CP giving remains steady

BRENTWOOD — Even with the "love-Sunday month," gifts through the Cooperative Program remain ahead of last year's pace and are on target to meet budget after seven months of the current fiscal year, according to figures released by the accounting office of the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

Monies typically received by churches on the "fifth" Sunday do not arrive at the TBC in time to be counted that month, explained James Porch, TBC executive director-treasurer. In any case, those monies received the last Sunday in May will be included in the June total, he said.

May TBC churches sent \$2,279 through the CP giving channel.

For the year-to-date, Tennessee Baptists have given \$76,551 through the CP, an increase of \$653,046 or 3.25 percent over the same time last year.

Gifts are \$36,221 or 0.17 percent over current budget needs. "We are excited that our churches are continuing to give financially to meet missions ministry needs not only in Tennessee, but around the world," Porch said. □

Crossover 2005 uses multifaceted approach

BRENTWOOD — Crossover 2005, the multifaceted evangelism thrust preceding this year's Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, will involve the largest number of volunteers, host churches, and diverse ministries in the history of the annual project begun in 1989.

More than 13,000 volunteers will work with 262 host churches in a 40-mile radius of the greater Nashville area where 1.3 million people reside. It is estimated that 80 percent do not attend any church.

Most Crossover activities will take place on Saturday, June 18.

Crossover sponsors include the North American Mission Board, the Tennessee Baptist Convention, and seven area associations. Also, LifeWay Christian Resources is coordinating the largest venue, personal evangelism, with 8,042 volunteers involved.

Other Crossover venues are: sports evangelism, prayer journeys, block parties, ethnic ministries, kindness explosion, and

collegiate evangelism.

Don Smith, national Crossover coordinator from NAMB, said, "There is a lot of excitement and enthusiasm about Crossover Nashville. Our goal is to be intentionally evangelistic and see people come to know Christ. We've been praying that the Lord would give us five thousand professions of faith."

Smith attributed the large response in part to aggressive promotion by Southern Baptist Convention President Bobby Welch who will participate in the personal evangelism venue.

Smith cited first-time Crossover ministries including a block party for special-needs children and their families at the Nashville Convention Center. Also, motorcyclists will gather at The Coliseum for a toy run to Riverfront Park where food, a Christian concert, and a gospel witness will take place. Toys will be distributed to children's hospitals, cancer, and burn centers in the area. In addition, the International Association of Gleaners will bring an 18-wheeler to Nashville loaded with potatoes to be bagged

and distributed to low-income families along with a gospel witness. Potatoes also will be distributed to local food pantries.

TBC Executive Director James

Porch said "the full impact of Crossover Nashville can only be known in time, maybe a long time, and in the hearts and lives of people and, hopefully, a change for a better society."

Porch praised TBC staff members "for devoting a priority of energy, skills, and passion in assisting in this ministry. Tennessee Baptists honor the entire Crossover evangelism event through the initiatives of readiness to serve, willingness to participate in training, and fervent attention to prayer. May our

Heavenly Father be honored and may people experience new life in Christ."

Jerry Essary, TBC ministry strategist and Crossover coordinator, predicted that Crossover "is going to have an unbelievable impact on the greater Nashville area.

"I believe so many people will come to know Christ that the very moral climate of Nashville will be affected for years to come."

Noting that volunteers are coming from 50 states and at least two foreign countries, Essary called the response "overwhelming. Each volunteer is coming to minister the love of God by sharing their faith with thousands of people. Churches in the greater Nashville area have responded to the task of getting the gospel to the people in their respective communities. Many of these churches will be impacted in a great way as they see hundreds of people come to know Christ as Savior and Lord.

"It will be exciting to see what God will do," Essary said. □ — See page 6 for a complete list of Crossover activities and ministries.

TBCH to build residential facility on grounds of Knoxville church

KNOXVILLE — Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes will build a permanent residential facility for children in Knoxville on the campus of Grace Baptist Church here, according to TBCH President Bryant Millsaps.

TBCH trustees approved the partnership with the church on May 3, while church members gave their approval on May 15.

While TBCH has a family preservation ministry in Knoxville, Millsaps said the lack of a residential home has limited "our capacity to meet the needs of children in crisis in one of our major cities." Earlier, TBCH provided residential care in Knoxville in a leased facility that was closed three years ago.

Bill Chastain, director of the northeast region of TBCH, said, "This will give us an opportunity to meet the needs of children in our city. It also will give churches in this area an opportunity for hands-on ministry and more of a feeling of ownership of Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes."

The new home will have the capacity to house eight children in

the care of a house parent couple. In addition, housing for a couple providing relief care will be provided.

Millsaps praised the 3,700-member church and its senior pastor, Ron Stewart, for their strong support of TBCH through the years and for providing land on their 67.5-acre church campus.

Stewart said, "The members of Grace Baptist Church are very excited about helping to bring the ministry of the Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes to Knox County. We are grateful that the Lord has opened another door of ministry for the churches of East Tennessee."

Millsaps said the opportunity to build the Knoxville facility began with a gift exceeding \$2 million from the estate of Elmer and Kathleen McGlothlin, members of Lyons Creek Baptist Church, Strawberry Plains.

"The board designated that money to be held in reserve until a decision could be made about a facility in Knoxville," Millsaps said, adding that he hopes groundbreaking and construction will begin by mid-July.

The home will be named in memory of the McGlothlins. □

Knoxville pastor to be nominated for SBC office

NASHVILLE — Knoxville pastor and past Tennessee Baptist Convention president Mike Boyd will be nominated as first vice president of the Southern Baptist Convention when messengers meet here June 21-22.

Boyd, senior pastor of Wallace Memorial Baptist Church, Knoxville, since November of 1997, will be nominated by current TBC president Roger Freeman, pastor of First Baptist Church, Clarksville.

