TBC leaders explore ways to help families

LINDEN — A concern about
the deteriorating condition of
the family unit was evident
among those gathered at the
Spring Summit on the family
May 30-31 at Linden Valley
Baptist Conference Center.

The summit was sponsored
by the Tennessee Baptist Con-
vention and drew participants
from the Executive Board staff
and several TBC institutions.

Leaders came away from
the summit determined to
work together to do more to
make families in Tennessee
stronger.

TBC Executive Director
James Porch noted that family
ministry was a priority cited
by a communications audit a
few years ago.

The purpose of the summit
was to bring the institutions
together to see what is taking
place in regard to family min-
istry in the state and to discover
ways to work together.

"We cannot afford to be lon-
ers in this ministry," said TBC
Executive Director James
Porch. "We need each other."

Condition of the family

Summit participants quickly
concluded that the family
unit in Tennessee in particular
and in America in general is in
trouble. "One of the saddest
tragedies of our time is the dis-
integration of the family," said

Bryant Millsaps, president of
Tennessee Baptist Children's
Homes.

Don Mauldin of the TBC
Christian Growth and Devel-
opment group previewed sev-
eral trends that will affect fami-
lies in the 21st century.

Among them were predic-
tions that premarital and extra-
marital sex will increase
and divorce will become even
more accepted as a norm, he
said.

Mauldin also noted that the
number of single households
and number of cohabitating
couples will increase.

Tony Rankin, a clinical psy-
chologist and member of First
Baptist Church, Nashville,
agreed that the family unit is
heading in the wrong direc-
tion. "Hopefully, we can
change the direction our fami-
lies are going," he said.

What is the family?

Rankin offered several sug-
gestions as to why the family
unit is disintegrating by defin-
ing what the family unit has
become.

► The family is too busy.
Rankin noted that church,
work, and extracurricular ac-
tivities such as sports all con-

tribute to families being too
busy. "We (the church) have to
be careful not to encourage
people to be too busy," Rankin
said. "We have to help families
slow down," he stressed.

Bill Northcott, leader of the
Church Staff Leadership
group, agreed. "In church we
profess family values but we
overschedule events that keep
families from being together,"
he observed.

► The average family eats
one meal together per week at
home. "When we stop eating
together, we stop sharing.
There becomes a lack of intimacy," Rankin cautioned.

► Resentments. The num-
ber one cause of counseling is
resentment, which Rankin def-
ined as broken expectations or
promises. "When you get mar-
ried, you don't get what you
think you're getting," he ob-
served. "Just because you
didn't get it doesn't mean you
should get divorced."

Rankin said it is critical to
help married couples under-
stand there are expressed and
unexpressed expectations in a
marriage relationship.

► Passing stress on to chil-
dren. "We are in over our
heads as parents," Rankin said.
"We don't do it on pur-
pose, but we pass stress on to
our children," he said.

With a circulation of 500,000, *HomeLife*

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Tennessee foundation gives \$173,200 in scholarships

BRENTWOOD — Almost 300 students — 298 — from Tennessee Baptist churches will receive Tennessee Baptist Foundation scholarships totaling \$173,200 for the 2000-2001 academic year. These students from across the state are studying at colleges, universities, and seminaries.

Applications for scholarships are received by the foundation from December to Feb. 28 each year. The foundation's scholarship committee evaluates the applications and awards scholarships based on the applicant's academic record, testimony, and recommendations from the applicant's pastor.

The program began in 1987 and is funded by Tennessee Baptists, either through gifts to the scholarship fund or bequests from their estates.

Evangelical leaders respond to Chicago interfaith leaders

ATLANTA — Top evangelical leaders joined prominent Southern Baptists in a rejoinder to critics of efforts to preach the Christian Gospel to people of other faiths.

A "Chicago Declaration on Religious Freedom" released June 2 challenged those who contend that attempts to proselytize non-Christians "undermine a peaceful, pluralistic society and may lead to intolerance, bigotry, and even violence."

