New study approaches needed to reach 'unreached' people

NASHVILLE (BP) — Southern Baptists have a traditional approach to Bible study that is reaching eight million people but need other approaches to reach others, according to the leader of Southern Baptist Sunday School work.

Apartment complex Bible studies such as Mission Arlington in Arlington, Texas, are non-traditional but they are reaching people who otherwise would not be hearing the Gospel, Harry Piland pointed out.

More than 2000 people are involved in the 120 Bible studies meeting in apartments, office buildings, and other locations throughout Arlington.

The leaders of Mission Arlington shy away from traditional Southern Baptist literature because they believe it is not appropriate for non-Southern Baptists and others who have little or no familiarity with the Bible.

Rather than reject non-traditional approaches to Bible study such as that of Mission Arlington, Piland embraces it as another way to reach people.

"We have to accept the fact we are trying to minister and touch their

lives, not make them Southern Baptists," Piland said.

Piland said many other Southern Baptist churches need to be working to reach people in the community who likely will never attend their church.

"Someone in the church must get the dream and begin the work," he said. "It's bone-crushing, hard work and we don't have near as many churches doing it as we need."

Just as Mission Arlington started five years ago with an effort to reach one family, other churches must start small with one apartment complex and build on that ministry for an outreach effort, Piland said.

CLC, BJC join forces on freedom restoration act

WASHINGTON (BP) — Disagreement over whether the Religious Freedom Restoration Act will advance abortion rights dominated a recent congressional hearing on the bill.

RFRA (House of Representatives Bill 2797) is designed to restore the free exercise of religion to its status before the Supreme Court's 1990

Employment Division v. Smith opinion. In Smith, the court ruled government was not required to show it had a "compelling interest" outranking religious freedom before restricting the First Amendment right.

Nearly all 13 witnesses in the two-day hearing before the Civil and Constitutional Rights Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee agreed the Smith decision needed a legislative remedy. While concurring on the damage done by Smith, pro-lifers split over the specifics of RFRA.

Rep. Chris Smith, R.-N.J., the National Right to Life Committee, and the United States Catholic Conference expressed opposition unless the legislation includes language excluding abortion claims from being made by women. The National Association of Evangelicals and some lawyers with pro-life credentials denied any new right to abortion would result from RFRA.

The Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission, which takes a pro-life position and is also the convention's religious liberty organization, examined the abortion concerns closely last year before deciding the pro-choice agenda would not be advanced

by RFRA.


"Pro-life legislators can support this bill without having to choose between life and religious liberty," CLC general counsel Michael Whitehead said after observing portions of the hearing.

"The ACLU promised to continue making claims of a religious right to abortion under the First Amendment, just as they have in the past, whether or not RFRA is enacted. The CLC and other pro-life groups are convinced RFRA will not help the ACLU win such claims," Whitehead said.

Oliver Thomas, general counsel of the Baptist Joint Committee, said after the hearing he was hopeful about RFRA "because it was made clear that this bill is scrupulously neutral on abortion. And I think it also was made clear there will be no restoration of religious liberty if either side" in the abortion debate tries to use RFRA as a weapon for its agenda.

"I am delighted the Christian Life Commission and the Baptist Joint Committee are working together on this issue," Thomas said. "As the chairman of the coalition, I want to commend the CLC and other pro-life groups who have stuck by this bill in the face of these allegations."

Missionaries safe after Nigerian riots

KADUNA, Nigeria (BP) — Renewed battles between Muslims and Christians in northern Nigeria reportedly have killed dozens of people, including some Baptists.

"(Missionaries) have word of individual pastors and Baptists they knew and Christians from other denominations who have been killed," said Betty Kay Yamaoka of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. "Some churches have been burned."

Yamaoka, associate area director for mission work in west Africa, spoke to missionary Ray Davidson in Kaduna by phone May 18. No missionaries were harmed, Davidson said, but a number of Nigerian Christians were killed.

The rioting began in two northern

towns May 17 when anger over the moving of a market from a Christian to a Muslim area exploded into violence, according to the Associated Press.

