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SBC Executive Committee creates task force to begin reorganization process

NASHVILLE — The Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee unanimously approved an "implementation task force" to carry out a sweeping restructuring approved by convention messengers in a 9,590 to 5,357 ballot vote during the first day of its June 20-22 session in Atlanta.

The restructuring faces a required second bylaw vote during the 1996 annual meeting, then it "will be carried out all the way," said Executive Committee Chairman Ronnie Floyd of Springdale, Ark.

The "Covenant for a New Century," drafted by a seven-member Program and Structure Study Committee, which included Floyd, will be enacted by the end of the 1997 SBC annual meeting "in fairness, but also in boldness," Floyd said during the Executive Committee's Sept. 18-19 meeting.

Floyd said the Great Commission "will navigate our every decision" in implement-

ing the restructuring plan.

"It is the Great Commission that should steer, direct, and guide this denomination to taking the Gospel to the world," Floyd noted.

The 10-member task force will consist of four Executive Committee members and six at-large members.

Robert Reccord, pastor of First Church, Norfolk, Va., was named as chairman.

Other members from the Executive Committee are: T.C. Pinckney, Alexandria, Va.; John O. Yarbrough, Perry, Ga., and Joe Reynolds, Houston. At-large members are Ted Warren and Sarah Maddox, Nashville; C.B. Hogue, Fresno, Calif.; Rudy A. Hernandez, Grand Prairie, Texas; Michael Hamlet, Spartanburg, S.C.; and Don Wills, Dallas.

The task force will "analyze, study, and take actions necessary ... to facilitate the orderly and timely transitions" stemming from SBC adoption of the study committee recommenda-

tions, according to the Executive Committee action. The transitions include reducing the number of SBC entities from 19 to 12 and creating a new North American Mission Board, encompassing the work of the current Home Mission Board, Radio and Television Commission, and Brotherhood Commission.

The implementation task force will have six areas of responsibility including legal issues "necessary for timely implementation," financial issues, such as cost analysis for relocating functions, including various personnel of the RTVC and Brotherhood Commission to the NAMB, based in Atlanta. The task force also will deal with physical assets, financial assets, personnel issues, and ministry assignments.

According to the Executive Committee action, the Executive Committee will "instruct (the task force) regarding any specific actions it deems appropriate." □

Ferrell announced registration for the state convention, which is set for Nov. 14-15 at the Chattanooga Convention Center, will be held at two locations.



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Executive Committee adds vice president

NASHVILLE — A welcome back was extended to David E. Hankins when the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee elected its former chairman to the new position of vice president for convention policy.

Hankins, 45, was on the Executive Committee eight years, serving as chairman from 1991-93. He has been pastor of Trinity Church, Lake Charles, La., the past 10 years.

His election came during the closing session of the Executive Committee's Sept. 18-19 meeting in Nashville. He will assume his new duties by Jan. 1.

In his announcement of Hankins' nomination Sept. 8, SBC Executive Committee President Morris H. Chapman said the new vice president would play a role in implementing the "Covenant for a New Century" approved during the SBC sesquicentennial in June.

Hankins also will provide staff leadership to the Executive Committee bylaws workgroup, coordinate a denominational planning process for the 21st century, provide staff assistance to assigned standing and special committees of the SBC and Executive Committee, and review governing documents of the SBC and its entities to determine when changes should be considered.

The Executive Committee also approved a 10-member implementation task force to carry out the SBC restructuring plan (see story on page 1).

In other action during the two-day meeting, the Executive Committee:

- authorized the convention's officers to employ a new vice president for convention relations prior to the Executive Committee's next meeting when a vote to affirm the individual will be slated. The post has been vacant since the resignation of Mark Coppenger.
- revised its policy for exhibit space at the SBC annual

meeting to make sure "each entity granted exhibit space is consistent with the Mission Statement of the Southern Baptist Convention and does not condone the use of alcoholic beverages in its programs or on its properties."

- received requests from the current 19 SBC agencies and the Baptist World Alliance for the 1996-97 Program Allocation Budget totaling \$150,809,379.

- declined action on a motion referred from the 1995 annual meeting for using investment assets of SBC agencies to further the convention's moral views, with the Executive Committee noting: "... while the Executive Committee agrees with the recommendation as a moral issue, only a small percent of investment assets have proxy votes, ... the effect of directing the votes on those shares is so minuscule as to be ineffective."