Freeman noted that since the convention is being held in Tennessee "it seemed appropriate that one of our Tennessee Baptist leaders be nominated for office in our convention.

"Mike Boyd represents all that is good and holy and progressive in a Southern Baptist pastor," Freeman said.

He added that Boyd seemed to be a natural fit for the post also because of his experience as a FAITH trainer and pastor and his relationship to FAITH originator Bobby Welch, current

president of the SBC who is expected to be re-elected to another one-year term at the annual meeting in Nashville.

Wallace Memorial, named for famed Southern Baptist missionary Bill Wallace who died in a prison in China, was one of the first churches trained in the FAITH evangelistic outreach program.

In addition to serving as TBC

president in 2003-04, Boyd's denominational service includes membership on the TBC Executive Board. Boyd also is being

nominated by the SBC Committee on Nominations to serve as a trustee of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, where he earned both his master of divinity and doctor of ministry degrees. A native of Memphis, Boyd also is a graduate of Union University in Jackson.

TBC choirs record for new album, honor Mary McDonald

KNOXVILLE — The Tennessee Ladies Chorus and Tennessee Mens Chorale presented a concert in an evening of worship at Central Baptist Church Fountain City here on May 5.

More than 150 music leaders from churches all across the state comprised the two choirs for the concert, which was recorded for release later this summer.

These groups are the performing choirs of the Tennessee Baptist Church Music Conference, and are both directed by Paul Clark, worship and music specialist with the Tennessee Baptist Convention staff.

"It is hard to describe the thrill of standing before these choirs as they sing their songs of praise and as we together worship through music expression," Clark said.

"These are talented people committed to their own local church music ministries, and the level of musicianship is exceeded only by the evident desire to sing for God's glory."

The concert was scheduled at Central Baptist as a part of celebration commemorating Mary McDonald's 20 years of service and ministry with the Tennessee Mens Chorale. The church is McDonald's home

church where she serves presently as organist.

The Tennessee Baptist Church Music Conference commissioned an anthem to be composed and published in honor of Mary. Composer/arranger Craig Courtney was selected for the task, and was present to accompany the combined choir's debut of the anthem as a part of the evening's festivities.

Dave Briley, minister of music at Judson Baptist Church, Nashville, and president of the Tennessee Mens Chorale, presented commemorative items to McDonald and expressed appreciation for her years of service as well as a desire for the ministry together to continue.

"I have never considered accompanying the Mens Chorale anything but a privilege," McDonald responded.

"It humbles me to be honored for doing something that I love so dearly. My heart is full to overflowing with gratitude for the honors you bestowed upon me. I will never forget this special night. Together, let us press on to even greater milestones that lie ahead."

Among those present at the concert were C.L. Huling, one of

McDonald's ministers of music, and also the very first president of the Tennessee Baptist Mens Chorale; Louis Ball, one of her music professors from Carson-Newman College days who also was the very first conductor of the Chorale; and Julian Suggs, who served as director of the Chorale and of the Tennessee Baptist Music Department until 2000, when he retired from the convention staff.

At Clark's invitation Suggs led the chorale in singing, "At Calvary," one of many arrangements McDonald composed during his tenure with TBC.

Clark noted the wealth of talent with which Tennessee Baptists have been blessed. Calling attention to the other accompanists he noted, "Vicki Wright, organist from First Baptist Church, Nashville, and Dora Ann Purdy, pianist from Forest Hills Baptist in Nashville are outstanding musicians with very unique strengths." Purdy is piano accompanist for the Chorus, and Wright plays organ for both the Chorus and the Chorale.

The "live" compact disk recording from the May 5 concert to be released this summer will include some pieces

that have become concert favorites.

The *Baptist and Reflector* will include an announcement once a date of release has been confirmed.

Remaining performance schedules for the Tennessee Ladies Chorus and Tennessee Mens Chorale includes the Tennessee Music Ministry Leadership Conference, Aug. 12-13, Brentwood Baptist Church Brentwood, and the annual meeting of the Tennessee Baptist Convention at First Baptist Church, Clarksville, in November. □

Tennessee summer missionaries commissioned to serve

BRENTWOOD — More than 60 students have been appointed by Baptist Collegiate Ministries, North American Mission Board, and other local ministries to serve in missions this summer across Tennessee. These students will serve in a variety of ministry opportunities including VBS, youth and children's ministry, inner city, resort ministries, sports, deaf ministries, church planting, and many others.

During May 25-27, these summer missionaries gathered at the Baptist Center for the Tennessee Summer Missions Orientation (TSMO) for a time of training.

"The orientation is a valuable tool because it is educational in terms of training, ministry awareness, motivation, and team building," says Beverly Smothers, Tennessee Baptist Convention strategic ministries specialist who leads the TSMO.

"TSMO also gives students the opportunity to come together for fellowship, worship, encouragement, and challenge before they hit the field for the summer," says Bruce Edwards, TBC youth ministries specialist who also serves on the TSMO planning committee.

These students will be serving 10-week assignments with ministries and locations which include Christian Women's Job Corps, Nashville and Jackson; Brentwood Baptist Deaf Church, Brentwood; Dyer Baptist Association, Dyersburg; Hale Community Ministries, Elizabethton; Western Heights Baptist Center, Knoxville; Smoky Mountain Resort Ministries, Gatlinburg; Camp Agape, Benton; Street Reach, Memphis; Tennessee Baptist

Children's Home and Boys Ranch; Montgomery Village Baptist Center, Knoxville; Ocoee Outreach, Cleveland; Appalachian Outreach, Jefferson City; Chilhowee Area Ministries, Maryville; and a new church start in Clarksville, Legacy Baptist Church. Two travel teams will also serve as TBC camp staff and work with churches across the state in VBS and youth ministry.

