## Offering proves to be a miracle for Memphis church, says pastor

**MEMPHIS** — For some, miracles are events they've only read about in Scripture. Others, however, say they've experienced a miracle at some point in their life. Still others, like Tim Cox, pastor of Brinkley Heights Church here, believe miracles are events that happen daily as he and his congregation live by faith and trust in God's provision.

The small mission church in northeast Memphis doesn't have the financial resources most churches rely upon, so when Cox was told Brinkley Heights Ministry Center was being considered as one of the recipients of this year's World Changers offering, his reaction was one of humble thanksgiving.

"I couldn't believe we were actually chosen to be recipients of the offering," said Cox, who was presented a check for \$12,750 at the Brotherhood Commission trustees' November meeting.

World Changers is a ministry of the Brotherhood Commission that offers youth an opportunity to participate in co-educational missions projects, including "hands-on" participation.

Each year World Changers sponsors an offering for a special missions project or need. This year Brinkley Heights was chosen.

The ministry center, a faith ministry of the church, offers emergency food and

clothing assistance, spiritual counseling, health-care screenings, children's and youth clubs, substance abuse counseling, tutoring/homework centers, apartment Bible studies, and alternatives to gang involvement.

But the center, which relies solely on gifts and contributions to operate, has dreams of expanding its ministries, Cox said.

"We don't have any space to do the community ministries we want to do," he explained. "This offering will enable us to turn our church into a Christian community center to further reach the children and youth in the community and provide a safe place for them to come during the week," Cox said.

Cox said the center works with the Department of Human Services. "It's our hope that we can become involved in Tennessee's new Families First program, so that we can offer educational counseling, job training, and life skills that will take men and women from their present dependency upon the system to self-sufficient living. This year's offering will go a long way toward making those dreams a reality.

"We do ministry at whatever level God provides," Cox said.

"We totally live by faith. Whatever God sends, we use. To give you an idea of the significance of the offering, \$12,000 to us is like a whole year's worth of resources at one time." ■

## Southeast Church's Christmas drama noted in magazine

**MURFREESBORO** — The Bethlehem Marketplace, in its 15th year of operation at Southeast Church, Murfreesboro, was featured in the December issue of *Southern Living* magazine's "Tennessee Tidbits" section.

The magazine noted that for 15 years Southeast Church "has re-created the Bethlehem Marketplace as a reminder of the true meaning of Christmas."

The Bethlehem Marketplace is scheduled this year for Dec. 14-15 from 1-6 p.m. each day in the church's Family Life Center.

The walk-through drama re-enacts how the village of Bethlehem might have appeared the morning after the birth of Jesus. It features characters in period costumes such as Roman soldiers, prisoners, tentmakers, weavers, carpenters, merchants in shops, census-takers, and more. Live camels, donkeys, sheep, and other animals lend authenticity. Attendance in recent years has averaged 7,300 each year.

The drama is done solely by church members. There is no admission, no donations are accepted, and nothing is actually for sale. The tour time is approximately one hour.

## FMB sends \$150,000 to help resettle refugees in Rwanda

**KIGALI, Rwanda** — While many agencies are clamoring to offer immediate relief to the half-million Rwandans streaming home from refugee camps in Zaire, Southern Baptists will help them start over once they return.

The Foreign Mission Board expects to spend \$150,000 on farming supplies and household goods, plus other needs as they are identified, to help speed the process of rebuilding their lives.

The Rwandans, who fled genocide in 1994 during the country's civil war between the Hutu and Tutsi ethnic groups, started moving in masses out of Zaire in late November.

Almost since the refugees

fled, Baptists have been preparing for their return. Working with the Baptist convention in Rwanda and other Baptist partners from outside the county, Foreign Mission Board workers will help refugees re-establish themselves in communities they left — starting with virtually nothing.

"People are returning home at an amazing rate," said FMB missionary Stan Lee. "Within a few days everyone will be back in their home communes. Most of them have lost everything they own."