- acted on numerous referrals from last June's SBC annual meeting. □

Rankin, O'Brien meet; agree missions is priority

NASHVILLE — Heads of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and Woman's Missionary Union met Sept. 16 and agreed to get on with the task of missions.

FMB President Jerry Rankin and WMU Executive Director Dellana O'Brien met in Birmingham in an attempt to restore the close working relationship the two executives and agencies have enjoyed for many years.

Although they basically have "agreed to disagree" on the matter of WMU's printing of Cooperative Baptist Fellowship materials, the two executives emphasized the need to strengthen their longtime partnership.

A dispute emerged between the two recently when Rankin sent a letter to all Southern Baptist pastors and WMU directors asking them to pray that WMU would reverse its decision to print and distribute CBF materials when asked by churches. A sharp exchange between the two leaders made media headlines.

The Birmingham meeting included Don Kammerdiener, FMB executive vice president, and Carolyn Miller, WMU president.

Rankin told Baptist Press he and O'Brien "are very close friends. I have a deep respect for her."

O'Brien observed each family has disputes and arguments, but it is "incumbent upon us" to work through the disagreement and get on with the "important task of missions."

Both were reluctant to provide further details of their four-hour meeting. □

European leaders affirm cooperation

SAO PEDRO DE MOEL, Portugal — Baptist leaders from 40 European countries unanimously affirmed their cooperative relationship with the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board during the European Baptist Federation's general council meeting.

In an address to the body Sept. 21, FMB President Jerry Rankin reasserted the board's commitment to ever-higher levels of cooperation in evangelism and church planting efforts, even as the number of career and volunteer missionaries in Europe reach record levels.

The FMB has 459 career missionaries and representatives in 30 European countries. □

Voices in the wind, candles in the dark?

George Chisholm is credited with this wise reality: "So far in history there have never been enough mature people in the right places."

Ah, but there are, usually. The problem often is with the world — not with those who are mature.

Senior adults form a formidable force in Tennessee Baptist life. But often their voices are not heard, their advice not wanted or followed.

Too often senior adults are taken lightly or ignored. The general attitude seems to be that seniors have had their opportunity and their advice is not needed.

It is a wise congregation who will continue to use senior adults for more than people who rock on the front porch or get involved with soap operas all day.

Indeed, it is a wise congregation who loves senior adults past their golden years.

Often the sad truth is postponed or side-tracked beyond the church walls. The new generation of believers knows little of Baptist history or heritage. And the church is not free of guilt. The church is busy telling them how to feel good, take it easy, and worship the church. Seniors are wealthy in wisdom of how to do church.

It is in these areas that senior adults are a dramatic resource for any church. When people today hear talk about free grace, they think about some mysterious commodity that is cheap, they think pos-

session of free grace demands fair weather belief. What is good for me must be good for the world.

Most senior adults can talk about free grace and experiential love from mountain peaks as well as valleys of despair.

Senior adults are more than voices in the wind or candles in the dark. Their voices are stronger than the wind; the candles burn brightly enough to light up all the valleys.

It is almost trite to say that seniors are a national treasure of human resource. But it is true.

Senior adults are more than a bunch of loud grandparents, more than an organization called Gray Power of AARP.

Seniors are more than old people who are skittish about their Social Security and health benefits. They are more than elderly blue-haired ladies who are eager to spend wildly on exotic tours with money left by their husbands' estates.

Tennessee seniors are men and women with pride and dignity who want to be treated with respect. They want to stay busy, and do more than spin long stories about the good old days.

Most seniors want to be a part of the entire congregation, of the whole family.

At each Tennessee Baptist Senior Adult Retreat, more and more evidence is accumulated for proof that seniors are serious in their faith and spiritual beliefs — and they still want to express their faith in lives that live, love, laugh,

and lift up those around them.

They are walking closer to the end of the last chapter of the book, and they know it. But there is a sense of security founded in deep faith, faith enough to carry them through the toughest of life's trials.

There are more senior adults in our nation, our state, than at any time in history. Before seniors move off the stage, we should thank God for the wealth stored among them.

And we must tap that wealth, the wisdom and strong, but tender love that seniors have for Christ and his church.

Listen to seniors. Don't segregate them from the rest of the church body. Use them to nurture the younger generations in the beliefs of our heritage.

Use the seniors, not in tiny tasks that require no thinking — but use them to help shape the character of the church and the family.

Remember the contributions of the seniors, and be thankful for their leadership.

In most churches, senior adults are the strongest supporters of the church when they are able. Their beliefs are based on the Bible. Their love of Christ has been proved. Their desire for the church to succeed is beyond compare.

