At second PowerSource conference

Church staff members explore worship

BRENTWOOD — Contemporary, blended, and traditional styles of worship exist, but speakers at last week's PowerSource: The Heart of Worship conference agreed churches should be focusing on authentic worship rather than a style of worship.

Addressing about 200 conference participants at Brentwood Church here, Benjamin Harlan, dean of the School of Music, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, said what is important about worship is not all the trappings, but the sincerity of the people worshipping. "We've analyzed and marketed the thing (worship) to death," he explained.

To determine the style of worship needed by a church, church staff members "should go out and see their community," Harlan said.

"The world doesn't need another singer, conductor, pianist, or writer; what the world needs are some people who are selfless and sacrificial

in their service to other people," he continued.


Harlan suggested the following is needed in church music.

▶ Churches should be the centers of creative expression in their communities.

▶ Music leaders should stop overgeneralizing about kinds of music and use music based on its own merit. Some music should be used because it is functional although it isn't great art and visa versa, he said. And music leaders should experience a broad array of music because "the more global your experience is the more you bring to the people you serve."

▶ Church music should be live rather than recorded. To do this, churches must nurture aspiring musicians, he said, which will positively impact the youth and the church. To encourage them, these musicians should be used "even if to your ears it doesn't sound very good," he added.

▶ The needs of the congregation must be the priority. If this is true, church leaders

can't be focused on competing with other church music programs, Harlan said. And this priority highlights congregational singing. If music can't be internalized by most of the congregation, it shouldn't be used. Some music has outlived its usefulness, he explained.

▶ Music leaders should prepare well for church services.

▶ Church leaders should nurture the individual gifts of people and think about

the individual.

Harlan added that ministers of music shouldn't become discouraged by measuring their accomplishments against musical standards because music ministry is "so much more than music."

Preachers should speak to the modern ear: Lewis

BRENTWOOD — Frank Lewis warned pastors at the PowerSource: The Heart of Worship conference here that they face "losing an entire generation" if they don't make some changes in their approaches.

The pastor of First Church, Nashville, spoke at the annual conference held at Brentwood Church last week.

Lewis said young adults, which are referred to as Generation Xers, busters, become, bridgers, or fixers, often haven't heard the name of Jesus.

These young adults are more than twice as likely to die by suicide or homicide than someone born 30 years earlier, he said, referring to *Futurist* magazine. Poverty among them has increased 50 percent since the 1970s. And one-half of Americans between the ages of 21-25 lack basic skills in literacy, balancing a checkbook, or reading a map, said Lewis.

To reach this age group, pastors must do more than don a sport shirt and add contemporary music to their services, said Lewis.

He told of a young adult couple he met while serving a congregation in Las Vegas. Charlie and Mary became Christians and asked to meet with Lewis. In that meeting Charlie asked two questions for which seminary hadn't prepared Lewis, he said. Charlie asked how to get a better job and how to balance a checkbook.

To help young adults like these, pastors should be prepared "to do a lot of re-parenting," said Lewis.

Preachers should pace their sermons in light of the influence of TV. Viewers are used to sitcoms with 18 minutes of content and commercial interruptions, Lewis noted. For this reason and others, a sermon should have only one point and three to five applications, which are often in narrative or story form.

Other suggestions are to use a conversational delivery, image-driven connections, and creativity. For example, preachers can incorporate a 90-second testimony from another person.

Sermons must retain one quality from past years, Lewis stated. They must present biblical content because young adults are searching for a spiritual reality, he said, referring to *Christianity Today*. And pastors must remain in the counter culture,

"so we can try to clean some things up" in culture, said Lewis.

They also should work on their image of arrogance and meanness by removing anger from their presentations, he suggested.

Pastors can be comforted by recent studies, Lewis reported. In a survey three years ago, young people placed as much credibility in pastors as they did in fictional heroes, but in a recent survey the number of young people who put credibility in pastors seemed to be increasing. Pastors should respond by guarding their image in the community so they will remain credible to this group, he added.

In programming, churches should consider multiple services to reach young adults, said Lewis. And congregations should be educated that church unity won't be sacrificed with the addition of services.

"Our biggest sin as preachers is boring people to death with the Word of God," said Lewis. But, as George Barna says, presentation of the Scripture should be simple. We don't want them to think the pastor has so much knowledge of the Bible that "I can never be like this guy," said Lewis. *BER* — Connie Davis

State youth minister questions Princeton study

NASHVILLE — A key proponent of sexual abstinence until marriage has questioned a national Associated Press story May 20 reporting that a "safe-sex" emphasis on condom use is "more effective" than teen sexual abstinence.