The FMB money will buy seed, tools such as hoes, household goods, and food for the short term. Other more specific needs will be determined by local survey teams. ■

# Gambling addiction real to devout Baptist mom

GULFPORT, Miss. — Gaylon (not her real name) wishes she had never accepted the casino's invitation to dinner. She believes if she hadn't, she would never have become addicted, lost her family, humiliated herself in prostitution, or lived in fear of using her real name on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

"I thought I could handle it, but it's the strongest drug I've ever done," Gaylon said as she sat trembling in her counselor's Gulfport office.

What could compel Gaylon — a lifelong Gulfport resident, devout Southern Baptist, and stay-at-home mother who voted against the county referendum that brought gambling to the Gulf Coast — to give up everything for a hooker's life on the street?

"Satan can appear to be an angel of light, and that's what those casino lights are for me," she said.

Tempted again and again to return for the elaborate, inexpensive buffets — a casino staple — Gaylon eventually began detouring by the video poker machines on her way out of the building.

In a matter of months, she had stolen \$30,000 from her children, driven her recovering husband back into alcoholism, and was hurtling toward utter

personal destruction.

She lost 30 pounds because she gambled three to four days at a time without stopping to eat, always convinced the next bet would be the big winner.

"I talked to the machines; I worshiped the machines. I have seen people wet their pants because they couldn't bring themselves to leave a machine," she said.

As her money vanished into the machines, she became increasingly desperate for more cash to stay "in play."

She was approached by a casino floor employee, who gave her a room number at the casino hotel. He was, in effect, the casino pimp, splitting with her the proceeds of her prostitution. "They've got all the bases covered."

The deeper her addiction became, the darker her personal life became.

"(The pimps) loved me, because they knew I'd do anything for the money. I'd go to a room thinking, 'Let's get this over with so I can get back to my machine,'" she said.

Gaylon considered prostituting her teenaged daughter for gambling money. She contemplated robbing a bank, as much for closure as for the money.

"I had access to a gun. I didn't care if I got away with

it, or if I hurt somebody and went to prison. I just wanted it to end," she said. Her 23-year marriage crumbled and her children turned her away. She couldn't get credit extensions and no business in town would cash her worthless checks.

Abandoned, forlorn and homeless, the starving Gaylon knew she had hit bottom.

That's when she began thinking about suicide.

"I had lost all self-respect. Suicide is something you think about when you just want it over," she said, echoing the sentiments of many addicts who want to break out of their downward spiral but don't know how.

In the midst of her personal crisis, a friend urged Gaylon to talk with a Southern Baptist counselor specializing in problem gambling. The counselor helped find Gaylon a place to live and convinced her she could turn her life around.

She confessed her addiction and her lifestyle to her pastor. A godly woman in her church began to pray for her.

"She's been my spiritual mother," Gaylon said.

Gaylon is hanging on, but the temptation is almost overwhelming. "Just sitting here with money, I get nervous. Everything makes me think of

it; with gambling, you really are possessed," she said.

Gaylon harbors a special disquiet regarding her fellow Southern Baptists who frequent the casinos.

"I kept thinking, 'If you're really saved, you wouldn't be doing this.' Then I would see church people in there at 3:30 in the morning when they thought no one would see them.

"I thought a lot about their hypocrisy," she said.

Gaylon has a suggestion for anyone who believes legalized gambling has brought prosperity to Mississippi.

"I would invite them to come with me and stand outside a casino at 3 a.m. They will see men and women fighting. They will see wives crying. They will see hungry children locked in cars.

"They will see how wholesome it is," she said.

Gaylon is determined to make her life what it once was before gambling, but she knows it will be a one-day-at-a-time struggle.

"Every morning I wake up and promise myself that I won't go to the casino, but the urge is there," she said.

Perhaps the most telling example of her personal battle is her response when asked how much she would have to win to quench her thirst for gambling: "Do they print that much money?" ■

## Arkansas Baptists reconcile with Ouachita

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — More than 1,500 Arkansas Baptist messengers gathered Nov. 19-20 to address the future relationship between the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and Ouachita Baptist University.