Texan to offer amendment to BF&M

DALLAS — Texas Baptists' top paid leader says he will seek to amend the Baptist Faith and Message when a new version of the confessional statement is proposed to the Southern Baptist Convention June 14.

Charles Wade, executive director of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, previously criticized proposed revisions to the 1963 document for leaving out some key references that were included in the old statement.

Wade echoed those comments in his weekly column in the June 5 issue of the *Baptist Standard* newspaper.

"I believe any Baptist statement of faith should clearly affirm soul competency, the priesthood of the believer, and local church autonomy, and it should make clear that Christ is our guide for interpreting the Bible," Wade wrote.

"As a Baptist ought to do when he or she has a concern, I will be at the SBC to offer an amendment, which I hope will be a unifying word for Southern Baptists," Wade continued.

This year's convention meets June 13-14 in Orlando, Fla.

The committee that drafted the changes issued a statement responding to a number of questions the document has raised. While priesthood of the believer, soul competency, and the autonomy of the local church are not

enumerated in their statement, the committee said those concepts are implicit in the article on "the church," where it says that "each member is responsible and accountable to Christ and to God."

The committee also said that new language affirming that "all Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is himself the focus of divine revelation" is stronger and more historic than in the 1963 statement. Words in that verse describing Christ as "the criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted," they said, had been used "to drive a wedge between the infinite Word and the written Word and to call into question the truthfulness of certain passages."

Texas Baptists are already on record as opposing one article of the new document. The state convention endorsed the 1963 Baptist Faith and Message last year, in effect rejecting a family amendment added by the SBC in 1998 that, among other things, calls for wives to submit to their husbands.

While Texas Baptist leaders said they believe the statement takes Scripture out of context, critics of the move said it casts doubt on moderate leaders' belief in the Bible and loyalty to the SBC. Despite a number of disagreements with SBC leadership over the years, BGCT remains the largest contributing association to the national body, giving more than \$1 million to the national convention's budget in 1997-98. ■

That language echoed a plea last year by a council of interfaith leaders in Chicago for Southern Baptists to call off plans to blitz the city with volunteer missionaries this summer.

The Council of Religious Leaders in Metropolitan Chicago, in a November open letter to Southern Baptist Convention president Paige Patterson, expressed fear that an announced plan to send 100,000 evangelists to the city might undo progress made in interfaith dialogue or even encourage extremists to commit violence by fomenting religious differences.

Southern Baptists rebuffed that request, but more recent projections have scaled the scope of the planned effort back considerably.

Joining 21 original signers were more than 60 individuals who endorsed the statement. They included Campus Crusade for Christ founder Bill Bright, Prison Fellowship founder Charles Colson, Richard Mouw of Fuller Theological Seminary, David Neff of Christianity Today, Janet Parshall of the Family Research Council, Jay Sekulow of

the American Center for Law and Justice, and evangelist Billy Graham's son Franklin Graham.

The statement is clear in its view that such criticism constitutes censorship. ■

Georgia church burned by arsonist

GAINESVILLE, Ga. — A \$10,000 reward has been offered for information leading to the arrest of an arsonist who burned down a Southern Baptist church building in the north Georgia town of Gainesville.

Investigators said someone broke into the Montgomery Memorial Baptist Church in the early morning hours of June 4 and torched the sanctuary. Officials determined the fire started in the pastor's office shortly after midnight.

Firefighters were able to save an adjoining education building, but the sanctuary was a total loss, according to Fulton Boswell, pastor of the 1,150 member congregation.

Boswell said the church was insured. Officials placed damages at about \$700,000.

NAMB effort targets Phoenix

PHOENIX — How do you touch a booming metropolitan area of nearly three million people with the Gospel — and do it in a way that will last?

Organizers of Southern Baptists' Strategic Focus Cities effort in Phoenix determined the solution was not in grand, region-wide strategies, but in individual neighborhoods where 170 churches in three different associations were full of people who shared their vision.