The fighting spread the next day to the cities of Kaduna and Zaria, where Southern Baptist missionaries work. Muslim rioters also approached the Baptist pastors' school in the area several times threatening violence, Davidson reported. They were turned away, first by police and later by students on campus.

Reported deaths in the area varied from 12 to 100; several sources put confirmed deaths at 24. A hospital in Kaduna was said to be overflowing with people wounded in attacks. The government reported a "huge loss of lives" in Kaduna.

Spiritual lords, immortal souls, and religious liberty

Someone has said that the separation of church and state does not seem so necessary or attractive when you are in the majority. But religious liberty definitely is one of the strongest tenets among basic Baptist distinctives.

What does "religious liberty" mean to Baptists today? Is there cause for alarm that this cherished freedom could be lost? The heroes of the faith paid for it with their lives, their honor, and with great suffering on injustices.

Religious Liberty Day is celebrated by Southern Baptists on June 7. Celebration materials are available from the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs in Washington, and from the Christian Life Commission in Nashville.

More than 200 years ago (1781) Isaac Backus said, "As religion must always be a matter between God and individuals, no man can be made a member of a truly religious society by force or without his own consent, neither can any corporation that is not a religious society have a just right to govern in religious affairs."

Speaking to the religious liberty theme perhaps for the first time in the English language, early Baptist leader Thomas Helwys of London, addressed the issue in his book *A Short Declaration of the Mystery of Iniquity*. The year was 1612.

In a handwritten note at the front of his book, he said to King James:

"Hear O King and dispise not the counsel of the poore, and let their complaints come before thee. The king is a mortall man, not God, therefore hath no power over the immortall soules of his subjects to make lawes and ordinances for them, and to set spirituall lords over them.

"If the king have authority to make spirituall lords and lawes, then he is an immortall God, and not a mortall man . . ."

What is religious liberty? It could be freedom from religion — and not just freedom of religion. To many people religious liberty means the opportunity to choose what form of religion one wants.

Remember Roger Williams? He fervently fled

persecution in Massachusetts and founded Rhode Island — for the sake of religious liberty. In 1622 he wrote (*The Bloody Tenant of Persecution*), "God requires not a uniformity of religion to be enacted and enforced in any civil state," and that repression of religious liberty was never intended by God.

According to historian Edwin Gaustad, John Leland, that noble 18th century Baptist itinerant preacher, argued that whether a man believed in "one god, twenty gods, or no god" was not the concern of the state.

He said that religion is not in any direct way the concern of the state. The law should not favor ministers, for example, nor should it penalize them. Gaustad said that the state, on theological grounds, "has no right to be the armed avenger against 'false' religion nor the armed defender of 'true' religion." And, on Constitutional grounds, the state is not privileged to be either the foe or patron of religion — to any degree.

Churches have no right to coerce others. Churches do have the right to organize, influence, and persuade. Each group has the right to speak and practice its basic religious faith and practice.

But religious liberty remains an emotional and unsettled issue today. Even among Baptists there are wide variances of opinion.

We like the way it was stated by the late Gerhard Claas, Baptist World Alliance general secretary. The call for freedom including religious liberty always must have a double goal, he said. One is the freedom of the individual, so that he can live according to his own conscience and to the glory of God; and the other is the freedom of society — so we can build for the future and serve the people for the welfare of the city (country, world.)

Stan Hasteley, formerly of the Baptist Joint Committee staff, several years ago said that religious liberty is the chief contribution Baptists have made to the social teaching of the church. Its continuity, he said, is essential to proper church-state relations. It then follows that each generation of Baptists is obligated to "contend for it and to extend it to the next generation."

Baptists today see increasing attacks on the views of the nation's founders concerning church-state. Some of these attacks are from so-called "far out" cults. Some, to our dismay, come from government itself.