Richard Ross, a spokesman for the popular abstinence-based True Love Waits campaign, commented, for example, on the definitions of abstinence used in a Princeton University study highlighted by the AP and also by the *Journal of the American Medical Association* in its May 20 edition.


The Princeton University study, of 659 sixth- and seventh-graders at three inner-city Philadelphia schools, de-

scribed "abstinence intervention" as stressing "delaying sexual intercourse or reducing its frequency."

Ross, youth ministry consultant for the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and minister of youth at Tulip Grove Church, Old Hickory, said such a definition often is used in government and academic circles, but noted, "To say to a teenager, 'Could you wait just a little bit longer?' does not influence their behavior."

On the idea of abstinence as a reduction in frequency in sexual intercourse, Ross stated, "It is interesting to note that no one in Washington or in education is challenging teenagers to smoke fewer cigarettes — or to drink and drive less often or to commit hate

crimes with less frequency. "The best opportunity to help a teenager avoid lung cancer is to challenge him to stop smoking. The best option for challenging a teenager to be abstinent is to challenge him to wait until marriage."

The study is not, however, the first academic inquiry involving abstinence — nor the most comprehensive.

A study reported in the same *Journal of the American Medical Association* last September, utilizing a questionnaire completed by more than 90,000 seventh- through 12th-graders, reached a starkly dif-

ferent conclusion: A pledge of virginity is the strongest factor in shaping a teenager's sexual behavior.

The federally funded National Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health, often called the Add Health study, also found that teens who take a pledge of virginity, have loving parents and regard religion and prayer as important are the least likely of all adolescents to report engaging in early sexual behavior.

"Critics of the True Love Waits campaign enjoy saying, 'It is easier to break a promise than a condom,'" Ross reflected.

"The Add Health study confirms what we have known all along for the vast majority of True Love Waits students. The promise lasts." ■

Bell, minister of music, Prestonwood Church, Dallas, led a group on the use of choirs and praise/worship teams. And a worship service was held in which Calvin Miller of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, spoke.

Miller told of a struggle he had as a young pastor. He served for a while and "grew" the church from 35 to 19, he said facetiously.

Then the church asked an evangelist to help lead a revival. The evangelist asked almost everyone he met if he or she had been born again although it "wasn't very seminary," Miller said.

When the evangelist left, Miller asked himself, "Who's going to ask that question now?" He realized he thought too much of his degrees so he took his diplomas off the wall, he added.

Miller went on to lead a church to bap-

tize 2,800 people and to write 30 books. He is professor of communication and ministries studies at the seminary.

Referring to the story of Jacob's experience of wrestling with an angel, Miller said Christians wrestle with the devil and with God.

"Oh, it's fun to lose when your opponent is God," he said.

Bell said choirs and praise/worship teams can co-exist. A former Tennessean, Bell considers his home church Westwood Church, Cleveland, where his father, Bob, is pastor.

He incorporates a worship team into the choir during Sunday morning worship services at Prestonwood Church, he said. And worship teams are integral to the more contemporary evening services, he added.

They are useful to help the choir balance out instrumental accompaniment because of the poor acoustics of the sanc-

tuary, Bell explained.

He sees worship teams as worship leaders and encouragers. The members are drawn from a pool of potential members and they serve short periods of time, from one week to several months.

Because of their leadership, he looks for more than musicianship, he said. Worship team members must be active in the Celebration Choir and church and meet other spiritual standards, he added.

Bell, who is an arranger, referred to the following companies for resources on this area of worship: Genevox, Word, Integrity, Maranatha, and the International Worship Institute of Dallas.

The 1999 PowerSource conference will be May 17-18 and will be held once again in Middle Tennessee, said Ev Robertson of Tennessee Baptist Convention Executive Board ministries, which directed the meeting. *B&R*

A literary critic reviled the playwrights of his day, "Man, as they see him, is a creature trapped between two voids, prenatal and posthumous, on a shrinking spit of sand he calls time." His commentary mirrors what families fear — falling into the trap of busyness without meaning.

Time management pioneer Peter Drucker said that time is the scarcest resource; unless it is managed, nothing can be managed. Since time is a fixed quantity, nothing we do speeds or slows it, increases or decreases its value. Time is relentlessly impartial. No one

manages time. We only manage ourselves in relation to time.