Follow the seniors — don't push them aside. Observe how they love the church, look at them with grandchildren.

Senior adults are pacesetters. They have grasped the meaning of missions and ministry, and touching people. □

A closer look at anorexia

This week we want to consider the eating disorder that is known as anorexia nervosa. The term means "nervous loss of appetite."

This term is misleading since most anorexics do experience hunger and spend a great deal of time talking about food or even in preparing food for family or friends.

To be considered anorexic a person must diet or refuse to eat until body weight is at least 15 percent below the normal level or fail to grow until his or her weight is 15 percent below the normally expected growth curve. For women diagnosis is usually reserved until the loss of at least three concurrent menstrual cycles.

Some more obvious consequences of anorexia are retarded bone growth, anemia, dry skin, low body temperature and basal metabolism rate, slow heart rate, and lack of tolerance for cold.

One more serious consequence is a low level of serum potassium which may cause cardiac arrhythmia that can result in death. This sets eating disorders apart from other

psychological disorders in its serious physical consequences.

The person with anorexia has an unrealistically persistent personal view of "overweight" and a constant regimen of dieting to control the problem.

Even when confronted with rational evidence of their underweight condition (such as photographs and weight charts), the anorexic will continue to hold to a distorted view of the body as overweight.

The risk for the onset of anorexia is highest between the ages of 14 and 18.

One major psychological or personality characteristic linked to the problem of anorexia is that of obsessive-compulsive tendencies.

Such young people are ideal students in school and give little or no trouble. They develop a pattern of compliance, perfectionism, and dependence. All of these traits lead to a sus-

ceptibility to peer pressure for appearance and attitude toward body size.

Here are some signs that might indicate a problem with anorexia:

■ Substantial weight loss in a relatively short period.

■ Diet continues although the individual becomes bone-thin.

■ Continual setting of new weight goals after one is reached.

■ Dissatisfaction with appearance, claims of feeling fat, even after weight loss goal is reached.

■ Isolated dieting rather than in a diet group.

■ Development of strange eating rituals, i.e., cuts food into tiny pieces or measures everything before eating extremely small amounts.

■ Secret eating.

■ Obsessive exercising.

■ Appearance of depression much of the time.

Anorexia is a serious disorder, but there are steps that can help in recovery. □

Finding how I fit in

By Charles Parker

If you pull any coin out of your pocket or purse, you will see engraved on it these words in Latin: "E Pluribus Unum." This inscription means "Out of many — One." The fact that 13 struggling, straggling colonies were able to mold themselves into one nation struck our founders with wonder, so they often used this Latin motto. America is one nation achieved by the blood and toil of many men and women, over many years and despite many trials. It is a human achievement for which we can be very grateful to God.

If the church issued money, we might place on it a notice of our unity, too, because unity is one of the certain marks of a true church. But the miracle is that God brings unity out of something that is also marked by great diversity. In I Corinthians 12, Paul plays on unity and the diversity of the church as though they were complementary musical themes. This should not surprise us. Since the heart of chapter 12 is Paul's description of the church as the body of Christ, it is necessary for him to consider it as one body with many members or parts, just as the human body has such a twin nature.

Verses 12-13 stress the unity of the church. Despite striking human differences, the Holy Spirit in conversion works an even more striking miracle to baptize us "into one body." Surely water baptism is a symbol of this spiritual miracle. The reference to drinking "into one Spirit" is obscure. Perhaps the New English Bible helps clarify the meaning: "for by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body ... and that one Holy Spirit was poured out for all of us to drink," thus recalling Jesus' words that he is living water (John 7:38).

Verses 14-20 discuss individual differences, the equally necessary diversity of the church. God has all kinds of people, since he made all kinds. Unity does not demand uniformity. Verse 19 refers to the absurd image of the big eye in verse 17. Someone pointed out that an eye in a head is priceless, but an eye in a glass jar is a curiosity. In fact, if the entire body was an eye or ear, it would not be a body! If all church members were exactly alike, the church would be a tiny organism indeed and many people would be unreached.

Verses 21-26 emphasize the importance of every Christian. Sometimes the stronger, more outgoing, or more physically appealing members think they are more important. I remember a man of short stature and shy nature in a church I served years ago who taught me that everyone is important. He served that small church as usher. He was always there with a happy smile and a welcome hand for everyone. He was not a public speaker or a bold man. But perhaps he made a greater impact for Christ than the bossy, bullying member, or even the gifted members of the congregation. He made a greater impact on me, despite his nervousness, handicaps, and retiring nature.