Responding to an Oct. 10 action by OBU trustees to become a self-perpetuating board, messengers voted 801-456 to approve a compromise between the university and the convention. The action sets in motion a two-year procedure to formally amend OBU's trustee selection process.

OBU President Ben Elrod described the plan as "a win-win situation" for both entities. "The new arrangement will foster a strong element of trust between our two institutions, and I have confidence that the process will work to the benefit of all concerned," he stated.

Agreeing "the reconciliation agreement is a good one," convention Executive Director

Emil Turner added, "No other state convention that has been through this has an arrangement that puts the final say in the hands of the messengers, but Arkansas has that. This keeps Ouachita accountable to the messengers of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

The Ouachita recommendation was developed by a five-member convention "reconciliation committee" working in cooperation with OBU's five-member bylaws committee.

The primary focus of the agreement is for future OBU trustee nominees to be recommended to the convention by a joint committee "composed of an equal number of people from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention nominating committee and the Ouachita Baptist University committee authorized to act on behalf of the board."

In other action, Rex M. Horne Jr., pastor of Immanuel Church, Little Rock, was re-elected by acclamation to a second one-year term as president.

Messengers adopted eight resolutions including "appreciation for gambling opposition" and affirmation of "Christian public school teachers and administrators." Other resolutions affirmed racial relations and the sanctity of human life and opposed homosexuality, pornography and alcohol, and other drugs.

The anti-gambling resolution was adopted just two weeks after a Nov. 5 election that resulted in the almost 2-to-1 defeat of a proposed gambling amendment. The measure sought to legalize casino gambling, a state lottery, and statewide charitable bingo.

The resolution affirming Christian teachers noted "many public school teachers and administrators are active members of Southern Baptist churches." It emphasized many Christian teachers "are attempting to make a difference in the lives of their students through lifestyle evangelism" and pledged prayer support. ■

# Let awakening roll down like a river



**S**eldom have the devotional messages at the Tennessee Baptist Convention evoked such genuine excitement and enthusiasm as those in this recent annual session.

Most Tennessee Baptists have heard of Henry Blackaby's involvement in spiritual awakening. Many have participated in a study of *Experiencing God: Knowing and Doing the Will of God*.

SOME HAVE MADE a conscious effort to change their lives because of what Blackaby preaches and teaches. It is quite popular to quote from his writings and teachings.

However, the whole experience of personal and corporate spiritual awakening has moved a giant step closer to Tennessee Baptists because of Blackaby's six messages given during the recent TBC sessions at Two Rivers Church, Nashville.

THERE IS MUCH HOPE that those who heard those messages will be a leavening force across the state — getting the interest of thousands and thousands of Tennessee Baptist churches and individuals.

It is quite possible that awakening will come in our state if early indications prove correct.

It's encouraging that people are studying tapes of the awakening series. There is new interest in Blackaby's book. Discussions of the content and about the desperate need for awakening were prevalent during the convention and yet continue.

## Important question: Do you need a will?

If you want all your property to go to your surviving spouse and children, and the law in your state, as in Tennessee, provides for this, you may not need a will.

If you want your property divided a certain way, a will is needed. Should you desire to distribute your property with controls on its use, you have to have a will. You may also want to permit your heirs to sell or keep it at their discretion.

Wills are increasingly used to benefit Christian work such as colleges, missions, evangelism, or one's home church. You must have a will if you want to appoint

the person of your choice to oversee your estate. Without a will, the probate court will appoint an administrator of your estate after your death.

The person you appoint in your will to handle your estate is known as an executor (executrix if female), and the person appointed by the court if you have no will is known as an administrator (administratrix, if female). If a named executor dies or is unable or unwilling to serve, the court will appoint someone.

An executor should be a person you trust to abide by your wishes. Close family members are appointed usually, but a professional can be named. The executor should have strength of character, and be gentle enough to handle any conflicts. ■

**Additional revenue means increased ministry at BSSB**

NASHVILLE — A second consecutive year of positive financial results at the Baptist Sunday School Board translates into more ministry resources than ever before, according to Ted Warren, executive vice president and chief operating officer.

