## TBC study committee plans statewide meetings

Eight regional forums have been designated by the Special Study Committee which was appointed last November by Ron Phillips at the Tennessee Baptist Convention in Gatlinburg.

The committee was appointed by Phillips, who was TBC president, to study election processes for the Executive Board, and the committees on committees and boards.

Chaired by Fred Steelman, pastor of Red Bank Church, Chattanooga, the committee already has held two meetings.

At its second meeting, the committee began finalizing sites for the regional meetings. The committee also gave attention to ways for receiving input from the people attending the regional forums.

Places and dates for the meetings include: North Central Region, First Church, Cookeville, April 1; Southeastern, Red Bank Church, Chattanooga, April 6; Eastern, Harrison-Chilhowee Academy, Seymour, April 8; Northeastern, Holston Association office, Johnson City, April 15;

Southwestern, First Church, Bolivar, May 24; Northwestern, First Church, Trenton, May 25; Central, Belmont Heights Church, Nashville, May 27; and South Cen-

tral, Lawrence County Association office, Leoma, June 1. All sessions will begin at 7 p.m.

In addition to Chairman Steelman, other members of the committee include Wayne Allen, Briarwood Church, Memphis; Ken Altom, First Church, Cookeville; Lloyd Bardowell, First Rivergate, Nashville; Raymond Boston, First Church, Dyersburg; Edward Futtrell, Southside Church, Jefferson City; Jackie Kay, Bartlett Church, Memphis; James McCluskey, Wallace Memorial Church, Knoxville; and Ralph McIntyre, Nashville, retired from the Sunday School Board.

All are pastors. Others included are Leonard Markham, pastor of Bluegrass Church, Hendersonville, TBC president; Ron Phillips, pastor of Central Church Hixson, Chattanooga, former TBC president; and James Porch, TBC executive director/treasurer.

At the regional meetings, Steelman said, there will be opportunity for participants to "talk back" to the committee and share their views about the election processes. "The meetings are open," he said, "and we hope many Tennessee Baptists will participate. This is what messengers asked for at the convention

## Executive Committee acts on BJC, WMU in Nashville meeting

NASHVILLE — The Southern Baptist Convention's Executive Committee registered concerns for the SBC's future relationship with Woman's Missionary Union auxiliary during its Feb. 22-24 meeting, here.

The committee also approved an end to a heated dispute with the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs over \$300,000 in SBC funds originally set aside for a building in Washington.

At the meeting the committee also approved a recommendation to the Southern Baptist — See Executive, page 2

## Tennesseans may leave Rwanda

KIGALI, Rwanda — Baptists are among those fleeing before a rebel army advancing toward the Rwandan capital of Kigali in central Africa.

American citizens, including 12 Southern Baptist missionaries and workers, have been advised by the United States Embassy to remain near their homes and in phone contact with the Embassy in case it becomes necessary to evacuate.

Tennesseans in Rwanda are Katrina Knox, Columbia; David and Janet Hooten,

Knoxville; and Marvin and Anice Ogle, Greeneville.

"All Southern Baptist personnel are reported to be safe and not in immediate danger," said missionary Larry Randolph.

The same cannot be said for Rwandan Baptists. "We hear gunfire every day and wonder if it is directed at anyone we know," missionary Diane Randolph said.

"We don't know about many of our Christian friends, if they are homeless or perhaps dead. Please pray for peace in Rwanda," she requested. □

last November."

At its February meeting, the committee agreed that the convention needs a system of fairness and adequate and equal representation — one that "does not need fixing constantly." It was agreed also that competency has a high value when people are nominated. Steelman reminded the group that "we need to look at the original assignment and be true to it."

The committee also looked at the current status of Executive Board representation and polity relationship to churches and the convention. Members discussed at length ways to include in the study methods to receive and digest input from

those who attend the meetings.

Since 1984, statistics reveal, there have been 158 new members elected to the Executive Board and only 21 with previous service. It was pointed out that the convention does not relate directly to associations, but to churches. Committee members said that nominees need to be "spirit-filled, mature, Godly Christians, committed to serve the Lord" and the result would "jell the entire state" and help Tennessee Baptists to rely on trust and not to a system.

Committee members will be present at each regional meeting. Reservations are not necessary. — Wm. Fletcher Allen □


## Full Tennessee Senate to consider lottery bill

NASHVILLE — Bill Bates, TBC public affairs consultant, gives an update on a lottery-related proposal which is calendared for action before the Tennessee Senate today.

Senate bill SJR would eliminate the word "lottery" as it stands in the Tennessee State Constitution, Bates said. On Feb. 24, the Senate Judiciary Committee voted 6-3 to put the proposal before the entire Senate. Later in the week, the bill was placed on the Senate calendar for action today. Lotteries are not legal in Tennessee, and the proposed bill can be seen as a fight between pro and con groups as voting time nears on Capital Hill.

If the bill passes the Senate and House, it would then be ready for inclusion on Tennessee's 1994 gubernatorial ballot. Bates said Tennessee Baptists should contact their district senators if they wish to oppose the bill.

According to anti-gambling sources, if approved, the measure would be a big step toward legalizing a state lottery. Currently lotteries are not permitted because of wording in the Tennessee Constitution.

Some sources say approval of SJR would open the doors for legalizing other forms of gambling in Tennessee. Others say that a legalized lottery would bring in extra income for needs such as education. A counter argument says that lotteries take money mostly from those who can least afford to gamble, he said.

The bill must pass each legislative body by a two-thirds margin (22 votes). It passed the House by a simple majority last term. The two-thirds margin requirement may make it difficult to gain approval. Supporters of the bill say that the lottery question should be put in "the hands of the people."