Many of these ministries are funded in part through the Cooperative Program and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions (GOTM). "TSMO gives us a chance to make sure the students understand about who we are as Tennessee Baptists and the importance of our churches giving through the Cooperative Program and GOTM," says Edwards.

Ministry site supervisors and directors utilize skills and talents of the students to enhance their ongoing ministries during the summer months.

"Many of our supervisors could not do alone what they can do together collectively with summer missionaries. For many of these ministry areas, if summer missionaries were not there, the ministry would not happen. Thus, there would be boys and girls, teenagers, and adults who might not hear and receive the gospel message," says Edwards.

Smothers agrees to the importance of

the service these students provide during the summer. "Student missionaries provide needed person-power at ministry venues. They bring energy, enthusiasm, and creativity to a variety of God's ministries across Tennessee," she says.

Throughout the three days much of the activities were geared toward the theme of the orientation, "The Amazing Grace." Students were given opportunities to share their own personal journey of how God has called them to serve this summer to share His amazing grace with those to whom they will minister.

Students received training in evangelism, leading children and youth activities, working with mission teams, and organizing worship services.

TSMO also provides the opportunity for students serving in various locations to interact and learn from each other. For many students this is their first missions experience or first time away from home, and new friendships formed at TSMO are very valuable throughout the summer as they serve.

"There is a good balance of training and fellowship that brings the summer missionaries closer," says Edwards.

Times of praise and worship, Bible study, and prayer are provided. On the last evening of the orientation, students participated in a time of commissioning and a prayerwalk to pray for every team.

Norman and Hope Davis of Clinton and former contestants on the CBS reality show, "The Amazing Race," were guest speakers at the chapel service. The couple encouraged the students to depend on God's amazing grace this summer as they serve. □

Both sides of the pulpit need to 'happy up'

From both sides of the pulpit

The sign board outside the church read, "No feel-good sermons preached here!" It made me feel bad because I felt that church might not be hearing sermons on joy as the keynote of the New Testament.

Feel-good sermons?

After I had passed the church, I began to think of the general meaning of "gospel" as good news. I wondered whether folks in our churches might be getting feel-bad sermons instead of good news. Later, I read some letters in denominational publications that referred to "feel-good sermons" in a negative way. I suppose those who oppose feel-good sermons are concerned about a sugar-coated, watered-down gospel that fails to address the need for personal repentance. If so, the concern is legitimate. But after repentance and confession of sin, we are to feel joy and its surrounding blessings (John 15:11).

I once read that it's the task of preachers "to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable." I smiled over that and felt I knew what it meant. However, the folks on the pulpit side seem to have digested only the part about afflicting the comfortable. Admittedly, "the comfortable pew" needs the tension of a holy discontent; but it's not to preach peace and cheer about Christ that passes understanding in our pain-filled world (1 Peter 1:6-8).

Unhappy pastors & people?

It seems to me that we can add "pastor rage" and "pew rage" to "road rage" and all the other rages these days. So many people seem angry on both sides of the pulpit. Perhaps Richard Carlson of "Don't Sweat the Small Stuff" fame was correct when he replied to this question: "How would you describe the average person in two words or less?" After a moment's thought, he replied, "Easily bothered." The essence of I Corinthians 13:5 seems to say, "Love isn't easily bothered."

Some folks don't seem happy unless they're unhappy about something and dragging their clouds over the sunshine of others. With personal apologies to classical Puritanism, I nevertheless quote H. L. Mencken: "Puritanism is the haunting fear that someone, somewhere may be happy." They're like the unhappy children who couldn't be pleased in Luke 7:24. The children refused to play either wedding or funeral.

Early Christians were sometimes called "hilarious" (see II Corinthians 9:4), which the Greek word "hilarious" comes from. Basically, it means to be cheerful, glad, gracious. We ought to be like that today. Paul counseled us to forbear — put up with — one another in love (Ephesians 4:2). We can apply some spiritual WD-40 to the squeaks and live together more smoothly.

Unholy Jihads

We know that "jihads" refer to holy wars. However, unholy jihads stir up much unhappiness on both sides of the pulpit. Even holy jihads can warp our spiritual sensitivities. My name is not Pollyanna, nor am I naive. But over the past generation of

theological and music-worship wars, I've stayed friends with most folks on all sides. I'm glad to state my convictions, but I dislike being labeled. So when questioned about my position during these years, I've consistently replied, "Fundamentally, I consider myself to be a liberal-minded conservative." This answer pretty much catches up all the theological labeling words. Worship music is a bit trickier, but I'm charitable on that subject also.

In my personal experiences in Communist Russia and China, no Christian there ever asked me about the outer circles of my belief. It was enough for them that our hearts beat together in Christ. As Paul longed for Syzygus to reconcile Euodia (Harmony) and Syntyche (Fragrance), I too long for us to be in syzygy with Christ (see Philippians 4:1-3's footnote in the NIV or other translations).

Christ is our center of concentric circles of eternal being. He is the focal point. That said, life is too short for us to be unhappy with other Christians as long as we are united in Christ — even if we differ in some beliefs. I think it was Cicero who once said something like this: "We shouldn't be too unhappy that we can't make others behave as we want them to when we can't even make ourselves behave as we would like."

"Happy up!"

When we were raising our three boys, one of them would sometimes have an early morning problem and say, "It's going to be a bad day." I would reply, "It's going to be the kind of day you make it." If one of the boys persisted in being pouty or negative, I would often say, "Happy up!" Recently son Steve said he

knew what I meant and that he now uses that expression as a parent. Churches need to happy up!

Jesus said much the same thing but used different words. He would encourage disciples to be of good cheer or to take heart. Though He himself was a Man of Sorrows, His overarching themes were love, joy, and hope. When people came to Jesus for a sermon or healing, He never left them feeling bad unless they failed to exercise faith and repentance. Then the unbelieving and unrepentant went away sorrowful. But it wasn't because of Jesus' sermon; rather, it was because of their own response.

