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Tennessee lawmakers look at moral concerns

NASHVILLE — A focus among Tennessee lawmakers in 1996 appears to be on family values and moral concerns.

State lawmakers are taking a strong stance against same-sex marriages and are encouraging Tennesseans to follow the Ten Commandments.

The Senate Judicial Committee approved SB 2305 by an 8-1 margin Feb. 20. It bans formal marriage between members of the same sex.

The bill will be placed on the Senate calendar possibly sometime this week, said Bill Bates, public affairs consultant for the Tennessee Baptist Convention. The House version of the bill (2907) has been referred to the House Judicial Committee.

"I think the bill reflects the feelings of Tennessee Baptists who believe along the lines that marriage is sacred and should be as God intended — between man and woman," Bates said.

On Feb. 21, the Senate approved by a 27-1 margin a resolution supporting the

Ten Commandments.

The action is simply a resolution and is not a law, Bates explained.

The resolution urges every citizen to honor the Ten Commandments, teach them to their children, and display them in their homes, businesses, schools, and places of worship. It also sets May 5-15 aside as a time to honor the Ten Commandments.

Last year the Tennessee House of Representatives passed a similar resolution on their consent calendar without an objection, Bates said.

The Senate took action despite an opinion by State Attorney General Charles Burson that it is unconstitutional.

Bates noted family values is a popular topic. "The emphasis today is on family values and the legislature is becoming sensitive to these values and is taking some positive actions," Bates said.

The veteran public affairs consultant said he didn't see why "anyone could object to the resolution. Most of our laws are

built around the Ten Commandments," he observed.

Another action of interest to Tennessee Baptists, Bates said, concerns the so-called "monkey bill." This bill (SB 3229 and HB 2972) "prohibits teaching the theory of evolution except as scientific theory. Imposes any teacher teaching theory as fact shall be dismissed or suspended."

The bill was amended to say "may" be dismissed or suspended.

The bill cleared the Senate Education Committee Feb. 21 by an 8-1 margin and will be sent to the Senate Calendar Committee. A House education subcommittee also approved the bill. It was scheduled to be voted on by the House Education Committee Feb. 27.

Bates said he feels most Tennessee teachers are teaching evolution as a theory rather than fact and is not sure whether a bill is needed to "tell the teachers how to teach."

Tennessee Baptists interested in expressing their views on any of these bills should contact their state senator and representative, Bates encouraged. □

SBC Executive Committee moves toward restructuring; approves AB mutual funds

NASHVILLE — Members of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee took the first steps needed toward implementation of a massive restructuring of the convention during its Feb. 19-21 meeting here.

Committee members also dealt with a motion to allow the SBC Annuity Board to restructure its investment program into registered mutual funds, and approved two budgets dependent upon Southern Baptists' second vote on bylaw 15 at the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in June.

With little discussion and few questions, the Executive Committee took the necessary legal steps to begin the implementation and approved the expenditure of up to \$495,000 to employ a consulting firm to assist in creating the new North American Mission Board.

The Executive Committee members were given the four recommendations from the Implementation Task Force,

chaired by Bob Reccord of Virginia, only minutes before being asked to approve the report.

Blaine Barber of Petoskey, Mich., made a motion to delay the vote overnight on the Articles of Incorporation for the NAMB so Executive Committee members could have time to read the articles. However, Michael Trammell of Mt. Airey, Md., opposed the delay, noting little would be gained by reading the complicated legal material.

The committee overwhelmingly rejected Barber's motion and was then given three to four minutes by Chairman Ronnie Floyd of Arkansas to look over the document before voting unanimously to approve it.

The North American Mission Board will replace the SBC's current Home Mission Board, Brotherhood Commission, and Radio and Television Commission. It is a key component of the "Covenant for a New Century," restructuring plan which was approved by SBC messengers last June.

The other three recommen-

dations from the Implementation Task Force involved a proposed charter for the NAMB and proposed legal documents relating to several SBC agencies slated for dissolution or merger.

The recommendations will be forwarded to the 1996 SBC annual meeting in New Orleans, where a required second vote is slated on an amendment to SBC bylaw 15, which lists names of SBC entities.

In the case of the Southern Baptist Foundation, to be merged with the Executive Committee, the Executive Committee approved a proposed charter to enable the foundation's ongoing operation as a separate corporation.

Under the proposal, the Executive Committee would be the foundation corporation's one "member" and will select the Foundation's trustees.

SBC legal counsel James Guenther of Nashville said he is satisfied "we are not creating any ascending (lawsuit) liability either for the Executive Committee or the Southern Baptist Convention."