## Executive Committee acts on BJC, WMU in Nashville ...

Convention for the 1993-94 SBC Program Allocation Budget; a new publication, *SBC Life*, to replace *The Baptist Program*; a request to the Annuity Board to divest itself of stocks of corporate contributors to Planned Parenthood; and a study of "the future of theological education in Southern Baptist life."

The Executive Committee voiced "deep concern" in a resolution addressing changes approved by WMU's Executive Board in January to broaden the auxiliary's scope of work with other Baptist groups and Christian bodies, such as producing missions education materials "at their request."

While giving high praise to WMU's longstanding promotion of SBC missions offerings, its prayer efforts for missionaries and its missions education programs, the Executive Committee resolution called on WMU to "make clear its singular cooperation" with the SBC and its Foreign and Home Mission boards.

Responding to questions from an Executive Committee member, national WMU Executive Director Dellanna O'Brien said WMU is not planning to promote other mission offerings, such as one initiated by the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, a two-year-old organization of Baptist "moderates", nor will WMU become a missionary-sending organization.

"We appreciate the affirmation expressed by the SBC Executive Committee for WMU," O'Brien said after the meeting. "The WMU Executive

Board next meets in June in conjunction with the WMU annual meeting and the Southern Baptist Convention. This would be the earliest time this resolution could be considered by our board."

In a split vote over an agreement hammered out between Executive Committee and Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs officials and legal counsel, the Executive Committee agreed to give the BJC \$100,000 from its operating reserve — \$25,000 each of the next four years — to settle a dispute over a \$300,000 fund established in 1966 for a Baptist building in Washington.

The agreement calls for both sides to "put to rest" the issue, which arose in 1991 when the BJC claimed the \$300,000 and SBC messengers in 1992 in Indianapolis instead approved control of the fund by the Executive Committee.

A number of Executive Committee members opposed the agreement on the grounds it was a reaction to a threatened lawsuit by the BJC — and that it's "flatly wrong" to submit to threats, as one member put it. Both sides cited biblical passages in debating the proposed agreement before it was approved by a 2-1 or wider margin in a show of hands.

A 1993-94 SBC Program Allocation Budget of \$138,234,735 was approved for recommendation to the SBC annual meeting June 15-17 in Houston. The Executive Committee's recommendation follows its 1989 decision to recommend a basic budget no larger than receipts of the last

fiscal year of record, which in this case was 1991-92.

The recommendation is \$1,965,660 less than this year's budget, or a 1.4 percent decrease.

Also approved was the 1991-92 audit of the Executive Committee.

With *SBC Life*, a full-color, newspaper-like publication, *The Baptist Program* — published by the Executive Committee since 1925 — will be phased out after its September edition. *SBC Life* will be launched with a special edition for the SBC annual meeting in Houston, then begin regular publication in October. Like *The Baptist Program*, *SBC Life* will be published 10 times a year.

The new publication's editor, Mark Coppenger, vice president for convention relations, said *SBC Life* will be both for ministers and laypersons.

Stepping into the abortion issue, the Executive Committee voted to request the Annuity Board "identify any company in its portfolio that is contributing to Planned Parenthood or any other provider or advocate of legal abortion" and "begin a process of divesting itself" of those stocks.

J. C. Mitchell, a Winter Park, Fla., pastor and an advocate of the divesting, said in an interview information available from pro-life research arms indicates the Annuity Board may have investments in various companies that contribute to Planned Parenthood.

The divesting request to the Annuity Board, however,

passed with only minimal opposition.

Responding in behalf of the Annuity Board, Thomas E. Miller Jr., senior vice president for public relations, told Baptist Press the matter would be presented to the agency's trustees.

The Annuity Board currently is following through on a trustee-initiated Kmart shareholder action to instruct the company to eliminate from its Waldenbooks subsidiary publications "largely devoted to the description of sexual encounters or that has a graphic depiction of exploitative sex and/or gratuitous violence."

Joining efforts to urge President Bill Clinton to end U.S. diplomatic relations with the Vatican, the Executive Committee passed a resolution stating such ties are "clearly a violation" of the U.S. Constitution's First Amendment prohibition against laws favoring one religion over another.

In approving an in-depth study of the future of theological education in the SBC, the Executive Committee authorized chairman David Hankins, a Lake Charles, La., pastor, to appoint a study committee in consultation with the SBC's Education Commission and six seminaries.

The Executive Committee also approved a revision of the seminaries' SBC program statement to include baccalaureate programs. The revision, requested by the seminaries' presidents, reflects adjustment to New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary's new baccalaureate program. □

## Supreme Court asked to end religious discrimination in schools

WASHINGTON — Religious liberty advocates argued in back-to-back Supreme Court cases Feb. 24 school districts act unconstitutionally when they discriminate against religion in the provision of facilities or serv-

ices to students or nonstudents.

In the first case, the court was asked to determine whether a school district can refuse to allow a church to use facilities when use by other groups is permitted. In the case immediately following, arguments focused on whether a hearing-impaired student

attending a parochial school should be provided a government-funded interpreter like deaf children are in public and nonreligious private schools.

"Both cases are essentially about discrimination against religion," said Michael Whitehead, general counsel of the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission. "Many well-meaning public officials feel obligated to discriminate against religion, for fear that equal treatment of religious people might somehow violate the separation of church and state."

In *Lamb's Chapel vs. Center Moriches Union Free School District*, a New York school district rejected requests by an evangelical church to rent space at a high school first to hold worship services and then to show a film series on the family produced by James Dobson's Focus on the Family organization. More than 80 community groups had used the school for a variety of reasons.