Jesus came to seek and save the lost (Luke 19:10). He was the loving pastor-shepherd (John 10). He came with love to find and rescue those who felt bad and were hurting. He did not come to judge and condemn but to deliver. Only those who refuse Jesus need feel bad. As Emerson noted, "There is no beautifier of complexion, or form, or behavior, like the wish to scatter joy and not pain around us."

Put on a happy faith!

In half a century of ministry, I've experienced and witnessed enough misery to last more than a lifetime. Still, the dominant note of my life and faith is one of joy and happiness.

Despite anyone's interpersonal relationship problems and depressing circumstances, I counsel them to put on a happy faith and let it show on the face. "Be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you" (Ephesians 4:32). □ — Copyright 2005 by Johnnie C. Sad letters

Occasionally I receive letters I cannot print for one reason or another. I recently received two letters that quite frankly caused me a lot of heartache, but for different reasons.

The first letter came from an elderly lady who lives in our state. She wrote me that she had been diagnosed with a disease and had begun taking chemotherapy treatments. She and her husband are both retired and have no health insurance. As one would expect, the bills are coming in and they do not have the money to pay them. Her question to me, "Is there anything anyone can do to help us?"

Talk about wanting to cry. I could see and hear her despair in her handwritten note. Other than pray, which I have done, there is nothing else I know to do or say. I would hope that she has talked with her pastor and others who have tried to help her find agencies that might provide the financial help she needs.

The second letter also "broke my heart," but in a much different way.

This letter writer was upset that the *Baptist and Reflector* had run a photo of Gov. Phil Bredesen in the May 18 issue.

The writer certainly was no fan of the governor and made a lot of strong accusations against him. Whether they were true or not really doesn't matter. What bothers me is that the writer, a member of a Baptist church in our state, failed to "get the point" about why the photo was used.

Roger Freeman, our TBC president, had the vision to provide Holman Christian Standard Bibles to every legislator in Tennessee, along with Gov. Bredesen. Executive Board members and TBC staff took the Bibles to the Capitol and personally delivered them to legislators and as they could, prayed with them. There was nothing political intended. Bibles were delivered to everyone regardless of political party.

It saddens me to think that Christians would oppose this. Whether we agree politically with our president, governor, mayor, senators, etc., doesn't really matter. What does matter is that we pray for our political leaders and pray that they would seek God's will in all they do. If we can't pray for our leaders, whether we like them or not, then we have a serious problem.

Two letter writers — one with a hopeless heart, one with a hardened heart. Both need our prayers. □

Missing at winning: What message is your child learning?

Parent speaks

For many families, sports are part of summertime activities. How can parents help their children enjoy sports, increase physical endurance, yet learn sportsmanship? Look at the following anecdote:

Brad, a 10-year-old, stands at the plate, a baseball bat over his right shoulder, his eyes on the ball. Bases are loaded with outs against his team. The umpire mounts to get a hit. The umpire calls out, "Strike one." Brad gets a better grip on the bat, swings, and misses again. "Strike two." His hands are shaking. Perspiration trickles down his cheeks. He searches the yelling crowd for his mom and dad. Then, with eyes on the pitcher, he watches a curve ball

make its way from the mound. Should he try again, or let it pass and hope it will be called a "ball"? At the last moment, he swings ... and misses.

Striking out isn't the problem. It's facing his family and the coach.

As a parent, which of the following insights on this issue represents you?

(1) A quote attributed to Vincent Lombardi, coach of the Green Bay Packers said, "Winning isn't everything, it's the only thing."

(2) David Vickey, Ph.D., founder and director of the Behavioral Health Clinic in Jackson, says that parents usually have good intentions about involving their children in sports. However, if winning at all cost is expected, these traits may develop:

- lower performance;
- more emphasis on failing, rather than succeeding;
- the joy of the sport is lost;

- children burn out quickly;
- parents may show their own insecurities by living vicariously through their children.

(2) An elementary school principal and the father of two children says, "Sports play an important role in developing the child. I try to stress that children play to the best of their ability, but if they lose, they must learn to accept it with grace. In every game, someone wins — and someone loses." Like other professionals, he sees stress disorders, lower school performance, and behavior problems surface when parents place unrealistic expectations on children.

Here are some tips for building a relationship between parents, coaches, and children.

As your child chooses a sport he or she enjoys, look for a coach who has these characteristics:

- (1) Displays high Christian values and morals.
- (2) Respects parents point of

view (when discussed in private) regarding a decision.

(3) Is knowledgeable about developmental skills required for the sport.

(4) Possesses a cooperative spirit.

(5) Maintains a sense of fair play.

(6) Knows how to work with others.

(7) Brings out the best in people.

(8) Has a sense of humor.

(9) Honors this motto: It's not whether you win or lose; but how you play the game.

Some children are interested in organized sports; others are not. Regardless of your child's choice, parents can help their child feel good about their decision by spending time together as a family. Childs, a member of West Franklin Baptist Church, Franklin, is leading the development of prayer gardens at Linden Valley Baptist Conference Center, Newport.

Also she just led a team of 12 Tennessee Baptists to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, May 20-29 where they completed the Elizabeth Oates Memorial Prayer Garden and did landscaping at a Baptist missionary training center along with other ministries. Oates was a missionary from Tennessee to Brazil for 40 years. The work also was to support the Tennessee WMU/Rio WMU Partnership.

Childs, the wife of William "Bo" Childs, president, Tennessee Baptist Foundation,

Brentwood, was asked to lead the development of the prayer gardens at the TBC conference centers in 2002 by Joy Fenner, interim executive director, Tennessee WMU, at the time. Fenner also developed funds for the prayer gardens.

