

EDITORIAL



MRS. W. J. Cox, President W.M.U.



The hearts of W.M.U. members yet glow with gratitude for last year's abounding offering to home mission work. Despite the widespread decrease in denominational gifts, the 1931 Thank Offering exceeded its goal by \$15,000, thus proving the abiding power and appeal of missions.

We approach the 1932 March season of prayer and its "Thank Offering for Home Missions" fortified by large faith expressed in courageous goals. We know in Whom we have believed. We also know the needs of the mission fields are even greater than last year and that giving this year for some members will necessarily mean real denial. To offset any decrease in gifts, every society should seek to reach its entire constituency that the gleanings may compensate for any possible reduction in the amount of in-

dividual gifts. As paradoxical as it may seem, lean times are favorable to gratitude and giving. Benevolence thrives in times of want and distress. At this moment, more people are truly grateful for the simple blessings of a means of livelihood, for food and warmth and for shelter than our land has known for many years. We are getting back to the simple, fundamental graces that enrich the soul. The delicacies of life often lead to selfishness; adversity to God's superlatives. This spirit of gratitude which prevails in the hearts of many people will find expression in the "Thank Offering for Home Missions". Some gifts will come from those temporarily in straightened financial circumstances. We can but believe an extra blessing will be upon such offerings because of the spirit in which they are made.

Let us look again at a woman, gaunt with poverty, entering the Temple. She no doubt timidly cast in her two mites because the rich had cast in much. lesus, who had taken a seat opposite the treasury, called His disciples to Him and declared that the poor widow had cast in more than all the rich for they had given of their abundance, she of her want—even all her living. There is something in the spirit of a gift enriching its power, doubling its value. May our gifts this year possess this blessed overplus as they go from loving, grateful hearts, and may earnest prayer back every gift. Mrs. Taylor, of the China Inland Mission-that mission which has never known a debt, never asked for a contribution-said to me that it was nothing short of miraculous the way the gifts always met their needs. If the gifts seemed less in amount than their expenses, the exchange always increased the amounts to meet their needs. She also said that, when adequate amounts failed to come in, they always knew that something somewhere was wrong in the lives of the workers, therefore they called them in and prayed until that thing was recognized and removed. What a tremendous testimony for the power of prayer. Southern Baptists need nothing so much as prayer like this. Such heart-searching prayer would prepare us to live our Christian ideals right in our homes, in our own churches and towns and, through our missionary programs, in our land and other lands. We have Jewish and Catholic neighbors. Right in our own southern Baptist homes thousands of the Negro race live and work day by day. Our relations are so close it is impossible to disguise our interest or lack (Concluded on Page 10)



FROM OUR MISSIONARIES



WINNING INDIAN STUDENTS



This year to Chilocco came a lively lad of thirteen, attractive, keen, bearing the names of two famous old Indian families, Colbert LeFlore. A small city is named for the first name and an Oklahoma county after the surname and both

families have been prominent in governmental and other activities before and after statehood. But in spite of such a background, he was the most mischievous person you ever saw, just into everything. It was almost an impossibility to keep him quiet in B.Y. P.U. or even attentive except when he himself was doing something. Not just in B.Y.P.U. did he get into things: in the dormitory one morning he turned on the fire siren and all the boys came tumbling down, to find that it was only a false alarm. The school authorities showed him carefully the gravity of such an offense and he slowed up a little after that. But nevertheless the leader was exasperated and so were the boys. During one meeting she had to ask him to leave the room entirely and after they were through they discussed what was to be done. Some were for barring him from the service so that the others could convene in peace, but they finally decided they would be "made all things to all men that by all means they might save some" and have patience a little longer.

The time was nearing for the annual fall decision service when the doors of the church are opened and all who wish may join; the leader was explaining carefully to the boys the plan of salvation and the symbolism and beauty of the baptismal service. This was one time that our boy listened and on the following Sunday evening when the in-

vitation was given he was one of the first among twenty-three boys to go forward, confessing Christ as Savior; a few Sundays later he followed his Lord in baptism.