Phoenix and Chicago are the first two cities being impacted by Strategic Focus Cities, an evangelism and church-planting effort of the North American Mission Board and local partners focusing resources and volunteers on two major cities each year.

Phoenix is characterized by its explosive growth with a population expected to double by 2030. As of early May, 170 churches have been started through the effort and plan to be on track for another 33 started by the end of the year.

As I lis to the participants and various statistics, it is ap t many Tennessee homes ot blessed with the tradi family model of both mom ad in the home.

And even when there are two parents in the home, in many cases both spouses work. One of the points of discussion at the family summit was that families today are simply too busy.

Tony Rankin, a clinical psychologist and a member at First Baptist Church, Nashville, noted that families are involved in so many activities including youth sports, church, and more.

He also noted many people today are "workaholics."

I have thought about that a lot. Over the years, every generation has had to face the task and sometimes dilemma of finding ways to support and provide for the family. That has not changed.

Today, however, we may be attempting to do more than just provide. Some families struggle with "living beyond their means," or trying "to keep up with the Joneses." This provides additional stress on families that is not needed.

We have to make tough decisions about what is really important to our families. Is time

spent away from our kids worth the boat or the really expensive house? That's a decision each family, under the leadership of God, must make for themselves.

The second event that made me focus on being a dad happened last week.

I received a call from South Carolina that "Pop" was on the verge of death. It appeared I could not get to South Carolina before he died. Through God's grace his condition, though still extremely serious, has improved somewhat.

Biologically, Pop is my grandfather. Emotionally, however, he is my dad. My mother and I lived in my grandparents home when I was growing up. I never knew my father, so Pop served both roles over the years. He did it well. Along with my grandmother, they instilled the values and work ethic I have today. Since I became an adult, Pop would give advice if asked. He has been a positive influence throughout my life.

During that long drive to

South Carolina, I thought about how God blessed my life through Pop and my grandmother, who is now deceased.

I know I did things to disappoint them, but through it all they never stopped loving me.

I have thought about my relationship with Joanna and Daniel. God has blessed me and my wife, Joyce, with two wonderful kids. They're not perfect, but neither are we. As a family, we have tough times, especially when we make decisions that are not popular with our kids. But we also have a lot of good times as well. Our kids know they are loved.

Through God's grace, Joyce and I are still learning to be parents, a task that no doubt will be a life-long effort. Our hope is that someday our kids can say we were a blessing to them. There's no doubt they have blessed us.

Central members prove 'Nothing Is Impossible'


CROSSVILLE — Members of Central Baptist Church here dedicated their new 33,375-square-foot worship center on Sunday, May 21.

The theme for the occasion was "Nothing Is Impossible."

For the past 16 years, the 18-year-old congregation has met in a multi-purpose building. Though they had added some temporary educational space and additional parking by literally moving a hill behind the church and building a one-half mile access road, the church continued to meet in the combination gym-sanctuary, said Pastor Roland Smith.

"Four years ago we got serious about building," he said.

Members began planning the new facility three years ago. On June 7, **MEMBERS OF** Central Baptist Church, Crossville, dedicated their new sanctuary on Sunday, May 21. The theme for the occasion was "Nothing Is Impossible."



1998, the church body proved that "Nothing Is Impossible With God," by pledging to financially support the construction of a new sanctuary. Before groundbreaking was held, members had pledged about \$1 million toward construction of the sanctuary.

"It has been exciting," Smith said, "As pastor, I've been thankful for the

genuine, sweet spirit of a loving church," he said.

While the church has experienced "consistent, steady growth" during its 18 years of existence, Smith said he feels the church has positioned itself "to grow even more." ■

► Surrogate parents. Surrogate parents can include anything from day care, television, teachers, the Internet, and more, Rankin observed. "We have to be careful to teach parents to parent their kids. If we don't, someone else will," he cautioned.