Proposed staff plan featured in two weeks

The March 13 *Baptist and Reflector* will review for readers details of proposed plans for remodeling the Executive Board staff organization.

The plan involves all Executive Board departments. It was reviewed for the Executive Board in December, and at Staff Sharing later. The Executive Board will vote on the plan in May.

Program statement assignments of the TBC Executive Board are included.

James Porch, TBC executive director, said there is no employee job loss, and that Vision 2000, the convention-adopted long range plan, will be facilitated by the remodeling.

ServanTeam 21 includes some significant changes, but is designed to emphasize servanthood in assisting TBC churches. As such, it is a ministry remodeling.

Seven groups comprise the plan. Look for the story in the March 13 *Baptist and Reflector*. □ — Editor

Morris Chapman, Executive Committee president, also noted the Executive Committee would not be managing donor funds.

"The SBC Foundation, although it is (to be) a subsidiary corporation of the Executive Committee, will nonetheless operate as a corporation," Chapman said. "It will have a board of trustees ... (and) a president in place who is equipped, who is professional, and who will continue in the leadership of the management of funds."

The name of the management consulting company to be hired was not disclosed in the Executive Committee materials Feb. 19.

The vote to hire a consulting firm was preceded by an explanation from Ted Warren, ITF member and chief operating officer of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

"Based on my 22 years of leading organizations of \$50 million to \$500 million," Warren said, "I can tell you that no commercial enterprise would undertake such a large and meaningful reorganization without the assistance of a professional management consulting firm. The need for objective assistance is even greater, I believe, in a religious, not-for-profit organization. An investment of less than \$500,000 can be recovered in less than one year from the savings we anticipate," Warren said. "The cost in efficiency and effectiveness of a restructuring poorly done can be millions of dollars that we have to live with year after year for many years."

The Executive Committee's

decision to approve the Annuity Board's request "to establish the Annuity Board Select Funds Trust and the Annuity Board Blended Funds Trust ..." came at the end of the Feb. 20 evening session.

Deliberations were held in executive session as were meetings of the bylaws workgroup and administrative subcommittee which dealt with the matter.

Chapman said the executive sessions were needed because of the "wide-ranging legal considerations which required extensive discussions prior to becoming a decision."

The approval of the business trusts and their governing documents, as required by SBC bylaw 35, gives the Annuity Board the go-ahead to convert its massive investment program to a mutual fund structure. For Southern Baptists who have invested in the board's retirement programs, there will be no effect on retirement benefits, board officials said.

Board officials told the Executive Committee "the conversion to a mutual fund structure will not impose a greater risk upon the funds accumulated over the years in a retirement plan account. In fact, a mutual fund structure may actually reduce risk ..."

Executive Committee officials praised the work of AB officials and others in researching, analyzing, and preparing the information about the proposal.

"The Executive Committee recognized the good work that the Annuity Board has been doing in the investment area," R.L. Sorrell, chairman of the Executive Committee administrative subcommittee and associate pastor of Bellevue Church, Cordova, told Baptist Press following the lengthy executive session.

"The Annuity Board investment strategy has been good for Southern Baptists. The purpose of these meetings was to respond to the Annuity Board's request to expand appropriately into other markets."

Because budget planners did not know if messengers to the SBC annual meeting in June will approve, for the second time, a change to SBC bylaw 15, the Executive Committee approved two Cooperative Program Allocation budgets for 1996-97 — depending on whether bylaw 15 is amended. Both budgets are the same total: \$145,053,499, a 2.42 percent increase above the current year. SBC agencies had requested \$150,809,379 for 1996-97. Bylaw 15 simply lists the names of SBC entities, several of which are to change under the SBC restructuring.

If the bylaw is amended the 1996-97 budget would have two parts: a nine-month provision for current agencies and then a three-month provision under the new format.

A considerable portion, \$685,424, of the proposed budget, if the bylaw is approved, would go for "Covenant Transition" expenses for the restructuring in a line item identified for the period July 1-Sept. 30, 1997. □ — Compiled from BP and ABP reports

Committee hears Henry, acts on referrals

NASHVILLE — Do "what is good" for the Southern Baptist Convention, Jim Henry kindly urged Executive Committee members, SBC agency leaders, state convention leaders, and editors.

Henry, in his second term as SBC president, based his remarks on numerous references to doing good in the New Testament epistle of Titus, during the opening session of the Executive Committee's Feb. 19-21 meeting.