There has been one difficulty that the leader has had especially with this group of intermediate boys, that of getting them to lead in prayer-self-conscious, critical little fellows that they are. It was the last meeting before the Christmas holidays and they had been talking about Christ and the wonderful gift that God, in Him, had given to the world and how thankful we should all be particularly at Christmas time: their boyish hearts were full of wonder and of love for this other Boy who had so blessed the world. They stood as usual to be dismissed by the leader, when Colbert stepped forward and said: "Let's all pray. Couldn't we?" They all bowed their heads and every boy there except one prayed.

We have at Chilocoo Indian School—a government Indian school of eleven hundred students of whom about six hundred are Baptists—seven B.Y.P.U's., with the boys and girls in separate organizations. During the last four years we have baptized three hundred out of these B.Y.P.U's. into the church, sending them back to our Indian Baptist churches in Mississippi, North Carolina and Oklahoma as Christians and trained in the Master's work.—Gladys Sharp, Okla.

"LORD, TEACH US to PRAY"

RATHER recently, while we were holding a meeting out in the big cotton fields of the beautiful valley of the Colorado in the Hornsby Bend Community, we had many interesting experiences as is usual in our work. One morning, after our self-prepared breakfast, we had our devotional hour and planned our day's work. ("We" rejets to the breacher students of Mexican

Raptist Institute at Bastrop, Texas, and myself.) We divided into groups and charted out the big fields in sections of given lines for each group to work. Hundreds of Mexicans-women, children and men-were at work ploughing and hoeing. We armed ourselves with tracts, portions of the Gospets and our own (Spanish) New Testament in our pocket. We were dressed in khaki, laced boots and broad straw bats. Therefore it was easy to walk across the soft ploughed ground. Often we would take the hoe of some man, whose clothing was sweat soaked; we would hand him a tract and ask him to read and rest while we hoed, praying as we worked that the Lord would touch the heart of him as he read.

All morning we had worked from field to field and it was nearing noon. I called to my two companions that we should cross the road and get a drink of water. As we came out of the field, approaching a house, there was an old Mexican woman of the Indian squaw type squatted in the back door smoking. We asked for water and while the boys were drinking. I engaged in conversation with the woman and found out that there was some one sick in the house. I went inside and found on the floor a child less than two years old. seriously ill. I asked the mother to let me help some and I showed her how to prepare the child's diet and otherwise to care for him. As I turned to go I found myself facing an old man, nearing ninety years of age and the victim of a quack "medicine man". I helped him all I could and then told them I would pray. When I finished, the old man took my hand and wanted to kiss it but I withdrew it. He then asked that I give him that prayer that he might learn and pray it, saying that he had never before heard a prayer from a "padre" that he could understand. I told him he could learn to talk to God, that God would be his Father if he would trust Jesus, that he could pray to God in Jesus' name and that he, too, would be answered.

Days passed. One of the preacher boys went back to that home and they asked about the tall "padrecito" who wears boots and prays in a language they can understand.—Rev. Paul C. Bell, Bastrop, Tex.

TWO LITTLE NEW GIRLS

IT was Saturday afternoon at the Baptist Good Will Center. Fifteen precious girls of different nationalities were marching in to the music of a Christian hymn. There was a solemn hush as all bowed in silent prayer, at the close singing softly and reverently "Holy. Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty". Then all joined in singing that beautiful missionary song, "Some One Must Tell Them Who Knows". At the close of this song, two shy little Slovakian girls -barefooted and poorly clad twinsslipped into the room. They attended the Catholic school and church but some one had told them what good times we were having at our Good Will Center on Saturday afternoons.

This particular afternoon the missionary told the story of Ruth. Every girl seemed eager to listen, to ask and to answer questions concerning Bible stories. Soon the new girls felt a little more at home and, during the handwork period, the teacher gave them special attention: they talked excitedly about the choosing of colors for the sweet-peas to hang in the baskets. The missionary asked them to stay a few moments after the others left so she might get their father's name and address. She invited them to come to Sunday school at the Good Will Center the next afternoon but Pauline and Jenny replied: "No, we go to Catholic instruction each Sunday afternoon". But they were very faithful to come to "Happy Helpers" every Saturday afternoon: they learned the songs quickly and soon they were able to tell many Bible stories with very little belp. One day Pauline said to the missionary: "We want to have Sunday school class

too. Could you teach us after we return from learning the catechism on Sunday afternoon?" "Yes indeed", the missionary replied, although she knew how very tired she would be by that time. So at 4 o'clock every Sunday afternoon for several months she taught those Catholic girls and gave them religious papers to take home with them.