In *Zobrest vs. Catalina Foothills School District*, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled a school district would be establishing religion if it paid for an interpreter for James Zobrest, a student at a Catholic high school in Arizona. The school acknowledged he could be provided an interpreter if he attended a public or nonsectarian private school. □

But Bates says that this is not the usual method for most legislative proposals.

Bates believes this is a crucial issue, and urges Tennessee Baptists to contact their local representatives in the House and Senate to state their opinion. "If this passes the legislature," he said, "it will be like opening the door for all kinds of gambling in our state. It could get out of control before our citizens know it. Tennessee Baptists need to

make their feelings known."

Bates said nine persons spoke before the Senate Judiciary Committee last week, and all spoke against the proposal to eliminate the word "lottery" from the Constitution. Two Tennessee Baptist leaders spoke against the bill — James Porch, executive director/treasurer; and Leonard Markham, pastor of Blue Grass Church, Hendersonville, who is also convention president. — Wm. Fletcher Allen

Billy Friel, pastor of First Church, led the liquor fight. He told *The Tennessean*, Nashville's morning paper, he was pleased with the result though he "would have liked for us to make a stronger showing to have made more of a statement." □

# Georgia editor nominated as next Southern Seminary head

— A brief announcement of the Southern Seminary's search committee recommendation of Al Mohler to succeed President Roy Honeycutt was carried on the front page of last week's *Baptist and Reflector*. The printing deadline necessitated use of the brief story. Following is a full account of the Feb. 22 action — Editor

NASHVILLE — Receiving "a sense of God's will" sooner than expected, the search committee for a new president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary announced its unanimous nominee Feb. 22: R. Albert Mohler Jr.

Mohler, nominated to become Southern's ninth president since its founding in 1859, is a master of divinity and Ph.D. graduate from the Louisville seminary and a former assistant to Roy Honeycutt, 66, Southern's president since 1982 who will retire at the end of the year.

Mohler has been editor of *Georgia Baptists' newjournal*, *The Christian Index*, since 1989 and an articulate spokesman for conservative causes in the SBC.

"At 33 years of age, he would be the fourth person to become president while in his 30s," Wayne Allen, chairman of both the seminary's trustees and the seven-member search committee, said during a news conference at the Southern

Baptist Convention Building in Nashville.

"James Boyce founded the institution at age 32," said Allen, pastor of Briarwood Church, Memphis. "E.Y. Mullins became the president of Southern at age 39. And Duke McCall became the president of Southern at age 36."

Rick White, pastor of First Church, Franklin, also served on the committee.

Acknowledging Mohler's age "could be viewed as a liability," Allen said it also "may well be a strength. Studies of institutions reveal that long-tenured administrations have the most significant shaping influences on the school," he said.

Mohler voiced his acceptance of the nomination "with a humble and an awe-filled heart but with a clear sense of God's direction."

"I cannot express to you how precious Southern Seminary is to my heart," he said. "I do feel the absolute, unmistakable consistency of God's calling in my life which brings me to this day."

Allen said trustees will vote on Mohler during their next regular meeting April 19 or perhaps in a called meeting in late March to allow for a lengthier time to dialogue with the nominee.

"We believe that Dr. Mohler will receive a very strong vote ... a very significant majority of the trustees," Allen predicted.

The search committee, the week of Feb. 15, interviewed

Mohler and two other potential nominees, Richard Land, executive director of the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission, and Timothy George, dean of Samford University's Beeson Divinity School in Birmingham, Ala. A fourth candidate, Bob R. Agee, president of Oklahoma Baptist

University, withdrew from consideration after the four candidates' names were revealed in news media reports.

"We had not planned to reach a decision until early March," Allen recounted, "but we all had such a sense of God's leadership and a peace concerning God's will that we came to a unanimous decision on Friday afternoon."

Explaining why the committee decided to make an announcement the following Monday, Allen said, "We felt, rather than information to be

dispensed by conjecture or rumor, that it would be best to officially declare who our candidate is."

Allen said other trustees had been notified of Mohler's nomination by fax or overnight mail and Southern's faculty was being notified in a meeting at the same time as the news conference.

Honeycutt said regarding Mohler in the news conference: "I predict for him an outstanding career as president."

"Personally, I have great confidence in him as someone with whom I have worked closely," Honeycutt said. Mohler was an assistant to Honeycutt, as coordinator of foundation support from 1983-87 and director of capital funding from 1987-89. He earned his master of divinity degree at Southern in 1983 and his Ph.D., specializing in systematic theology, in 1989.

"He (Mohler) is well-prepared academically," Honeycutt continued, "and though this is not a teaching post, I think the skills, the logic, the abilities that one develops in an outstanding Ph.D. program can but help one in the kind of position he will fulfill."

Allen also addressed the question of Mohler's experience. "While Dr. Mohler has no academic classroom experience or academically related administrative experience," Allen said, "there are impressive precedents: Duke McCall (who earlier had been president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary) and Ellis Fuller at Southern; Robert Naylor and Russell Dilday at Southwestern (Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort

Worth); and Landrum Leavell at New Orleans."

Asked how he will deal with a climate of anxiety as his new administration takes shape at Southern and his vision for the seminary, Mohler said he felt a responsibility to discuss such matters first with the trustees. "It's not a matter of reticence to speak," he said, "but a commitment to maintain trust with the process."

After his trustee discussions, Mohler said he intends "to be very open and clear and candid, sensitive ... a listening ear" and a president who will provide "a firm sense of direction."

After the search committee's announcement, Land and George issued written statements of best wishes for Mohler.

Land said: "At the request of the Southern Seminary Search Committee, I entered prayerfully with them into their process to seek God's will concerning their next president. I rejoice with them that they have found common agreement as to their nominee and I wish my good friend, Al Mohler, God's blessings and Godspeed."