In an employee meeting at the BSSB in mid-November, Warren said revenue of \$261,314,000, a total \$13.5 million ahead of 1994-95, includes funds necessary to sustain current and future operation of ministries and to provide for new products and services.

The figures represent a second year of positive results following two years of anticipated losses during reorganization and actions to fix business problems.

Funds Provided from Operations (FPO) — revenue remaining after all product costs, operating expenses, and contributions for convention support have been deducted — reached \$9.8 million, exceeding the 1995 FPO by \$4.2 million.

Since the board receives no Cooperative Program funds, Warren said the revenue from products and services meet needs such as support for new assignments, ministry assets, upgraded and new Baptist Book Stores, equipment repair, working capital, debt repayment, minimized future price increases for curriculum, and more. ■

# Alabama Baptists deal again with Samford, UM

BIRMINGHAM — A two-year controversy over Samford University's election of trustees peacefully ended during the 174th annual meeting of the Alabama Baptist State Convention.

A "Covenant of Sacred Trust" between the convention and Samford passed overwhelmingly by the 1,938 messengers who attended the Nov. 19-20 meeting at Shades Mountain Church here. A few concerns and questions during the floor debate lasted less than 20 minutes.

While not a legal document, the covenant calls for Samford to submit its trustee nominees to the convention's committee on boards and commissions. Only those nominees jointly selected by the committee and Samford will be recommended to the convention for approval.

The dispute has been a major focus for the past three annual meetings, after Samford trustees voted in September 1994 to become a self-perpetuating board.

A committee was appointed to study the issue at the 1994 convention. However, its report was rejected by messengers at the 1995 annual meeting. A 13-member Samford Reconciliation Committee was then appointed to prepare a proposal that could be agreed upon by both parties. The committee included ABSC President Fred Lackey as chairman and ABSC Executive Secretary-Treasurer Troy Morrison.

Samford trustees have acknowledged taking action to keep political factions of the convention from stacking the board. John Pittman, chairman of the Samford trustees, de-

clared to messengers this year, "There were documented threats to Samford University, its board of trustees, and to its future that we couldn't ignore." Now, he said, "I hope now we can get on with our business and love each other, trust each other, and work together."

The bylaws committee subsequently asked messengers to voice their opinions through a non-binding vote about extending a covenant similar to Samford's for all entities. Messengers favored the idea by a 79-vote margin.

The University of Mobile also figured into this year's annual meeting, when administrators disputed the convention's audit committee report, which voiced "continuing grave concerns" about the financial condition and operations at Mobile.

University President Michael Magnoli said no such complaint was expressed in the university's audit report that was reviewed by the convention's audit committee.

"We take great exception to that report," Magnoli said, noting university officials were unaware of any such concerns by the committee until they read it in the book of reports Nov. 19. "It just shows the vindictiveness of selective members of the audit committee," Magnoli charged.

The convention audit committee, made up of certified public accountants around the

state, review each entity's audit and management letter in presenting an annual report at the convention.

Audit committee chairman Mac Carpenter, a CPA for Carpenter, Bevis & Eberhart, P.C. and member of First Church, Dothan, declined comment on the committee's report but said the complaints are evident in the management letter given to the university Sept. 20.

The management letter from the Wilkins Miller firm noted significant deficiencies in the internal structure that "could adversely affect the University's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements."

Cited specifically in the letter: (1) Accounting records and details maintained at the university's Latin American branch campus in Nicaragua do not consistently agree with records maintained at the main campus in Mobile.

(2) Various journal entries during the year were made for the incorrect amount and some entries should additionally have been made.

The auditor noted neither of

these reportable conditions was considered to be a major weakness.

The management letter reports progress has been made but states "improvement is still needed. ... The University has made progress and now appears to have the proper personnel in place to implement" recommendations stated last year, such as disciplined communication between the two campuses about financial transactions.

The University of Mobile has been under fire from the convention over its Nicaragua campus opened in 1993 because Mobile failed to get convention approval for funding its new campus, an ABSC bylaw violation. Other financial irregularities had also been alleged.

Messengers unanimously approved a \$32.12 million base budget and a challenge budget of nearly \$33.5 million. The 1996 base budget was \$31 million.