How happy they were when their mother told them that they would no longer go to the Catholic school!

"Mother is letting us go to the public school this year", they happily announced at the Good Will Center meeting. Soon they came to the regular Sunday school. The missionary was happy and thankful to the Heavenly Father when they gave their hearts to the Master. Will you pray that they and many other "foreigners" will find their way back to their native lands to tell to others the joy of Christian living?-Mary Headen, Birmingham, Ala.

of it. Stanley Jones tells of a woman missionary in the midst of her Bible lesson who noticed a native woman rise and go out of the room. Shortly she came back and sat down. Rather disconcerted, the missionary later asked her why she went out. The reply was: "I went out to ask your driver if you really meant the wonderful things you said and if you lived it at home. He said you did, so I came back to listen".

We need to express the Gospel message on Main Street and among our "foreigners" on Market Avenue, in our French, Italian and Mexican quarters. The Glad News needs to be interpreted by living epistles in the mining districts, on the Indian reservations. The mountain schools are asking only for a pittance to satisfy the thirst of their young people. Many other phases of home missions are pleading for a chance to live.

During the March Week of Prayer the W.M.U. can follow the stream "that maketh glad" as it flows through all our land, Cuba and the Canal Zone carrying the Water of Life. Everything lives whither the river cometh.

Paul is at Philippi. The rich experiences of a protracted meeting at Corinth linger in memory. With Aquila and Priscilla he had followed the trade in tent making on week days, going into the synagogue every Sabbath. Later Silas and Timothy come to see him, bringing a gift of money from the disciples in Macedonia. Released from the grind of making a living, he gave himself wholly to preaching and teaching that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. The word of God was blessed abundantly. Many believed.

In the midst of Greek philosophy and a plan of living, which put ethics and culture above everything, Paul's message was unique. Offering salvation to all who would accept his Saviour as their Saviour, he had no fear of preaching false doctrine. The Jews among them knew that the Hope of Israel would come; but it was hard for them to give up their own ideas of His nature. The Greeks were confused when offered One God, One Lord, even Christ. The Holy Spirit worked in men's hearts in spite of all the things which seemed to be against Him. With something of regret Paul left these new converts, passing through Ephesus and into Macedonia. Here he related to the churches how the poor saints in Jerusalem were in great need.

Writing now his second letter to the Corinthians, he tells of the liberality of these Macedonian Christians. Commending the Christians at Corinth for their faith and sound teaching, he urges that they come to the front in the grace of lil erality too. Using a familiar figure of seed sowing for almsgiving, he points of that only in proportion as men sow can they expect to reap.

In the temple were two chests for gifts. One contained tithes and the special offerings required by law. Into the other went freewill offerings, thank offerings. Of the first nothing is said; but of the second, "God loveth a cheerful giver". . . . "Therefore, as ye abound in everything-in faith and in utterance and knowledge and in all diligence and in your love to us-see that ye abound in this grace also".

WITH the PROGRAM COMMITTEE



"Tithes and Offerings: God's Financial Plan for Men and Missions"—
Here is a topic over which many program committees have worked, yet the vast majority of our women have not learned to tithe. As the subject is shaped up for the March meeting, it should be the earnest purpose of the Program Committee so to present it that there shall be a group of new tithers developed. Each member of the committee should promise that every day between the meeting of the committee and that of the society she will pray definitely for this result.

The material given on pages 18-27 is so good that it is difficult to omit any of it. Yet the program must not be too long. As the opening devotions will lead up to the subject, it will not seem too abrupt to begin with "The Three Rs of Tithing". The leader may repeat the introduction and be followed by one or preferably three women, who give the three Rs--Reasons, Rules, Results. Each of these three talks should be made as short as possible, even if some things one would like to have said must be left out. One or two brief points clearly made will remain longer in the minds of the hearers.