Henry focused on doing good in four areas:

- (1) involving more laypeople and pastors in SBC work.
- (2) staying focused on evangelism, missions, and the starting and nurturing of churches.
- (3) undergirding SBC institutions with capable trustees.
- (4) including more minorities and women on SBC trustee boards.

Among other actions, the Executive Committee:

- (1) added its endorsement to the Home Mission Board's national "Celebrate Jesus 2000"

evangelistic thrust.

(2) approved a request from the Baptist Sunday School Board for a \$20 million capital fundraising campaign for its conference centers in Ridgecrest, N.C., and Glorieta, N.M.

(3) formally elected Bill Merrell as vice president for convention relations.

(5) declined action on a referral from the 1995 SBC to transfer funds formerly designated for the American Baptist Theological Seminary to the six SBC seminaries for theological education for African American students.

(6) declined action on a referred motion to amend the SBC bylaws to permit the convention to act on referred motions at the time they are reported to the convention.

(7) noted, in regard to a motion that the Executive Committee report to the 1996 SBC meeting about its ongoing study of procedure for the removal of trustees that a proposed revision of Article V of the SBC Constitution that would allow for the removal of a trustee by simple majority vote of the SBC be deferred in favor of the current "organization, program, and policy studies related to the implementation of the Covenant for a New Century."

(8) approved a 2.5 percent increase in the Executive Committee's staff salary structure, effective Oct. 1. □

SBC agency heads name task force

NASHVILLE — Voicing "agreement in spirit and in substance" with the resolution on racial reconciliation approved at the 1995 Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting, the SBC Inter-Agency Council has named a task force "charged to work toward strategy and implementation of full racial and ethnic reconciliation" in keeping with the resolution.

The SBC resolution from the Atlanta SBC sesquicentennial called for Southern Baptists to "commit ourselves to eradicate racism in all its forms from Southern Baptist life and ministry."

The IAC, composed of chief executive officers of all SBC entities, unanimously approved a resolution during its Feb. 18 meeting to commit the IAC "to work as an agent for racial reconciliation in the Southern Baptist Convention, and in our agencies and institutions."

The IAC resolution calls racial reconciliation a "priority issue for our own study and strategic planning."

The task force is to consist of one representative from each agency who will serve from 1996-2001.

Richard D. Land, president of the Christian Life Commission, was named its chairman. Land will release the names of the task force representatives as soon as the appointments are made by respective agency heads.

The task force is required to report to each of the IAC meetings. R. Albert Mohler, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and vice chairman of the IAC, noted, "The reporting requirement clearly indicates the high profile and priority the IAC gives to the racial reconciliation task force."

The resolution commits IAC members "to strive for representation on our boards of trustees, our staffs and faculties, and all other bodies, based on biblical qualifications and embracing the ethnic diversity of the Southern Baptist Convention and its churches."

The resolution also called on the SBC Committee on Nominations to "set a priority to nominate persons representative of all ethnic groups to our boards of trustees." □

FMB lists 50 priority needs for missionaries overseas

RICHMOND — The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board has selected 645 new career missionary jobs to fill in 1996, 50 of which have been designated strategic priority requests.

The 50 priorities reflect a global emphasis by board area directors. Half of these are for missionaries to work in virtually unevangelized parts of the world. The rest are to further evangelize areas already highly responsive to the Gospel or to accomplish other strategic goals.

Last year Foreign Mission Board missionaries began work with 41 new people groups, many of them virtually untouched with the Gospel. In 10 years, the board has increased its total resources committed to unreached people groups from 1 percent to 13.5 percent, said Avery Willis, se-

nior vice president for overseas operations.

But this is just a beginning. "It will take a mission force equal to our present number (4,100-plus) just to have one missionary unit (single or married couple) assigned to each unreached people group," Willis said. This year's requests address this goal.

The priority list gives board officials the opportunity to "encourage applicants to look at top (priorities) within a certain skill," said Jim Riddell, associate director of the board's missionary personnel department. His department reviews the list monthly.

While sharing the Gospel falls under every missionary's portfolio, the majority of personnel requests specify evangelism and church planting as an actual assignment. A sampling of those priority requests include:

(1) Church starter in the

historic area of Novgorod, Russia, or the Andean town of Cajamarca, Peru, and other locations.

(2) Evangelist/health worker in Kanuri, Nigeria.

(3) Student worker in South Korea.

Other assignments focus on specialized needs.

(1) Teaching hearing-impaired students at a school in Gaza.

(2) Teaching soil conservation and crop management among the Afar people in Ethiopia, or in Madagascar, helping local farmers in animal husbandry.