Here are some business maxims for time management applied to family life:

Set short and long-term family goals. "Better to do the right thing than to do things right!" Drucker said. Before filling every day to the brim, ask: "What does it cost us, financially, yes, but even more, relationally?" Christian families should add, "How does this contribute to the kingdom?" and "What would Jesus do?" Families must re-evaluate goals and track progress.

Find your family's peak time and protect it. Many workers know that the first few hours of their workday is their peak time, best used for projects requiring creativity. Ask: "When is our family together and at its best?" That is the time to plan a special ac-

tivity or project.

Redefine quality time with children. Author Penelope Leach contends that quality time, especially for children in day care and school settings, is not parents doing things with their children. It is children doing things with their parents — gardening, sorting clothes, stirring soup on the stove. This is mentoring in its basic form.

Guide wise choices for activities. Six to 10 hours of extra activities per week is the maximum recommended for school-aged children. Leach laments, "We don't give children time to stand and stare," to wonder, to imagine.

Ask hard questions and make hard decisions. One father's quest for balancing work and family led him to conclude: "There's no way of getting work and family into better balance. You're in-

evitably shortchanging one or the other, or both. I have the best job I've ever had and probably ever will. No topping it. Can't get enough of it. I also have the best family I'll ever have, and I can't get enough of them... I had to choose." So said Robert Reich before leaving the first Clinton administration. He accepted an academic position and said, "I haven't suffered one minute of the rapid decompression that typically follows leaving a cabinet post. I now share breakfasts and dinners with my family. Prayergram makes difference for Tennessean

GUATEMALA CITY — The very day his ministry was mentioned on the International Mission Board's Global Prayergram, Donald L "Skip" Martin Jr. saw the results of Southern Baptists praying for him.

Martin, an International Mission Board missionary from Hixson, had had a problem with the Bible study ministry he began with cadets at the Police Academy of Guatemala.

Back in January, Skip and a group of Guatemalan Baptists had begun having a weekly Bible study with the cadets. Everything went fine until the first group of cadets finished their training and were posted to duty all over the nation.

But then the permission to have the studies at the acade-

my was withdrawn.

"For seven weeks, we were not permitted to conduct services within the confines of the academy," Martin said. "Refusing to grant us an official audience at any and every level, the authorities finally informed us (indirectly through lesser officials) that it would be necessary for us to submit another written request just to be considered for possible ministry opportunities in the future."

Finally, Martin was told the "Evangelical slot" had been granted to a Pentecostal group. It would be held at the same time Catholics and Mormons were holding services on Sunday night.

On April 15, the day the police academy ministry was mentioned as a motive of prayer in the Global Prayergram sent out by the IMB's International Prayer Strategy

Office, Martin talked with the pastor of the Pentecostal group, who graciously conceded the time back to him.

Without being able to publicize the meeting, some 200 cadets showed up. There were three decisions and 20 rededications that first meeting.

"Participation in our services is steadily rising with as many as 500 cadets in attendance," Martin reported. "Although our primary focus is evangelism, there exists a tremendous need to disciple the increasing number of new converts at the academy."

To carry this out, Martin and the Guatemalan Baptists working with him spend 15 minutes of training with eight of the more mature believers among the cadets. They in turn disciple others. Martin can only enter the compound once a week.

"We're careful to maintain a current list of all decisions made at the academy to insure the new believers receive ongo-

ing spiritual instruction," Martin explained.

The ministry at the police academy is not what Martin expected to be doing when he arrived in Guatemala. Armed with a Ph.D. in religion from Baylor University, Waco, Texas, he expected to carry out a ministry of theological education.

But the Lord had other ministries he wanted the Tennessean to do. Martin began theological extension groups in three Guatemala City area churches. These are called



"Agape" groups. Agape is an acronym for the name of the groups in Spanish.

A new believer in Salam who was about to come to the capital city to enter the academy asked IMB missionary Gary Fulton if he thought a Bible study could be conducted at the academy. Fulton contacted Martin, who sought and was given permission for the study.

From the beginning, Martin wanted to involve students from his Agape groups in the academy ministry. He has between 50 and 60 students enrolled. "I wanted the church involved from the very start," Martin said. "I wanted to make sure the studies continued every week."

Martin has a word for Southern Baptist prayer warriors — keep on praying.