Childs agreed and soon had met with Mark LeMay, TBC facilities manager, visited the two sites, and completed some landscape drawings.

The two prayer gardens are "so beautiful although they are different. They are beautiful in their own way," she described. The garden at Linden Valley is in a sunny setting near the Buffalo River which flows through the West Tennessee camp.

The garden at Carson Springs is shaded because of the forested, hilly setting of the property in East Tennessee.

The garden at Linden Valley has recently been relocated with help from Tim Bearden, senior manager, to the site along the river, which will be more enticing to visitors, said Childs. John Coblenz of the Linden Valley staff recently built and installed two arches in the garden, she added.

Carson Springs has a similar entranceway to host climbing flowers for several years which was built by a staff member there under the direction of Keith McKinney, manager.

Childs has transported many flowers from her home garden for transplant to the two prayer gardens. With funds already raised, other plants, trees, and flowers have been added. Recently four Baptist individuals gave four benches which were added to the gardens.

Several volunteers have worked in the prayer gardens with Childs over the three years she has worked on them. They include Don Mauldin, retired TBC staff member; Tim Hornbeak of Forest Hills Baptist Church, Nashville; Kay Rush, WMU member of West Franklin Baptist Church, Franklin; Barbara Smith, WMU member of Brook Hollow Baptist Church, Nashville; and Bo Childs.

Just a few months after she started working on the prayer gardens, Sharon Fairchild, missionary to Rio de Janeiro, asked Childs if she would lead in the development of the Elizabeth Oates Memorial Prayer Garden. Childs said yes.

Childs had been to Brazil three times, joining teams from the foundation which built churches.

So she traveled there in 2004 with a state WMU team to develop the memorial. WMU leaders in Brazil asked her to return to expand the garden and do other landscaping and ministry. Childs agreed again, this time to recruit a team and lead it.

The team, made up of men and women, received \$3,500 from the 2005 Tennessee WMU Get-Together for the projects. They also furnished and decorated a guest room at the missionary training center, got to know some of the center students, and led some evangelistic activities.

"We just had a super, super time. Everything went so smoothly," she said. The group not only accomplished what they hoped, but more. At one point, students helped form an assembly line to move floor tile

to the third floor of a building. They sang as they moved the tile, described Childs. The Tennesseans also visited a worship service in a church several of them helped build through the foundation.

Now that she has returned from Brazil, Childs hopes to recruit volunteers who live close to Linden and Newport who will go and check on the gardens, work in them if possible, and report any needs to her.

Childs said she learned gardening while growing up in Mobile, Ala., from her grandmother, whose favorite flowers were zinnias, azaleas, sweet peas, and lilies.

"It's something I've always loved," she said.

She also learned about gardening while she and Bo lived in Portland, Ore., where gardens are plentiful because of the climate which includes a daily mist.

They lived there for four years where he was head of the

foundation for the Northwest Baptist Convention. Elizabeth was volunteer Girls in Action consultant for the convention. She is a WMU conference leader and former team leader in Tennessee.

Actually, Tennessee has more rainfall than Portland, she noted. The Childs have lived in Tennessee for 12 years.

Childs said she has visited the prayer gardens at LifeWay, Glorieta (N.M.) Conference Center, and LifeWay Ridgecrest (N.C.) Conference Center and gardens at churches.

"What a wonderful place for people to come and meditate and pray," she said.

She was a shy girl a young woman, she described. I never dreamed I would ever be able to do, but God is good." She said she has learned to "be available" to God.

Crossover ministries target diverse groups prior to SBC

NASHVILLE — Crossover ministries are planned to reach diverse groups, including internationals, college students, children and teens interested in sharpening sports skills, motorcyclists, children with special needs and their families, families enjoying a Saturday outdoors in their communities, and people who respond to a knock on their door.

Following is a summary of Crossover activities.

Sports Clinics — Saturday morning sports clinics for children and teens will be held at five churches and one community center. Volunteers from outside Nashville will provide training in skills related to basketball, soccer, baseball, volleyball, and track, depending on facilities and location. Members of area churches will be on hand to cultivate relationships and share devotionals with a time for response.

John Garner, direction of recreation and sports ministry for LifeWay Chris-

tian Resources, said, "The sports clinics have an evangelistic slant to reach participants and their parents."

Prayer — Prayer journeys or prayer walking has been taking place for several months to "prepare the soil" for evangelism, according to TBC prayer strategist Don Pierson. Prison inmates also have been praying daily for Crossover for several months. Members of the TBC staff devoted part of one day to prayer walking in downtown Nashville. Members of host churches have been saturating their neighborhoods with prayer, and volunteers from around the country will join them on Friday and Saturday, June 17-18.

Personal Evangelism — Southern Baptist Convention President Bobby Welch will be among the more than 8,000 volunteers working with 157 host churches to visit door to door. Participants will gather at 10 a.m. for a visitation kickoff at the Gaylord Entertainment Center and return for a celebration rally at 6:30 p.m.

Block Parties — Approximately 30 block parties will be held throughout

the Crossover mission field staffed by about 1,000 volunteers. Coordinator Jay Austin, pastor of Life Community Church of Nashville, said block parties, held outdoors and offering food and entertainment, often reach people who would not respond to an invitation to church. It is hoped that some block parties will lay the foundation for new churches.

Ethnic Ministries — People living in the Nashville area from countries around the world will gather at the Tennessee State Fairgrounds for an International Festival of entertainment, music, food, giveaways, and the opportunity to hear the gospel presented.

Also, more than 1,000 volunteers will spend June 11-19 in Tennessee, working with Hispanic Baptist churches to reach people for Christ and to start at least 10 new churches.

"My dream is to have a Hispanic church for every 12,000 Hispanics statewide," said Chuy Avila, Hispanic church starter for the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

Kindness Explosion — An estimated 600 volunteers will with host churches to carry out acts of kindness ranging from providing bottles of water on a hot day, offering coin wash loads of laundry, and cleaning dirty windshields.