Today's family rationalizes divorce. Rankin observed that the church, like society, is beginning to rationalize divorce. "We need to keep the

(biblical) standard and stop rationalizing divorce," he stressed. He acknowledged that "it's not easy to be married," but at the same time couples must realize that "divorce impacts people's lives," he said.

What's the solution?

Rankin observed that more than education is needed to improve family life in the state. "If we're going to impact families in Tennessee, we are going to have to develop feelings of trust in families before they can become healthy," he suggested.

He observed that there needs to be more "model" families. "We don't need more pro-

grams. We need better families. People need to see it."

In order to improve family life, Rankin suggested that there needs to be more realistic expectations. "We won't have perfect kids or perfect parents," he noted.

He also observed families can become healthier by having fun together, finding a sense of direction, and providing security and predictability to the family unit.

"Some day our kids will tell our grandkids what kind of parents we were. We have to model what a good family looks like," he said.

Conclusions

During the two-day meeting

at Linden Valley, representatives of the Executive Board staff and institutions shared what each was already doing relative to family ministry.

This was needed, according to Porch, because "we don't all need to do the same thing and duplicate it."

The summit also helped leaders realize there is a lot that can be done to help strengthen families in Tennessee and all expressed an interest in cooperating to meet that goal.

"Our God has taught us the family is a very sacred thing," said Bryant Millsaps. "We don't have any option as ministers of Jesus Christ to not fight

for families," he said.

Representatives at meeting agreed to develop a source directory for families and to continue to meet to explore ways they can work together to strengthen families in the state.

"We are in a new day of Tennessee Baptist life," Porch said.

"I hope this can become a model or new paradigm in which family ministry and other ministry can be done as work together in a more efficient way," he said.

"As churches see institutions working together, hopefully we will have a spill-over effect," Porch said. ■

Jerry Sutton authors book on SBC conservative resurgence

NASHVILLE — What might have prevented the crisis which Southern Baptists endured in the latter half of the last century? Through a well-substantiated analysis of the history of the conservative resurgence, author Jerry Sutton suggests some answers. And for a new generation unfamiliar with the roots of the controversy, he offers the context and characters of events which led to a theological transformation.

The Baptist Reformation, to be released by June, is a 560-page history published by Broadman & Holman, the trade books division of LifeWay Christian Resources of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Sutton, pastor of Two Rivers Baptist Church, who holds a Ph.D. in church history from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, said he

relied upon primary sources for much of the book's material, "endeavoring to substantiate all conclusions with hard facts."

of the Baptist Faith and Message. Instead, their influence increased at two sister institutions — Midwestern in Kansas City, Mo., and Southeastern at Wake Forest, N.C. "The leftward drift could have been nipped in the bud," Sutton writes.

One of those professors, Ralph Elliott, set the stage for the ensuing controversy with his book, *The Message of Genesis*. If the then-Baptist Sunday School Board had not defended its publication and Midwestern administration and trustees had not supported the Elliott's historical-critical method of interpretation, Sutton believes the crisis might have been headed off at that point.

Other turning points described in the book include the failure of BSSB trustees to prescribe conservative parameters for the multi-volume Broadman Bible Commentary and the unwillingness of seminary presidents to admit any theological problems on their campuses.

"Conservatives understood the adage, 'What the fathers do in moderation, the children take to excess,' and they knew that something needed to be done. And it was. And we do not apologize for it," Sutton writes, clearly acknowledging his support for the conservative cause.

In the first part of the book, Sutton addresses what he terms the theological inadequacy and the institutional bureaucracy that protected those who taught aberrant doctrinal views. A second section gives a chronological account of events during administrations of the SBC presidents elected by a conservative majority since 1979. A third part describes institutional change at the various Southern Baptist entities. In his final section Sutton analyzes and interprets why change occurred, offering an epilogue on "The Future Before Us."

past five years and nine-year NFL veteran, recounted his disdain for hypocrites during a June 2 chapel service at the Southern Baptist Convention building in Nashville — and during that evening's Billy Graham Crusade in the city's Adelphia Coliseum.

