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A New Year

75th Anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union

January, 1963, begins an important year. It is the 75th year of Woman's Missionary Union. Throughout the year anniversary meetings will be held in state conventions, in associational meetings; and in Kansas City, Missouri, May 6-7, 1963, the anniversary meeting of Woman's Missionary Union, SBC, will be held.

Local Woman's Missionary Unions will keep the 16 anniversary goals before their organizations and associational Woman's Missionary Unions will be seeking to attain the 6 associational goals. See pages 12-21 in the 1962-63 WMU Year Book for presentation of each of the goals.

On the local level the following committees will assume leadership for the goals which pertain to their phase of work.

- 75 per cent of leaders holding current leadership cards

Recognition will be given for the attainment of 12 or more goals.

YWA. GA and Sunbeam Band directors will keep the goals before the youth organizations and lead them to participate in the goals which apply to their organizations.

World Missions Year

1963 has been designated by the Southern Baptist Convention as World Missions Year. Dr. Baker James Cauthen, Executive Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board. has been chairman of the committee planning for this significant year. He says, "There will be concentrated thought upon sharing the gospel of Christ with all the peoples of the world. . . . World Missions Year will focus attention upon what is being done and should be done in the name of Christ beyond the confines of the church and its local community.... The chief value of the year . . . will come in the deepening of conviction about the world mission task, conviction which will bear fruit and strengthen the cause of world missions for all the years to come."

Tuesday—Seek Those Gone Astray. Matthew 18:12 (Juvenile rehabilitation)

Thursday—Arise and Go into the City. Acts 9:6 (Mission centers in downtown areas)

Friday—Enter Open Doors. 1 Corinthians 16:9 (New opportunities—Hawaii, Puerto Rico, etc.)

Effective observance of the Week of Prayer will require advance planning. A New Day

More Than One WMS in a Church

At the close of World War II, there were 191/2 million women in the labor force; 15 years later, in 1960, there were 23 million. This increasing number of women workers made it necessary for Woman's Missionary Union to study again WMS work. Business women are capable of taking greater responsibility in Woman's Missionary Society work than just that of a circle. If the Missionary Society is to be as significant as it should be for business women, they should enter into the full planning and participating in a Woman's Missionary Society. Then there were women who found it more convenient or who preferred going to a night meeting. What was the answer? It seemed to be a night Woman's Missionary Society.

In a recent survey it was discovered that those enlisted in WMS

were in the following age brackets. (Percentage of age groups enlisted in WMS as compared to Sunday school enrolment in these age groups)

Married young women, ages 16-25, in WMS, 31.7 per cent

Women, ages 26-30, in WMS, 38.8 per cent

Women, ages 31-40, in WMS, 45.8 per cent

Women, ages 41-above, in WMS, 48.9 per cent

These figures point up the tremendous enlistment potential there is among women in all ages, with the largest number unenlisted in the younger age bracket, 16-30. In the working world, the largest percentage of working women are also in these ages. In some churches the young adult Woman's Missionary Society has been the means of enlisting many more young women.

The retired business woman and the senior adult have become a challenge to many Woman's Missionary Societies. In some churches these women need to be organized into a WMS that will more nearly meet their needs.

The Sunbeam Nursery provides suitable learning experiences for children, birth through three, while mothers attend the Woman's Missionary Society meetings. By organizing a Sunbeam Nursery young mothers are often enlisted in the Missionary Society. The Sunbeam Nursery may meet during the gen-

eral missionary program meeting, circle meetings, or any other meeting of the society. Only those children brought to the nursery by the mothers are enrolled.

WMU Enlistment Week

The purpose of Enlistment Week is threefold: enlistment, enlargement and improvement. This intensive, concerted endeavor helps reach all prospects for Woman's Missionary Society, Young Woman's Auxiliary, Girls' Auxiliary, and Sunbeam Band. To enlist prospects there must be adequate organizations, competent leadership, and constant attention given to improving the organization program.