Beverly Smothers, TBC strategies specialist and one of the Kindness Explosion coordinators, said the purpose of the project is "approach people in the marketplace and meet physical needs while sharing a spiritual witness as opportunities arise."

Collegiate Evangelism — The Baptist Collegiate Ministry at Middle Tennessee State University, five churches, and 130 volunteers are joining forces to reach out to MTSU students with free food, entertainment and the good news that God loves them.

"This is an opportunity for students to know that churches in the area care about them and to get connected to churches," said Bill Choate, TBC collegiate ministries leader. □

AFA ends boycott of Disney; SBC may act in June

TUPELO, Miss. — The American Family Association, which led the charge against the Walt Disney conglomerate over moral values in the mid-1990s, is ending its Disney boycott.

"We feel after nine years of boycotting Disney we have made our point," AFA President Tim Wildmon said in an article in the ministry's June 2005 newsletter.

In a May 23 news release, Wildmon said boycotts are a "last resort" for the AFA. He said AFA is not shrinking back from the issues it had raised with Disney but is taking the opportunity to address the same issues more broadly "on a crowded cultural battlefield."

AFA, in launching its Disney boycott in 1996, criticized the entertainment conglomerate for what the AFA described as a decline in moral and family values from the days of founder Walt Disney. The American Family Association, based in Tupelo, Miss., primarily focuses its energies on the influence of television and other media on families.

A year earlier the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights had called for a boycott of Disney products, parks, and the company's cable channel over the Dis-

ney/Miramax film "Priest."

The boycott shifted into high gear nationwide when messengers to the 1997 Southern Baptist Convention adopted a resolution, "On Moral Stewardship and the Disney Company," in which Southern Baptists were urged to "take the stewardship of their time, money, and resources so seriously that they refrain from patronizing The Disney Company and any of its related entities." The resolution criticized Disney for "increasingly promoting immoral ideologies such as homosexuality, infidelity, and adultery."

Following the SBC's 1997 action, Focus on the Family, the Assemblies of God, Concerned Women for America, and other religious groups joined in the boycott.

Wildmon said Disney now appears to be more aware of how much its reputation had been damaged among one of its primary constituencies — Christian families. He said it is harder than ever before to find "evidence of new missteps by Disney."

Richard Land, president of the SBC's Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission, said American families are more sensitized than ever to the entertainment industry's ways.

"The intention of the resolution was never to put the Disney Company out of business, but to awaken and energize families to the fact that Disney and every other Hollywood studio has changed course over the past 20 years," Land said.

Any action by the SBC on the Disney boycott would have to be taken by Southern Baptists during their annual meeting.

"It may well be that the Southern Baptist Convention this June decides to declare victory in this matter and move on," Land said, "but I learned a long time ago not to predict what a Southern Baptist Convention meeting in session may or may not do."

The next Southern Baptist Convention will be June 21-22 in Nashville.

The entertainment company is not out of the woods, Wildmon added, saying Disney is still on "probation" and that AFA will continue to monitor the company's productions. □

Resolution calls for churches to investigate schools

COLUMBIA, S.C. — A group that tried last year to get Southern Baptists to encourage parents to pull their children out of public schools is now asking the Southern Baptist Convention to urge churches to investigate whether their local school systems support homosexuality.

South Carolina-based Exodus Mandate, which promotes home schooling and Christian schools, is backing a resolution proposed by Voddie Baucham Jr., a Southern Baptist lecturer, preacher, and author; and Bruce

Shortt, a lawyer, home-schooling father and author, according to a statement on the group's web site.

The 2004 resolution asked Southern Baptists to remove their children from "godless" and "anti-Christian" public schools. The SBC Resolutions Committee did not endorse the resolution, which was proposed by Shortt and T.C. Pinckney of Virginia.

Instead, the committee brought to the SBC annual meeting a resolution calling on Baptists to "aggressively engage the culture by speaking the truth in love concerning every aspect of life, public and private."

Pinckney made a motion to add the anti-public school language, but it failed.

This year, Shortt and Baucham have submitted a resolution that encourages every SBC church to investigate whether its local school district has a homosexual club or any

curriculum or program attempts to influence children to accept homosexual behavior as a legitimate lifestyle. The resolution urges churches to inform parents and encourage them to remove their children from the schools immediately.

The resolution also recommends Christians work with government schools; ask teachers to make a greater effort to provide and support Christian educational alternatives in public schools, especially for children from low-income and single-parent families; call on Baptists to pray for homosexuals, and criticizes homosexuals who slander Christians by claiming that homosexual behavior has any connection with the civil movement.

The SBC Resolutions Committee will decide whether to present the resolution to messengers for a vote at the SBC annual meeting June 22 in Nashville. □



Food delivery offers bridge for the gospel in S. Thailand

RENTWOOD — When God led me the opportunity to go to Thailand four years ago as a college student through the Missouri Baptist Collegiate Ministry (BCM), I never dreamed what He had planned for me. I served again a year ago as a BCM semester missionary, and now I have the opportunity to assist students in serving in missions. It has given me lasting friendships with Thai friends and a deep love for the Thai people. After the tsunami disaster of December 26 hit Southern Thailand, I have a love for the Thai people that led me to go and assist in any way I could, to share smiles and words of encouragement, and help with physical needs. Even though my desire to go was great, I never expected to be able to go as a part of relief efforts because I did not have the specific skills needed that I did not have. However, I found out about a group of volunteers from First Baptist Church, Cassville, Mo., and I knew God was opening a door for me to join them. I didn't know I would be, and I greatly appreciate the support of my church, First Baptist Church, Heights Baptist, Shelburne, and serving with Southern Baptist churches from another state led me to how God can

multiply our impact when we are willing to join together with others to serve Him.