Covenant implementation chairman reports

NASHVILLE — Robert Reccord, chairman of the Southern Baptist Convention Implementation Task Force, reported Feb. 23 that William Pinson of Texas will chair and name three or four others to a committee of state Baptist convention executive directors "to be an information resource" for the ITF's work as it relates to state conventions.

Reccord said he asked Pinson, executive director of the Baptist General Convention of Texas and president of the state executives' group, to chair and name the committee.

Also, in his report of the ITF's work overseeing the SBC restructuring, Reccord spoke of the feelings created by such change — denominational restructuring which he affirmed is "complex and challenging."

In a recent meeting with Baptist state convention executive directors Reccord said he asked that they become a "resource pool" as the SBC transitions into the "Covenant for a New Century" restructuring aimed at strengthening the SBC's service to churches toward fulfilling the Great Commission during the coming century.

The restructuring, which includes a reduction in the number of SBC agencies from 19 to 12, was approved by messengers to the SBC sesquicentennial in Atlanta. The 10-member ITF was created last September by the SBC Executive Committee. Reccord said he told the state leaders the ITF needs their insight into how the restructuring impacts issues on a state level.

"They will help us see these issues more clearly from a state convention perspective," said Reccord, pastor of First Church, Norfolk, Va., and a member of the Executive Committee.

"One of the key concerns in state

conventions is how cooperative agreements between the Home Mission Board and the states will be affected. The Covenant announced the firm intention of continuing and enhancing the practice of cooperative agreements." The Home Mission Board and the Brotherhood Commission, whose ministries under the covenant will become part of the North American Mission Board, work in close concert with state conventions.

Likening the SBC restructuring to a family moving across the country, Reccord said it is only natural for people to fear change. □

Agencies receive memo from ITF

NASHVILLE — The SBC Implementation Task Force sent a memo Feb. 7 to all agencies affected by the restructuring of the Southern Baptist Convention encouraging them to get task force approval for any severance packages they adopt for employees. And, the task force cautioned agencies not to promise severance or retention packages to employees if the agencies don't already have the funds to pay them.

In January, trustees of the SBC Brotherhood Commission agreed to pay employees a bonus if they continued to work until July 1997, when the agency will be merged with two others and moved to Atlanta.

The Implementation Task Force said such agreements should be coordinated with the task force for the sake of "uniformity."

The memo also requested agencies to inform the task force if they intend to spend any of their reserve funds. "It is our concern and desire, as we are sure is yours, that none of these assets be lost through liquidation, grants, or other actions in the process of the ... implementation," the memo said.

David Hankins the Executive Committee official directing the implementation, told Associated Baptist Press the memo was prompted by concern over severance agreements. He said the issue of severance pay should be handled by the SBC, not the agencies. The ITF "will take a comprehensive look" at severance issues, he said.

Brotherhood Commission President James Williams said the memo angered him because it interferes with the SBC-assigned duties of Brotherhood trustees. □

Kelley unanimously elected as NOBTS president

NEW ORLEANS — Charles S. "Chuck" Kelley was elected unanimously Feb. 23 as the eighth president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

Kelley, professor of evangelism at the seminary since 1983, will assume the office of president March 1. He succeeds Landrum P. Leavell II, president from 1975-95. Billy K. Smith, provost and academic dean at NOBTS, has been interim president since Dec. 12.

The 12-member presidential search committee, chaired by Morris Anderson, pastor of First Church, Pigeon Forge, reached a unanimous decision on recommending Kelley in a Feb. 6 meeting.

In accordance with a selection procedure approved in the March 1995 trustee meet-

ing, board members were given two-weeks notice for the special called two-day meeting Feb. 22-23.

After the election trustees went with Kelley and his wife, Rhonda, to the seminary chapel, where faculty, staff, and students were given the official announcement.

The trustees approved in executive session a total compensation package of \$125,727 for Kelley.

Kelley, 43, has been the Roland Q. Leavell professor of evangelism at New Orleans Seminary since 1983. In March 1993 he was named chairman of the seminary's largest division, pastoral ministries.

In 1993 Kelley was named director of Southern Baptists' first Center for Evangelism and Church Growth, located on the front block of the NOBTS campus. He also served from 1983-93 as the seminary's director of field education.

Kelley is recognized widely across the SBC for his evangelistic preaching and for his research in the area of "baby boomers" and "busters." He is the author of numerous denominational articles, training materials, and books, including *How Did They Do It? The Story of Southern Baptist Evangelism* and "The Roman Road" tract.