"We are most grateful for the prayers in support of this ministry and solicit continuing intercession for this miracle of God in the Police Academy of Guatemala." ■

Family life

Focal Passage — Genesis 24-33

She was energetic and sincere. She talked about her family with obvious love and admiration. According to her, they never argued, became angry, ate too much, got on each other's nerves ... and all the children were sweet as angels. I listened with a healthy sprinkling of skepticism as the speaker, a young pastor's wife, described her "perfect family." I thought about my own family and some of the struggles we had endured over the years. I thought about the sessions of family counseling during years as a pastor and missionary. I had become convinced that such a "perfect family" did not exist.

Though she very young and idealistic, I knew she had a good foundation in Christ. I also knew there would be problems as she and her family encountered more of life. As I said a silent prayer for her, I prayed for my own attitude as well. No family is perfect. We are all sinners.

But guess what? There can be a redeemed, wonderful family — in Christ. When we are submitted to Christ and his authority, we are able to deal with the issues, conflicts, and struggles of living in a sinful, imperfect world. We can experience forgiveness, love, grace, and peace with one another, always seeking to move ahead together in life as God so leads. He has revealed many examples of families who experienced his strengthening presence as they walked through life together. This Sunday we will look carefully at one such family.

Abraham and Sarah were blessed with a son, Isaac. When Sarah died, Abraham sent his servant to find a wife for Isaac among his extended family. God led the servant to Rebekah and he brought her back to Isaac. After several years of marriage, Isaac and Rebekah still did not have a child and Isaac prayed to the Lord asking that she might be blessed with a child. God gave her twins named Esau and Jacob. They were as different as night and day. Esau was born first and was a real "daddy's boy." He was obviously Isaac's favorite. Jacob was Rebekah's favorite. This favoritism was the seed that produced a harvest of deception and hatred that severely damaged their family relationships. Rebekah encouraged Jacob to deceive his father in order to cheat Esau out of the family blessing. Isaac, who was nearly blind, blessed Jacob instead of Esau. When Esau found out about this, he was outraged. Esau begged his father to bless him, but Isaac could not cancel the blessing he had already given to Jacob. Eventually, Rebekah feared for Jacob's life and sent him to her family far away. She told Jacob that he would only be there a brief time. In reality, he stayed there for 20 years.

It is difficult to always relate to each of our children in the same way. The difficulty comes from the fact that each child responds to us differently. Only God can enable us to show the right measure of love to each child in such a way as to overcome problems of favoritism. Loving them in their uniqueness requires God's type of love.

If you had asked Jacob how God was at work on that day when his mother sent him to her family to protect him from Esau, he wouldn't have had a clue. But years later, in retrospect, he could probably tell you how God had used this family problem to change his life. As families, we will experience different problems, issues, conflicts and crises, but with Christ, we are able to find the right way to deal with them and grow together in love. Help for the future

Focal Passage — Mark 13:1-7,24, 27, 32-35

The thirteenth chapter of Mark's Gospel could be the most difficult chapter in this book to interpret. It deals with two events — the temple destruction and the return of Christ.

During his last week Jesus had entered and cleansed the temple. He then spent time asking and answering questions. Afterwards, he left the temple (possibly for the last time) with his disciples. Although the Jewish people had little regard for Herod the Great, they took pride in the temple he began to build in 20-19 BC. It was partially finished in Jesus' day and completely finished in AD 64. This temple was wondrous to behold. A Jewish historian, Josephus, wrote that some of the stones were huge. Such magnificence would capture the attention of anyone. Upon the insistence of a disciple to observe the beauty of the temple structure, Jesus responded with his prediction of destruction. No doubt, with a note of sadness in his voice, Jesus told this disciple that this beautiful temple would be totally destroyed. The prediction became a reality during the Jewish-Roman war. In AD 70, the Romans burned the temple and then dismantled all that remained.

Family Bible Lesson

The four disciples named in verse three were the first four called by Jesus according to Mark's Gospel. These disciples questioned his prediction. When will these events occur? Jesus' answer addressed both the destruction of the temple and his future return to earth.

The English phrase "take heed" appears four times in Mark 13 and should be translated from a Greek word which means to "pay special attention to something." Be not deceived by the history of wars or the rumors of wars. All of history has been filled with such things and "the end shall not be yet."

Courage and hope in life and death

Focal Passage — Revelation 1:9-20

Our focal passage could be entitled "The Vision on Patmos," because John hears the command to write these words while he was on Patmos. Paul lived for 18 months on this six by 10 mile island in the Aegean Sea about 37 miles southwest of Miletus.