The leader may now say: "We have prepared an old-fashioned examination for the members of the society. The advantages are that you will not have to write out any answers and that nobody but you yourself will ever see the papers. You need only to check the 'yes' or 'no' of each question but the last. This one you will not be able to check until you have listened to the experiences of seven women. You are then to check the one that most nearly resembles your situation".

Here have papers passed around bearing the following questions:

1-Do I believe in tithing? Yes. No.

2-Do I believe it is right for me to tithe? Yes. No.

3-Do I believe it is any harder for me to tithe than for others to do so? Yes. No.

4-Have I ever really tried tithing? Yes. No.

5-Did I find joy in tithing? Yes. No.

6-Shall I try tithing for the next four months? Yes. No.

7-If not, which of the seven following reasons shall I choose? 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7

The "examination papers" should be written clearly; it will be better to use a mimeograph if the society is large. Some young office woman, who is a member of the church, will gladly do this "over-and-above" service. It will be forehanded also to have a supply of pencils for use.

After the papers are distributed and time given for reading and checking them over, the leader may introduce the seven tithers who in turn will tell their stories (pages 22-24) If the last one seems so personal as to sound almost boastful, it may be put in the "third person" as follows: "I can tell you of Mrs. Faithful who was trained to tithe. She has tithed almost ever since she can remember etc."

At the close of this, the leader may ask all present to fold up their "examination papers" and take them home for further study, also stating that there are tithers' cards on the table for any who wish to get one at the close of the meeting. She may then speak briefly of offerings. Then—if there is time—some one may repeat the opening paragraph "Oh Money, Money" this to be followed by "Gifts and Givers" (pages 18, 26). A prayer for more tithers and offerings should close the program.

The THREE Rs of TITRING

"The tithe is holy unto Jehovah".

(This may be given either as one talk or three. If given by three women, it can be made more effective if each one carries a placard, the first one displaying in large letters the word REASONS; the second RULES, the third RESULTS. In this case the leader will give the introductory paragraph. If it is given as one talk, a large poster bearing the three words will aid in presenting the points.)

TITHING is a much talked of subject today, but it is one that many of us neither understand nor practice. Let us try to enrich our minds and souls with a better understanding of this important part of our Christian living as we discuss tithing in terms of three words beginning with R: Reasons, Rules and Results-the Three Rs of Tithing.

R-casons

MANY reasons for tithing have been given by thoughtful people and yet it is to be doubted if there is more than one real reason for this plan of Kingdom finance. All other reasons are based on this one. A reason for tithing usually cited is the needs of a lost world. When we realize that there are a billion souls in the world without Christ—a billion people enduring untold suffering in this world and eternal suffering in the world to come, surely that is reason enough for generous Christian giving. But in the face of this condi-

tion, reason demands far larger giving than the tenth. With the cry of dying millions on the ear the Christian heart desires to give one-fith, one-half or even all to help send the Gospel of Jesus to those who know it not.

Again we cite as a reason for tithing what God has done for us. When we consider God's goodness to us, how He created us and redeemed us and keeps us, how He gives us every good giff how He is preparing a place of eterns happiness for us in Heaven, that is reason enough for giving to Him. But how much? Surely reason demands far more than a tenth. In return for all His good and perfect gifts, the Christian heart longs to lay everything at His feet.

Why then the tithe? For the simple reason that it is required in the Word of God. It is the Father's impelling command. It is His plan for financing His Kingdom. It is one of His fundamental laws. It is taught both by precept and example on the pages of His book. Long before the decalogue was

ever given, Abraham and Jacob paid tithes. Into the law was written very definite commands concerning the consecration of tithes for the support of the house of the Lord and His priesthood. Jesus placed the undeniable stamp of His approval on the practice of paying tithes. Paul recommended proportionate giving as the means of Kingdom support. Thus in the Old Testament and in the New, in the law and in the Gospel, by prophet, apostle and by Jesus Himself we are commanded to tithe. This is a part of the Bible teaching on stewardship. God, as the owner of all we have and as the giver of all our gifts, claims one-tenth of our possessions as His own. This is His command as clear and definite as the command to be baptized. And this is the fundamental reason for tithing. Surely it is reason enough, for to the Christian there is nothing so forceful and so impelling as the command of God. What God says to do we must do. He says, "Tithe": therefore we must tithe.