A native of Beaumont, Texas, Kelley is a graduate of Baylor University, Waco, Texas, and holds both the master of divinity and doctor of theology degrees from New Orleans Seminary. □

SBC home missionaries affirm power of prayer

ALPHARETA, Ga. — While the Season of Home Missions is a time to raise money — this year's goal for the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering is \$42 million — it is also time to increase the kind of support that money can't buy.

During the Week of Prayer for Home Missions, Southern Baptists are asked to pray for home missionaries whose specific prayer requests are highlighted in everything from bulletins to videos.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I think so many people would be praying for me on the same day," said Richard Harris, associational missionary in Wheeling, W. Va. "We got letters from people all over the country. We would feel a whole lot more alone without that. Now we know we're not forgotten."

Harris and other missionaries said they received encouragement and saw prayers answered as a result of being featured in last year's Week of Prayer.

Harris requested prayer for new congregations and stronger churches in the Upper

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Ohio Valley Baptist Association. The association started one congregation and two churches had more than 100 in Sunday School for the first time. Each of the 12 associational churches reported at least two baptisms last year, he said, and the total number of baptisms was more than 100.

As Tennessee's director of African-American church starting, Ken Weathersby had prayer concerns last year for new churches in Union City, Jackson, and Memphis.

"The Lord dropped a pastor in my lap last February (for the church in Union City). It has a strong core group and a good financial base," the TBC

Missions Department staffer said.

The church in Jackson reported more than 100 professions of faith last year. Its pastor, Richard Lee, is featured in this year's Week of Prayer for Home Missions (see page 6, Feb. 21 issue).

"The work in Memphis has exploded. You can't control it," Weathersby said. The primary emphasis there is starting churches, called Hope Centers, in apartment complexes. More than 120 people have become Christians through this ministry.

Another missionary, Ramon Aleman, Oklahoma church starter, asked Southern Baptists last year to pray for resources needed to construct an

Arguments for lottery don't tell real story

It is about time for the annual legislative tussle about having a state lottery in Tennessee.

As the Tennessee legislature moves in the current session, we need to realize that some kind of gambling bill probably will be debated. We will be reminded of how backward we are for ignoring the "blessings" and fortune that only a lottery can provide.

Not only will the lottery people remind us of this, some of our own state Senate will march alongside them.

Listen, Tennessee citizens, don't fall for the stale arguments of instant fortune and a quick and painless financial windfall for schools and other good causes.

Even if true, these do not come without a price, a terrible toll on culture and family values of a good state. Can anything good come from a source that is faulted at its conception, flawed by gambling interests whose reputation is tainted.

At the present time, a bill concerning a lottery for Tennessee is on the legislative back burner, but it probably will be pulled to the front soon. It may have been planned, promoted, and bargained for already. The Senate may begin the debate soon.

Remember, the Tennessee House of Representatives last term passed a bill calling for a referendum on the next available election ballot. However, a discerning Senate still stands in the gap. Claims for the need of a lottery are as false and twisted as ever.

Let's look at some points of faulty reasoning:

Anything that is promoted strongly every year in Tennessee's legislature must be good for the people, *right?*

Everything that is presumed to have vast support from the citizenry is good for the people, *right?*

Everything that is constantly ballyhooed and promoted by the secular news media will produce a positive impact on most citizens, *right?*

No. No. No. No to all of the above suggestions.

Let's continue the faulty suppositions: A state lottery, or any legalized gambling for that matter, will greatly enhance Tennessee's school systems by pouring unlimited income into the coffers, *right?*

All of us will be "winners" in the lottery simply by buying lottery tickets, *right?*

There really will not be any losers because no one has to buy a ticket, *right?*

It is not fair to make a person travel to the state line to buy a lottery ticket when we could have our own, *right?*

All the money that people spend on out-of-state lottery tickets should be spent in Tennessee, if we only had our own lottery, *right?*

Even people who choose to purchase lottery tickets instead of family necessities should be allowed to do so, *right?*

The state would not have to increase spending, providing for gambling addiction therapy, repairing broken homes, helping alcoholics, or fighting increased crime, *right?*

Neighboring states have lotteries and casinos for gambling. We are adults and

should have legalized gambling also. We are out of step with progress, *right?*

No to all these and other weak arguments that propose a Tennessee lottery.

We stand against gambling, including lotteries, horse racing with pari-mutuel betting, casinos, poker machines, dog races, TV betting on off-site races, et al.