Although he had an interest in knowing Jesus Christ as a teenager and young adult, Smith devoted more attention to how athletes and others who called themselves Christians acted rather than what they said.

And he wasn't impressed.

Not during his college career as a quarterback at Miami (Ohio) University, tallying a 33-1 record. And not as a second-round draft pick of the NFL's Seahawks.

Not until Ken Hutcherson showed up for training camp.

A hard-hitting middle linebacker and unabashed Christian, Hutcherson caught Smith's attention, and Smith watched Hutcherson

closely for six weeks, looking for him to stumble, to be a hypocrite like so many others.

Then, unexpectedly, came the test. A gut-wrenching test. Hutcherson was cut down from behind in a play during the last preseason game of 1976, left on the ground crying out in agony with a knee injury. Later came the news that Hutcherson had suffered a career-ending blow to his knee.

Teammates came by to console Hutcherson after the game, the last of whom was Smith, who still had Hutcherson's faith under a microscope.

"Sherm," Hutcherson, somehow upbeat and smiling with ice

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


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
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packs on his knee, Smith, "I'm excited to see God has planned for my life."

"You see, Sherm, I'm Christian and nothing happens in life unless it's filtered through God's hands first."

Smith responded to his son in a way he never heard a Christian before: "I'm more." And right there in the locker room, Hutcherson was sharing the Gospel with him.

Smith listened but didn't take that step of faith — few weeks later, when facing a less-serious knee injury that nevertheless had him feeling, "It's over with."

Sitting in his car, Smith finally took that step. It was peace and a confidence he never known before. ■



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What is God Like?

Focal Passages: *Isaiah 40:10-11, 18-31*

One of the primary building blocks in the construction of a biblical worldview is a proper understanding of the person and nature of God. There once was a young boy who heard his Sunday School teacher talk about the nature of God – specifically that God is everywhere and will never leave or forsake. She asked the class if they believed what she said. The boy said he agreed with the teacher and proceeded to tell the class, “God’s the one who opens the door at the grocery store.” Like our young minds, the world’s understanding can be quite different from what the Bible teaches. The world’s notion of God runs the gamut from a cruel master to a heavenly “grandfather” who lives at our every request. This week’s lesson focuses on gaining a biblical understanding of God by giving answers to the question “What is God like?”

God is incomparable (vv. 18-20). To be “incomparable” means to be without equal or the only one of its kind. Isaiah asks the questions, “Who can compare with God?” He then proceeds to show the error of worshiping a manmade idol instead of the true God. While modern men and women may not worship idols out of wood or precious metal, they are guilty of creating false gods in their hearts and minds. These idols often go by the names of lust, power, and materialism. However, the true God is the only true God and thus attempt to limit God’s power is wrong.

God is sovereign (vv. 21-24). Isaiah creates a powerful image in this passage of God’s sovereignty over the universe. First, he establishes that God’s power is universal and not territorial. Then the prophet shows the significance of human wisdom and power in light of God’s sovereignty. Finally, Isaiah declares God’s authority over all earthly governments. Truly there is no power on earth or in heaven which can claim equality with God.

God is the all-powerful creator (vv. 25-28). If you stop to consider the vastness of the universe, two things become readily apparent. First, we come aware of just how small and insignificant we seem in comparison with the totality of God’s creation. Second, you begin to appreciate God’s awesome power, his limitless knowledge, as well as his eternal omnipresence. Not only is God the creator and sustainer of all that exists, he is the owner. When we come to comprehend God’s position in the universe more fully it becomes clear for us to acknowledge his Lordship in our lives.