R-ules

OD gives in His book very definite rules for tithing. We are not left to guess the what or where or when of it. What? The tithe is a tenth, definitely figured and not just guessed at. In the Bible we find these phrases: "The tithe of the fruits of the land ... the tithe of the oxen and sheep . . . the tithe of all things". A tithe, then, is a tenth of whatever God gives to us in wages, fees, inheritance or income from lands or other property. What a sensible plan is this! It is convenient and easy of computation. Even a child can figure the tenth of a dime, a dollar or a hundred dollars. It is fair to all, for those who have much, pay much, and those who have little pay little, and yet all pay the same proportionate amount and share alike in the Lord's work. It is a constant reminder that all we have belongs to God and that we are partners with Him in the use of His money and in the support of His Kingdom.

doubt as to where the tithe is to be paid, for He says: "Bring ye the whole tithe into the storehouse". Without question the storehouse means the treasury of the church. We are not to use our tithes to answer every call, that comes to our doors, according to our fitful impulses of generosity, but we are to bring them to the house of the Lord and place them in His treasury to be used according to the church's plan for financing the Kingdom. If all Christians would do this there would be no need for charitable institutions, and the church would take its rightful place as a panacea for the woes of suffering humanity.

When? When are we to bring our tithes? Combining the admonition of the Apostle Paul with that of the Prophet Malachi we have: "On the first day of the week . . . bring ve the whole tithe into the storehouse . . . according as God has prospered you". If you notice, we are told to bring our tithes and not to send them. On the first day of the week we are to come ourselves, bringing to the storehouse the tenth of what God has given us during the week, making that a definite part of our Sunday morning worship.

These are the rules for tithing given in God's book. How simple and sensible and sufficient they are! We wonder why any Christian would fail to see the wisdom of tithing and refuse to adopt it as his plan for the support of the Kingdom.

R-coults

Great Blessings for Ourselves-Without doubt tithing brings great blessings for ourselves. All of God's laws are for man's good and this one is no exception to the rule. God follows His command to bring the tithes into the storehouse with a challenge, saying: "And prove Me now herewith if I will not open you the windows of Heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it". Uncounted thousands of tithers have proved the faithfulness of Where? God does not leave us in this promise. The devourer has been

rebuked for their sakes, and material blessings have been poured on them from the windows of God's bounty. It is said that Gladstone tithed not only as a religious duty but also as a good business system. Many prosperous business men attribute their success in business to their strict partnership with God in paying tithes. Even when the material blessings are not so noticeably large, tithers say that the nine-tenths left after God's tenth has been paid seem to have magical power in paying bills and meeting material needs. We believe that David's great statement of trust could be paraphrased as thousands of southern Baptists say: "I have been young and now am old, but I have never seen the tither forsaken nor his seed begging bread".

But the blessings from God's windows cannot be measured in dollars and cents. The spiritual benefits of tithing are far greater than the material. The peace and satisfaction that come from tithing are worth more than silver or gold. Some one has said, "Stewardship is God's plan for raising men and not money". Tithing enlarges the soul, enriches the life and spiritualizes all the material possessions of the tither. The faithful stewardship of money makes men rich toward God, rich in love, joy, peace and all spiritual graces. The tither can approach God in prayer with a confidence that the non-tither cannot possibly have, for he has obeyed God's command and can claim His promise. He can hear the calls of a needy world with an easy conscience because he knows that he is answering those calls according to God's plan. He can listen to the reports of the work of his church and denomination with satisfaction and pride, knowing that he has bad a worthy part in it. No matter how small his tithe may be, he can have the joy of knowing that he is helping to support his own church and also helping to minister to the world's need and to save the world's lost. All of these blessings and many others we may have for ourselves by joining the band of faithful tithers.

freat Benefits for the Kingdom-The story of what tithing could do for the Kingdom reads like a magical fairy tale. Dr. B. H. Carroll once said, "If every Christian were to tithe it would not be ten years until every lost man in the world might have the Gospel