Those who pander to gambling interests are surrendering to the theories that tainted money is acceptable if used for a good cause. This kind of thinking overlooks the insidious danger of greed, avarice, and robbery of character. It chokes the ideals of any strong culture, promotion and protection of family values and the virtues that can keep our nation strong. Gambling cannot, will not do that.

No matter how long or "strong" the argument, the idea of gambling can be reduced to the ageless hope of getting something for nothing, at the risk of destroying anything standing in the way.

It is selfish, greedy, and insensitive to the commandments of God. "Love your neighbor as yourself" does not include gambling to satisfy greed or selfishness.

The sensible, morally right approach to this lottery is to say no so emphatically that it will be buried for a long time.

Saying no is not pushing personal moral or religious values on anyone else. It is simply a matter of standing strong for those values which one holds dear. That is not a selfish view.

We urge Tennessee Baptists to share personal views with local legislators. The struggle involves family values based on positive morality, versus shallow ideas backed by millions of dollars. Tennessee does not need a lottery. □

Some suspects for stress

We live in a stress-filled world. The family faces the threat of strife because of

stress. Families need help.

It will be helpful to identify the person who is more likely to be susceptible to stress so that person might be more watchful in his or her own life within the family.

When we are strung out in stress, we are more likely to strike out at each other within the family. I suggest five personality or temperament factors that would be more likely to succumb to stress.

These attributes identify individuals who are **inflexible, intense, idealistic, insecure, and illusionary**. Each involves an inappropriate view of self to some degree.

The **inflexible** individual is the one who has rigid thinking that allows for one and only one "right" way to do things. That is usually his way. It is "my way or the highway" kind of thinking.

This inability to make allowances for other family members causes the build-up

of stress, which is often unloaded at the most inopportune times.

The **intense** person is someone whose self-worth is totally invested in success or production in some particular area of life.

When things do not go well in that area (job, social life, etc.), he really can be a bear to live with in the home.

This individual is the typical type-A personality who is driven in every area of his life. When his expectations are not met, he can be difficult to live with.

The **idealistic** person is one who has bought into goals, dreams, and visions that aren't his personally.

This could be a child who tries to live out a parent's dream, even into adulthood. It could be one who has committed to live out the demands of a family guru about unrealistic time and energy committed

to the family.

Failing to live up to these idealistic expectations, he doesn't like himself or anyone else very much.

The **insecure** person could be the one who in spite of success, fears it will all evaporate in the next recession or layoff. These persons seem to be always uptight and find that the stress leads to confrontations and strife over little things. Reassurance and stroking do little to disarm the fear that feeds the stress of this type of personality.

The **illusionary** persons are those who because of low self-esteem feel they are living in an illusion of well-being which others ultimately will learn about. This continual fear of having their bubble burst produces the stress that keeps them on the edge of strife in the family.

Undivided loyalty

By Charles Parker

This passage is about commitment and surrender to God. Jesus' followers are to give him their full commitment and loyalty.

This is not always easy. An American soldier, fighting in France, received a harsh letter from his nagging wife. Exasperated, he wrote back: "I wish you'd keep quiet and let me fight this war in peace." Here was a man having to fight on two fronts. As citizens of two worlds, creatures made in God's image (spiritual) yet also made of earth to live on earth (material), we are faced with numerous dilemmas. Do I love Christ and hate things? Do I try to serve both? Do I chuck all this religious stuff and try to live it up while I can? Can I serve Christ and use things rightly? As Frank Pollard once asked, "How in heaven's name do I treat earth's things?" Even Christians are tempted to live ignorantly.

Illustrations of ignorance

The impermanence of earthly treasures (vv. 19-21). Jesus presents two different kinds of treasure. What we get here on earth does not last. For example, in his time, people accumulated wealth in the form of clothing, metals, and goods. But then as now moths destroy garments. No respecters of persons, insects will eat the fancy clothes of the rich as readily as those of the modest dressers. "Threads" do not last, no matter how "cool" or stylish. While rust and other forms of corrosion eat metal, the word could also be applied to vermin that eat stored grains. Thieves are dreaded by the poor as well as the rich. Jesus' words indicate that he was speaking to a largely poor audience, who lived in mud or plaster houses through which a thief could "dig" unlike the stone houses of the rich.

Earthly treasures are still impermanent. Yet surveys not long ago showed one class of college freshmen showed that 3 of 4 thought "being very well off" was a top goal, while only 40 percent listed "developing a meaningful philosophy of life" as essential. Apparently greed is not dead! On the other end of life, a wealthy man was contrasting his gloom over death with a Christian friend's anticipation of heaven by saying to the friend's daughter: "Your father can be more optimistic about heaven than I for a very simple reason. He is going to his treasure. I'll be leaving mine."