Michael Whitehead, director of Christian citizenship and religious liberty concerns for the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission, reminds us:

"Baptists are committed to religious liberty because we are committed to proclaiming the truth. We are also committed to liberty of conscience. No government or church organization must be allowed to interfere with a person's relationship with his or her God. Religious liberty has Biblical roots . . . Each person is responsible for his or her own choices (Genesis 1:27)."

John 8:32 is the key verse for the Christian Life Commission's theme for Religious Liberty Sunday, June 7: "The truth shall make you free."

George W. Truett, as we are reminded by the Baptist Joint Committee, was perhaps Southern Baptists' most eloquent spokesman for religious liberty:

"Christ's religion needs no prop of any kind from any worldly source, and to the degree that it is thus supported is a millstone hanged about its neck."

Our Baptist fathers waged a mighty struggle for religious liberty, he said. "They dared to be odd, to stand alone, to refuse to conform, though it cost them suffering and even life itself. They dared to defy traditions and customs . . . They pleaded and suffered, they offered their protests . . . and thank God, mighty statesmen were won to their contention."

Though Baptists and other citizens today do not have to fear heinous burdens or death because we defend religious liberty, we do face critical erosion and government supported religion is still not palatable. Truett, in his Capitol steps message in May 1920, assailed government intervention in religious matters. Today we must be equally decisive against government support of religion. — WFA

Religious leaders, scientists meet on environment

WASHINGTON (BP) — A recent meeting of religious leaders and scientists concerning the environment benefited from participation by evangelical Christians, said Southern Baptist Convention agency head Richard D. Land.

About 150 leaders from religion and science gathered for "Mission to Washington: Religion and Science in Partnership for the Environment." The three-day conference produced a four-page statement signed by 115 participants calling on the United States to

lead the way in protecting the environment.

"This is not everything we would want and not everything is said the way we would want it but this is a better statement than it would have been had not evangelicals participated in the process," said Land, executive director of the Christian Life Commission. "We didn't win every discussion but we didn't lose every one either."

Another evangelical signer, Calvin DeWitt, called it a "very good statement" considering the group's diversi-

ty. Evangelicals "have to bring it much further" by "honoring God as creator," as an example, said DeWitt, director of Au Sable Institute of Environmental Studies, which serves 80 Christian colleges.

Noted scientist and evolutionist Carl Sagan called it a strong statement "given the immense diversity not only in the religious community but between religion and science."

In addition to Land, Southern Baptists who signed the statement are Cecil Sherman, coordinator of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, and Foy Valentine, former CLC executive director. Patricia Ayres, the CBF's moderator, also attended the meeting. Few among the religious leaders

participating would be categorized as evangelical. One of the discussions evangelicals won involved the final sentence of the statement, which reads as adopted: "Understanding that the world does not belong to any one nation or generation, and sharing a spirit of utmost urgency, we dedicate ourselves to undertake bold action to cherish and protect the environment of our planetary home."


Evangelical participation may have helped scientists decide, possibly for the first time, "that we, as disciples of Christ, are part of the solution" rather than part of the problem, DeWitt said. "We have lived a very self-centered life and our theology has been self-centered." Christians have "trampled the works" of the creator, he said, "while saying we honor the creator."

Principles of giving

When an offering for missions was being received in one church, a young person who had no money asked the usher to place the offering plate on the floor. She then stepped into the plate as a way of giving herself totally. Generous? Yes, all would agree that her gift was very generous. With needs here in these United States and around the world, such generosity is needed. Missionaries and mission gifts are needed to preach the Gospel, feed the hungry, and help the poor.

The desire of Paul was that the Corinthian Christians might be generous in the offering they had promised. Paul again urged the Corinthians to give generously to the collection for the poor Jewish Christians in Jerusalem. The word "bounty" can be translated as "a generous gift." (v. 5). In describing the procedures for the offering, Paul set forth what generous giving will do.

Provokes readiness (vv. 1-5)
Having successfully used the prom-

ise of a generous offering by the Corinthians to challenge the Macedonians to give, Paul used the generous giving of the Macedonians to provoke the Corinthians to proceed with receiving a generous offering. Four times he spoke of the need for their being ready (vv. 2-5). Each time Paul challenged them on the basis of the generous giving of the Macedonians.