It has been suggested that the sum to be set for the Every-Member Canvass goal for 1932 be \$40,000,000 or only one-fourth of our tithe. We plan to do great things with this forty million dollars, but think what could be done if this were multiplied four times. The possibility staggers us. There would be no more debts, no heartbroken missionaries or enforced furloughs and no young volunteers disappointed because they are forbidden to answer the call of God for special service. All of our schools, hospitals and orphanages would receive adequate support, the veterans of the cross would be. amply cared for, the Gospel would be preached to needy groups in state and homeland, and shiploads of missionaries would cross the seas to tell the story of salvation to the world's lost millions. Not only that, but the work of our own churches would be gloriously advanced and there would be a spiritual revival beginning in our own hearts and reaching around the world as people by the millions turned to Jesus for salvation. Is this a wild dream? No, it is a true picture of what would happen if all southern Baptists would follow the Bible plan of tithing. If this could be true what a shame it is that it is not true. The failure of southern Baptists to tithe is wholly responsible for our denomination's present financial condition. How tragic! How disgraceful) May the day be hastened when our dream of an adequately financed missionary enterprise shall come true because all southern Baptists shall be faithful tithers.

HOW SEVEN TITHERS LEARNED to TITHE

"Prove Me now herewith, sayeth Jehovah of hosts".

Leader-We learn through the experi- ets. Of course I couldn't call myself a ences of others. Let us imagine that we are attending a tithing experience meeting. Seven tithers, who have had typical experiences, are going to tell us how they learned to tithe. These once thought that they had good reasons for not tithing, but they learned that those supposed reasons were but foolish excuses. As they tell their stories perbaps we shall see ourselves in their experiences and follow their examples in learning how to tithe.

(Let the seven tithers sit in a semicircle in front of audience as they tell their stories. It desired, informal conversation may be introduced to make this part of the program like a playlet.)

First Tither—I was once Mrs. Unbeliever who did not believe in tithing. I had heard a great deal about tithing but thought that it was just a scheme to get money out of poor people's pock-

poor woman, for I had everything I needed and more too. In fact, one reason why I refused to believe in tithing was because I knew that one-tenth of my income would be more than I was willing to part with. Of course I gave a little to the church along as I could spare it, but I didn't see any sense in giving as much as a tithe. One day I was reading my Bible and I came across these words, "The tithe is holy unto the Lord", and again, "Ye have robbed Me in tithes and offerings". That made me feel very uncomfortable, for I didn't like to be told in plain words that I was a thief, and yet I couldn't deny that I had robbed God of His tithe. Then I began studying about our southern Baptist mission work and saw that it was not going forward as it should because thousands of southern Baptists were robbers just as I was. I was not willing to share in the responsibility for Baptist

honest with the Lord's money. I am now Mrs. Believer who believes in tithing and brings her tithe to the store. house every Sabbath day.

Second Tither-I was Mrs. Selfish who kept the tithe and used it for my own desires. I knew that tithing was taught in the Bible but said, "I'll titbe later on when I don't need the money so much for my own family". You see, I wanted to keep my children well dressed and give them every advantage. Besides. I wanted pretty clothes for myself, luxuries for the house and other things that cost money. So I said, "I just can't tithe now, but when the children are through school and I am getting old and don't care much for nice things then I will tithe". But the day came when one of my children was very ill, and as I prayed for her recovery I saw how selfish I had been. I saw that I had no right to ask God for things when I had never shared with Him the wonderful blessings which He had showered on me. I decided to become Mrs. Unselfish and pay my tithe even if it meant doing without many things I wanted. And. do you know, my own children are greatly blessed by this change. Though I had not realized it they, too, had been growing very selfish, but now they are sharing their blessings with the whole