God is the caring helper (vv. 10-11, 29-31). God’s picture of God is more than one-dimensional. While the prophet sees the power and greatness of God, he also shows us the tender and loving side of God’s nature. Human beings may be only a small part of God’s overall creation, but our Creator relates to us with tender love and care. His power in us limits the extent of his concern for our daily needs. Isaiah pictures God as a loving shepherd who gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them close to his heart. Verses 29-31 reminds us that when we are weak God will strengthen us if we place our hope in him. Peter continues this theme of an all-powerful but loving creator in the New Testament when he writes, *Humble yourselves, therefore, under God’s mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you* (I Peter 5:6-7). — Holt

Pressing on in Christ

Focal Passage: *Philippians 3:7-21*

There are many who believe they are climbing the ladder of success, only to later discover that their ladder was leaning on the wrong wall! This was true of the Apostle Paul when he realized that, despite his impressive pedigree (vv. 4-6) none of these credentials achieved salvation. His past achievements paled in comparison to knowing Christ personally and persistently living for him. However, Paul refused to look back and let his past stifle his future. In this chapter, Paul notes that following Christ is a life-time undertaking which requires persistence and diligent effort. We first see that following Christ is:

Family Bible Lesson

A constant pursuit (vv. 7-11). In this passage, Paul uses business and commercial terms to describe his relationship with Christ. In verse seven the word “gain” means “advantage” or “profit.” Everything he once thought was valuable (before Christ) had little or no value compared to knowing and following Christ. He considers his former privileges to be “liabilities” and knowing Christ to be an “asset.” After Paul let Christ take charge of his life, rearrange his priorities, and restructure his ledger, he found true wealth. In verse nine, he also discovered that true righteousness comes from God and not through personal achievements, thus he denounces his own “self-righteousness” which he sought by keeping the law. He now affirms that a right relationship with God is not achieved by man, but given by God. Thus Paul’s new ambition was to “know Christ” (v. 10). The Greek word (*gnosis*) means “knowledge gained through personal experience and intimate companionship.” Knowing Christ and living for him became Paul’s greatest passion and constant pursuit.

Coveted prize (vv. 12-16). In verse 12 he was saying, “The race isn’t over. I have not done all God has for me to do.” The word translated “perfect” means “to reach the

end” or “to bring fulfillment.” Perhaps the greatest indictment of many Christians is that they have quit striving to reach the mark (vv. 13-14). Following Christ no longer seems to be a coveted prize. Paul notes, “This one thing I do ... I press forward to reach the prize of the high calling of Christ Jesus.” He had a single-minded devotion. The Greek word he uses for “reaching out” in verse 13 denotes a runner going hard for the tape, his eyes on nothing but the goal. What a lesson for us today! Too many Christians have given up and taken a sabbatical. They feel they have run their race when, in reality, they haven’t made it past the first lap! Paul had a constant pursuit of the coveted prize, which would be fully realized at the conclusion of his earthly race.

Contrasting persuasions (vv. 17-21). The Christians at Philippi were surrounded by immorality. Paul speaks of those who are “enemies of the cross” (v. 18). We’re not totally certain if he was referring to the members of the church who weren’t really Christians or unbelievers outside the church, or perhaps both. Either way, Paul warned the Philippians to avoid following them but instead to follow his example, and the example of “those who walk according to the pattern you have in us” (v. 17). As Christians we must have our hearts and minds fixed on the things of eternity (vv. 20-21), and thus not imitate the world. The reason many Christians are not involved in the church and serving Christ is because their time, energy, and interests are diverted in a hundred different directions. Their commitment to Christ gets lost in the shuffle. Paul goes on to say in verse 20 we are to “eagerly await the Savior.” We are to live as if Christ will return today, and perhaps he will! Choose Christ and you have something that will never be taken away, an eternal relationship with God that even death cannot destroy (see v. 21). Christians have a prize before them greater and more desirable than anything that could be imagined. We only have one life, and soon it will be past. Our relationship with Christ, and what we do for him, is all that’s going to last. Brethren, we must press on! — Milliken is pastor of Hickory Hills Baptist Church, Mt. Juliet.