"Dr. Al Mohler is one of my dearest friends," George said, "and the most brilliant student I have ever taught." George, an associate professor of church history and historical theology at Southern from 1978-88, had Mohler in master of divinity- and later doctoral-level courses.

Mohler, a Florida native also has served as a pastor in Kentucky. He and his wife have two children. □

## 'Friends of Southern' voice encouragement

LOUISVILLE — Representatives of various constituencies of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary voiced their support for the school at a Feb. 25 rally on the seminary campus.

About 150 people braved the

threat of Louisville's most severe winter storm in years to attend the event sponsored by a loose-knit group called "Friends of Southern Seminary." The group is composed of faculty, students, alumni, and community supporters.

"We want to encourage a positive future for the seminary,"

said Louisville pastor William P. Tuck, who presided at the rally.

The rally came just three days after Southern's presidential search committee announced it will recommend to trustees R. Albert Mohler Jr. become the seminary's ninth president. The rally was scheduled, however, before the announcement.

"It is in all of our best interests (the next president) succeed and I will do everything in my power to make that a reality," Faculty Association President Gerald Keown told the rally, adding nobody at the seminary or in the Southern Baptist Convention would be helped by the school's failure. All, he said, would benefit from the "continued integrity and continued successful mission" of the school.

In addition to students, alumni, and faculty who spoke, two non-Baptists from Louisville spoke in support of the seminary — Eugene March, dean-elect of the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and Georgine Buckwalter, an Episcopal minister. □


"The task of putting these committees together is a tremendous one," Young said. I need the assistance of

Thanks to the staff for this opportunity to be more effective and professional in the work we are attempting to do for our Lord.



Building and maintenance of these along with high salaries of executives are driving literature prices up, promote materialism, and set a bad example.

Can't these be printed on newsprint to cut costs? Sources are available to buy the entire New Testament for less than half a dollar a copy. Many are tired of money being spent on multitudinous publications mailed us filled with redundant articles preceded by the author's picture and concluded with his signature.

# Eliminate the non-essentials; do something

Do something!  
That's the theme for the March 7-14 Week of Prayer for Home Missions. Anyone who has loved and believed in the mission of Christ's church learned early on the three-fold emphases of going, giving, and praying.

That formula equals doing!  
How can Tennessee Baptists get involved in achieving the goal of doing?

Norman Cousins, longtime writer and editor, once visited Dr. Albert Schweitzer in Lambarene, French Equatorial Africa. While there he talked with Schweitzer's associates and many of the local people.

In one conversation with Dr. Margaret van der Kreek, the talk turned to attitudes of dedication and how things are done when there is not much with which to accomplish them.

"Do you like Lambarene?," she asked the writer. "It has all the things that are difficult to find outside, and freedom from the non-essentials." Cousins asked what she meant by "non-essentials."

Her answer was simple, eloquent. "The endless running around in circles to do things that seem a matter of life and death at the time but that you can't

remember two days later. The business of struggling with a checking account to make sure there's enough to cover all the things that we bought but that we don't even know where to put. And the desperate way we try to entertain ourselves."

Well put, Dr. Margaret. Surely those are non-essentials we can do without. As we get ready for the Week of Prayer for Home Missions — and consider the Tennessee Baptist portion of the national \$38 million goal, let's omit the non-essentials from our lives. The Tennessee share of the goal is \$8.1 million — that's about eight percent of the total.

The Week of Prayer, with focused thought and prayer for missions in the homeland, coupled with the giving sacrificially to reach the \$3.1 million goal is doing something!

Woman's Missionary Union will be leading the efforts. Churches and individuals in Tennessee will be involved in all phases — praying, giving, and even going. Churches across the state will have prayer emphasis and discussion and studies about home missions.

The 1993 operating budget for the Home Mission Board is \$86 million. That's \$164 per minute. Of the Annie Armstrong

Easter Offering goal of \$38 million, \$32.7 million will be used for missionaries and field ministries.

When God wants to do something, he gets people praying. That's the stimulus for involvement, finding what God is doing around us, and becoming his partner. Busy Christians already know that, and they know about sacrificing the "non-essentials" in life so they can do something essential for the Lord Jesus.

Do you want to know some other interesting facts about your Home Mission Board?

Americans use more than 600 languages to communicate with each other. Since 1975 Southern Baptists in the United States have resettled more than 10,000 refugees from various countries, resulting in 307 language-culture congregations. A Korean church is begun every week. The SBC has about 3,000 Spanish-speaking churches. One of every two missions started is ethnic or black.

These are but a few good reasons for praying, giving, going — doing something. The essentials in life for Christians far outweigh the non-essentials. The goal of \$38 million is used for essentials, reasons for giving like the Macedonians. □

## Awaiting mortality

Westerners long have displayed keen curiosity about the longevity of citizens of the east.

There has been a certain mystique about it. Why do folks live so long, those in the south central part of the Commonwealth of Independent States? And the Chinese, why do the leaders especially live on and on and on?

In its China Prayer Letter, the Chinese Church Research Centre refers to eight aging Chinese leaders who have dominated the politics of China since the death of Chairman Mao in 1976.

The centre reports that one of the "immortals" died last year at 83, but that his ideas still haunt Chinese politics.

The others, still holding on to old communist ways of repression and authoritarianism, range from 84 to 90. They sabotage reform and persecute those with new ideas.

Of course this includes those who believe in Christ and try to show others the Way. But the "immortals" really aren't immortal.

Despite the fact that a couple of the "immortals" show some sympathy for open thought, evangelicals in China aren't waiting for the aging cadre to pass from the scene.

They are asking us to pray for the elders "that they might receive Christ while there is opportunity."

Wouldn't that be the way to "overcome the world?"