Third Tither-I was Mrs. Deceived who thought I couldn't know what the tithe was. My husband was a farmer and he and I agreed that it was impossible for us to know what our income was, therefore we could not tithe. We gave generously to the church but did not try to figure the tithe. One day some one said to us: "If you should be offered a bonus of ten per cent of your income for the year you would find some way to calculate it, wouldn't you?" We knew that that was true. Fourth Tither-I was once Mrs. Thought-She-Couldn't-Tithe, I believed in tithing but felt that I couldn't practice it because I had no money of my own. My husband didn't believe in it and all the money I had was what he gave me for household expenses, and that seemed to be barely enough to meet the needs of my family. One day. as I was reading the Bible admonition to tithe. I came to that place where God said. "Prove Me". Those words seemed like a challenge, and I said in my heart: "I will do it. I will pay into the Lord's treasury a tithe of the household money and trust God to make the other ninetenths pay the bills". I kent that resolution and have proved that God is true to His promises. Not only did He help me to meet the expenses of my family after the tithe was paid but He changed the spirit of my home. Even the children have been willing to sacrifice that God might have His part. And best of happy in the thought that they are all, my husband has seen the wisdom of the plan and has become a tither too. Now, instead of being Mrs. Thought-She-Couldn't-Tithe I am Mrs. Knows-She-Can-Tithe. In my opinion every woman could tithe if she had faith enough and love enough.

Fifth Tither-I was Mrs. Faker, who tithed and yet didn't tithe. Yes, I actually gave a tenth to the Lord and then took part of it back. I carried a small portion of my tithe to the Lord's treasury, then kept the rest to give as I please. You see, I had to help with the Community Chest and the Red Cross. and I enjoyed always having some of the Lord's money on hand to give to the poor people who came to my door. From that time on we began keeping Then, too, I had to belp support old

and couldn't take care of himself, so I just used part of my tithe money for that. But the time came when I realized that God commanded that we should bring the whole tithe into the storehouse; so I ceased to be Mrs. Faker and became Mrs. Honest as I resolved to place every cent of my tithe in the treasury of my church. I still help to support Uncle Needy and give to other worthy causes, but I do it out of my nine-tenths instead of out of the Lord's

Sixth Tither-I was Miss Uninformed. I was a business woman, on a good salary, but I gave to my church in a very careless and unsystematic way. I heard my pastor preach on tithing occasionally, but I never did think about it seriously. In fact I didn't know much about the Lord's work anyway, for I had been so occupied with my business that I had never taken time to inform myself. My hours at the office were such that I could not attend the meetings of the Woman's Missionary Society, so I was ruly Miss Uninformed, very ignorant nd very indifferent. The change in my life came when our W.M.S. organized a Business Woman's Circle. This met at night when I was able to attend. At those meetings we had splendid programs, and I learned about missionary work as southern Baptists were doing it. Then we had a study class in stewardship and I learned the meaning of the tithe and its place in Christian life. I am no longer Miss Uninformed but am informed and am a faithful tither. We business women

are often a neglected class in the church. If plans were made to keep us informed about missions and stewardship many of us would become tithers and our combined tithes would greatly increase the contents of the Lord's storehouse.

Seventh Tither-I am Mrs. Faithful who was trained to tithe. I have been a tither almost ever since I can remember, for as a child in the Sunday school and the Sunbeam Band, and later in the G.A., Y.W.A. and B.Y.P. U. I was taught the principle and practice of tithing. At first I tithed money that was given to me, and then, when I began making money for myself, I tithed that. I married a man who also believed in tithing, and we have always tithed our family income. I know I am not a robber, for I have never kept a cent of God's money in my pocket. I know I am not a parasite. for I have been a vital part of the church to which I belong, sharing through my tithe in all her activities. I am not a miser, for with a joyful heart I have sent my tithes out into the world to be a blessing to others. I may not be rich in this world's goods, but I am daily growing richer toward God as I share in all the work of His Kingdom. The only way we will ever realize our dream of a southern Baptist tithing constituency is to teach the young people to tithe before they begin to deceive themselves with foolish excuses. With the right kind of training we can raise a generation of tithers who will do all the things we talk about but have never been able to do.

