survey of the Old Testament* by Paul R. House, and *Learning to Study the Bible* by Earl P. McQuay.

In another report, trustees learned of plans by the Discipleship Training department to release on an accelerated production track a new line of church-based, support-group materials for use with people suffering from addictive behaviors and codependency.

Utilizing manuscripts provided at no charge from RAPHIA, a Christian-based in-patient hospital program for the treatment of psychiatric and substance abuse problems, the board will develop church-based materials on a variety of other subjects under the imprint, Lifeway.

Roy Edgemon, director of the Discipleship Training department, said the release of 24-30 products in the next 30 months represents an "unprecedented opportunity for ministry and evangelism."

Harry Piland, director of the Sunday School division, said the 1991 Sunday School enrollment gain of 173,303, the

largest since 1976, puts Southern Baptists "on the verge of one of the largest breakthroughs we have ever seen."

After hearing a report on options for "downsizing" the 93-member board, trustees voted to ask their five-member committee to continue its study and bring a recommendation in August.

personnel committee, voted to ask the full board to reaffirm the covenant document. The recommendation also specifically urged trustees to stand by their commitment not to revisit the seminary's 1986 response to the Southern Baptist Convention Peace Committee. A trustee review that year cleared several professors, including Hinson and Marshall, in response to allegations they were teaching outside the Abstract of Principles.

Executive Committee Chairman Larry Adams of Oklahoma said a reaffirmation of the covenant would be reassuring to the faculty.

February is the "love" month. Unfortunately in our society we have begun to spell "love" differently. It is now spelled "sex."

The statistics I have been reading indicate we need to do more than have a "Sweetheart" banquet. It is time for the church to "teach them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." I am still haunted by the memory of that university student who had become involved in a lesbian relationship, and was surprised that her church disapproved of this. She had been fairly faithful in the program of her church.

Does not our Lord include love, marriage, and sexuality in the "all things." No one who has ever read the Sermon on the Mount could ever doubt that He included it. The pattern that


He presented in his life and his instruction leaves no room for sexual uncleanness.