One of the terms used by Christians to identify true servants is that of overcomer. It suggests for us, that overcoming is a way of patterning our lives after the master life-giver and chief builder.

When the world is topsy-turvy, spinning rapidly with no apparent control, it's time for Christians to be overcomers.

The Chinese Christians show the way. While it would be easy to hate, they have decided to pray for those who seem to be immortal. □

MT. CLEMENS, Mich. — Norman Beckham has been around long enough to know that the process of making "clones" only happens in science fiction.

But the dilemma Beckham faced was not fiction. The needs were real, and there were too few people to meet them. What he needed was a quick way to multiply leadership.

Many Tennessee Baptists know Beckham and other Michigan directors of missions because of the Partnership Missions venture that has connected the two state conventions for a decade.

Beckham, a Southern Baptist home missionary, is director of missions for the Macomb Association. More than 1.2 million people live in the association which covers a six-county area north of Detroit.

There is only one Southern Baptist congregation for every 48,000 people within the association, and there is more to do than the 18 churches can do, Beckham says. And there is more than the 4,000 church members can do.

"Our churches tend to be made up of new Christians and new Southern Baptists," he says. Three years ago Beckham made a decision that has made a difference in Macomb Association.

Beckham began to depend on volunteers to do what needed to be done. Brenda Davis took over as part-time director

of volunteer missions, and worked with Beckham and the Home Mission Board to develop the volunteer program. Because of her husband's job transfer last year, she had to resign and now Jan Woodard continues the volunteer program. Currently 10 volunteers are working with the association in a variety of jobs — pastor, educational director, artist/computer operator, children and youth workers, music evangelist, etc.

Beckham has seen the benefits of the volunteer program within the association, and is committed to continuing it. Macomb could use at least 10 additional long-term volunteers.

At present the HMB has 671 mission service corps volun-

teers and more are needed. Achieving the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal of \$38 million will help relieve some of the needs.

The 1993 Annie Armstrong allocations support volunteer ministries with \$426,000.

# Masonic study director removed

NASHVILLE — The Home Mission Board has removed the director of its interfaith witness department from an ad hoc committee preparing a "report and recommendation" on Freemasonry for the Southern Baptist Convention.

HMB President Larry Lewis removed the department's director, Gary Leazer, from the committee Feb. 22 for what Lewis termed "inappropriate" comments Leazer made about the Freemasonry issue in a letter.

Leazer's letter, to a Chattanooga man, was circulated to Home Mission Board officials, Baptist Press, and other news media Feb. 22 by James "Larry" Holly, a Texas physician intent on the SBC declaring Freemasonry incompatible with Christianity.

During last year's SBC meeting in Indianapolis, Holly made a motion for the creation of a special ad hoc committee to study Freemasonry. But messengers voted to amend the motion, instructing the HMB Interfaith Witness Department to do the study and the HMB to bring "a report with recommendation" to this year's annual meeting, June 15-17 in Houston.

Holly, in an interview with Baptist Press, said he obtained a copy of Leazer's letter about

the HMB Freemasonry study after it was "circulated indiscriminately" in Chattanooga and in a particular church. A church member gave the Jan. 17 letter to another church's pastor, and that pastor read it to yet another pastor, whom Holly said called him.

Leazer, in the letter, voiced appreciation to two Masons, including Abner McCall, former president of Baylor University, for reviewing the report he was preparing to submit to Lewis Jan. 22. Leazer wrote he had incorporated suggestions made by McCall and the other Mason.

"I appreciate all of the help that Masons have been to me," Leazer wrote. "Jim Tresner, editor of *The Oklahoma Mason*, and Abner McCall, former president of Baylor University, have each read the report and offered suggestions which I have used."

Leazer wrote of Holly: "He, of course, will explode when he sees it. I am reaffirming our department's 1986 position that Freemasonry is NOT a religion and recommending that the SBC take a stand neither for nor against Freemasonry."

Leazer additionally noted: "Of course, anything can happen between now and the SBC ... Holly is already marshalling his forces to counter-attack. It is essential that as many Southern Baptist Masons get to the

SBC as possible."

Lewis, in a written statement Feb. 22, said an ad hoc board committee is handling the "second portion" of the SBC motion passed last year, preparing a report and recommendation to be submitted to the full board of directors for approval during their March 17 meeting.

Of Leazer, Lewis wrote: "Due to the controversial nature of his involvement and to the fact that his work is completed, I have requested that Dr. Leazer not be involved in development of the report or the recommendation." Lewis said HMB chairman Ron Phillips, a Chattanooga area pastor, had concurred with the decision.

Lewis also noted the interfaith witness department had completed the "study" portion of the two-part SBC motion. "The study has been reviewed by a number of directors of the Home Mission Board and will be sent as information to the full board prior to the March (17) meeting," he wrote.

Lewis's actions fell short of Holly's call for action in a news release sent to Baptist Press and other media. Beyond Leazer's removal from the HMB's handling of the Freemasonry issue, Holly said HMB directors should determine whether to ask for Leazer's resignation from the agency's staff "as he appears to have confessed to collusion with the Masons in this study." □

# State editors meet, study, elect officers

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. — Southern Baptist state paper editors stressed "new beginnings" in their annual meeting here Feb. 16-18. Under the theme, "A Time for New Beginnings," the group heard several speakers and committee reports, re-elected Jack Brymer as president, and employed its first staff member.

Editors participated in "how to" workshops and studies, including "Desktop Publishing," by Tim Fields, assistant director, Education Commission; "Marketing Your Medium's Message," Mary-Lou Galician, motivational speaker; "The Value of Research," Marv Knox, *Western Recorder* editor; "The Church Press Faces the Future," John Stapert, executive director of Associated Church Press;

"How to Save Money and Speed up Delivery," Bob Terry, *Word and Way* editor; "Who Is Our Constituency" and "Re-designing Your Publication," Cliff Tharp, research information manager, Sunday School Board; and "How to Develop a Mission Statement," Ronald Wilson, executive director, Evangelical Press Association.