TAVE you ever thought about God's extra gifts to us? When I lesus fed the five thousand, not only were all filled but they gathered up twelve baskets of the fragments which remained. This is a picture of God's bounty, filling us full of good things and then adding baskets full of extras. God expects us to imitate His generosity by giving extra gifts to Him. In His book, after speaking of tithes He adds the words, "and offerings". He says that the tithe is His. Until it is paid, no gifts can be given. Wonderful possibilities are wrapped up in those words, "and offerings". He widened the possibility of our generosity to the extent of our devotion. He granted to us the privilege of sharing with Him the spirit of adding extra gifts as an expression of extra love.

It is the experience of tithers that they are never willing to stop with the tithe. Indeed tithing is just the gateway that leads to the avenue of much generous giving. The more we tithe the more we love God. And that extra love demands extra expression in giving. The sense of partnership with God that comes to the tither increases his interest in the things of the Kingdom and makes him want to increase

March is the month of special home mission appeal also. Our regular giving seldom is up to our real limit of giving. We rejoice to pay our tithe through our church pledges and bring in our love-offerings in over-and-above gifts. This is a Scriptural procedure. A recent statement by Dr. John R. Mott showed that less than 2% of our population availed itself of the privilege of deducting 15% of their income from income tax payment by devoting it to charitable and religious causes. We see clearly then as Christians we are not giving as we should. Counselors and young people's directors have opportunity to change the feeble giving of the past into faithful, fervent giving in the future. In the last analysis our gifts are small because our love of Christ and our desire for His Kingdom are not always large enough to motivate real gifts. In that good day when as followers of Christ we really seek His Kingdom first, our stewardship will become an eager joy. Through our W. M.U. organizations of missionary education this earnest eagerness and real appreciation of values should be realized in the dedication of young people to the Kingdom tasks. Let us be sure that these March days, with Easter's reiteration of the message of our living Lord, lead our young people on into a richer experience of love for Christ which will touch not only their pocketbooks in immediate gifts but will guide in all their life purposes. 

CURRENT EVENTS



Discussed by Mrs. W. C. James, Virginia

"Steward I-and not possessor-of the wealth intrusted me. What, were God Himself the holder, would His disposition be? This I ask myself each morning, every noon and every night As I view His gentle goodness, with an ever new delight".

In Palestine the Christians (most of whom are Arabs) number about thirty-two per cent of the population. Eighteen per cent are Jews and all the rest are Mohammedan Arabs.

In China, which only a short time ago had almost 8,000 protestant missionaries, there is so far one Christian to every 1,000 inhabitants. Large racial groups are entirely untouched by the Gospel. Almost one-fourth of all China is untouched by any Chinese or foreign mission society.

A Japanese layman, who has already given a son to the Christian ministry, has now established a trust fund of \$100,000, the income from which is to be used for the cause of Christ in his district after the death of himself and his wife.

We learn from the "Missionary Review of the World" that few realize to what an appalling extent the evil of slavery curses the human race. It is estimated that there are today 5,000,000 slaves in various lands and the trade is still active in many parts of the world.

According to the "Alliance Weekly" many of the protestant churches in southern Italy have been established by emigrants returning from the United States where they have acquired money and education and have been converted to evangelical Christianity. It is estimated that there are now 200,000 evangelical Christians in a total population of 43,000,000.

When Dr. Kagawa, the great spiritual leader of Japan, was asked what American Christians could do to help bring in the Kingdom of God in Japan and other lands, he replied: "The greatest need is for a revival of spiritual life in America. I find in America both the worst and the best; the lowest morality and the highest spirituality. America must purify and strengthen her own life".

In "Christianity Today" we find the following: "It is reported that within fifty miles of Boston thirty-two Soviet Sunday schools function in which children are instructed in atheism. In Pittsburg a Soviet Sunday school, with an average attendance of 700, is said to meet every Sunday. In these gatherings, the children are taught to hate God, Christ and the Bible-openly".

Dr. Charles Francis Potter told his congregation on a recent Sunday morning that Hinduism was gaining in New York City and in the country at large. He declared that the Hindu missionaries to America had met with much better response than Christian missionaries to India.

Again quoting Kagawa: "It is time when, as in the days when Christ was on earth, we are called to leave all and follow Him if we would spread His Kingdom among men. We should be gamblers for God', putting all we have and are on His altar and devoting all to His service".