Our primary responsibility for the week was food distribution. Since I'd never participated in a disaster relief project, I wasn't exactly sure of the "how to" details of distributing food. I was glad when we were directed to deliver food door-to-door to each individual family. During the week we delivered fruits, vegetables, and meat to more than 1,400 families living in 13 temporary housing camps in the Southern Thailand area.

The caring hearts of the Thai people constantly touched me. They were so appreciative of the food. At the same time my heart broke, because I know they would prefer to be the ones helping instead of needing to receive help. The Thais were always concerned about their neighbors. If people were not at home during a food distribution neighbors were always eager to make sure their friends were not left out.

On our first day our project coordinator told us that by the end of the week we would know the camps well and have relationships with the people in each camp. I'll admit that I was skeptical. After all, we were only

in Thailand one week. Fortunately, God proved our coordinator right as I did get to know families in each camp. By the end of the week Thai friends knew my name, and I knew theirs as well. Visiting with them each day became a highlight experience of my trip.

I met a young woman in the camps about my age that spoke English well. Because of this, we became friends quickly. Each day during the food distribution, she was always grateful and gave me something in return, a piece of fruit or a snack she had made. Each day our conversations grew longer, and I could not wait to see her each time and see how her day was going.

When we, as Christians, develop friendships, we are eager to share the most important thing in our lives, our relationship with Christ. I did not have a direct verbal opportunity to share with my new friend about this, but I am amazed that God does not always need our words. This week was about God allowing us to share cabbage, mangoes, and chicken to convey His love to others.

The stories of the people I met are what will make them unforgettable. When we distributed food or visited the camps everyone always smiled, but I knew behind those smiles was a story of grief, pain, and stress over the disruption to their daily lives caused by the tsunami. Some were eager to share. In the midst of many tragic stories, there were also many amazing stories of strength and survival. In response some members of our team had opportunities to pray with individuals and share about God and His purpose for their lives.

One 13-year-old boy talked about losing his mother in the tsunami. He was caught in the water himself for two days before being rescued. I can only imagine his strength and determination. As I listened to his story I wished my Thai language skills were better. My prayer for him is that he will come to know it was our Heavenly Father who gave him the strength to hang on and created him as a special person in His image.

It was such a blessing to go and serve in the tsunami relief efforts. More than anything this experience constantly reminds me of the hope we have in Christ and of the great opportunity we now have to share this hope with the people of Thailand. I pray that through long-term tsunami relief efforts more volunteer teams will go and as a result churches will be planted and many people come to know Christ. □ — Murphree is TBC collegiate ministries specialist.

How to Be Good in a World Gone Bad
by James S. Spiegel
Kregel Publications, 2004

Train yourself to be godly. For physical training is of no value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come.
Timothy 4:7-8

Virtues don't just happen, according to author James Spiegel in his book *How to Be Good in a World Gone Bad*. Becoming virtuous is a direct result of developing good habits. For example, virtuous acts become virtuous bits which develop a virtuous character. It's a matter of training yourself. And Spiegel believes Christians should be disciplining themselves in order to become virtuous people.

To that end, he has written a sort of "self-help" book that examines 22 virtues including self-control, humility, patience, sincerity, courage, kindness, justice, generosity, peace, creativity, wit, discretion and modesty, perseverance, forgiveness, gratitude, wisdom, faith, and love.

Why does Spiegel believe we should be training ourselves? Because "in this life, we forge the characters we take into the next world It can be presumed that we take these attributes with us into heaven or hell when we leave this world. No sense otherwise could be made of the notion that the "me" living on earth today will not be the same "me" that survives death and lives on in the next world. Therefore, we must take our moral preparation very seriously indeed."

Each chapter focuses on a single virtue and features examples and practical steps for developing specific virtues. The first virtue Spiegel, a professor of philosophy at Taylor University in Upland, Indiana, addresses is self-control. "Being a morally upright person is, after all, mostly a matter of managing one's impulses and desires Among the qualities that constitute a moral character, then, none are more crucial than the virtue of self-control."

To practice self-control, Spiegel suggests we look at areas of indulgences — consumption — what we eat, work, and purchase — and amusement — how we spend our free time. "What may appear to be moderation relative to our consuming society may actually be absolute gluttony and greed. In practice, self-control in the area (consumption) means keeping a proper diet and avoiding frivolous purchases."

Spiegel talks about his own personal effort to control his time with the television and admits he was a news sports junkie. "After repeated attempts to curb my tendency to overindulge, I finally cut that eye out of its socket. I got rid of my television."

To help develop self-control, Spiegel suggests one should: engage in the spiritual disciplines of prayer, worship, fellowship, study, meditation, confession, submission, celebration, and service; recognize your indulgences; and practice voluntary self-denial.

There is enough food for thought in this book to make worthwhile your time — especially if that's time you're spending now in front of a television watching some entertainment program. Practice the virtue of self-control. Deny yourself some television time. Read this book and meditate on these concepts, all of which are biblically based. "Virtues are not acquired spontaneously through a single act of will They are, as it were, deeply ingrained good habits . . . just as vices are bad habits." □

Not guilty by association

Focal Passage: Romans 3:19-26; 4:1-3; 5:1-2

In a Dennis the Menace cartoon, Dennis is sitting in the car with a friend. He turns to the friend to explain, "Air bags are kinda like God. You know they're there to protect you, but you can't see them." That is a great perspective on faith. God is unseen but trusted to deliver. The writer of Hebrews states the same principle with different language as he pens these words: *Faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen.* As Paul writes his most mature epistle, Romans, he explains the relationship of faith and the defeat of man's sin. By presenting three aspects of the doctrine of justification, Paul is placing faith center stage in the drama called the "History of Humanity."