Worship the Redeemer

Focal Passages:
Revelation 4:1-3; 5:1-10

We move from the messages of our Chief Shepherd to the sacred place of our Living Savior worthy of our worship. Would not such an experience cause us to come before our Lord with a renewed spirit of humility, a resurrected spirit of honor, and a rejoicing in our heart? Indeed, Jesus is worthy of our worship.

First, there is the reason for our praise. When we realize who Jesus is, what Jesus has done, and what Jesus will do for us, worship should become the utmost desire of our hearts. As we follow John in these glimpses of glory, it should cause us to realize that we are on sacred ground and in the presence of our God of grace and glory.

When our risen Savior invites us into his presence, to hear his voice of triumphant victory, and receive his vision of glory, we have reason to worship our redeemer (ch. 4, v. 1). When we are filled with his spirit, see his clear, consuming, and complete throne of glory, we cannot help but fall down upon our knees and say, “My Lord, and my God!” When we note the multitude about his throne (v. 5), and the majesty of him who is on the throne (v. 6), we cannot but have a reason to worship our redeemer (vv. 7-11).

stands by us and secures us (vv. 4-7).

Three, we have rejoicing in our worship. These glimpses of glory can only leave gladness in our hearts. Every time we come to worship our

glorious King of kings and Lord of lords, why not a sense of gladness? When our past of guilt is forgotten, our sins in the present forgiven, and our future in Jesus fulfilled, why not a sense of gladness? Why should not we sing, “Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name!” (Psalm 103:1). There is a song to be sung, praise to be lifted, and joy to be expressed. When we express adoration for who Jesus is, appreciation for what Jesus has done, and amazement for what Jesus has in store for us, there can only be a rejoicing in our hearts in worship (vv. 8-14). Indeed, may we not say, “Where is God my maker who giveth a song in the night?” (Job 35:10), but may we remember that “...weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning” (Psalm 30:5). We can only praise our redeemer in worship and to say, “Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honor, and glory, and blessing” (ch. 5, v. 12). During SBC annual meeting

Messengers adopt revised BF&M

ORLANDO, Fla. — Debate over Southern Baptists' statement of faith lasted barely one hour June 14 as messengers to the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention overwhelmingly approved a revision of the 1963 Baptist Faith and Message.

After months of speculation about proposed changes to the Southern Baptist Convention's Baptist Faith and Message statement, debate on the convention floor focused on the nuanced question of whether Baptists' ultimate authority is Jesus or the Bible.

Adrian Rogers, chairman of the Baptist Faith and Message Study Committee, introduced the revised document with a brief summary of its contents, despite repeated interruptions of the crowd's applause.

"We have sought to clarify the intention of both previous editions (1925 and 1963) of the Baptist Faith and Message as reflected in Article I, the Scriptures," said the pastor of Bellevue Baptist Church in Cordova. "We have made the total truthfulness and trustworthiness of the Bible

'Priesthood' statement added to preamble

ORLANDO, Fla. — Prior to presenting the revised Baptist Faith and Message statement to convention messengers, the BF&M Study Committee added the following paragraph to the preamble of the report:

"Baptists cherish and defend religious liberty, and deny the right of any secular or religious authority to impose a confession of faith upon a church or body of churches. We honor the principles of soul competency and the priesthood of the believers, affirming altogether both our liberty in Christ and our accountability to each other under the Word of God." ■

even more explicit. And we point to Jesus Christ as the focus of divine revelation."

Rogers said the committee removed the statement identifying "Jesus Christ as 'The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted' because it has been subject to misunderstanding. Jesus Christ cannot be divided from the biblical revelation that is testimony to him.

"We must not claim a knowledge of Christ that is independent of Scripture or in any way in opposition to Scripture."

Leading Baptist moderates and conservatives alike agreed afterward that

the debate provided a microcosm of partisan tensions that has divided the nation's largest Protestant denomination over the last 20 years. Some viewed the debate as the culmination of the battle for

the Bible launched in 1979.

From a conservative perspective, Southern Baptists have cemented their conviction that the Bible is the written Word of God. For moderates, the SBC has elevated the Bible to an object of worship, rather than an inspired document that points believers to Christ.