Besides Brymer, editor of the Florida *Baptist Witness*, other officers are James Waters, president-elect, *Northwest Baptist*; and Terry, secretary. Lynn Davis, retired Sunday School Board employee, was named executive director of the Southern Baptist Press

Association, the editors' group's first employee. (See last week's *Baptist and Reflector*). He will serve on a part-time basis.

The group held one joint session with Southern Baptist state executive directors, who annually meet at the same time.

The editors heard a report from its Baptist Press liaison committee, which provoked a lengthy discussion. The report noted some ways Baptist Press could improve its service. The main item of discussion dealt with the committee's finding that BP had reported too many stories including statements of Richard Land and reports of Christian Life Commission actions. Land is executive director of the CLC. One committee finding said that some of the reports included "right wing" political wording.

After long discussion, the group accepted the report as information. Committee members were R. G. Puckett, North Carolina *Biblical Recorder*; Knox; and Guy Henderson, Mississippi *The Baptist Record*.

In other action, the editors reaffirmed the writing of a history of the SBPA by Carol Woodfin, Historical Commission research analyst; and approved a resolution honoring the late Everett Sneed, former editor of the *Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine*. □

# Criswell shares perspectives

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — "If I had my life to live over again, I would change the order of my priorities," declared W.A. Criswell, senior pastor of First Church of Dallas.

"All through the years of my life, my priorities were first God, second the church, third my family. If I had my life to live over again, I'd make it God, I'd make it my family, and then I'd make it my church. I think I made a mistake in that."

That perspective was among dozens of insights Criswell shared with about 35 central Arkansas pastors during a recent conference at First Church, Little Rock. The Feb. 8 meeting was coordinated by Frank Gantz, pastor of West Rock Church, and hosted by First Church Pastor Bill Elliff.

Sharing candidly about "the things I have learned in the 65 years I have been a pastor," Criswell addressed topics ranging from funeral services to premillennialism. The 83-year-old minister, who also is chancellor of Criswell College,

Dallas, was accompanied by Criswell College President Richard Melick.

Describing Criswell as a "living legend," Melick said the Little Rock meeting was the first of several such gatherings across the nation. He said Criswell's presence and perspectives were being shared as "a gift from the college to American Christianity."

Discussing practical aspects of the pastorate, Criswell remarked, "In my humble persuasion, the study, the library of the pastor ought to be at his home. When you get up in the morning, go to the study and stay there; every morning keep that sacred for you and for God."

Encouraging pastors to study each morning, work for the church each afternoon, and be available for meetings each evening, Criswell said, "When you stand up in the pulpit the following Sunday, they'll know what you have been doing — studying God's Word, listening to the voice of the Lord, and preparing that message." □

# 1992 VBS enrollment reaches record high

NASHVILLE — Enrollment in Vacation Bible Schools and backyard Bible clubs reached a record high in 1992, surpassing the 3.7 million mark.


Almost 76 percent of Southern Baptist churches (29,482) reported having VBS in 1992. In addition, 1,712 mission Vacation Bible Schools and 3,508 backyard Bible clubs were reported.

Two other categories showing gains over the previous year were the number of people enrolled in Sunday School through VBS, 66,273, and the number of people making commitments to a church-related vocation, 2,005.

Professions of faith (65,621) and total prospects discovered (499,053), however, were both below 1991 totals.

The 1992 figures also showed 91 percent of Vacation Bible Schools are five-day schools and 54 percent are held in the evening. □

Cost of the meal, which can include hot entrees, pizza, deli sandwiches, soup and salad bar, and short order snacks, is \$4.25.

## Some things are worth repeating

I continue to believe that the best way to grow a church is to keep the Sunday School at the center of all we do. As we enter another year in our Bible study ministry, I want to share with you once again why I am committed to the growth and expansion of our Sunday School ministry.

(1) The Sunday School is the church organized. In a growing church it would be very easy for people to get lost in the crowd or fall through the cracks. The class structure of our Sunday School organization allows us to keep up with the needs of people. Even then I am sure we miss some needs but I do believe that Sunday School remains the best way to keep up with the people of our fellowship.

(2) The Sunday School is the church organized to do outreach. The only possible way to be effective in outreach to our community is when every Bible study unit from pre-school to senior adults participates

together in outreach. In today's world the ministry of outreach wears many hats. It may involve personal visitation, telephone contacts, cards or letters, or prayer support. There is a way for everyone to share together in the responsible stewardship of outreach.

(3) The Sunday School is the church organized to do ministry. When you care for people you will always discover more needs than you ever thought existed. I assure you the only way we could ever attempt to care for all the needs and nurture all the people is through Sunday School. There's only one way to care for people's needs — every Bible study class must be a caring center for the needs of its membership. We must rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep.

(4) The Sunday School is the church. Occasionally someone will say, "I went to church today, but I didn't go to Sunday School." Wrong! I know what they meant but the truth is Sunday School is the church in celebration. We never separate the two and they are not in competition. Both are equally important

and differ only in function. □

## What is your name?

When was the last time you thought about the significance of a name? We use them every day. We call people by name. We purchase items that have a particular name. Roads, streets, highways, bridges, buildings, businesses, all have names. Have you ever stopped to think how they got their names? Is it named after the founder or owner? Is it named after some significant individual or event? Is the name contrived by combining words or initials? What about your name, how did your parents decide upon your name? Whatever we name something becomes our way of identifying it.