Even though there is no command in the Bible to compete with one another, there is the command to "consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works." (Hebrews 10:24). Certainly generous giving ought to provoke others to be generous givers. Paul wanted the love offering to be generous and voluntary, not squeezed out of the givers.

Provides a return (vv. 6-10)
Someone said, "You can't out-give God." He is going to return to you much more than you give. Paul said the farmer knows this principle. The more a farmer sows the more he gets

back. There is a return on one's investment. "You just can't out-get God." God's granaries are full and overflowing. He is ready to unload on us if we will trust Him and give. One grain of corn in the fall of 1936 produced 22 ears of corn on the main stalk and all the stalks that sprouted from it. (I know because I gathered them as a teenager.)

BIBLE BOOK

May 31 Lesson

Basic Passage: II Corinthians 9:1-15

God loves a cheerful giver. He doesn't want us to give with the wrong motives, "grudgingly or of necessity," but purposefully (v. 7). God is able to supply through us adequate resources for every good work (v. 8). He does not forget benevolent giving (v. 9). A gift to the poor is a loan to the Lord (Proverbs 19:17). And God always pays His debts. God will also supply the necessary funds to give (v. 10). What a God! And what a joy to give as God supplies the resources!

Produces results (vv. 11-15)

The more we give, the more we are blessed. And the more we are blessed, the more we are to give. Thus, "we give to get to give." There is never to be a break in the flow. God wants His money in circulation. And we are the ones who must keep it in circulation. We need to be like the Macedonian Christians who couldn't wait until the offering plates got to them. Instead of the offering killing the worship service, it ought to enhance the service.

God has always been a giver. And He still is. He allows no gift that is given to Him with the right motives to go unblessed. And what are those blessings? In these verses we find the answer: enrichment to give more generously (v. 11); much thanksgiving from the ones being helped with their material, physical, and spiritual needs (vv. 11, 12); added praise of God (v. 13); more prayers prayed in behalf of the givers (v. 14); and a greater recognition of the greatest gift of all, the Lord Jesus Christ (v. 15).

Focused on the future

As the Christian movement took root in the early years following the resurrection of Jesus, many problems arose. The problems had to be addressed in an open and forthright manner. Whether addressing Gnostic heretics or shallow scoffers, Peter dealt with falsehoods concisely and profoundly. The scoffers sought to discredit Christian teachings by raising questions regarding the return of Christ. They challenged the second coming, stating, "Ever since our fathers died, everything goes on as it has since the beginning of creation."

Peter indicated that false teachers choose to forget and ignore the purposeful activity of the Creator. By merely speaking, God brought the

world into existence. God was in control of the creation when the floodwaters deluged the earth, destroying everyone except Noah and his family. God will determine the time and circumstances under which this life will end.

CONVENTION UNIFORM

May 31 Lesson

Basic Passage: II Peter 3:3-14

The negative line of reasoning is further refuted by the indication that God operates on His own timetable. God acts and moves without limitation — "With the Lord, a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day." Christ will return at the

time appointed and determined by the Father.

The delay in Christ's return is purposeful. It is the desire of God that all people live in a vital, personal relationship with Christ. God wants no one to perish, "but everyone come to repentance." The delayed return of Christ affords the opportunity for more sinners to come to know Him in a saving experience.

On the other hand, the return of Christ should not be taken for granted. Jesus is coming again! Christians should live in anticipation of this reality. Jesus will return suddenly and unexpectedly. Peter stated, "But the day of the Lord will come like a thief."

Graphic language depicts the cataclysmic nature of circumstances surrounding this event. "The heavens will disappear with a roar; the

elements will be destroyed by fire, and the earth and everything in it will be laid bare." The recipients of this letter are to realize God controls the ultimate destiny of life. In light of Christ's return and the earth-shattering events surrounding it, Christians are called to live as the children of God. The challenge is "... to live holy and Godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming."