In the election of convention president, Leon Ballard, pastor of 229-member York Church in western Alabama the past 14 years, won a 60-40 percent margin over Mike McLemore, pastor of 2,000-member Lakeside Church, Birmingham. ■

# Truth

## Focal Passage — Exodus 20:16; I Kings 21:8-16; Proverbs 6:16-19; Ephesians 4:25

I was involved in the criminal justice system, in the state of Georgia. I often found myself in court. I heard hundreds of people "sworn in" before they gave their testimony in court. The bailiff would ask, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?" They always said yes. Then, when some of them sat down in the witness chair, they lied.

Imagine we are going to interview people. Our assignment is to ask people to tell us as many of the Ten Commandments as they could remember. One answer we are sure to receive is, "You shall not lie." Do you realize that is not what the biblical text states. The text states, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor," (NKJV). The Living Bible does read, "You shall not lie" and then gives the correct rendering in the footnote. What is the difference in a lie and a false witness? Why did this principle make God's top ten? Let's attempt to understand this principle and the impact it has on relationships.

The Old Testament practice prohibited the giving of a false witness. Dr. Roy Honeycutt translates Exodus 20:16 as, "You shall not begin to answer against your neighbor a false witness." There are several words that help us to understand this Old Testament practice.

The word for no is the powerful Hebrew word for a permanent injunction. There are no exceptions to the practice of this principle.

The word we translate as bear, may better be understood as answer. This word occurs hundreds of times and usually means to answer or to respond. There are about two dozen times in the Old Testament where the word is translated to testify.

The word witness is also of significance for us. This word generally refers to testimony that is given in court. The prohibition for the witness is in the giving of a false witness. The word false has the meaning of deceive. This word had an intense meaning when used concerning testimony.

It is interesting to note in the Deuteronomy account of the Ten Commandments a different word is used for false. In this commandment is the same word we find in the third commandment that we translate as vain. A false word is an empty word.

Thus, the Old Testament practice prohibited a false witness in court. Could not God have simply said, "Thou shalt not lie." What is the principle behind this practice?

God's principle promotes trust as the foundation of all relationships. When the truth is told in court there are two things that happen. The innocent are protected and the guilty are exposed. The truth was essential in the courts for the quality of society to be preserved. When truth is the core of society it is because relationships have been built on trust. A false witness breaks down trust and without trust the quality of relationships is destroyed.

Ephesians 4:25 refers to how essential truth is in relationships. Those based in truth will have a positive impact on building trust and trust is an element critical in the quality of deep and meaningful relationships.

God's plan for relationships includes our relationship with him, with our family, and with people outside our family. The basis for our relationships is trust. ■ — Ron Galyon is pastor of First Church, Pulaski.

# Mary, mother of Jesus

## Focal Passage — Luke 1:26-42

God works through those who trust him with their lives. In the New Testament, Mary, who would become the mother of Jesus, models such a trusting relationship to God. She was the first to commit herself to participate directly in what would become the life and ministry of Jesus.

### An unexpected announcement — vv. 26-33

Six months after her cousin Elizabeth became pregnant with John, Mary received a visit from the angel Gabriel. Mary, a virgin, was espoused or pledged to Joseph. The arrangement was considerably more binding than our practice of engagement. The two were considered husband and wife under the law. They awaited only their wedding ceremony and the consummation of their marriage.

Gabriel appeared to Mary, declaring God favored her and was with her. Seeing that Mary was troubled or puzzled by these words, the angel told her not to be afraid. The angel's next words, though, probably did little to calm Mary. He told her she would conceive

tion. Perhaps it was a statement of faith linked to a simple inquiry, which we might read: "I know God can bring this to pass, but how does he intend to do so?" I think it more likely Mary's first reaction might best be interpreted as: "How can such a thing happen to a person like me?"