The purpose of all our gifts is succinctly stated in verse 25. To the divided Corinthian church, Paul stated that their gifts were so they might not be divided, but so they might care for each other. This word "care" in the Greek can sometimes refer to anxious concern, but it can also be positive. In this case, it means a real enthusiasm in caring for each other that matches the depths our worries sometimes have. Verse 27 summarizes and particularizes Paul's argument. □ — Charles Parker is pastor of First Church, Oliver Springs.

Chosen to serve

Even as the church was finding its footing in the Jewish community and was enjoying the growing pains of a new congregation dissension arose.

The Greek-speaking (Hellenistic) widows felt that Hebrew converts were being treated better in daily food distribution from the common fund.

Until this new danger arose, the apostles had overseen the distributions, but in their absence abuses had arisen.

With additional demands upon their time the apostles founded for the church a new order of men. Their special duties would be to attend to daily distribution and ensure equality. To build the confidence of the people, they invited the church to elect seven men of approved wisdom to whom this trust would be committed. Let us break it down in order:

Dissension and the seven — ch. 6:1-7

(1) The problem Hellenistic vs. Hebrew favoritism charged — In ancient society widows had no other means of support. The Old Testament commanded care for the widows. In the New Testament church were two groups of widows, Greek speaking or Grecians, and Hebrews with favoritism claimed. (2) Recommendation (vv. 2-4) — The apostles knew the danger of dissension so they brought the plan of setting aside seven men both groups could agree upon to minister (to serve tables) or distribute money to buy needed food. This allowed the apostles to follow their true calling! (3) Solution (vv. 5-6) — The people were pleased. They elected seven men, and the apostles commissioned and laid hands on them. All of these men seemed to come from the Grecian Jews in the Jerusalem church. (4) Results — By using wisdom and dealing with the problem dissension was averted and the church began to grow again.

Stephen's ministry — ch. 6:8 - 7:1

(1) God had his hand on Stephen, who became a bold minister of Christ. Perhaps this was the synagogue to which he belonged. Unbelievers rose up and challenged

him but they could not stand against Stephen's wisdom and spiritual power.

(2) Accusations (vv. 11-12) — Stephen had to suffer abuse of false accusations. Coming from within the

church, this stirred emotions of the people, particularly Pharisees against believers. Stephen was seized and brought before the Sanhedrin.

(3) The trial (ch. 6:13-7:1) — False accusations brought Stephen to trial with two charges being leveled against him. One, Jesus would destroy the temple. Two, he was changing the custom of Moses. The fathers of his faith had rejected Moses, but he had spoken the truth and the truth would stand.

Stephen's speech and its results — (1) Stephen outlined the history of Hebrew faith with a survey of Abraham, Joseph, and Moses' life. (2) Israel's persistent rejection — Stephen reminded the Sanhedrin that generation after generation had rejected God's leadership. Verses 44-50 give Stephen's defense against the charges; God does not live in man-made houses. (3) Rejection of the Messiah (vv. 51-53) — Stephen accused the people of resisting the Holy Spirit as their fathers had. This generation had murdered the Messiah. Stephen also questioned how well they kept the law they claimed to revere. (4) Death of Stephen (vv. 54-60) — Stephen's words of truth angered them. They took him outside the city and stoned him to death. As our Lord did, Stephen prayed also for their forgiveness as he died. (5) Persecution (ch. 8:1-3) — Saul emerges as a leader of persecution following Stephen's death which spread and scattered the believers.

In applying this lesson to ourselves and our churches we need to realize dissension, when handled with wisdom, can bring about good. We need to remember the truth, and nothing but the truth, will stand the test of time. We must acknowledge persecution of Christians continues today and that we must remain faithful until the end. □ — Kim Allen is pastor of Little West Fork Church, Clarksville.

A new beginning

Returning to the land

The proclamation — ch. 1:1-3

These verses are almost identical with II Chronicles 36:22-23. Isaiah 44:28-45:3 contains an amazing prophecy of Cyrus' coming years before the great Persian ruler was born. In 539 B.C., Cyrus conquered Babylon and established the Persian Empire. His policy with prisoners of war was opposite that of Babylon; for, he encouraged the Jews to return to their land and rebuild their temple, and pray for their welfare. No doubt Cyrus extended this same privilege to other displaced nations and their gods, too. His decree was in 538 B.C. Do not confuse this decree with the one in Daniel 9:25, which refers to the rebuilding of the city and is dated 445 B.C. Cyrus' decree had to do with the people (1) returning to the land and (2) rebuilding the temple.