## Chattanooga church breaks ground for \$2.5 million addition

CHATTANOOGA — The congregation of First Church Golden Gateway, Chattanooga, recently broke ground for a \$2.5 million addition.

A number of people representing all ages from young children to senior adults, were involved in the ceremony. Shovels used to break ground were those used 26 years ago when the congregation voted to move to its present site from another downtown location a few miles away where there was no room for expansion.

The new building will include Sunday School classrooms, an elevator, an activities/recreation room which will

be large enough for basketball and volleyball, a music suite, and an office complex.

Portions of the current building will be remodeled to provide more educational and media library space. Parking will be expanded and a softball/recreation field created on property currently not in use.

The new building will provide classroom space for more than 300 additional people. The activity room space will promote intergenerational activities such as mission projects, arts, crafts, aerobics, walking, skating, and senior adult activities. It would also be appropriate for a childcare ministry or daycare for the elderly, options the church may consider in the future.

This is Phase Two of a plan approved two years ago called Gateway 2000. In Phase One the sanctuary was renovated with new lighting and sound systems.

The debt-free church will continue to be debt-free when the building is completed, said Pastor Gary Carver. The entire amount of money for both phases was pledged three years ago and almost all of this already has been given.

"We must reach and keep people," Carver said. "We must have the facilities and ministries which will reach people today or face a limited future," he added. — Robinson is a member of First Church and a writer for the *Hamilton County News-Leader*.

## Nashville Association constitutes new church in Williamson County

More than 60 people gathered Jan. 24 to constitute and dedicate Triune Church, Arrington.

The church located on Henry Horton highway held mission status for less than three months, an unusual occurrence according to Sunday School Director Julian Suggs, also director of the Tennessee Baptist Convention Church Music Department.

Sponsored by Grassland Heights Church, Franklin, Triune Church started as a mission in late October with eight

people attending services. Membership has since grown to 24 people.

Lloyd Lawrence is serving as pastor of the new church. He retired in August, 1992, from the pastorate of Forest Hills Church, Brentwood, where he served for 18 years.

Lawrence said Carl Duck, retired Nashville Baptist Association executive director, and others have hoped for years that a church would be started in the Triune area. Property with 21 acres of land and a 6,000 square foot home ideal

for a church site became available on Henry Horton Highway. The property was purchased and the mission was born. The house is being remodeled to accommodate a congregation of 100 people.

"I see Triune as being a church that really has a loving, caring spirit," Lawrence said rather than it becoming "a mega church."

Lawrence attributes the church's short time in mission status to the people who began the church.

"We have lots of talent, people who have the ability to start a church," Lawrence said. "As soon as we began meeting, we knew we would constitute

quickly. The people desired it to constitute so we would become a full-fledged church and a member of the Nashville Baptist Association as quickly as possible," he explained.

Since members first began gathering for services, a Sunday hasn't passed without community people attending morning worship, according to Lawrence. "People in the area have responded to the coming of a new church," he stated.

"The whole thing has been unbelievable — the excitement, the people involved. It's God's doing, bringing these people together," he said.

Charter membership in Triune Church will be open until Easter Sunday.

Nashville Association's Executive Director Jim Freedman and Director of Mission Development Clifford Horne participated in the constitutional/dedication service. □

# ■ Sunday School lesson commentary

## □ Community thanksgiving — Bible Book Series for March 7

Thanksgiving represents in us a deep sense of gratitude for what someone has done for us. In our case, as Christians, that gratitude is expressed to God.

### Psalm 67

This psalm contains seven verses filled with hope, praise, and joy. It speaks repeatedly of praise, which is a way to express thanksgiving to the Lord. In the first verse the psalmist visualizes God.

In the second verse the psalmist expresses that for which he is craving: "that thy way may be known upon the earth." A way is a road that leads from one place to another. Everyone in their right mind wants to know the right way. Most folks want to know the right way to heaven.

The only way to heaven is found in John 14:6. We live in a world that knows there are two ways: God's way and man's way. The Lord, however, knows only one way — his way! The psalmist was looking beyond the first appearance of Christ to his second coming. When that takes place, Israel will know the way and be healthy, or complete.

The third verse contains an exhortation: praise. This leads to nations praising the Lord. We see this in verse 4. The writer rejoiced in anticipation of the time when the people shall be judged righteously and the nations shall understand what good government actually is. Verse 5 is the same as verse 3.

This praising leads to the earth yielding as it has never yielded before.

The psalm closes with anticipation: "God shall bless us!"

### Psalm 75

This psalm is one of the

strongest passages of Scripture in the Bible that speaks of the sovereignty of God. To speak of God's sovereignty is speaking of his sole authority to rule.

God is sovereign in his very person (v. 1). The opening verse is an expression of thanksgiving. It is his name that is the most powerful in all the earth. Names mean something in the Bible. There are many names for God. Perhaps two of the most familiar are Jehovah-jireh, the Lord is in this place, and Jehovah-nissi, the Lord is my banner.

God is also sovereign in his power (vv. 2-3). God has appointed a time in which he will judge the congregations or assemblies. The "pillars" are the social structures of the world. God does allow evil men to come to power. But he also knows when their end will be. He let Pharaoh oppose the Hebrews until the appointed time in which God humbled him with the passing of his

first born.

The purposes of God are also sovereign (vv. 4-7). People who come against God and His powers are fools. It is wrong to rise up against God. He can put one down and lift up another at the same time.

God is sovereign in his punishment (v. 8) and his praise (vv. 9-10). He is a God of wrath who punishes those who do wrong,

### Basic Passage: Psalms 67; 75; 107

but also a God to be praised.

### Psalm 107

The theme of this psalm is in verse 8. Read it carefully. We are exhorted to give thanks to God on the basis of the fact that he is good and that his mercy endureth forever.