The implausibility of looking in two directions (vv. 22-23). Jesus describes how they were getting lives out of focus by his use of the "single eye" to describe a proper focus and the "bad" eye to apply to a person who tries to keep one eye on God and the other on worldly things. The late H. Leo Eddleman described the dangers of "seeing double": Astigmatism is the defect which causes the eye, instead of giving one clear image, to give two or present an object entirely out of focus ... The blind man would recognize a pool by touch of his cane before stumbling into it. The man of double vision might think the pool a broader walkway and be drowned."

The impossibility of serving two masters (v. 24). Today the custom of "moonlighting" or holding two jobs with different hours is very common. Many who read this will be "bivocational" pastors. But in Jesus' day when many were actually slaves, it was impossible. Jesus did not say, "No one should," but "No one can" serve two masters at once.

The call to commitment

Underlying this whole passage is an implicit call to the disciple to choose the Lord and to be loyal to him in daily surrender. □ — Charles Parker is pastor of First Church, Jacksboro.

Parable of the sower

Matthew 13 is known for its parables of the kingdom of heaven. The first and most famous is the parable of the sower, often called the parable of the soils. This parable first challenges us to be like the seed sown in good soil, which bears fruit. Secondly, it encourages believers to sow the seed of God's Word.

Parable of the sower

Sowing the seed. Jesus drew most of his parables from every day life and told them in simple ways that the truth of the parable was apparent. Parables were written to be understood, heeded, and acted upon.

Seeds on hard soil. Jesus described four kinds of soil with hard paths separating the fields and as farmers scattered the seed in all directions, some fell on the paths and was consumed by the birds.

Seed in the shallow soil. Stony places were fields with large formations of rock just under a thin layer of soil. Some of the seed fell on the shallow soil and three things happened: it sprang up quickly, it was scorched, or it withered.

Seed among the thorns. All farmers experience this problem described here.

Seed in good soil. A farmer would be bankrupt if there was not some good rich soil. Good soil yields varying amounts and a 25 to 1 ratio is excellent but the story says some 100 to 1, 60 to 1, and 30 to 1 were recorded.

Listen. Some people hear without responding in faith and obedience. Verse 9 paves the way for verses 10-17, where Jesus explains the difference between closed and open eyes.

Why Jesus taught in parables — vv. 10-17
Insiders and outsiders. Matthew is emphatic in asserting that the insiders understand but the outsiders do not understand the mysteries of the

kingdom.

Closed eyes and ears. Outsiders see and hear with their eyes and ears but do not truly see or hear.

Open eyes and ears. Those that truly hear and see are blessed for they hear and see what other generations have yearned to see and hear.

Jesus explains the parable — vv. 18-23

Not withstanding. Two things apply to all four kinds of soil in the parable: the seed is the Word and all four groups represent people who hear the Word of God.

Jesus described two distinctive things about the first group of hearers: they did not understand the Word and Satan took away the Word sown for them. The word understandeth means more than an intellectual understanding.

Not persevering. The second group receives the Word with joy immediately. They show almost immediate evidence of life. Sadly they soon wither because they have no root.

Worries and wealth. Some professing Christians have that genuine salvation experience but never bear fruit. They miss the true meaning of a relationship with the Lord.

Fruitful lives. Here is the real hearer — one who responds in faith and obedience. The seed of the Word takes root in the person's life. This person's faith is focused on the Lord, not on worldly things. This person's faith bears fruit. □ — Kim Allen is pastor of Little West Fork Church, Clarksville.

Riches and Christian responsibility

This closing chapter continues to explain the church's ministry to different groups in the fellowship, particularly those that would cause problems.

To slaves — vv. 1-2

Slavery was a vital part of ancient life; it is estimated perhaps 25 percent of the population of Rome were slaves. Many slaves found Christ, but their masters would be unbelievers; and the Christian slaves might be prone to disobey or claim freedom in Christ. Paul urges them to be good testimonies to their lost masters that their masters might learn to respect the name of God and the Word of God.

To troublemakers — vv. 3-5

"Don't worry about doctrine," some modern preachers say; "the important thing is spiritual unity!" Paul refutes that lie in this section: whenever there is disunity in a church, it is because somebody does not believe and practice the Word of God. Those who were teaching false doctrine, and who would not agree to Paul's teachings, were to be noted and dealt with.

The apostle clearly pictures those people who cause trouble in the church. They are proud; they want to be "important people" in the church. Yet they are ignorant, "knowing nothing."

