Community Missions Committee

Prepare for soul-winning visitation during Focus Week. Have training class for soul-winners. Helping Others to Become Christians (50c from your Baptist Book Store) may be used. Ask pastor's advice.

Know steps in conversion: Conviction of sin—Romans 3:23 Repentance of sin—Luke 13:3 Confess him as Saviour—Matthew 10:32 Desire to obey and live for him-

Know sinners' objections and some answers.

Pray and depend on Holy Spirit for power.

Seek decisions for Christ.

- (b) Have ready names, ages, addresses, and other available information concerning those to be visited
- (c) Assign partners, go two by two.
- (d) Have tracts to leave in homes.
- (e) Help converts know what God expects in church membership and Christian witness.
- (f) Seek to enlist new Christians in church activities.
- (g) Keep good records of results of visits.

Prayer Committee

Promote the nine o'clock prayer time or choose another hour for Focus Week. Organize prayer groups or partners to pray for those who are lost and those doing soul-winning visitation. Encourage members in family worship to pray for soul-winning efforts.

Promote attendance at mid-week prayer meeting.

Encourage Intercessory Prayer League members to pray for all Focus Week plans.

Enlistment Committee

Have committee ready to give membership folders (order from Woman's Missionary Union, Birmingham 3, Ala., 20c doz.) to women who join the church at the Sunday services on January 12. Arrange for brief but challenging messages on WMS work to be given in women's Sunday school classes or in adult Sunday school and Training Union assemblies if superintendents agree.

On Sunday evening place a few members of committee at Woman's Missionary Society exhibit; give out membership folders to unenlisted women.

Program Chairman Fundamentals Chairman Youth Directors

At close of Sunday evening or Wednesday evening services during Focus Week conduct WMS tour. Guides in each room will, of course, be the committees responsible for their part of the tour. At close of tour you may want to serve punch and cookies. Go from room to room in which the following displays have been arranged.

Room 1. World Awareness—Place on wall travel posters from all parts of world; on one table have books chosen from World in Books, copies of Royal Service, on others WMS Round Table books. Hang on door the general missionary program theme for year. Present monthly topics with attractive placards (see September Royal Service or WMU Year Book, page 47, for topics.)

Room 2. Spiritual Life Development—Use picture of praying hands superimposed on large world. Display Royal Service calendar of prayer, pictures of Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong (25c each from Woman's Missionary Union, Birmingham 3, Ala.), dates of weeks and season of prayer, also themes, and books on prayer.

Room 3. Christian Witnessing— Make poster or streamers: To Win Souls, To Meet Other Spiritual Needs in Community. Display such pictures as mission Sunday school classes, hospitals. Good Will Centers, jails, Bible, religious literature. Have posters of special emphases for year;

Room 4. Sharing Possessiens—Decorate room with dollar marks, stewardship slogans, tithing and Cooperative Program leaflets, streamers, and posters. Display book of the year, God's Wealth and Ours, price 50c from Baptist Book Store.

Room 5. Educating Youth in Missions—Use YWA, GA, and Sunbeam Band emblems, manuals, GA Forward Step awards, youth magazines, and all other available materials (see WMU Year Book.)

WHAT ARE SOME 17

"We will seek to develop an appreciation for all people."

During the past quarter you have been studying Africa. You have seen a continent in commotion. Community Missions and Mission Study Chairmen, have your members felt the heavy heart beat of a people in bondage, seeking freedom? Freedom from ignorance, freedom from superstition, freedom from oppression are desired by Africans whether in Africa or in the United States of America.

Now that your study is over, or almost over, how successful was it? Did it help you develop a greater appreciation for the Negro people? Has it set you and the other members of your society in motion, causing you to act differently toward the Negroes in your home, your community?

"Southern Baptist women can help to prepare the people in their communities for the implementation of the Supreme Court's decision concerning integration in the public schools. No better service can be offered than to conduct with Christian decorum discussion groups and study classes.

"If we believe it is possible to be Christian in race relations, now is the time for Baptist women to lend their influence in this new area where common sense, understanding, and Christian integrity are essential"—Guide for Community Missions.

Let us keep our attitude that of Christian sisters and not one of superiority of class or color.

In your efforts to help the Negroes, plan together with the president of a nearby Negro WMS or the pastor of a Negro Baptist church, or the principal of a Negro school.

What are some monds?

A mothers' club with lessons in preparation of food for invalids, for babies and growing children?

Classes in simple elements of sewing, studies in home care and decoration?