John describes himself as a "fellow sufferer for the Lord's sake," indicating that the church was undergoing intense persecution as he was writing this letter.

Today we should follow John's example in our relationships with other Christians, encourage them to be steadfast, faithful, and remind them of our future reward with God.

John was exiled to Patmos because he refused to stop preaching God's Word. What a message. He told his readers he was their "Brother ... for the Lord's sake." He was patient in his endurance of suffering. Looking at verse 10, we see that John "was in the Spirit on the Lord's day." Just as all Scripture is given by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, so John was under the control of this same Spirit. As for the phrase "the Lord's day" this refers to the first day of the week.

In verse 11 the seven churches, to whom the book is sent, are named in the order messengers would carry letters, going from northwest to north-

east and southeast. The order is very important because this is exactly how God wanted his message delivered. As Christians, the way God gives instruction, and in the order he gives them to us is important. It's important that we follow his way.

Verse 12 John mentions the seven lampstands, which represent the seven churches mentioned in verse 11. These churches were located in the general area of the Roman province Asia. John must have been aware of each congregation and their needs.

Christ's clothing (v. 13) designated him as priest and judge. In Daniel 7:9, we see the description of the Ancient Days. Please read Daniel 7 as a foundation for this vision. John recognized Jesus because he lived with him for three years and had seen him both as the Galilean preacher, and as the glorified Son of God. Here Jesus appears as the mighty Son of Man. His white hair indicates his wisdom; his piercing eyes symbolize judgment of all evil, and the golden band reveals him as the High Priest who takes our prayers to God.


Next John writes of his feet and voice (v. 15). In judgment Christ will trample the winepress of God's wrath

Jesus admonished his disciples to continue the task of preaching the good news to all nations and to persevere in the face of persecutions. Even though difficult times will come to Jesus' followers, they are expected to endure in their faithfulness. It was true that Christians were hated. Some writers referred to Christianity as a new and evil superstition. The most serious slander was the charge that the Christians were cannibals, a charge which was supported by the words of the sacrament which speaks of eating Christ's body and drinking his blood in referring to statements in the Lord's Supper observation.

The background of verse 14 is Daniel 7:27. The description of the events in Daniel fits various people within history and foreshadows a final evil one at the very end. A Syrian King desecrated the temple in 167 BC by sacrificing a pig on the temple altar. The Romans desecrated the temple by destroying it and robbing its treasures. Verses 14b-18 contain words of the Lord that the Christians of AD 70 applied to the coming of the Roman armies.

Verses 19-25 sound more like a final period of tribulations at the end of time. Apocalyptic language is used to describe the Lord's future coming.

The phrase "take heed" appears again and stresses the need for preparedness. Literally, the words mean to stay awake rather than falling asleep. Jesus used a familiar parable of a master leaving on a journey and giving instructions to his servants about what they were to do in his absence. "Watch" did not mean standing idly by waiting for the master's return. It meant to do what he left them to do. Likewise, watching for the Lord's coming does not mean gazing into the heavens or spending time speculating about the time of his coming. Instead, he wants to find us busy at the task to which we have been called. The Lord expects us to be faithful to him as we await his return. Let us continue as his witness until he should return to this earth to claim his bride, the Church, of which we are a part, because of our faith in him. — Murphy is Computer Consultant for West Carroll Special School District and a bivocational pastor, Howse Church, Atwood.



(Isaiah 63:1-5). His powerful voice will not be lifted to quiet the troubled sea, but to call down the judgment of God on the wicked. The sword in Jesus' mouth (v. 16) symbolizes the power and force of his message. Isaiah 49:2 and Hebrews 4:12 tell us that his words are sharper than a sword.

Jesus appeared (vv. 17-18) in glory and splendor, reassuring John that he and his fellow Christians had God's strength to face these trials. If you are facing difficult problems, remember that Jesus' power is available to you today. When we place our lives in Christ's hands, he restores us a peaceful fellowship with him.

In verse 19 we see John is instructed to "write down" all these things that have happened and will happen.

John closes this chapter and this lesson with verse 20, which explains the mystery of the seven stars and the seven golden candlesticks. For years I have read, "angels of the seven churches" and have had questions about the meaning. Some say they are the churches' guardian angels while others say elders/pastors of the local churches. I guess each person should ask God's help in this interpretation. Just let me say we as pastors are accountable to God for the churches which we, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, lead. — Growden is a teacher and a bivocational pastor, Hillcrest Church, Nashville.