Romans 3:19-21 reveals the condition which requires our justification. Paul begins with the familiar Greek term "order" which refers to something that is certain and complete. The one thing we know is that, without exception, Jews and Gentiles are sinners under the law and accountable to God. The Law of God is our tutor to the reality that because our works of the flesh are unrighteous, we are guilty before God. One of the major themes of Romans is righteousness or justification, the various verbal and adjectival forms of the Greek root is found 60 times in the epistle. The

contrast Paul presents at this point is the unrighteousness of man as opposed to the total righteousness of God. Such a contrast allows God as judge of humanity to demand our justification. Paul declares the Law of God to be like a doctor that can only provide a diagnosis but no cure. He tells us the law is incapable of providing our needed justification.

Beginning in Romans 3:22-31 and highlighted in Romans 4:1-2, Paul shares the singular characteristic which provides our needed justification. Righteousness can only be acquired by faith. Faith is never any greater than its object; therefore, the faith that justifies is in Jesus Christ alone. When applied to the sin condition, this faith changes our unrighteousness to a state that makes me "just as if I'd never sinned." This faith is greater than an affirmation of truths about Jesus. Earlier "in Romans 3 the reader reads that "sin taints the mind" since "none can understand," that "sin tarnishes the heart" since "no one seeks after God," and "sin taunts the will" since "no one does good." Justifying faith involves the intellect because we comprehend the truth of the gospel. Justifying faith involves the emotions because a person trusting Christ experiences a change of heart resulting in joy everlasting. Justifying faith involves the will because a person possessing this faith makes a conscious decision to change desire and direction. In

Romans 4 Abraham becomes the illustration of justifying faith. *He believed God, and it was credited to him for righteousness.*

Romans 5:1-2 culminates this study of justification by listing the consequences of our new right standing with God. Because of justification we receive "peace with God." This is subjective peace and not objective. This peace is fact-based rather than feeling-based. Our sin declared war with God, but our justification is a declaration of peace.

A second residual effect is access to God. The Jewish temple repeatedly placed barriers to the presence of Holy God. The greatest of these, the veil between the Holy Place and the Holy of Holies, was torn by the hand of God in that Jesus provided for our justification at Calvary. God would no longer say, "stay out!" to the justified believer. He always says, "Come in and stay forever."

The final result of our justification, which Paul mentions here, is the glorious hope. Wiersbe writes, "Peace with God" takes care of our past. "Access to God" takes care of our present, and "Hope of the glory of God" takes care of our future. □ — Adams is pastor of First Baptist Church, Lexington.

Living by the Lord's values

Focal Passage: Ezekiel 7:1-2, 15-16, 19-27

I heard about an elderly couple who credited their long and happy marriage to the husband's ability to tune her out any time by adjusting the volume on his hearing aid! Many people in the church "tune out" parts of God's Word that are hard to understand or difficult to accept. This week's sobering passage falls into the difficult-to-accept category and, if we didn't know better, might tempt us to draw some inaccurate conclusions about the nature of God.

Chapters four through 11 scream "God is righteous!" — even though the word "righteous" isn't found within them. God's righteousness (Psalms 119:137, Revelation 16:5) refers not only to what He does but who He is, and this righteousness was demonstrated in His giving of the Law at Mt. Sinai (Exodus 19-20). It outlined the way of right living and was a covenant between God and the nation of Israel with conditions: keep the covenant and there will be blessing . . . break the covenant and there will be cursing (Deuteronomy 28 outlines in detail the blessings/cursings, and it would be very helpful to study them as a background for this week's text). The Israelites, as was their habit, didn't hold to the conditions of the covenant. They turned away to serve false gods, breaking the first command-

ment (see Ezekiel 8:5, 7, 14, 16), offending the righteousness of God, and bringing down upon themselves the judgment promised.

Now this is where many folks have difficulty. They are troubled by God's apparent harshness and malevolency (e.g., Ezekiel 5:8-17). I have heard some people say they can't believe in a God who would exercise wrath and judgment. They think there is no such thing as hell or a final judgment, and if there is it's only temporary. Just like that elderly man, they "tune out" the parts of the Bible that trouble them, trashing much of the Old Testament — and certainly the book of Revelation — in their pursuit to make God more comfortable and grandfatherly.

A problem arises whenever we start "thinking" about God disengaged from the authority of Scripture. Our powers of reason and logic are flawed and fallen. God's ways and thoughts are infinitely higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9). Those two truths should be enough to convince us we need something objective and completely trustworthy to guide us into truth about life and the nature of God. Of course, we have just what we need in the Bible, God's perfect revelation of Himself to us.

The God of wrath and the God of love observed in Scripture are the same. Based upon the whole counsel of the Word, we comprehend that God's righteousness was just as much displayed in His response

of judgment as it was in His showing the Israelites the way of righteous living in the Law. God wouldn't be God if He didn't act according to His nature. The book of Ezekiel, and much of the Bible, must be interpreted with this backdrop. It should come as no surprise, though, that within this troubling text and throughout the book of Ezekiel we are given a glimpse of God's grace and mercy. In 11:14-21 God promised restoration to Israel, pointing to a future time when He would "put a new spirit within them . . . that they may walk in [His] statutes and keep [His] ordinances and do them."

Aren't you glad we don't have to live under the burden of a conditional covenant like the Israelites? Through the blood of Christ we have entered into a new covenant in which the burden of keeping it is placed squarely upon the shoulders of Christ (study Genesis 15 where God passes through the blood of the slain animals alone and I Corinthians 11:25, Galatians 3-4, and Hebrews 8:6 ff). The judgment and cursings have been replaced with the discipline of our heavenly Father because we have come to Him through His Son, Jesus Christ. Hallelujah! □ — Shockley is pastor of Cedar Hill Baptist Church, Cedar Hill.