This decree was the amazing fulfillment of Scripture.

Rebuilding the temple —

ch. 3:1-2, 6-7, 10, 12

Establishing the altar (vv. 1-2)

The altar was the center of the Jewish faith; for without their sacrifices they could not approach God or expect his blessing. The exiles

feared their powerful neighbors, but they knew God would protect them if they obeyed him. Jeshua and Zerubbabel led the people to establish the sacrifices and also to keep the feasts. It was the seventh month (our September - October); the month of the Feast of Trumpets and Tabernacles (Numbers 29:1-6; Leviticus 23:23-25).

Laying the foundation —

vv. 6, 7, 10, 12

The people gave offerings, adding these to the gifts from the king (ch. 1:5-11) to get the materials to rebuild the temple. In the year 535, they started the work in the second month (our April-May). The Levites led the way in doing the work, assisting the other workers on the job. So grateful were the people that they sang and shouted when the foundation was laid. God was doing the impossible (Jeremiah 33:1-11). Of course, there were older people there who remembered the former glory; and, they could only weep as they saw the poverty of their second temple. However, it is not good to

live in the past (Haggai 2:3).

God is the God of new beginning/ beginning again

Application: A fresh start gives new meaning to life. Past failures retreat before the excitement of a challenge. Shortly after World War II, a journalist said that his nation needed "The Tonic of a Great Task." Louisa Fletcher wrote: *I wish there were some wonderful place called the land of beginning again, where all our mistakes and all our heartaches and all our poor selfish grief could be dropped like a shabby old coat at the door and never be put on again.*

The people of Israel needed to put their sins behind them and make a fresh start/a fresh commitment to God. They had spent 70 years in captivity and were ready to go home. God had not forgotten his promise to use them in his redemptive plan. The time arrived as the prophet had predicted. Persia conquered Babylon, and Cyrus became God's instrument. □ — Phil Lovelace is pastor of First Church, Somerville.

I believe it was in 1885 when the Chilhowee Baptist Association was organized in the Mount Olive Church. This building was made from logs and the pews were split logs. The messengers came with loaded baskets of food which included turkey, pheasant, fresh trout, and other wild meats and home canned vegetables.

Many of the members of Baptist churches had returned to their homes after the awful Civil War had come to an end. Soldiers from Blount and Knox counties had been divided during the conflict. Some of them had worn the blue uniform of the Federal Government, while others had worn the gray uniform of the Confederacy. Many of

these returned to their homes wearing the scars of war in their crippled and diseased bodies.

Now the survivors were at home. The war was over, and they must face each other in their homes and in their churches. Once they obeyed the commands of men in human flesh; now they must obey the commands of the King of Kings. In all reality it was a critical period in the history of Baptist churches in the Chilhowee Association.

The pathway for Baptist churches was filled with rubbish. Gospel preaching was at a minimum. Sin was in full sway. Men were dying in sin. The Tennessee Association in 1868, had stated that Blount County was the most desitute place for Gospel preaching found in East Tennessee.

It is now 110 years later. Our annual meeting is approaching, Oct. 19. Many things now are radically different — yet some are the same. A covered dish luncheon will be held. Fried

chicken and meat loaf will replace turkey and pheasant — but it will still be a wonderful day! □

Knowing vs. caring

As our church begins a new Sunday School year, and we focus on reaching people, there is a basic truth to remember. People will respond to the kind of care and attention we give to them. I want to include in my column today a few paragraphs from *The Winning Attitude* by John Maxwell that applies to our approach with people.

"Often when I am speaking to leaders, I tell them about the importance of acceptance and affirmation of the ones they are leading. **The truth is, people don't care how much you know until they know how much you care.**

"Think back to your school days.

Who was your favorite teacher? Why? Probably your warmest memories are of someone who accepted and affirmed you. We seldom remember what our teachers said to us, but we do remember how they loved us.

"My favorite Sunday School teacher was Katie, my second grade teacher. When I was sick and missed her class, she would come and visit me on Monday. She would ask how I was feeling and give me a five cent trinket that was worth a million dollars to me. Katie would say, 'Johnny, I always teach better when you are in class.'

"When next Sunday morning dawned I would be up, preparing to go to Sunday School. I can still remember watching Katie smile at me from the front of the class."

The atmosphere we create in our Sunday School classes and in our worship services can attract people. Let's be positive and affirming toward those God sends our way. □