The return of Christ will be the dawning of a new day. Persecution will no longer exist. False teaching will cease. Temptations will be overcome. God will keep His promise as "... we are looking forward to a new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness." As we see Christ face to face, the fullness of life will be experienced. Until then, Christians should live in joyous and eager anticipation of the coming of Christ.

Growing yet incomplete

Writings by Kenneth H. Cooper, founder of the Aerobics Center in Dallas, Texas, reveal that a person can be healthy, yet not physically fit and vice versa. The church at Thyatira was a growing, yet incomplete church. We might say they demonstrated spiritual health, but their spiritual incompleteness or lack of spiritual muscle tone was evident, especially to Christ, the head of the church.

The Scripture for this lesson, Revelation 2:18-29, focuses on discipleship and the necessity of continuing to faithfully serve Christ while refusing to be permissive toward evil.

Thyatira was well known for its guilds of craftsmen, dyers, and weavers. An important trade center, Thyatira produced expensive purple dye and was home to pottery and brass craftsmen as well. We are told in Acts 16:14 of Lydia, a businesswoman in Thyatira who dealt in purple products. It is believed that the Ephesian Christians began the work in Thyatira.

The sender of the letter identified himself as the Son of God which is the only time Christ used this title for Himself in the letters to the seven

churches. As the Son of God, He had flaming eyes (ch. 1:12-16) which could not only recognize the good of the Thyatira church, but also penetrate layers of corruptions to expose the sin of the church.

Just as Christ used the words "I know thy works ..." with the church at Smyrna (ch. 2:13), He also used the same "I know thy works ..." with the Thyatira church. In contrast to Ephesus where the people had lost their zeal for God's work, the real commendation of Thyatira was that they were engaged in charity, service, faith, and patience more than they were at the beginning of their ministry.

Although they were a growing church, they were permissive toward wickedness (ch. 2:20-23). The queen bee of the wickedness was a woman in the church who was misleading other church members to embrace the doctrines of Baal worship. She was compared to Jezebel, wife of Ahab in the Old Testament.

The Thyatira church people tolerated her craftiness which led to their adapting the ungodly beliefs into their hearts

and living. These church people were frequenting the feasts and social activities of the trade guilds, which began as a kind of worship service and was reduced to sordidness, sexual immorality, and the eating of food sacrificed to idols.

Verses 22 and 23 were directed toward this Jezebel and her followers. Truly, we Christians reap what we sow (See Galatians 6:8a).

But for those who did not conform to the teachings and practices of Satan via this Jezebel, a promise was given: Authority over the nations (see Psalms 2:8), which is ultimately reigning with Christ. The Morning Star was promised to those who "hold on" to Christ's teachings and principles to the end. Paul's appeal in Romans 12:2, "Be not conformed to this world ..." certainly echoes Christ's challenge in Revelation 2:24-26.


Eric Taylor receives degree from MWBTS

The group did not issue a report on the dialogue nor did it indicate recommendations stemming from the meeting would follow.

The WMU leaders have also issued an invitation to SBC leadership. These two invitations are part of a series of meetings WMU plans to have with leaders across the convention.

Representing the Fellowship were John Hewett, past moderator; Cecil Sherman, coordinator; and Pat Ayres, newly elected moderator.

The meeting at the national WMU headquarters was the first between the Fellowship leaders and members of a WMU special long-range study committee.

The WMU long-range study committee was named by national WMU President Carolyn Miller during the

January 1992 WMU executive board meeting. Miller asked the group to explore action plans and strategies to enable WMU to strengthen its involvement in missions. The committee is made up of representatives from the national WMU staff, current and former national WMU executive board members, state WMU staffs, and current and former national WMU officers.

"We feel it is important to talk with representatives of all groups of Southern Baptists about missions," said

Dellanna O'Brien, national WMU executive director and a member of the study committee.

The most important thing for WMU to do at this point in Southern Baptist life is to serve all churches as they educate about and involve their members in missions, she said. "The best way for us to accomplish this is to listen and be informed." — BP

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