### Gabriel's answer — vv. 35-37

In either case, Gabriel had a ready answer: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you." Gabriel's language reminds us of the language of Genesis 1:2, where the Spirit of God is said to have hovered over the deep even as God began the work of creation. God was going to create something new, a new humanity, and so Jesus would be called "the son of God." As proof of God's power to do the seemingly impossible, Gabriel told Mary of Elizabeth's pregnancy.

### Mary's response — vv. 38-42

Mary surrendered to the will of God. She described herself as "the Lord's servant." A more literal translation would be "the Lord's slave," that is, one at the disposal of God. She went further and made a positive declaration of her willingness to serve God by bearing the promised child. Later Elizabeth, in a burst of prophetic insight, verified Mary's decision.

Mary's story challenges us to be open to whatever God may want to do with our lives. What might God accomplish through us if we truly view ourselves as his servants and genuinely told him to do whatever he willed with our lives? Mary's willingness to serve God in any way opened the way for God to send his son and offer reconciliation to all who would accept him. May we follow the lead of the mother of Jesus. ■ — Michael Smith is pastor of Second Church, Memphis.

# Growth in faith

## Focal Passage — Matthew 14:22-33

How would you like to be a 45-year-old man or woman living in a baby's body? Does the prospect of being spoon fed at 60 appeal to you? Spiritually speaking many people are chronologically mature, but spiritually they are infants. Spiritual growth is not a chore, but a wonderful journey to be treasured. In this passage, Jesus addresses many aspects of spiritual growth.

**Unbelief in Nazareth (ch. 13:53-58).** To the people in Nazareth, Jesus came home as somewhat of a hero. To them, he was a local boy who had done well. As he began teaching, it was evident that he was special. When he exerted his authority the people said, "Isn't this just Joseph's son?" Prejudice and ignorance reared their ugly heads!

**Herod's superstition (ch. 14:1-2).** Herod, the governor of Galilee, had his own fears. Jesus reminded him of John the Baptist, whom he had killed. Herod feared Jesus politically and personally.

**Herod's murder of John the Baptist (vv. 3-12).** John the Baptist had accused Herod of gross immorality with his half-brother's wife. Herod wanted to have John put to death (Matthew 14:5). Even

so, he had kept John safe (Mark 6:20) until Herodias' daughter tricked Herod into having him killed. The painful memory lingered, and Jesus' presence once again pricked Herod's conscience.

**The feeding of the multitude (vv. 13-21).** The feeding of the multitude had a tremendous impact on the people around Jesus. Most people of Jesus' day didn't have much food. They would eat until the food was gone, and still be hungry. Jesus fed the multitudes, and had food left over! This was no snack to tide them over. The disciples hadn't matured spiritually enough not to question the master!

Jesus didn't just give adequate provision, he gave abundance! The people were totally satisfied of their hunger, and there was food left over. Jesus provides abundant spiritual satisfaction for us today as well.

**Walking on the water (vv. 22-33).** Jesus went up on the mountain to pray. This is a powerful lesson for us. Our Lord prayed to gain spiritual strength. He went alone. It is extremely important that we have a personal quiet time alone with God each day.

It's almost funny to us today. The


disciples were out in the sea when Jesus walked on water to the boat. They were scared. It was between three and six in the morning, and it was dark. The disciples thought he was a ghost!

Imagine being there. Jesus told them not to fear. In response to Peter's request, Jesus called him to walk to him on the water. From this incident I learned these lessons: (1) Peter had fear, but he still obeyed by walking to Jesus; (2) In faith, Peter accomplished things he was not able to do alone; (3) Peter saw the waves only when he took his eyes off Jesus; (4) Even when his faith failed, Jesus was still there to pick him up again. Peter grew in faith that day.


**Miracles of healing (vv. 34-36).** Those who greeted Jesus at Gennesaret sought healing. Some demonstrated immature faith by trusting in a touch of a garment, but still, Jesus responded in love.

From these passages we see that our trust must be in Jesus. There is no aspect of life where that trust should not be demonstrated. If we truly follow an all powerful Lord, our trust is well placed in him.

Spiritual growth will take us on a journey through the storms of life. The Lord will nurture us as we grow, if we let him. ■ — Thom Tapp is pastor of Oral Church, Lenoir City.