Classes in first aid, information about good citizenship, law observance, and the alcohol problem?

A Christian community center providing a day nursery and playgrounds to aid the Negro working mother?

English and Bible classes, night school, an employment exchange service, simple medical care?

Classes for maids, cooks, and practical nurses, sewing classes?

Music clubs and choir work, a branch library, Bible classes and a vacation Bible school of longer duration than a regular school?

Books, religious and theological magazines for Negro pastors?

Training classes for Negro Baptist leadership in mission study classes, classes in stewardship, in church finance, soul-winning, and methods of organization?

Better recreation facilities instead of liquor stores, dance halls and pool rooms which are centers for crime?

A Reminder to Community Missions Chairmen—The Christmas holiday season is an excellent time for you and your committee to activate the fourth and fifth Christian standards in the WMU Plan of Work.

High standards of conduct, speech, and dress. With the rush of Christmas shopping it is easy to become impatient with the crowds and inconsiderate of those whose work is heavier at this sesson.

Promote high standards of conduct and speech with Christmas Shopper's Slogans. At WMS circle meetings have members of your committee march by slowly with banners on which such slogans are printed: "Smile, bring a lift to the clerks." "Listen—enjoy the soft music in the stores." "Be grateful for the bells of the Salvation Army." "Appreciate the Christmas stars on city streets." "Keep the feeling of Christmas wonder and loveliness in your heart."

Remind the members of your society that there is no place for pushing and fussing in high standards of Christian conduct and speech. You can lose Christmas with too much shopping, too much cooking, too much decorating, too much card addressing—though all are good Christmas customs.

The fifth Christian standard is law observance. Death takes no holiday. Every holiday the death totals soar higher and higher. Read this statement by President Dwight D. Eisenhower and help promote law enforcement:

"I have a deep conviction that the United States can do anything to which 160,000,000 citizens set their hearts and minds. We know that we cannot solve the traffic accident problem in one day; but we can—and must start doing a better job. I appeal then to every American to help demonstrate that we can—by our own personal efforts—reduce accidents on our streets and highways. Let us see how many highway deaths and injuries we can prevent by obeying traffic regulations, following sim-

ple rules of good sportsmanship and courtesy, and staying alert and careful, whether driving or walking."

PROMOTE USE OF THE

Palendal

In some societies the president is requesting that the prayer chairman at the beginning of each meeting have a brief meditation period when she gives stress to prayer and the use of your prayer calendar. The following ideas from Mrs. T. A. Patterson of Beaumont, Texas may be helpful to you. Look in your December Royal Service to see arrangement Mrs. Patterson has used.

Arrange real or artificial grapes across bottom and up one side of picture frame, allowing fruit to spill out on table. If a real frame is used, a piece of styrofoam fitted across the bottom, will hold arrangements as you stick stems into foam. Write carefully the verse given for that day on Call to Prayer and place in the proper position. Into capsules put the names of the missionaries for the day, with bit of information about each if possible. These capsules are easily prepared by puncturing one end. knotting a 6- or 8-inch florist's wire, and wrapping base of capsule and wire to make a green stem. Florist's tape is easiest to use for this purpose. Arrange among

story in your prayer calendar for that day. Then have designated women open the capsules one at a time and pray for the missionaries. The leader will close the prayer.

Or use magnolis or other large glossy leaves in the frame. Leaves of a contrasting color will give a balanced effect. Try skeletonized leaves available wherever artifical or dried flowers are sold. Attach on the backs of the skeletonized leaves small paper leaves of matching color. Write on leaves the names of missionaries. The leader proceeds as suggested above; or pray before reading the Scripture verse, and follow with a musical benediction.

Another idea: Along with leaves or colored flowers, place in a frame letters addressed to the missionaries for the day. (See Directory of Missionary Personnel, free from Foreign Mission Board, Box 5148. Richmond 20, Va.) The woman who chooses a name not only will pray for that one, but will write later a brief appreciation letter on the blank note paper in the envelope. If there are more than three letters, the others should be placed in a shallow basket, a letter holder, or a container which fits the arrangement.

Other suggestions: At Christmas use bells, stars such as are used in tree decorations, toy sheep, etc., each with a Scripture verse and music.



Asia

Last year most of the appropriations for Colombia were for the International Theological Seminary. That request had been so urgent that it was on the very top of the list. It had been easy to agree that that was our greatest number one need for Colombia. Since 1948 Colombia has not received any evangelistic mission-