"Ladies and gentlemen, this is what it all comes down to. The issue is whether the Bible is the word of God or merely a record of God's Word," Albert Mohler, president of Southern Baptist Theological

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Birthday bash held for CP

ORLANDO, Fla. — Grammy-winning musical artist Larnelle Harris and syndicated talk show host Dennis Swanberg headlined a June 13 celebration of the 75th anniversary of Southern Baptists' Cooperative Program.

Hosted by Swanberg, the celebration was part of the opening session of the June 13-14 Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting at the Orange County Convention Center here.

The Cooperative Program is the channel by which Southern Baptists finance missions and ministry endeavors of Baptist state conventions and national and international outreach efforts of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Morris H. Chapman, president and chief executive officer of the SBC Executive Committee, presented the inaugural M.E. Dodd award to Jim Henry, senior pastor of First Baptist Church, Orlando, Fla., and his wife, Jeanette. Henry, a native Tennessean, formerly served as pastor of Two Rivers Baptist Church, Nashville.

"The Dodd award is for lifetime achievement to a person or congregation who has demonstrated continuous excellence in giving to the Cooperative Program," Chapman said.

Dodd, longtime pastor of First Baptist Church, Shreveport, La., chaired the committee that in 1925 recommended creation of the Cooperative Program. Dodd's granddaughter,


Responding, Henry said, "This is for Dr. Dodd and our spiritual forefathers who had heart and vision to fulfill what God had for the Southern Baptist Convention in diagramming the most magnificent way to reach the world for Christ."

Since 1925, more than \$1.6 billion has been given through the Cooperative Program. A total of 6,181,393 international baptisms have been recorded and more than 13,000 missionaries have been sent around the world. On the home front, the Cooperative Program has supported 6,683 missionaries,

helping Baptists record 24 million baptisms.

The celebration also included videotaped greetings from Christian entertainers Sandi Patti and Rebecca St. James, actor Kirk Cameron, Republican presidential candidate Alan Keyes, author and speaker Joni Eareckson Tada, Christian television personality Pat Robertson, former Seattle Seahawks football player Ken Hutcherson, and Tennessee Titans coach Jeff Fisher.

After a litany of humorous impersonations including former President Ronald Reagan and the late John Wayne, Swanberg introduced a moving video presentation in memory of slain missionary Mavis Pate. A native of Louisiana, Pate was a missionary nurse who was shot and killed by

Arab terrorists in 1972.

"The real stars, the heroes, are those who left friends, to follow the will of God," Swanberg said.

Larnelle Harris, a deacon at Maple Grove Baptist Church in Louisville, Ky., bade more than 12,000 messengers to their feet with several selections. Later, he signed autographs and met givers at the Cooperative Program booth in the exhibit hall.

Since recording his album in 1975, Harris has collected five Grammy and 11 Dove awards. ■

Protesters arrested at SBC

ORLANDO, Fla. — Flanked by sheriff's deputies, 31 protesters were marched quickly to three white vans parked near the far corner of the Orange County Convention Center as the June 14 business session began during the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Twenty-seven of those arrested are with Soulforce, a national network of homosexual activists led by Mel White, and four people represented People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), according to the Orange County Sheriff's Department. White is Soulforce's founder and a former associate of Jerry Falwell. White later announced he was a homosexual.

Soulforce notified their members last month that a

prayer vigil was planned at the SBC annual meeting as part of a long-term civil disobedience at national and regional church conferences.

The SBC became target when language proposed to clarify Baptist beliefs in the Baptist Faith and Message included references to homosexuality.

"Southern Baptists teaching and practices are spiritual violence," White said just before an Orange County sheriff began making arrests.

Jack Wilkerson, SBC president for business and finance, said he met with White June 13, at White's request, to discuss plans for the protest.

"I told him we would receive him in the spirit of Christ," Wilkerson said, "but we would not allow him to disrupt our convention." ■