The redeemed of the Lord are encouraged to speak out in verse 2. A redeemed man is one who has experienced the grace of God

in his life. He is that individual who is saved. Only the redeemed can speak out for the Lord from the right kind of heart.

A redeemed man is the only one who can truly praise the Lord! The four pictures of people who have been redeemed in this psalm are wanderers lost in a desert (vv. 4-9); prisoners bound in affliction (vv. 10-16); the sick who are at the point of death (vv. 17-22); and sailors in a storm at sea (vv. 23-32).

These are pictures of Israel. The psalm closes in verses 33-43 by showing how God restored these people. It is a hymn of thanksgiving.

How true are the words of a chorus that we sing: "God is so good, God is so good, God is so good, he's so good to me." Make thanksgiving a part of your daily life. The redeemed can always find a reason to praise the Lord! ☐

## □ In him was life — Convention Uniform Series for March 7

Jesus — light of the world  
vv. 1-5

The opening verses of John's Gospel reveal to us some truths about our Lord. John first spoke of the pre-existent nature of the Word. The Word refers to Jesus.

John was not trying to validate or even prove the pre-existence of Jesus. He was stating what he believed by faith to be the truth. Under

the influence of the Holy Spirit, he was convinced Jesus had always been and always will be. It's difficult to fathom such a heavenly truth. Though we have trouble comprehending this truth, that doesn't mean it is not the truth.

By God's divine guidance, John gave to us an infallible truth. This truth is to be believed though we may fail at times to fully appreciate it.

John was not the first to introduce this idea. The Old Testament records for us this truth in Micah 5:2: "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting." To John, Jesus was the personification of this truth. So, the phrase in verse 1, "In the beginning," is not referring to the creation of the Word (Jesus), but the creative acts of the Word — more specifically, the creative acts found in Genesis.

John also referred to this

Word as being with God and was God. This is a reference to the triune nature of God. The word "with" in verse 1 is translated, "in company with." Not only was he in company with God, he was God. This truth was offered to confront the heresy of Gnosticism. The Gnostics believed Jesus was only one of many spiritual entities linking man to God.

Next John said, "All things were made by him; and without him was not anything made that was made," (v. 3). All things refer to each and every thing, instead of a totality of things. Here, the Logos (Word) was the instrument by which each and everything was made. This was probably in response to the teaching of Gnosticism.

The early church also believed John's teachings con-

cerning this matter (I Corinthians 8:6 and Ephesians 3:9).

John saw, through this creative process, God revealing himself to man. He continued with, "In him was life; and the life was the light of men," (v. 4). To John, Jesus was the creator of all life, physical and spiritual. This light of life was so powerful darkness could not prevail (v. 5). This light came in the form of human flesh to dwell among men and reveal the nature of God, (vv. 14, 18).

### Witness of the light vv. 6-9

John had been called by God to bear witness concerning this light, Jesus. "The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the light, that all men through him might believe," (v. 7). It was his God-appointed task to present Jesus in such a way that people

would believe in him.

John was careful to point out in verse 8 that he was not the light. He would simply bear witness of the true light, "which lighteth every man that cometh into the world," (v. 9). Be careful not to interpret this passage in support of universal salvation. That is not the meaning.

### Basic Passage John 1:1-18

What is meant, is that Jesus would come into this world and make the truth of God available to all men as it pertains to salvation, sin, and judgment.

In closing, Christian's today have the same responsibility to take the Gospel of Christ to the world. ☐

## □ When things go wrong — Life and Work Series for March 7

When things go wrong in our lives, we all, even believers,

want to throw up our hands in exasperation and say, "Why me?" It is a valid question and one which I think Joseph must have felt in his life. From the first exposure to this patriarch of the Hebrew nation, we can learn a good lesson on answering the dilemma of, "When things go wrong."

### Look at the cause ch. 37:3-5

Without realizing, Joseph was setting himself up for difficulty. His father Jacob wasn't helping matters at all by showing favoritism to the "son of his old age." Jealousy can be a terrible beast. Joseph fed his brothers' dislike by not only flaunting the "tunic of extremities" in front of them, but by boasting of his dreams. He, innocently or not, brought some

grief upon himself.

When we face financial disaster, struggles with children, and sour marriages; we need to honestly and objectively look at the cause. Perhaps we carry some blame.

### Go beyond the plots ch. 37:18-20

Other people are often involved when things begin to go amiss in our lives. Some of those people may even be malicious in causing us harm. The brothers of Joseph wanted nothing good for this "dreamer" brother. A plot was set in motion to do away with the dreamer and his dreams. Collapse of circumstances in our lives, brought on by others, must be ignored.

### Rise above the pit ch. 37:23-24

Something very interesting

happens in these verses. It seems Joseph did not struggle when his brothers began to attack him. The pit in which he was thrown was "without any water." This must have at one time been a cistern where refreshing water was caught and kept. It became a prison. Joseph

went into the pit, but did not allow the pit to keep him down.

Rising above situations in which we find ourselves is the only way we can have steadfast faith when our world crumbles.

### Move toward the answer ch. 37:28

Answers come in unusual places or in unusual ways.

Joseph's answer for the wrong done him came from "Midianite traders" and "Egypt." In Genesis 42:21 we are told Joseph did plead to not be sold to the Midianites, but he went.

There have been times in struggling with God's plan for my life that I had to move toward answers when an answer was not apparent. That's what Joseph did.

### See behind the scenes ch. 50:19-20

"Looking back is always 20/20," someone has said. Joseph was nearing the end of his life. Notice how he looked behind the scenes that had been played.

"You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good." What seems to be wrong God makes right! ☐


## Notes from Bro. Mike...