To the rich — vv. 6-19

The thought of "gain" in verse 5

leads Paul into a discussion of the Christian and wealth. Using godliness to try to get gain will never bring contentment, but a godly life, which is a contented life, is certainly great gain to a person.

It is easy to misinterpret verses 9 and 10. In verse 9, Paul is warning those who set their whole attention on welfare. This kind of person is bound to fall into temptations and snares, and will eventually sink into destruction. What does a man need for contentment? Very little: food and raiment and a godly life.

Verse 10 does not teach that money is the root of all evil, or even that the love of money is the root of all evil; but that the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Money itself is neutral; the way it is used, and the heart and motive behind it, determine its character.

Paul then injects a warning to Timothy because Christian leaders can be led by false values and material gain. Demas forsook Paul because he loved the world (II Timothy 4:10); Judas sold Christ for 30 pieces of silver.

Verses 17-19 form a positive instruction to the rich, telling them how to use their riches for God's glory. He calls them "rich in this present world." It is possible to be

rich in this world but not rich toward God (see Luke 12:13-21). These people must be humble, accepting their wealth as a stewardship from God. They should keep their eyes on the giver, and not put their trust in the gifts. God wants his own to enjoy the blessings of life; the word enjoy is in the Bible!

To the educated — v. 20

"Science" in verse 20 means "knowledge" but to Paul it was a false knowledge. He was no doubt referring to the Gnostics who claimed to have "full knowledge" about the universe, not too different from some of our philosophers today. False teachers at Ephesus were disturbing young Timothy with their high-sounding theories and their questions about the Word of God; so Paul warns him not to get involved with this "profane and vain babbling."

Timothy's responsibility is to guard the deposit that God had committed to him through Paul. God had given the Gospel message, the deposit of truth, to Paul, who in turn committed to Timothy. He was to guard it and pass it on to others. □ — Phil Lovelace is pastor of First Church, Somerville.

HMB volunteerism continues to rise

ALPHARETTA, Ga. — The number of Southern Baptists serving through Home Mission Board volunteer opportunities continues to rise annually. An estimated 81,300 volunteers served in Christian ministries through the agency last year, up 1.8 percent from 1994.

Youth volunteers comprised the largest category, with 39,931 individuals, up by more than 1,700 compared to 1994.

More than 24,500 adults served last year in short-term volunteer projects coordinated through the HMB. □

Supreme Court rejects challenge to display of Ten Commandments

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Supreme Court has refused to hear a challenge to a Ten Commandments display on the Colorado Capitol grounds in Denver. The Feb. 20 refusal left standing a Colorado Supreme Court ruling that the engraved monument in a park near the capitol did not violate either the federal or state constitutions.

The Freedom from Religious Foundation had argued that the monument's religious message violated the U.S. Constitution's requirement of church-state separation, as well as the Colorado Constitution's ban against preferential treatment of religion.

The three-by-four-foot monument has been in the park since the mid-1950s and contains some secular symbols as well. □

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BSSB releases resource to help teenagers with time management

NASHVILLE — When Richard Ross began working as a youth minister more than two decades ago, he rarely talked with teenagers about an upcoming event more than two weeks in advance.

Now, teens are pulling out planning notebooks and calendars, he observed.

"It's a different world; teenagers are much more interested in time management than in the past. For good or ill, their lives are much more programmed," said Ross, who also serves as volunteer youth minister at Tulip Grove Church, Old Hickory.

Evidence of adolescents' preoccupation with time management can be seen in the proliferation of teen-targeted daily planners now on the market.

Editors and consultants at the Baptist Sunday School Board became increasingly aware of that fact in recent years as they began receiving requests from youth ministers for a Christian-based planning tool for teens.

"They wanted something that would help their teen-

agers plan their day and encourage them in their daily walk with Christ," said Dwayne Ulmer, youth-adult leisure reading and devotional designer at the BSSB.

A Christian-based organizer wasn't a new idea for board editors. The BSSB released a planning resource for youth ministers three years ago. But developing a life management system for teens was definitely a special project, Ulmer said.

Input was received from numerous sources including youth ministers and teens.

The result of their efforts is "Student DayMaker," a planning resource released earlier this month at Youth Ministry National Conference 5 in Atlanta.

Among its features: monthly calendars and daily planners, class schedules, Scripture verses, evangelism and Bible study helps, and a glossary of religious terms.

Another section offers counseling suggestions designed to help teens minister to their peers. "I really feel the counseling section is one of the most practical features of the resource," said Ross who was involved in the project. □
